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## Hud's Proposals

Washington, D.C. -- The Department of Housing and Urban Development's proposal to virtually eliminate new construction of subsidized housing and rely almost solely on a housing voucher system is a "head-in-the-sand" approach to solving the housing crisis of the poor, according to Dr. Robert C. Weaver, President of the National Committee Against Discrimination in Housing (NCDH). The housing voucher system is part of a proposal submitted to the President's Office of Management and Budget by HUD Secretary Samuel Pierce.

Weaver says the housing voucher system will rely on the existing housing stock, an approach which incorrectly assumes there is an adequate supply of housing available to meet the

needs of very low income families receiving a modest subsidy from the government. "As a matter of fact, vacancy rates are alarmingly low in many metropolitan areas and cities, and housing units designed to accommodate larger families often are virtually nonexistent. What this means is that in these areas there will be in-place assistance, with no opportunity for mobility," Weaver explained. Moreover, rents for existing standard housing still would be out of reach for most low income families, even with the government assistance proposed he said.

The former HUD Secretary said NCDH takes the position that strategic use of new construction, rather than sole reliance on existing housing, for the poor in areas

where the vacancy rate is low, and (2) facilitating greater mobility for poor and minority families if such housing is outside areas of low income concentration. Weaver said even in areas where vacancies exist and housing costs are manageable, the housing voucher proposal fails to take into account another reality of the housing market, namely, racial discrimination. Low income families, especially those who are racial minorities, will continue to be steered and channeled to housing in areas of existing poverty and minority concentration and will be unable to exercise free housing choice under the housing voucher system unless certain safeguards are in place. "It is necessary for us to provide adequate counseling, referral and a variety of support services so as to ensure that low income families will

have full information on housing availability and are able to adjust successfully to new living environments. Moreover,

they must have assurances that all government agencies, including HUD and the Department of Justice,

will undertake firm fair housing enforcement actions." Weaver described as

Describing students participation in the blood drive program as "better than even we hoped for", John Crosby, Director of McKinney Center, stated, "We feel this is one of the best ways we can show our appreciation for the support McKinney has given our Center."

Job Corps is a program designed to train young men and women in skills which will enable them to obtain a job with a future. The McKinney Center has trained and placed over 14,000 students since its opening in March.

## Lubbock Employment Looks Bright

Employers in Lubbock area predict an upswing in hiring activity for the next three months, according to quarterly Employment Outlook Survey

conducted by Manpower, Inc., the world's largest temporary service firm. First Quarter hiring activity is historically low as employers return to pre-

holiday levels. Local job opportunities are predicted by manufacturers of durable goods, real estate firms and employers in the ser-

vice sector. Contrary to the national trend, local wholesale and retail merchants do not expect seasonal cutbacks. Slight staff reductions are expected by construction companies, manufacturers of non-durable goods and educational institutions.

Lubbock area results are better than those reported nationally and are similar to regional results. Local figures are also better than those reported in Houston and Dallas.

A thin but visible ray of hope for the future of the nation's employment picture has emerged in the

latest findings of the quarterly Employment Outlook Survey.

According to the projection of over 11,200 employers polled in 347 U.S. cities last month, the quarter-to-quarter drop in hiring plans has halted, and a slight improvement is indicated for the first quarter (January, February, March) of 1983 when compared to survey results of one year ago.

While slightly fewer firms plan to hire additional workers in the next three months than last year this time, the number of expecting cutbacks has declined markedly. Leading the improved job climate is a bright outlook in the construction industry which plans more hiring and fewer layoffs than in past first quarters.

National survey figures indicate that there is a trace of cautious optimism for the first time in the last six quarters. It is most evident in the drop in the number of firms expecting workforce reductions. The reductions must decline before positive hiring factors develop. Expected reductions have declined markedly in several key employment sectors, particularly in the construc-

tion and manufacturing industries which have been hardest hit over the past year. While the number of employers planning to expand their workforce is the lowest seen in six years, the number planning no change is the highest in that same period. It appears that the downward slide which began a year ago has stopped.

