City Drops Appeal

For more than eight years now, Lubbock's method of electing City Council members has been debated throughout the federal court system.

There have been two trials in Lubbock's U.S. District Court and two appeals to the Fifth Circuit Court in New Orleans. At issue was whether the at-large election process adopted by Lubbock voters in 1917 was unfair to racial and ethnic minorities.

It is important to note that after many hours of testimony and hundreds of pages of legal briefs, all court decisions found in the City of Lubbock's favor on the crucial points.

First, judges ruled that City Councils over the years have been responsive to the minority citizens of our community. The courts agreed that city services and facilities have been provided citywide without regard to race or ethnic makeup.

Second, all court decisions upheld the fact that the process of city-wide at-large elections was adopted with no intent whatsoever of preventing anyone from participating in the political process. Likewise, the courts agreed that the at-large system was not maintained over the years with this intent in mind.

What the most recent court decision said was that the result of our at-large voting was in violation of an amended provision of the Voting Rights Act adopted by Congress less than two years ago.

Since that ruling was upheld by the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals earlier this year, our attorneys have done a thorough job of researching the city's position in this case. Decisions in similar cases in other courts have been examined. There have been many conferences with outside authorities to seek their advice on our legal position.

The results are clear. Our attorneys tell us they find no reasonable possibility of success in this appeal. The probability of decision in such cases often virtually no hope that the Lubbock case would be reversed or even heard by the U.S. Supreme Court if appealed. Support of the amendment to the voting rights act by the President and the Attorney General also makes it clear that Lubbock's new system of election by district is in step with the nation.

Our attorneys have briefed the City Council on the results of their findings. They informed us they intend to bring the case of Jones vs. The City of Lubbock to an end. They will not file further appeals. However, the subject of attorneys' fees will continue to be pursued. The City Council has taken no action to authorize a further appeal of the case.

We are fully aware that the outcome of this case may not be popular with all citizens of Lubbock. But we are aware that

our goal in litigating has been to assure the citizens that Lubbock

deserves leadership that will consider what is good for Lubbock as a whole, regardless of any differences of personal opinion, we must continue to put

District Two Sets Up Committees

More than one hundred and twenty residents of District Two attended an historical meeting at Mac Simmons Community Center

last Wednesday to begin setting goals for their district. City Councilman T. J. Patterson called the meeting to begin the

ball rolling. "We have a lot to do, but we can do it if we stick together and work for the betterment of our entire community," said Patterson.

A very lively meeting, Patterson honored his campaign promise of beginning "mini caucuses" within the district. The group voted to meet each month at a neighborhood center. Next meeting will be held Wednesday, June 20 at Copper River Community Center, 40th & Avenue R.

"We want to move the meeting. We want to move the meetings around so we can have input from every resident of District Two," said Patterson.

"We don't doubt it, this is the first time this effort has been attempted," Patterson said, introducing the idea of community-based committees to the meeting and calling for "rainbow" representation on each committee.

After explaining the reason behind the various committees and receiving input from those in attendance, committees chosen were religion, youth affairs, education, housing, community relations, grievances, political action, entertainment/recreation, economic development and senior citizens affairs.

After asking those present to "visualize" a district with ten

committees having representatives from the five precincts in District Two, "I have a plan (and) if you don't like it, let's tear it down and set up something that will work," he said.

The residents of District Two voted to have at least two representatives from each precinct, plus a chairperson on each committee. But there was no limitation on the number of persons on the committee, but set eleven as the maximum on each committee.

In talking about economic development, Patterson told the group of the need of using the resources in the District. "We must create a healthy resource for each of us and work with everyone in the city," he said.

"We have a problem at Butler Park, and unless something is done there could be a blood bath on that park," said Patterson. He continued, "We need some alternative for our young people."

"Senior citizens are untapped resources, who can share some of their wisdom with us," said Patterson.

"There are 'special times' and there are problems we need to address, namely, minority contractors not receiving contracts, poor housing conditions created by absentee landlords, and the underdevelopment of the Chapel Hill area in Lubbock.

