Black News Briefs

New York Primary May Decide Jackson's Future

New York, N. Y. There is a growing feeling among political experts that New York's April 19 primary may well determine whether or not Jesse Jackson will be the Democratic party's presidential nominee. With 255 delegates up for grabs, a victory in New York could give either Jackson or Massachusetts Governor Michael Dukakis a lead and momentum which the other may find extremely difficult to overcome in the remaining primary states. Jackson's biggest problem in New York will be a generally hostile Jewish population which has been angered by Jackson's call for a less pro Israel U. S. policy in the Middle East. Going into New York Dukakis has 740 delegates but Jackson is a close second with 705. Tennessee Senator Albert Gore is third with 395. Jackson's biggest asset in New York will be the expected solid support he will get from Black Democrats. Thus, some experts have argued that Jackson's chances in New York will be determined by the number of Blacks who line up to vote for him versus the number of Jew who line up to vote against him.

Noriega Ask Jackson Help To End Panama Crisis

Panama City, Panama In a surprise letter last week Panamanian leader Gen. Manuel Noriega suggested that Democratic presidential contender Jesse Jackson help mediate an end to his country's current crisis. The U. S. State Department indicated that it would be opposed to Jackson's involvement and Jackson said that because of his campaigning he did not plan to become directly involved. Noriega's letter, which was a response to an earlier one from Jackson, charged that U. S. government charges that he was involved in the international drug trade were false. He told Jackson, "I have been lied about." Noriega's appeal highlights a claim from some of his supporters that most of the domestic opposition to him comes from upper class and middle class white Panamanians. And most observers agree that while opposition to Noriega crosses racial lines, he does appear to have greater support among Black Panamanians.

In an effort to reach out to the white community of Lubbock, and bridge the deep gap between brown and white, and Texas Tech University and Lubbock, the Hispanic students at Tech have selected a war hero as their principle speaker for next week's annual Cultural Awareness Week at the University.

The Hispanic Student Society of Tech has invited Master Sergeant Roy P. Benavidez of the US Army's Special Forces to keynote the annual Tech festivities honoring contributions of Mexican culture.

Benitez, who kept fighting the communist enemy in Viet Nam despite terrible wounds, will speak Friday night at the Awards Banquet.

Ironically, in an unpopular war that saw most college students successfully dodge the draft and many working class whites, browns and blacks fight the war, Benavidez volunteered to serve in the remote regions of Viet Nam with the US Army's designated elite counter insurgency warriors, the Green Bereted Special Forces.

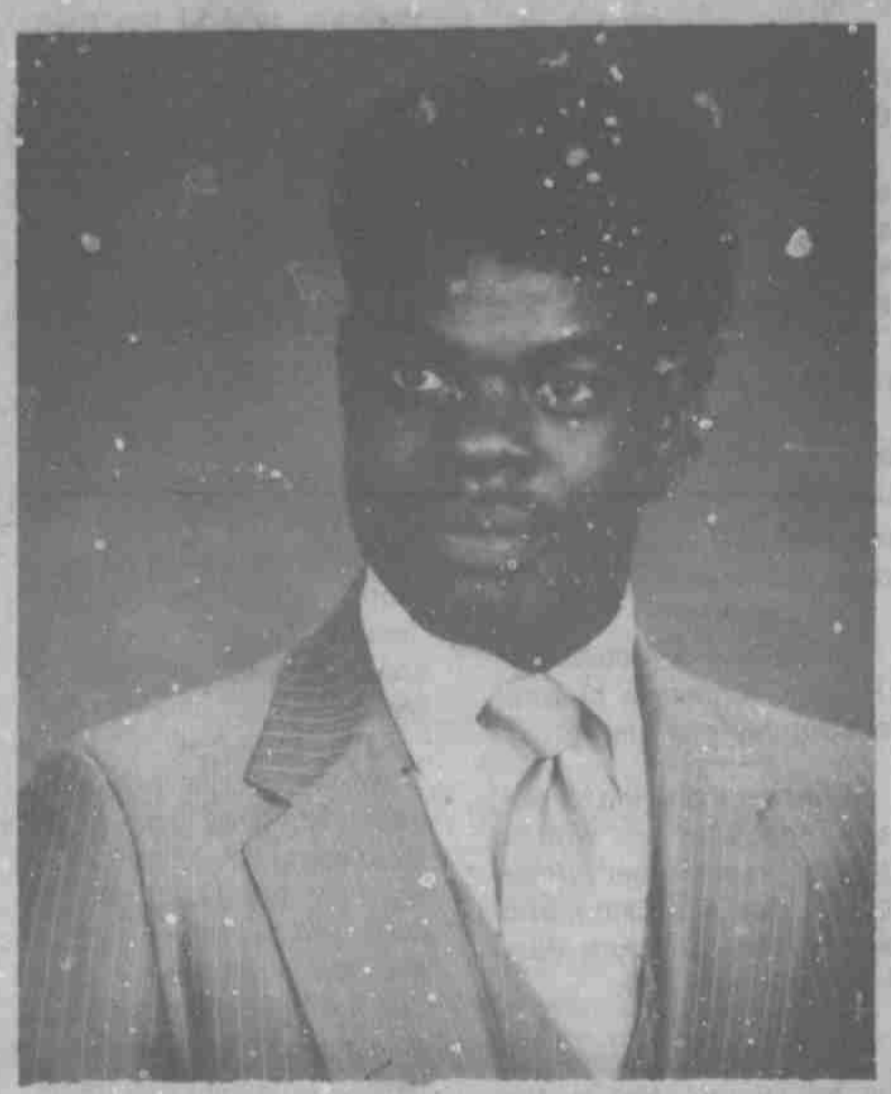
The war hero's exploits earned him the distinction of being the last American who received the nation's highest award for valor in combat.

