Kappas Delcare Civil Rights Director Insensitive To Blacks

The Grand Board of Directors of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. has forwarded to President Ronald Reagan a resolution regarding the misrepresentative statements made toward Blacks by Linda Chavez, Director of the United States Commission on Civil Rights according to Grand Plemarch Robert L. Gordon.

Linda Chavez, the new staff Director of the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights revealed that she believes the major problems among American Blacks are no longer civil rights and neither the Commission nor the government can solve them.

"Ms. Chavez contends that the economic and social disadvantage among minorities are not necessarily the result of discrimination," said Grand Plemarch Robert L. Gordon. Ms. Chavez has asked the Commission to cancel a study on the effects of cutbacks in student aid on minorities.

"She believes the government has no obligation to make college affordable for minority students," said Grand Plemarch Gordon.

Ms. Sanchez recently requested a study on the adverse impact of affirmative action on

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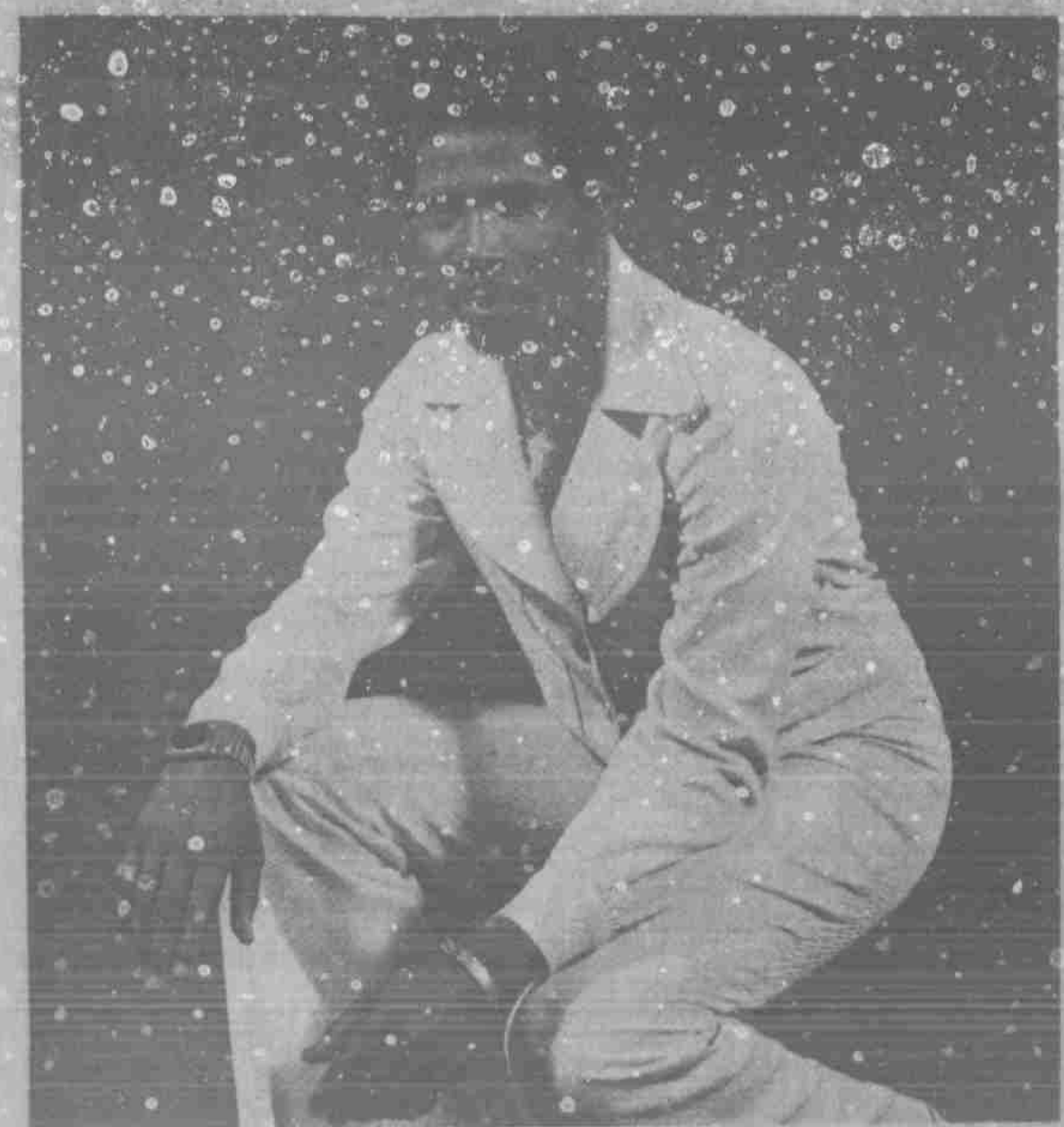