Regionally, the South continues to offer the brightest future for jobseekers with a major upswing reported by the construction industry. While Western employers continued to expect slightly more cutbacks than manufacturers of non-durable goods predict an improved job climate. The Midwest reports a more favorable employment outlook typified by a sharp drop in the number of firms expecting cutbacks. This development was particularly evident in the manufacturing sectors. The Northeast continues to predict slow-paced hiring activity. However, construction firms and wholesale/retail merchants in this region report cutbacks to be far fewer than in previous first quarters.

## State Rep. Al Edwards Leads Bud Fight!!

The Rev. Jesse Jackson joined with Houstonians to promote the boycott of the Anheuser-Busch-Budweiser Beer Company. On the morning of November 22, 1982, Rev. Jackson addressed a breakfast gathering composed of Ministers, Elected Officials, Businessmen, Community Leaders, and Concerned Citizens. The breakfast was hosted by State Representative Al

Edwards, of District 146, Rev. A. Louis Patterson, pastor of Mount Carmel Baptist church, Rev. C. L. Jackson, pastor of Pleasant Grove Baptist Church, and Houston Businessmen.

The Rev. Jackson told the one hundred or so guests that were in attendance that although Blacks had made some political gains in the sixties, that it was now more important to concentrate on Economics. The na-

tionally renowned and respected Civil Rights Leader pointed out that although some Blacks reflect bourgeois attitudes, Blacks have no significant control over products, and no power within large corporations. State Representative Al Edwards, who helped host the breakfast, announced to the audience that he totally endorsed Rev. Jackson's position and that he would participate in leading the

boycot. He also stated that he would encourage every concerned citizen to join with him, physically, spiritually and financially.

Immediately following the breakfast, Rev. Jesse Jackson, State Representative Al Edwards, numerous pastors, businessmen, and community leaders went to the Anheuser-Busch Brewery in Houston, Texas located on 775 Gelhorn St., to ask of-

ficials there for data on the employment, vertically and horizontally, and contracts with Blacks. They also asked for an explanation as to why Blacks receive such a disproportionately small number of Distributorships, Contracts, and High Level Jobs from Anheuser-Busch.

Although it was raining at first, the Anheuser-Busch officials refused to allow all but a handful of the crowd inside.

However, after strong resentment from Rev. Jesse Jackson, Representative Al Edwards, and other Houston ministers, the doors were finally allowed inside, but only seven were permitted to partial tour of the facilities, and none of the request data were provided.

Representative Edwards also noted that when Rev. McLain, pastor of First Bible Missionary Baptist Church,

attempted to talk to one of the black employees of Anheuser-Busch, a black superior official for Anheuser-Busch, Robert Tucker, ordered the man not to respond to the questions. However, the young man was able to supply Rev. McLain with the information that he was the only black in the department of approximately one hundred, with all others in his department being white.

As a result of the lack of information that was provided, and the attitudes that were reflected by the Anheuser-Busch officials, the Rev. Jesse Jackson repeated his claim, "BUD IS A DUD", and along with Representative Edwards, led the group in pouring Budweiser Beer out on the ground of the Anheuser-Busch plant in Houston, Texas. Rev. Jesse Jackson, Representative Al Ed-

he said, "more black children live in poverty and more black mothers and fathers must go without work than at any time since the Great Depression."

"In the tear-filled eyes of black children, in the resignation on the faces of aimless black teenagers, and in the tired, weary and worried looks of black mothers and fathers, one reads the desolation of a forgotten people," Mr. Hooks said.

Mr. Hooks' appeal was made in a special letter to NAACP friends and supporters. In this context, he wondered how it would feel to support a family on a few thousand dollars a year; to stand on a surplus food line for a box of cheese; to face a child's daily disappointment, watching his humiliation grow; knowing that tomorrow will be no better than today; and probably worse.

