Moments after adopting proposal 48. delegates approved what is viewed by many as a loophole measure.

It specifies that athletes who don't meet No. 48's requirements can receive athletic scholarships, but cannot play or practice their sport for one year, and will have only three years of eligibility, providing they meet academic requirements

of all freshmen athletes. Both presidents expressed dismay that the loophole measure was accepted so casually by the same voting body. "They jumped at an opportunity to protect themselves like a covey of quail," another black educator observed.

Asked If he was surprised No. 48 passed, Stone said, "I'm not surprised by anything while representatives from America does."

Stone declared that his school and others "have alternatives. We can withdraw from the National Collegiate Athletic Association, which really doesn't do much for us anyway, or we can seek help from human and civil rights groups. We have to weigh our op-

tions."

"I don't want anyone to get the idea that we are not concerned with stronger academic stanuards," Johnson explained, "But we also know how blased the ACT and SAT tests can be.'

The Grambling president said he spoke for all 114 predominantly black schools that comprise the National Association for

Equal Opportunity. presidents and faculty some of the largests universities in the country spoke in favor of the plan, many expressing concern over the awarding of scholarships to athletes who are not

acacamically qualified The list included Joe Paterno, cuach of tooranked Fenn. State. Paterno said the system has "raped" black athletes for the last 15

"We can't afford to do that to another generation. I'm really surprised that so many black educators have gotten up and sold their students down the river. I think you're underating their pride and competitiveness," Paterno

added. A number of black coaches and athletic directors accused Paterno of practicing subterfuge. They contend that the morality of his act is debatable.

He paints a distressing picture of big university practices and ethics as if he has been totally removed, completely ignoring his own shortcomings, the coaches avow-

A well-known black college coach suggested that Paterno should ask himse" how he got to the mountain top, how many black assistants he has now or has had in the 15 years he taiks about.

Then he should compare the number of black athletes who played for him with the number who graduated. He'll find that he can count the black assistant coaches, black student athletes who graduated and full-time faculty members at Penn. State on two hands, the coach reasoned.

Now, that's a contradiction, ne concluded. "Joe Paterno insulted ali blacks," Dr. Johnson added. "He does not know anything about

bleck athletes. Paterno's statement showed an ignorance of what is happening in this country, said Dr. Frederick Humphries, president of Tennessee State.

"To say, as he seemed to say, that he cared more about black athletes than black do is ridiculous. As of the moment, we're still in the NCAA, I'd be afraid to predict that we will stay."

Dr. Edward Fort chanceller of North Carolina A&T, said the language and the logic of Proposal 48 were "over a moral issue."

"Try as we might to avoid it, this, unfortunately, has become a black and white Issue. Black and rurally isolated white youths would be hurt by this. There is evidence that students from upper-income families sometines score 100 points higher on these tests than those from disadvantaged backgrounds. And it has nothing to do with

academic potential." Dr. James Zumberge, president of Southern California University, and several others argued that No. 48 would be a first step "toward re-establishing the integrity of our Institutions of higher education.

Dr. Johnson and Dr. Stone said they both planned to speak to civil rights leaders and lawyers to see what action can be taken.





There is a program in Lubbock that has been helping area residents for over a decade. The program has helped people from the relief rolls to the tax rolls. The program is the Lubbock Opportunities Industrialization Center (L.O.I.C.)

Somewhere the bureaucracy with SPAG and CETA set in and the problem started Instead of community involvement and support, a middle man SPAG emerged eventually leading to destruction and the Reagan ax.

Good to see the leadership is working hard to get the program back on the community involvement process and not government controlled. They are working to make the program viable to the needs of business and industry's needs in our area and going back to the motto "We Help Ourselves." There will be no more stipends (paying people to help themselves). Stipends, in this writers opinion was one of the most detrimental thing to happen to OIC andmade it just another government program to go pick up a handout. Without stipends, people go because they want to and are concerned about helping themselves and bettering their condition in life. Another good thing is they are going back to the basics the "feeder program" which is what a trainee goes through before they go into vocational training. They go through the feeder at their ownr ata. Such things as grooming and hygiene, motivation, job finding and keeping techniques, positive mental attitudes and the basics of becoming a worthwhile employee.

The recent radiothon did not reach the goal of the \$29,000 that was desired but it is not too late to help. The radiothon received \$10,200 in pledges and cash which is a little under haif the goal. How to Beat High Costs of College? At Cornell University in New York, a new plan to help students pay college costs will be tried next year. Alumni and others interested have set up a seven million dollar fund from which students at Cornell will earn about \$2,000 a year in Jobs made available. The money, while it will not pay anything like all college costs, after the work scholarships, the students still owe perhaps \$5,000 rather than \$13,000.

The program is called the Cornell tradition and the money from these jobs will often enable students to avoid annual loans. Tuition alone at many of today's select colleges often runs \$8,000 or more a year. Alumni of other high cost institutions might soon follow this same basic approach, bellringer observers