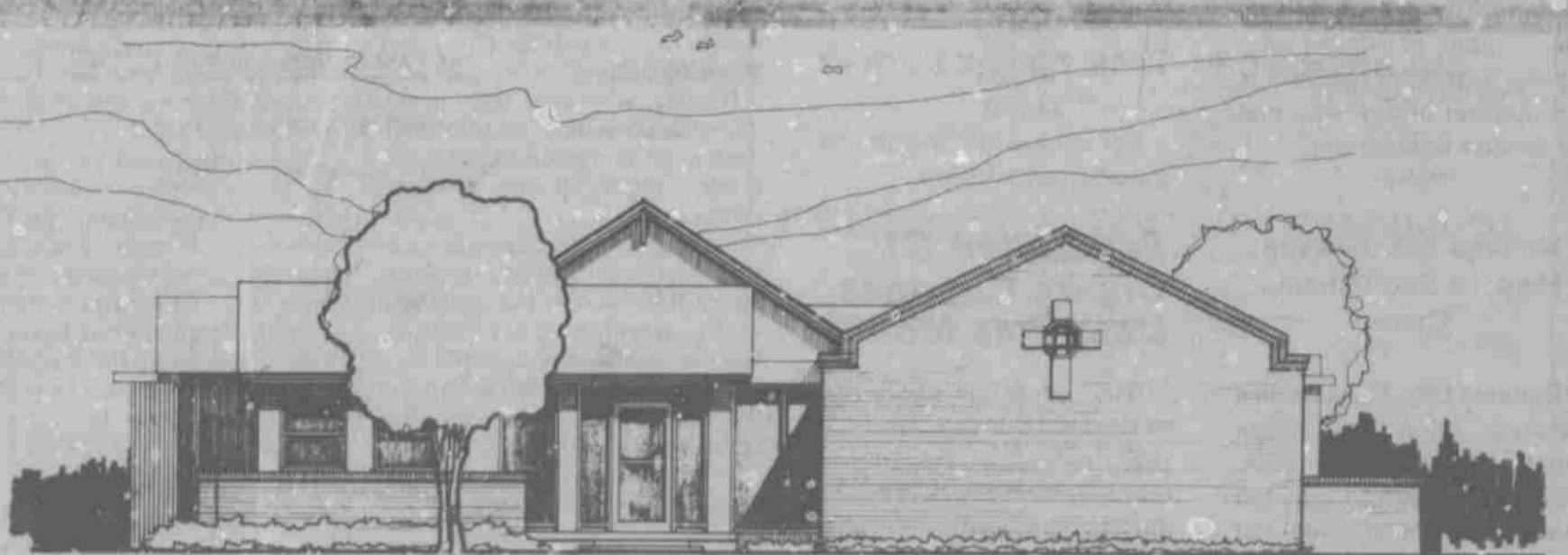

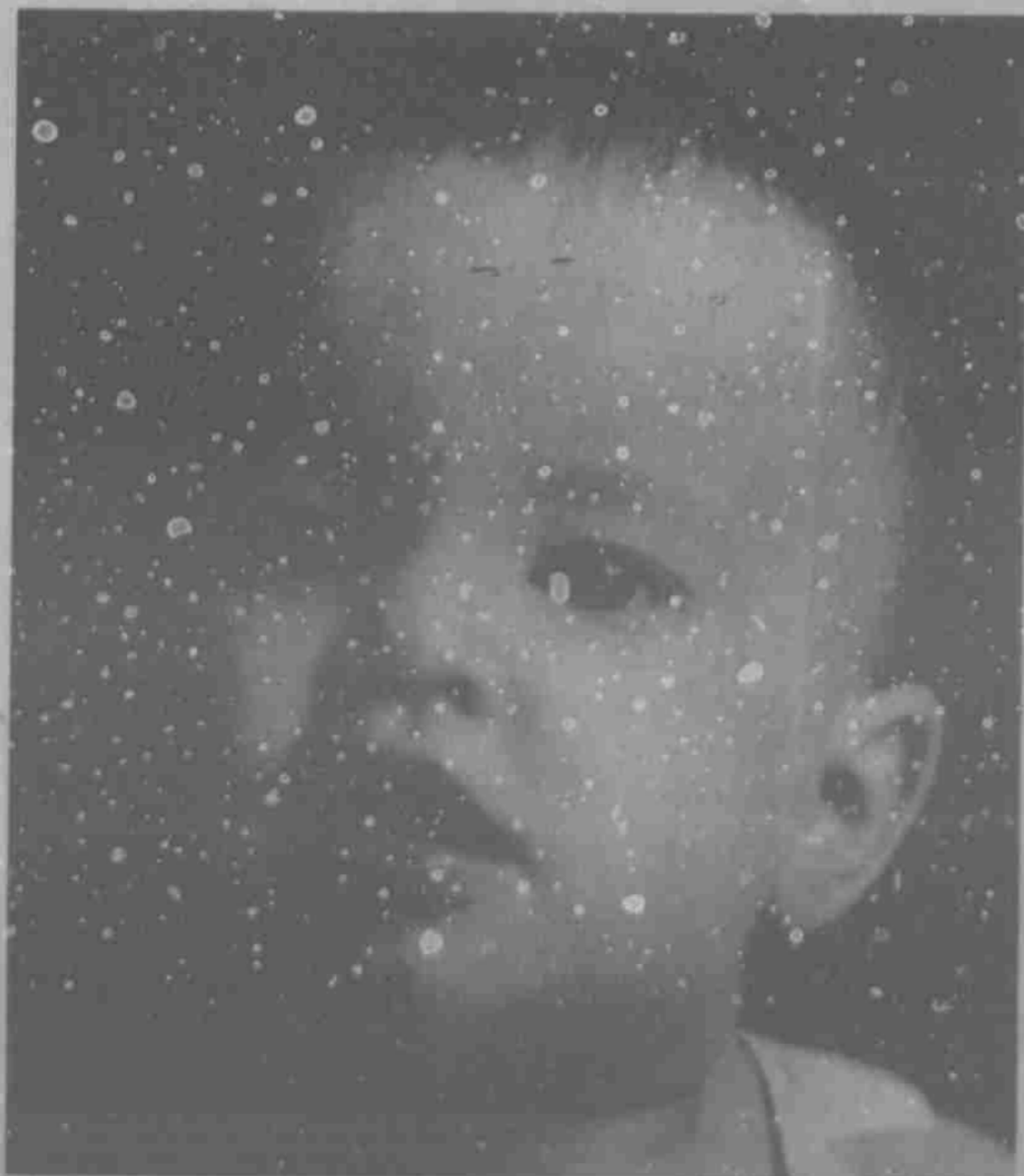

An Educator's Opinion

The Moral Challenge in '88

There may be no more compelling advocate for children in the United States than Marian Wright Edelman, the president of the well-respected Children's Defense Fund. Earlier this month, Edelman addressed the over 130 educators who make up the board of directors of the National Education Association.