He recalled that "Martin Luther King spoke of a 'lonely island of poverty in the midst of a vast ocean of material prosperity.' Today, he noted, one sees more Americans living on that island. Blacks, he said, are the perpetual inhabitants on that island."

The NAACP has a long history of fighting for human rights. "We've led the fight for black Americans to have decent jobs, adequate food and fair housing; to be free from misery, fear and despair," he declared.

With the generous support of concerned citizens, the NAACP Special Contribution Fund, seeks to continue its struggle to assure that every American child has an opportunity to reach his or her potential.

### Pension Offset

If you have any questions about the Government pension offset, contact any Social Security office. The people there can give you a free leaflet, Government pension offset - How it may affect you, and can answer any questions you have.

**Q.** I am a 57-year-old teacher, not covered by Social Security, who has been eligible for a State pension for 2 years. However, I'd like to work to 62 and then draw both the pension and a wife's benefit on my husband's Social Security record. Is this possible?

**A. Yes. As long as you meet all eligibility requirements for your pension before December 1982, the Government pension offset will not affect you. You need not actually receive your pension by then.**

**Q.** I am now 60 and have received a Federal Civil Service pension since 55. When my wife retires under Social Security in 5 years, can I get husband's benefits on her record?

**A. Only if you are dependent upon her for at least one-half of your support.**

**Q.** My county job is not under Social Security but I previously worked 12 years in covered private employment. How will the offset affect me when I retire in about 6 years?

**A. You should be eligible for both a county pension as well as a Social Security retirement check based on your covered earnings, without reduction. However, any Social Security dependent or survivor benefit you are potentially eligible for will probably be subject to the offset.**

## Helping Them Help Themselves

The citizens of Texas want the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to keep the right-of-way on highways free of trash, etc. Hiring these people in this way is a means by which the Department can afford to accomplish this task.

As stated by Mike M. Daniel, Director of the MHMR Workshop, "They are making a meaningful wage, and the Department is getting a service they didn't have before, so I feel like we are both benefitting from this contract. I have noticed the difference in the roadways from the time we started until now. I feel very proud about what it looks like now compared to what it did. I think from an aesthetic point of view, it is very well to see clean, well kept roadsides. I think our clients have a chance to see what they can do and they can take pride as citizens of Lubbock County."

"I guess I would say that we have really had an exceptional relationship with Bill Read (Maintenance Construction Supervisor III for the Highway Department), he has been our Section Foreman, and Mel Pope (District Maintenance Engineer).

"This kind of project can really be meaningful statewide. The reason I say this is because of the growth of the program over the 9 months period. Everyone and his brother is waiting to see about this contract, because it does a lot of things that contracts prior to this one didn't, and the primary thing is that it is paying a meaningful wage. It speaks very well for the Highway Department. I have high hopes and expectations that this will be meaningful news that will expand to other areas. The Lighthouse for the Blind makes vests that are used by these crews. They do sewing type work. No one knew we could do roadside maintenance work until we got out there and did it, and now we have con-

fidence that we can do a variety of things. Also, we have the confidence of other people.

"We have asked people specifically if they have seen our crews. Nine times out of ten they have seen our Loop 289 crew."

The people of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation feel that the good supervisor is the key to the success of employing handicapped people.

As Mike McDaniel, Director of the MHMR Workshop said, "Helen Jones, the supervisor (Loop 289 MHMR crew), has been tremendous. I think a lot of the success of the program has been because of the crews' supervisors on those jobs."

"It has opened some doors that would not have been opened otherwise, because everyone sees what the handicapped can do. Once we see that it is a small step to go to other areas these people can do, many things can be done with just a little assistance."