Demand For Blood Donors

The demand for blood and blood components is rapidly increasing in communities across the world. Medical advances and modern surgical techniques - cancer treatments, organ transplants, and open heart surgery - continue to create an increase in demand. Lubbock and the surrounding counties on the South Plains and in eastern New Mexico is an area in which the medical community plays a major role not only in the health of its citizens but also the health of the economy. Without an adequate supply of blood and blood products, the medical community cannot continue to advance. The

all-volunteer blood bank is one way of assuring that safe blood supply for the region.

The all-volunteer blood bank operates on the basic premise that donating blood is a community responsibility which is part of one's service to the community, just as United Way or other community activities. Blood should be available to anyone who needs it, regardless of whether he or she is a donor or a part of a special donor group. Since blood is freely given by volunteers, there is never any charge for the blood itself. The patient is charged only a processing fee which covers the

direct cost of recruiting donors, collecting, processing, testing, storing and distributing the blood. Just as there are costs in any business, such as salaries, supplies, postage, electricity, etc., which must be paid in cash, there are costs for the blood bank. The processing fee covers these costs. Patients are urged to help replenish the blood supply by asking their friends and family to donate, but they are not required to do so to offset a non-replacement charge.

Since donors are not being paid and there are no extra costs to administer a blood assurance plan or non-replacement plan,

costs to the patient remain among the lowest in the country. While total medical costs increased 146.5% between 1977 and 1981, the processing costs for red blood cells increased only 29.0% system-wide through 1982. Costs remain at the same level as 1981.

The all-volunteer system not only has the advantages of lower costs to the patient but also helps to assure the continuation of a safe blood supply. With all the press coverage on AIDS, many people are concerned about the blood supply. Blood donors in an all-volunteer system have no

Social Security Tips Your Social Security And You

A hospice is more a concept than a place. It refers to the care and treatment of a terminally ill patient in the patient's own home and includes physician's services, nursing care, medical appliances and supplies, home health aide and homemaker services, and social services and counseling. Medicare hospital insurance will pay almost the entire cost of this care. If the services are provided by a Medicare-certified hospice.

Patients eligible for Medicare-covered hospice care must be eligible for Medicare hospital insurance, and both the patient's physician and the hospice medical director must certify that the patient has a terminal illness. In addition, patients must sign a statement indicating they are selecting hospice care instead of the standard Medicare benefits.

The hospice may be operated either by a public agency or a private organization whose primary function is furnishing care to terminally ill patients and their families. The agency must be certified by Medicare to offer hospice care if its services are to be covered.

Patients may receive hospice care for two periods of 90 days each and for one period of 36 days. Medicare pays the hospice directly for the full amount of all reasonable and necessary covered services.

Only two items are subject to a deductible or co-payment: First, the hospice may charge 5 percent, up to a maximum of \$5, for each outpatient prescription for pain relief or symptom management; and second, the hospice may charge 5 percent of the cost of inpatient care (up to \$356 for 1984) for "respite care"—i.e., short-term inpatient care that may be necessary to permit the person who ordinarily cares for the patient to obtain some relief.