"We can make something happen if all get together," said Patterson.

Joining Patterson at the meeting were Nigie Trejo, District One representative and George Carpenter, District Three.

Ms. Joan Y. Ervin served as secretary of first meeting.

Concluding, Patterson told the constituents of District Two, "We cannot waiver now!"

JOHN BIGGERS, at age 60, one of the best known black illustrators and sculptors in the nation. Much of his work is folk-art. Headquartered in Houston, he expresses in much of his work a unique insight, born of experience, into the black heritage.

VICKI MEEK of Dallas offers a contemporary view of black urban culture. She is a collageist and sculptor, and works for a city-funded arts program. Her work and her reflections deal with modern urban problems and social situations. She is perhaps the most overtly political of our artists.

CHARLES THOMAS is the director of the "Sojourner Theatre" in Fort Worth. Her theatre produces both original plays and popular plays-cast with black actors and actresses.

THOMAS in her mid-30's, has strong views on the importance of a black perspective, and the physical presence of black performers, in the popular performing arts.

Controlling Medical Costs

One of the major issues before the nation at this time is the rising cost of medical care. Steps have been taken and others proposed to dampen the inflationary spiral that has made health care costs higher than the general cost of living with the resulting boost in Medicare costs.

Since October 1, 1983, the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) has been phasing in a prospective payment plan for Medicare hospital reimbursement. Enacted as part of the 1983 Social Security amendments, the new system replaces reimbursement according to hospital costs with reimbursement according to pre-established rates for each type of illness, based on diagnosis. If hospitals provide treatment at a lower cost than the established rate, they make a profit. If they provide treatment at a higher cost than the established rate, they suffer a loss. Thus, the Medicare hospital insurance program, for the first time, contains incentives for hospitals to control costs and reward efficiency.

Under the old system, hospital costs have increased an annual average of 17.5 percent since 1979. Hospital costs account for two-thirds of the approximately \$0 billion expended for Medicare in 1982. In that year, hospital costs increased 12.6 percent, three times the general rate of inflation.

The new system will be phased in over a 3-year period, and will be fully effective by October 1985.

As the new system reduces the growth of Medicare expenditures, it will also result in a reduction in the growth of out-of-pocket deductibles beneficiaries must pay.

However, officials note that effective use of one's Medicare protection can also help reduce costs for a person and in the end reduce total Medicare costs. For example, many doctors still accept assignment of their bill. When a doctor agrees to accept assignment of the bill, he or she accepts the Medicare approved payment as his or her entire charge. The Social Security office has a listing that shows the name and address of doctors and suppliers in your area and the approximate percentage of claims on which they accept assignment in the previous year.

In addition, studies show that many people purchase costly supplemental medical insurance that either duplicates their Medicare coverage, provides far beyond their reasonable needs, or does not otherwise meet their needs. People are urged to shop carefully before they buy and not buy more policies than they need. The Social Security office has a leaflet called **Guide to Health Insurance for People with Medicare** that provides useful tips on supplementing Medicare. It was developed jointly by the Health Care Financing Administration and the National Association of Insurance Commissioners.

Medicare officials also encourage people to join a health maintenance organization (HMO) plan. An HMO provides comprehensive health care at reasonable prices, generally under contract with Medicare, with the person paying a fixed monthly premium to the HMO covering the cost of the deductibles and coinsurance under Medicare. The Social Security office has a leaflet which spells out how HMO's may work to meet your health care needs.

Neighborhood Community Cleanup Program

To assist neighborhoods in getting involved in the Community Cleanup Program, an organizational meeting for interested people will be held Tuesday, May 29, at 7 p.m. in the Community Room of the Mahon Library.

The purpose of the program is to encourage a person or persons to volunteer to poll their neighbors to find out who would be interested in setting a time and date for a neighborhood cleanup of trash, rubbish, brush and junk, according to Sylvia Martinez, Community Services director.