"We have silk screens in our office. We have done caps for the Highway Department. We have done caps and T-shirts. They can clean the silk screens, they can print, do sorting and box. They can expand more and more. So much can be done with handicapped children producing commodities. They are a real work force. They can be used by society, a force that has not been tapped. People are skeptical at first, and when they see what this group can do, they change. Now that Bill Read knows what we can do, beginning with the Highway Department, we can expand to many other departments of the State and the city, county and private industry. Any time we can help both the Highway Department and the handicapped, it is good. If we can contract with an individual contractor and everybody walk away feeling good,

we love it."

State law provides that work can be provided to three groups. The prison system has the first priority. In Texas the blind and other persons with disabilities have contracts to produce commodities and services. This contract is coordinated with the parties in Lubbock through Texas Industries for the Blind and Handicapped in Austin, working with the central offices of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation in Austin. Hiring these people in West Texas is a part of a statewide program that is helping the handicapped.

The first experiment with disabled workers on the highway was in 1981 in Stephenville. In the Fort Worth District, Lubbock was the second project to go into effect in March 1982. Since then, similar projects have gone into effect in Wichita Falls, Lufkin, Bryan and Beaumont. These projects are being operated in an evaluating and testing stage now. If these test projects prove to be satisfactory, Mark Goode, the Engineering Director, SDH & PT, will give consideration to similar projects in other districts of the State on a case by case basis, when application is made to the districts by an agency for the handicapped, according to Tom Ohlendorf, Sr. Maintenance Engineer, D-18, Maintenance Division, SDH & PT, Austin, Office. At the present time, no adverse comment has been made on these work projects.

At the end of a 13-year Air Force career, he was 6'5" man grown bitter with hatred for whites and he earned a third-degree black belt in karate so he could, as once told a reporter, "kill somebody in such a way as to cause him as much agony as possible."

The man who once intended to become a disciple of Malcolm X became, instead, a minister of the gospel of Jesus Christ after what Kinchlow describes as an encounter with the living Christ during an 80-mile-an-hour test car run around a Texas track. Today, Kinchlow is licensed to preach by the African Methodist Episcopal Church and for the past several years has spent nearly all his free time speaking to groups across America.

The delivery of Kinchlow's wit and wisdom, the reality of his commitment, caused one journalist to describe him as a "hybrid Bill Cosby-Billy Graham." He can be, in turn, hilarious and profound. Yet he is always the same, whether visiting Watts or the White House.

Besides heading CBN's counseling centers and co-hosting "The 700 Club," Kinchlow also continues to head CBN's special ministries section, where inquiries requiring personalized answers are handled, and to work with "Operation Blessing," a program begun by CBN in 1978 to provide services and assistance to people in need. Earlier this year, "Operation Blessing" was cited by President Reagan as an example of the spirit of volunteerism needed in America today. Through 1981,

CBN received 500,000 requests for help and disbursed \$1.5 million through "Operation Blessing."

All of the duties assigned Kinchlow involves areas that are spin-offs from "The 700 Club," which was the first experiment in "Two-way television" when Robertson invited viewers to call in for prayer and counseling.

So far this year, counseling centers of "The 700 Club" have received 1.4 million telephone calls handled by thousands of volunteer counselors. Nearly 7,000 local churches cooperate with CBN through the counseling centers located in communities throughout the nation and in several foreign countries.

Kinchlow joined CBN as Dallas, Tex., area director, in charge of the counseling center there. He became "700 Club"

co-host in 1975. He is a graduate of Southwest Texas Junior College, where he was a member of Phi Theta Kappa, president of the Senior Class, and listed in "Who's Who in American Small Colleges." He left the Air Force as a staff sergeant.

"The 700 Club" is seen weekdays on about 150 broadcast stations throughout the U.S. and on CBN Cable Network.

"new" the HUD proposal that permits cities receiving community development funds to use them for new construction of subsidized housing. He argues that unless there is an increase in the amount of money made available to eligible communities most of them are unlikely to divert CD funds for construction of rental assisted housing. Furthermore, giving municipalities the option of determining whether and where to build subsidized housing is a throwback to an earlier discredited policy of local control of federally assisted housing. "Experience has shown that many municipalities, particularly suburban municipalities, go out of their way to block construction of subsidized housing, even when the programs do not permit local governmental control," he explained. Often such moves are attempts to prevent racial minorities from moving into a neighborhood by those who mistakenly believe that subsidized housing is synonymous with black housing.