Q. Can a patient change from one hospice program to another?
A. A patient receiving hospice care can change to another hospice program once during each period of care.

Q. What happens if a patient continues to need hospice care after the hospice benefit periods are used up?
A. The hospice is required to continue to provide care unless the patient no longer wants it.

The two day conference will feature comprehensive workshops for women who are in the start up or early growth of business ownership as well as seminars for women who already own established businesses.

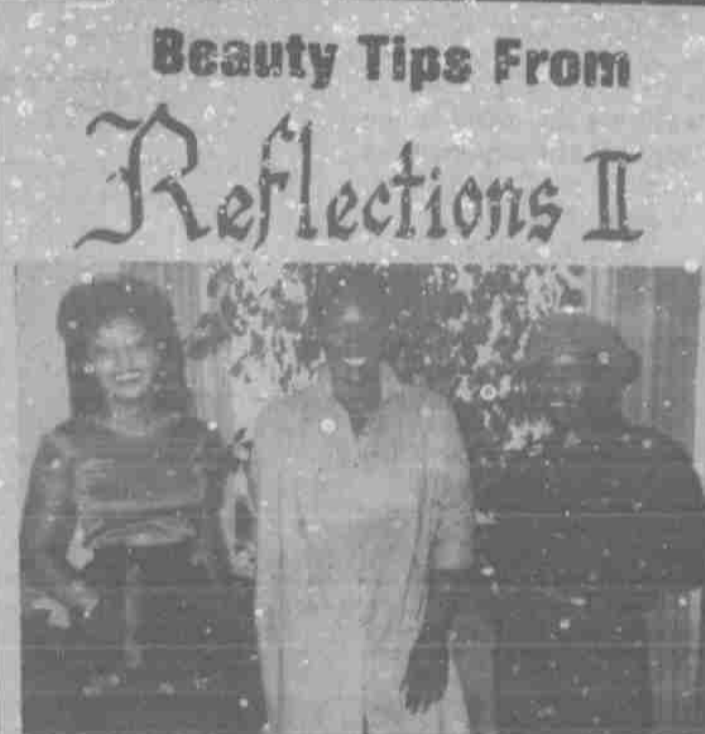

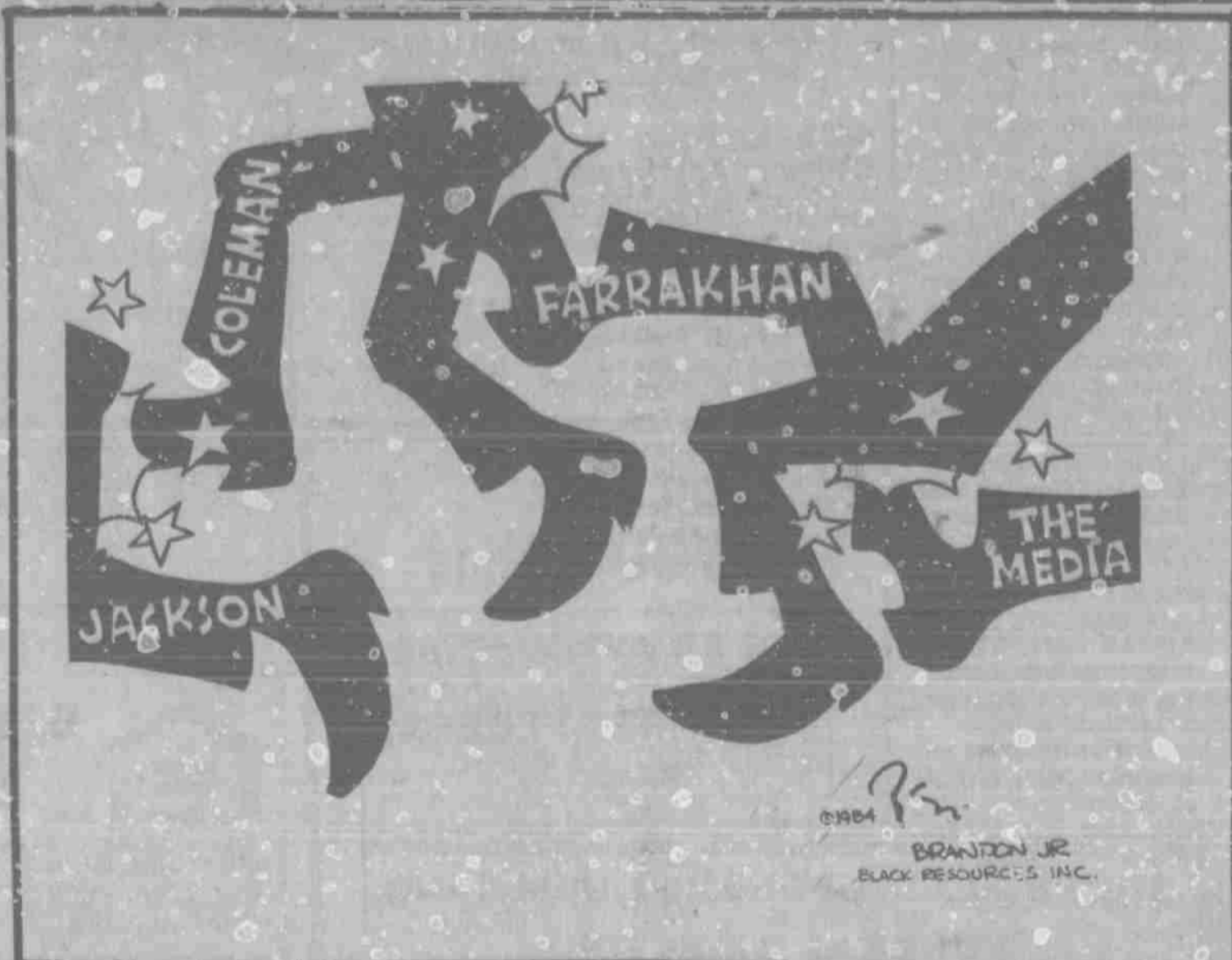

The Law and Legal Services

If you are applying for or receiving Social Security benefits of any kind, you should be aware of your basic rights and responsibilities.

A person receiving any benefits is required to report any change of his or her situation to the Social Security Administration within 10 days. If you do not, you may lose your benefits or even be asked to pay back part or all of the money paid. Some of the changes that must be reported are change of address, change of income, conviction of felony crime, marriage, divorce, adoption.

If you make an application for Social Security benefits and you are denied, you have the right to appeal that decision. Usually the time limits are 10, 30, or 60 days. If you receive any letters from Social Security denying you benefits, we suggest you talk to a lawyer, paralegal or some other person who understands Social Security rules and let them advise you about what steps you can take to protect your interests.

The rules of Social Security are quite complicated and there are many different kinds of benefits. Be sure to ask your caseworker any questions you might have. It is best to get the name of the worker and the explanation of your questions in writing. If the explanation is not clear, talk to someone else at Social Security or seek outside legal advice.

The Continuing Struggle for Equity in Education

As we approach the thirtieth anniversary of Brown v. the Board of Education, we have many educational gains to be thankful for, and many remaining problems to address.

The Black struggle for educational opportunity in this country has been a long and difficult one. In 1859, more than nine out of ten Blacks in the South were illiterate -- not surprising, given the laws making it a crime to teach slaves to read. In 1860, according to the U.S. Census, fewer than two percent of all Blacks of school age were enrolled in school. By 1870, this had increased to ten percent; by 1880 to about 34 percent, and by 1910 to about 45 percent.

By 1954, the year of the Brown decision, 98 percent of Black children ages 7-13 and 79 percent of those ages 14-17 attended school. However, the majority of these children attended schools that were racially segregated.

Today Black and white children of all ages are about equally likely to be enrolled in school. And Black and white students stand an equal chance of graduating from high school. Yet Black children still face a one in five chance of attending a school in which 90-100 percent of the students are minority.