A couple of weeks ago the City Council endorsed the idea of citizen participation and city cooperation in cleaning up our neighborhoods. The sanitation department is going to have trucks and drivers available at predetermined times and dates to go through the alleys. Volunteers are needed to pick up trash and load it into the trucks," Martinez said.

At the Tuesday night meeting, volunteers will be given information packets with sign-up forms for their neighbors who would be willing to have their trash and rubbish gathered in the alley to be picked up on the predetermined time and day.

Volunteers to pick up the trash for the people on their block are also being sought, she explained.

"We think that people have pride in their neighborhoods and want to help their neighbors. We have a pretty good organization already in place for a lot of areas in the north and east part of town and want volunteers from south and West Lubbock to get involved," she said.

Certain items such as old major appliances like washers, refrigerators, water heaters and furniture should not be placed in the alley to be thrown away because of their weight and bulk. These types of garbage should continue to be taken to the city landfill.

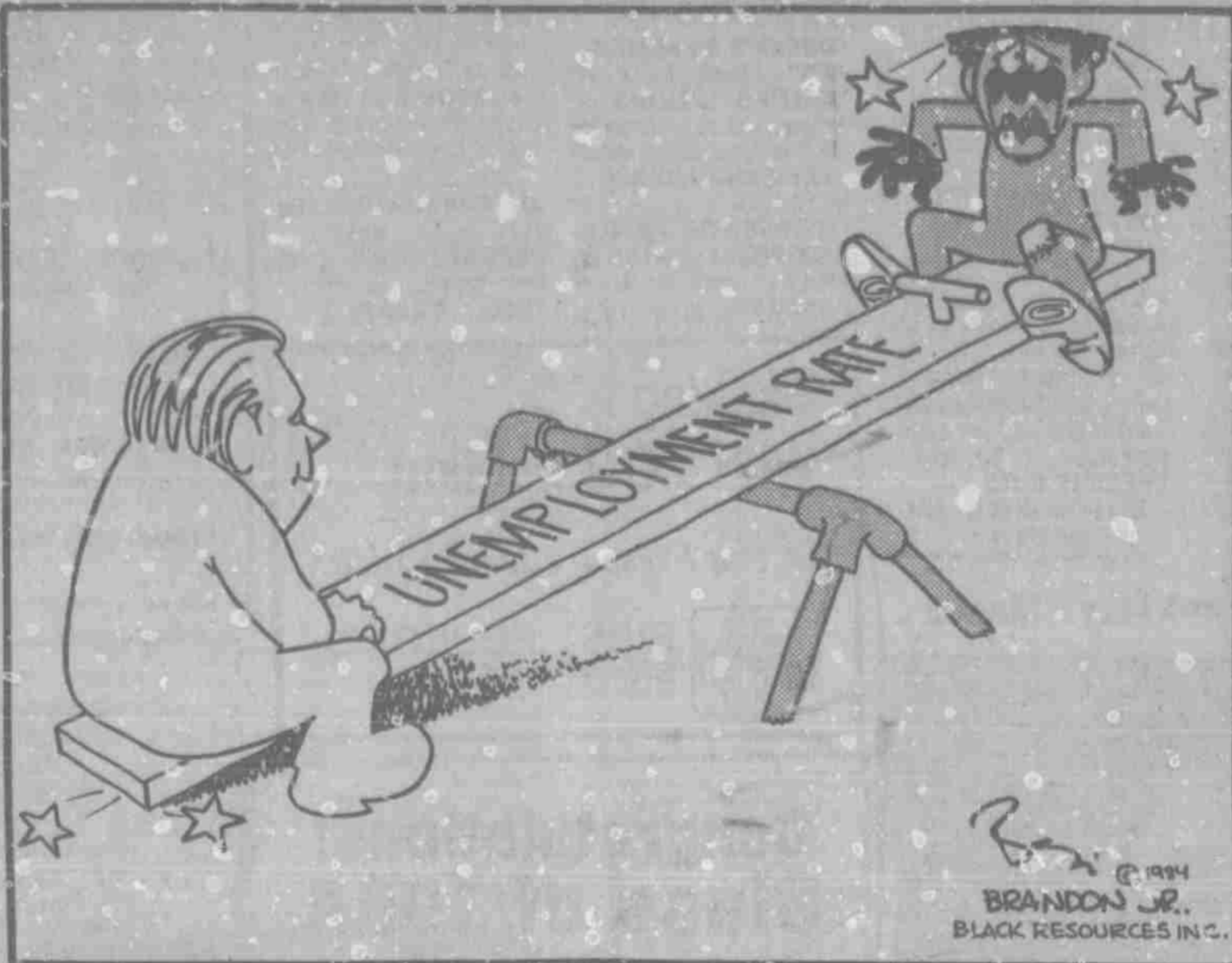

Pious Little Prince of Politics Would Be Emperor Kissinger Covers Up Central America

Henry Kissinger, former U.S. Secretary of State, and spokesman for the White House current Spanish American policy, put on one of his pretentious picture shows for the commonwealth Club of California last month in the City of Saint Francis. For those who don't know the spectacle and spectacular German tongue would be Hebrew, hearing him speak is like listening to the emperor with "new clothes." Naked without office or title of new directions, he pretended to preach the Republican Party line to an audience whose popular topic tends to be "might makes right." Rightly or wrongly without regard to his proposed central theme for discussion the defensive little dictatorial orator advised his anxious audience to pull the nuclear trigger at the sight of a red bear in your bedroom. But red bears do not exist in your bedroom.

Making bears in your bedroom is dangerous anyway, both for you and the bear. Being out of political office apparently gave Mr. Kissinger political license to lecture his listeners on the leaks in the Kremlin political base. Bad news for America if it is in continuous its same course, according to this soothsayer.