What Edelman had to say is a message that needs to be heard by every American. I'm pleased to have the opportunity to share the excerpt below with you.

The standard of success for too many of us in America has become personal greed, rather than common good. The standard for striving and achievement has become getting, rather than excellence and giving, and going the second mile. Truth telling and moral example have become devalued commodities. The philosophy that government is not the solution to our problem, government is the problem, has contributed to a dominance of people who think of government as a presumptively illegitimate enterprise.

If the public purpose of one's job is not considered a high calling, and if government has no purpose other than its own destruction, then the restraints against unethical behavior, in both the public and private sector, quickly erode. As a result, for every Michael Deaver, there is an Ivan Boesky or a Reverend Jim Bakker and his Tammy. For every traveler's check cashed by Ollie North, there are many more kited by E. F. Hutton.

Indeed, we need a full-fledged congressional investigation just to figure out if Richard Secord's greed is public or private sector greed.

The decline in ethics not only has led to financial banality, but it has made a casualty of honesty. One need only look at the congressional testimony of Assistant Secretary of State Elliott Abrams on Central American policy to know that we no longer require truth telling as a precondition for holding high government office.

Should we wonder, then, why so many of our children aghast our steps and flounder. If the only principle our nation adheres to is the invisible hand, it leaves little or no room for the hand of man or woman, or the hand of God.

whom the prophet Micah said enjoined us to be fair and just and merciful.

There has been a moral dearth and hollow-ness left at the core of our society. Its members share no common purpose, mutual goals, joint vision—nothing to believe in except self-aggrandizement. Only a nation with an eroded ethical base would allow more than a fifth of its children to live in abject poverty in the midst of the greatest affluence the world has ever known.

And then we even have the foolishness to think that it's not going to hurt all of us. The poor Black youth who shoot up drugs on street corners and the rich white youth who shoot up drugs in their mansions share a common disconnectedness from a larger hope and purpose, from a sense of community and shared strivings.

The rising rates of teen suicides, drug and alcohol abuse, out-of-wedlock births among youth of all races and income groups reflect, I think, a moral drift that cries out for correction.

The overarching task of leadership today from you, me, from our political leaders, is to give our youth and all Americans a sense that we can be engaged in enterprises that will give meaning to life, to give us a sense that we can regain control over our national destiny and families, which we can. We can make a positive difference individually and collectively in building a decent and safe world for our children.

A BMW with a vanity license plate may be a shallow goal, but our society today offers too few substitutes for our young, for our elderly, or for any of us, and this is the real and tragic meaning of the current era.

It's time to change course. I hope we will change it by beginning to have children become, and families become, a major part of the route to our saving ourselves for the future. And I hope that we can all begin to work together, as others in communities throughout the country are beginning to work together, in forming a massive public voice for children who cannot vote, cannot lobby, cannot speak for themselves. That's what we have to do.