The worst instances of segregation occur in Northern urban areas. Of equal concern is the segregation of Black children within school. A Black child is more than three times as likely as a white child to be placed in a class for the educable mentally retarded, but only one-third as likely to be admitted to a class for gifted and talented students.

The quality of education -- no matter which school a Black child attends -- remains a continuing challenge. Since the mid-1970s, the major agenda for public schools that have large numbers of poor and minority children has been to raise teachers' and principals' expectations for children's achievement and to design programs that can help maximize children's potential. Superintendents of the big city schools, where minority children are concentrated, have been concerned that children not only have equal access to education but equal access to a good education.

This is important not only because minority children make up an increasingly large percentage of urban school populations, but also because some of the recent critics of education have quite wrongly suggested that minority students are in some way to blame for the declining quality of American public schools.

These critics have confused the positive changes brought about by the civil rights movement of the 1960s and 1970s with changes resulting from the attack on traditional institutions that also occurred during that time. Challenges to authority removed rules and regulations regarding dress, hair length, and other parts of the discipline code. In the academic programs, elective courses proliferated. There was a move away from core academic programs that emphasized reading, writing, and math. Some adults began talking about not imposing values on young people. Requiring a young person to write six paragraphs of decent English prose was questioned as an unnecessary imposition. Of course, it is an imposition, it is also a helpful skill to learn.

At the same time, schools are struggling with the need to provide extra help to children who could not write the six paragraphs of English

Unemployment is not caused by undocumented immigrants. In places like Akron, Ohio, Gary Indiana and Tulsa, Oklahoma where there are virtually no such immigrants, unemployment is higher than it is in Dallas where there are many.

The causes of unemployment are greedy companies irresponsibly leaving the United States to pursue slave labor abroad, and Reaganomics, a system that has moved from a war on poverty to a declaration of war against the poor.

The ultimate goal of the Rainbow coalition is to bring in the locked out and create the conditions necessary so that people can solve their own problems. People must be able to control their own destinies, and thus affirm their own self-respect. That point is not negotiable.

GULLETTIN -- Louis Farrakhan, the leader of a Black Muslim sect said recently that if the Rev. Jesse Jackson was not taken seriously at the Democratic National Convention, the Muslim leader would lead an army to Washington to demand that blacks be allowed to secede from the United States.

CHIMES: The California Public Utilities Commission recently approved low-cost telephone service for households with annual incomes of up to \$11,000. The service, expected to serve 1.2 million households, replacing existing budget programs which have no income limit.

More Chimes: It is always nice to go back home in Oklahoma and to be exact -- to the largest all-black town in America. The facts are there are an increasing number of our white brothers as well as Indian brothers moving in all around and that is perhaps as it should be. Boley, Oklahoma was founded some 80 years ago by Blacks fearing oppression in the South. Booker T. Washington said it was "a noble experiment" that time could only tell if Blacks were capable of governing themselves.

Boley did reach its heights in the '20s and early '30s. There were thriving businesses, manufacturing plants, beautiful homes and two well managed banks. Then came the great depression of the '30s. Boley, like hundreds of other communities over the nation suffered. Today there is a stable growth and leaders say a bigger future may be just ahead. We hope so for Boley is home and home and God are buried in the sands of "my old hometown" and today we see flowers on their resting place. They loved Boley.

Capitol Report!

Well, this is State Representative Al Edwards reporting to you. I was delighted that I received 6,638 votes on May 5. That was the largest vote for a candidate for State Representative in Harris County. The next highest vote getter was Republican Mike Toomey with 5,619. The number two Democrat was Paul Colbert with 5,428.

Even if you did not vote in the May Democratic Primary you may vote in the June 2 run off as long as you have not voted in the primaries of any other party nor signed the petition of any other party and it is too late to register for the run off, but not too late to register for the all important November General Election.