Schemes by the Soviets to stop our arms build up are but a fake to cause us to falter in our military defense spending program. But your faith behind a bigger military machine manned with more nuclear weapons and threaten to wipe the daylight out of the Soviets at sea or in South America says this man who would be king. His catty remarks about his not being a natural born U.S. citizen and therefore ineligible to be President of the United States, indicated his contempt for the Constitution of the United States. No doubt because he did not have an opportunity to dictate it to his secretaries for notice and public posting. Presidents are no problem for him since he serves Democrat and Republican alike provided he is given a private office and privileged parking space. Letting these loans have a 90-day grace period, plus giving them a few billion dollars to cover their back interest payments is only postponing the predictable dilemma the U.S. faces in Latin America. Military juntas, coups and insurgents will continue to plague these countries so long as poverty is prevalent.

Putting U.S. military might in Central America, either by men or mines, is not addressing the central issue of Central America in a constructive manner. Washington ... Jesse Jackson last week managed a feat very few men have been able to accomplish in America. He appeared on the cover of both Time and Newsweek magazines.

Simultaneous major features in America's best known newsweeklies were not the result of charitable acts by the publishing world, but a recognition that Jackson's actions at the San Francisco convention could determine the next president of the United States. If Jackson strongly supports the likely Democratic nominee, Walter Mondale, and subsequently helps turn out a massive number of black voters for the November election, Reagan would probably be denied a second term in the White House.

The Democratic Party leadership is visibly upset that the fiercely independent Jackson may be in a position to insist that the Democratic Party support a range of black-interest issues, including the abolition of "runoff" primaries, strong affirmative action policies, sharply increased federal aid to the poor, and a change in party rules that determine minority qualify for delegates. They talk incessantly about their fears that Jackson will lead a walkout of black delegates at the convention if the black agenda is ignored, and subsequently give only lukewarm support to the eventual Democratic Party nominee.

Jackson, who met recently with Charles Manatt, Chairman of the Democratic National Convention, said that Manatt was obsessed with concern that Jackson could lead a walkout in San Francisco. Jackson, however, has never said that he would lead a walkout at the Democratic Convention.

He emphasizes correctly that his struggle and the struggle of black people has been to "get in" to the convention, not whether to walk out if black-interest demands are not met.