Weaver also took sharp issue with HUD's reported claim that increased new housing starts in September signaled a rebound in the housing industry.

## High Blood Pressure is Real Killer Among Blacks

Sickle cell anemia is not the real killer disease among black people today. The real killer is hypertension, better known as high blood pressure. For each black person who dies for sickle cell disease, over 100 die from high blood pressure. In fact, this killer-hypertension-is the leading cause of death among the black population, and the major reason blacks have a shorter life expectancy than whites.

Black people in the United States are twice as likely to suffer from high blood pressure as are whites. The disease develops earlier in their lives, is often more severe, and results in a greater number of deaths at a younger age.

You may ask why are blacks so vulnerable to high blood pressure? Why does this killer disease discriminate against black people? No one knows for certain, due primarily to the complexity of the disease. It is important, therefore, that each black person know about his vulnerability; important that he have blood pressure tests now, and on a periodic basis. If he has hypertension, he should do something immediately about controlling this disease. Patients with hypertension can be treated with medication, and many live long productive lives.

**Silent Killers:** One of the reasons hypertension kills and cripples so many black people is due to the sneaky way it operates. High blood pressure silently sets up its victims for disabling illnesses and early death. The victims are spared the usual warnings associated with most illnesses, for hypertension causes no aches or pains. That's one reason why half the people who have high blood pressure don't know they have it. You can't treat a disease you don't know you have!

Symptoms of hypertension are experienced only when the heart, kidneys or brain no longer work properly. That usually doesn't happen until 15 or 20 years after the disease started. The dizzy spells, headaches, chest pains, shortness of breath, etc. indicate that you may be suffering from high blood pressure.

But far too often - and that's the reason for the emphasis in this column - the first indication of trouble is a stroke, a heart attack, or kidney failure. If high blood pressure is detected early and treated, dangerous complications like a heart attack or a stroke may be avoided.

**You May Already Have It:** High blood pressure affects all ages, all races, all sizes, all social and economic groups. So even though you believe you're not old enough, or fat enough to get it, you may have it already. The 30-second painless blood pressure test is the only way hypertension can be detected before complications set in. You can have it done at a doctor's office, clinic, neighborhood health center, hospital, and in any of the mobile units that visit some neighborhoods periodically.

Because of the importance of finding and treating people with this disease, you may even find the test being offered free in your place of business or a supermarket. In order to enjoy happiness through health, make sure that you and other members of your family, including children, have high blood pressure tests made immediately...and regularly.

**Remember:** Because high blood pressure often has no symptoms, it is one of the most neglected of all major health problems in the United States. And a major health problem it is. Hypertensives are three to five times more likely than others to have heart attacks, four times more likely to suffer crippling or fatal attacks. Hypertension is of major significance contributing to kidney failure. Yet at the same time nearly every case of high blood pressure can now be treated effectively and kept under control with drugs.

## High Tech Only Hope Democrats Discover Atari

Nearly one out of five Americans in the labor force was unemployed last year. This year at least one out of five Americans will have been employed. Next year's prospects are even poorer. People who make up this 25 million of jobless folds have not found the key employment in the economy. Evidently only a child knows the advantage of owning an "Atari." A word of the future for the developed world. Without direction the democrats have decended upon the high technology area as America's solution for saving the economy.

As Americans rediscover "Poverty" perhaps it's best they bet on "Pac Man" to overtake the bill collectors. "The new poor" have not yet discovered or learned a new trade. It's an opportunity for Black Americans to take the lead.

Leading the profile of the poor are 21 1/2 million Black Americans and 3.7 million Hispanic Americans. A total of almost 35 million people, one-and-a-half times the population of either California or New York state.