All the parents that I know and have worked with -- from the rural areas of Mississippi to the housing projects of Cleveland -- have high expectations for their children. Poor and Black parents in particular believe that their children's future depends upon their success in school.

Brown, and what we have accomplished since, are still just part of a longer, continuing struggle to make education all that it can and should be for all children. We must not lose sight of that goal.

Palestine Picture of Principle Problem Queen Seals Lost Soldiers of Fortune

Being "Queen for a day" was the wish of every housewife a few years back. It meant money, a new dishwasher, a vacuum cleaner, cheap furniture and a trip to sunny California from the old cold midwestern or eastern humdrum habitat. Half the new Queen and new woman, not just for a day, but always. A real live Queen, an American woman who is not only a household engineer and mother, but an architect and urban planning expert for projects in the United States, Australia, Iran Jordan and other countries of the Middle East. Earned degree back in 1974 from a then previously all male bastion called Princeton University. Unlike so many males or females who benefited from the civil rights break throughs of the 60s to become one of the first women to receive a baccalaureate from a prestigious ivy league school, she has not forgotten those without such good fortune or to challenge those who would continue to deny the moral and human rights of all people.

Her Majesty Queen Noor Al Hussein of the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan, rose to address the usually cool, calm and collected if somewhat staid audience of the Commonwealth Club of California last month on the subject of Middle East Peace: Challenge to America's Principles. She posed a few eyeballs with her brilliant analysis of the archaic U.S. Middle East foreign policy. People will probably accurately argue that the Queen, a statuesque beauty, crowned with great flocks of golden reddish hair could command attention in the middle of a bull fight by merely standing and gazing about the circular arena. A stunningly attractive woman able to see through the mass created by the bull.

While no Queen worthy of her crown could use the language to directly describe the doing of the U.S. in the Middle East, it was easy for this learned leader to admonish an errant fetherland for falling down on the principles she personally cherished here and still does in her new country.

"Consider," questions the Queen, "human rights and the concept of self-determination an idea that America's President Wilson gave to the world. Why is it that the United States refused to apply it to the world? Why is it that in Grenada, the United States takes military action in the name of freedom; and at the same time ignores Palestinians living under Israeli military occupation in the west bank and Gaza? The Palestinians are experiencing everyday what it means to be denied the freedom of self-determination over their own lives and future. For years they have been suffering the denial of human rights in every aspect of their lives morally, physically and materially."

An Arab American born in Washington, D.C. Queen Noor Al Hussein has been Queen of the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan since 1978. An act which occurred three years after I visited Jordan on a "mission of peace" for the Black Press. The problem that existed then, exists now. The Queen has no choice but to condemn her former country for its corruption of its own effort of "alaam" peace in the area. The continuing practices of the part of the United States to either ignore or excuse these (moral and physical human rights) violations by Israel has seriously tarnished the American image in Arab eyes. Clearly the Queen, if but for a day in this country, would vanish the Israeli's washer, dryer, vacuum cleaner, cheap furniture and all from occupied Palestine and the Gaza strip.

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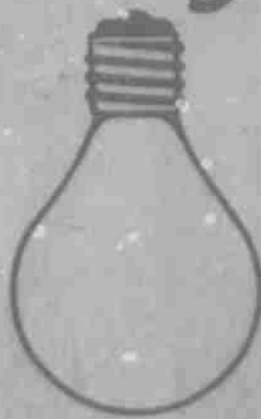
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LA BRANCH SIGNS TENTATIVE PACT WITH COORS

LOS ANGELES—The Los Angeles NAACP branch, upon signing a letter of intent with the Adelphi Coors Company that outlined the framework for an economic agreement between the civil rights organization and the national brewer, suspended its five-day old boycott against the company for 30 days.

Referring to the tentative accord, John T. McDonald, III, president of the Los Angeles NAACP branch said "this

agreement represents an important first step toward developing an open and meaningful line of communication between Coors and the black community. This development he said, "marks a new beginning and a significant step in formulating a viable minority economic plan which we will seek to encompass all leaders and groups within our community."