Jackson's critics continue to raise the prospect that Jackson's demands that the Democratic Party embrace the policy concerns of the black community will drive white voters, particularly white Southern voters into the Republican Party. Although his detractors raise the possibility of a white backlash, they refuse to condemn racial attitudes so closely held by many white Americans that they would rather switch political parties than end the mistreatment of blacks and other minorities.

Suggestions that Jackson lower his voice, soften his demands, temper his charges and be prepared in San Francisco to compromise in the interest of party unity is paternalistic nonsense. Similar suggestions are seldom made to other racial and special interest groups.

For Jackson to radically compromise on issues central to his historic campaign, would be to retreat to the usual black political charity. It is time for America's black community to flex its political muscle. If that is misunderstood, and there is a white backlash, the blame will not fall on Jackson and his supporters, but on a racially-sensitive white America that cannot bear the legitimate exercise of black political power.

Jackson Potpourri

Jesse Jackson scored a massive victory over Mondale and Hart in the District of Columbia's recent primary, beating Mondale by more than a 2-to-1 margin. Hart received less than ten percent of the vote.

Jackson also had an impressive third place victory in Tennessee, winning approximately 25 percent of the vote. It is expected that Jackson will also do well in Maryland, where it is possible for him to finish second behind Mondale.

Although Baltimore's black political leadership largely supports Mondale, it is expected that the majority of the city's blacks will vote for Jackson. A first or second place finish is also possible for Jackson in Louisiana where the black mayor of New Orleans is a strong supporter.

CHILD WATCH by Marian Wright Edelman. Saying Goodbye to Parental Childers Television?

Any parent knows how fascinating television is for children. Children under 12 average 27 hours per week glued to a TV set. Yet most of what they watch was "designed" for adults.

For years the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has prodded the nation's broadcasters to increase the quality and quantity of children's programs. But as part of the Reagan Administration's attempt to "derregulate" everything from education to child welfare, the FCC has reversed itself.

A commission ruling in December "writes the epitaph of the FCC's involvement in children's television," according to the sole dissenting commissioner. The nation's broadcasters would have free reign to choose what they put on the air, and the child audience is unlikely to be a top priority.

The handful of high-quality programs produced by the Public Broadcasting Service and the networks prove that television can teach reading and math skills to very young children, can instill values and behavior like altruism, kindness, cooperation, and can motivate children to learn more about the world around them. Yet the promise of television is fast becoming a threat.

Instead of being a positive educator, commercial television is a booby trap. Instead of offering a window on the world, most television program treat children to a learning peak through the keyhole at a world dominated by snickering, sex, violence, and crime.

Such programming takes a toll on our children and on the atmosphere in which they grow up. Television violence can lead to aggression in children and adolescents who watch violent programs. Studies have shown that for large groups of children, the more TV watched, the lower their verbal skills, and the more TV watched by high-school students, the lower reading scores. What, in the name of profits, are we doing to our children?

While some say that cable is beginning to offer children a wider range of quality programming than the networks, many families cannot afford to take advantage of cable's bounty. Are we thus condemning our "have-nots" children to cartoons, soap operas, and syndicated reruns, while rewarding the "haves" children with innovative and challenging programming that will further enrich their lives?

The Reagan Administration tells us we have a choice. If we don't like what free television's broadcasters offer our children, we can choose to purchase better programs. The true meaning of television's Saturday morning wasteland becomes clear when viewed in light of such "choices."

In this very real modern world—where 50 percent of children with children ages three to five are in the higher brackets—many children burn to television as the one constant companion they can depend on, a friend who is never too busy to play make-believe. Those of us who work to create better lives for our nation's children need to find ways to ensure that television will be a true "friend." Television should not only reflect the realities of children's lives but help them deal with those realities in constructive ways. Rather than blocking the way toward progress, the FCC should do its part to help television teach our children lessons from the past, gain positive role models, and develop their capacity to face the future. What ails the broadcasters is not necessarily satisfactory. It's even for adult viewers. In many instances, it is downright bad for children.