Sanity supports the democrats desire to develop a solution for more jobs in the U.S. In the mid-term nation elections even the usually gullible public put more democrats in the U.S. House of Representatives with hope they will begin a rescue plan for the economy. cabinet, from the laundry room, from under the sink, from dad's workshop, mother's vanity drawer. In the very living homes where the parents have tried to provide everything to nurture their child's health and happiness, a "little" carelessness has caused suffering, permanent maiming and death.

Teaching is not good enough for youngsters one through three. The only safe way to protect them is to put every poison in your home out of their reach, according to Health, Education and Welfare's experts in emergency health services.

**Put Poison in Safe Places:** Where are your household cleaners - bleach, detergents, floor wax, furniture and metal polish, window cleaner, and lye? If they are under the sink or in easy reach in the laundry room, find a safer place.

Check your garbage or workshop. If your child could conceivably reach insecticides, garden sprays, pesticides, paints, solvents, gasoline or kerosene, get them under lock and key or completely out of harm's way.

In your bathroom, devise a locked area for medicines and drugs, and make sure all your cosmetic preparations and external medications such as skin lotion, deodorants, hair tonics, perfume, nail polish, eyewash, alcohol are inaccessible to children.

**Avoid Scenes Like These:** The two-year-old who lost consciousness after chewing a bottleful of candy-coated aspirin. Or the agony of a tot with mouth and throat burned from swallowing bleach. Or a three-year-old boy in convulsions with an empty nail polish bottle besides him.

**But if Your Child is Poisoned, Here is What to do:** (1) Call a doctor or get him to an emergency hospital at once. (2) Give the child two cups of milk or water to dilute the poison and slow its effectiveness. (3) Induce vomiting by slipping a finger down the child's throat. Have him lie on his stomach on the bed or on your lap with his head hanging over the edge. Bring to the hospital some of the vomit in a clean plastic container. (Exception: Do not make the child vomit if he is unconscious or in convulsions or if he has swallowed petroleum products, acid or alkali.)

**Better Yet, Avoid This Experience Altogether** by taking inventory of your home now to make sure all potential poisons are completely out of reach of children. (NNPA)

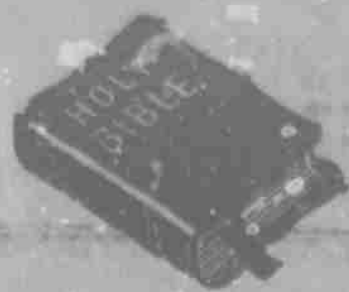
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## Wilson's Celebrate 40th Anniversary

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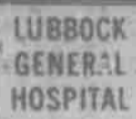
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**YOU AND YOUR HEALTH**  
by Peter J. Esse, M.D.  
**FACTS ABOUT HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE**  
Dear Dr. Esse: I've been told it's normal to have high blood pressure when one gets into the 60s and 70s. Isn't it true that it's a disease of old age? My pressure runs between 180/98 and 176/100. I am 64 and have no complaints. - Mrs. H.  
Dear Mrs. H.: Untrue. Hypertension is not a disease of old age. It can occur in youngsters. Whether age 20 or 70, a patient with your readings is indeed a candidate for treatment with anti-hypertensive drugs.  
There are many other misconceptions about pressure. For example, many like yourself believe that people have warnings when their pressure rises: headaches, nervousness, etc. Yet, although your own pressure is above normal, Mrs. H., you do not have discomforts or other symptoms.  
Patients have asked if being tense and nervous produces hypertension. Not necessarily. There are too many other factors involved.  
There is also a widespread misconception that hypertension can be relieved completely by taking a low sodium diet. This often helps; nevertheless, most patients also need to take their medications. Remember that hypertension cannot be cured so that you will not need to take pills any more. Treatment with medication must be continued throughout a lifetime.  
Usually, taking treatment does not interfere with your way of life. It makes one wonder why so many patients quit taking their medicine. Their pressure is bound to rise again.