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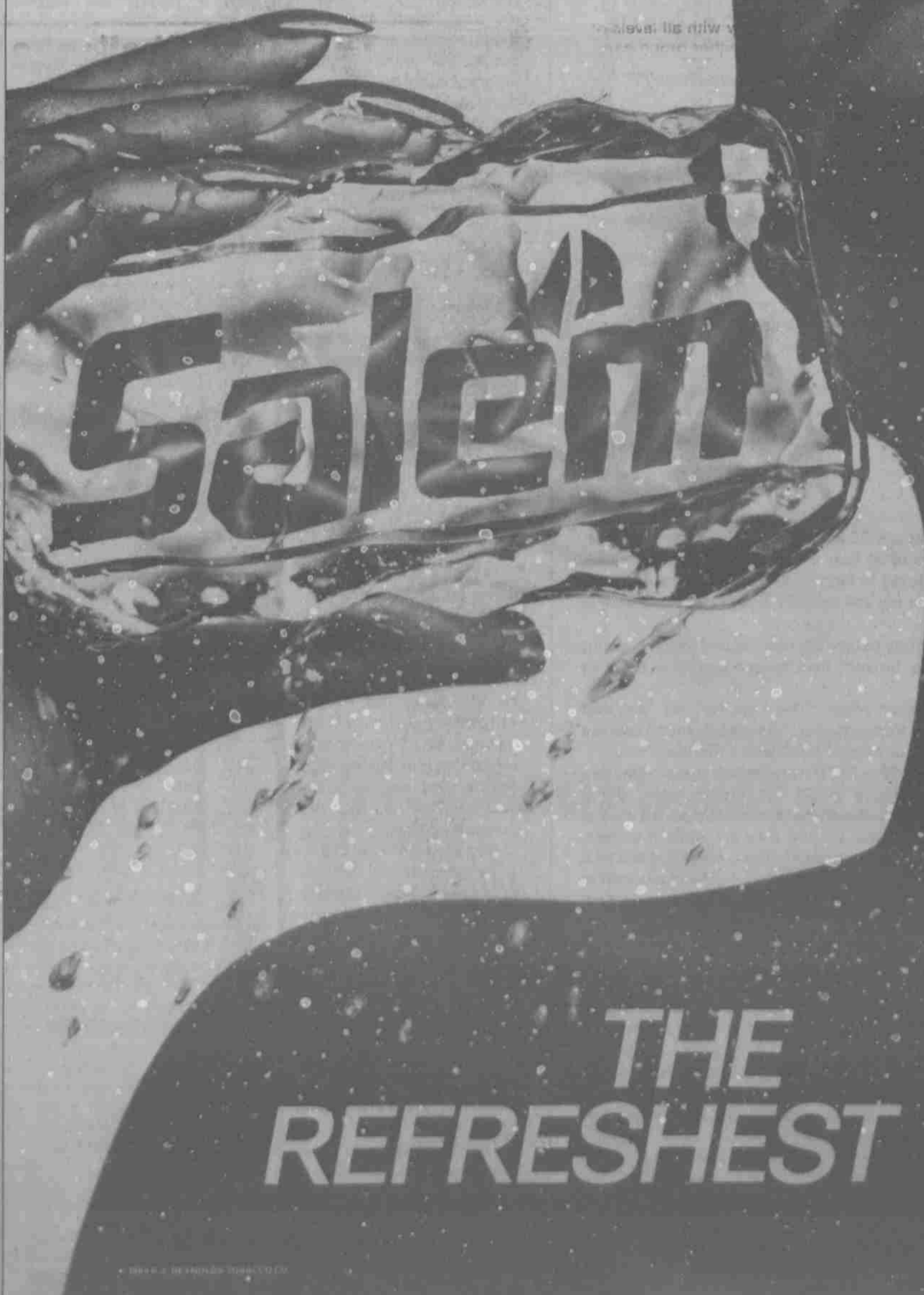

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"THE RESURRECTION OF JESUS CHRIST"

We believe in and accept the sacred and Holy Scriptures upon this subject at their face value. We believe that Christ rose bodily "the third day according to the Scriptures."

THE EVIDENCE OF HIS RESURRECTION.

1. The testimony of the angel. Matthew 28:6-7 says "He is not here: for he is risen as he said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay. And go quickly, and tell His disciples that he is risen from the dead; and, behold, he goeth before you into Galilee; and there shall ye see him."
2. The testimony of Jesus to the apostles. He told them in Luke 24:39 "Behold my hands and my feet, that it is I myself; handle me, and see; for a spirit hath not flesh and bones as ye see me have."
3. His invitation to Thomas in John 20:27 "Then saith he to Thomas, Reach hither thy finger, and behold my hands; and reach hither thy hand, and thrust it into my side: and be not faithless but believing."
4. The declaration of the Holy Scriptures in 1 Corinthians 15:4 "And that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day according to the scriptures." Mark 16:6 says "Ye seek Jesus of Nazareth, which was crucified; he is risen; he is not here: behold the place where they laid him."
5. The empty tomb. Luke 24:1-7 "Now upon the first day of the week, very early in the morning, they came into the sepulchre, bringing the spices which they had prepared, and certain others with them. And they found the stone rolled away from the sepulchre. And they entered in, and found not the body of the Lord Jesus. And it came to pass, as they were much perplexed thereabout, behold, two men stood by them in shining garments: And as they were afraid, and bowed down their faces to the earth, they said unto them, Why seek ye the living among the dead? He is not here, but is risen: remember how he spake unto you when he was yet in Galilee, Saying, The Son of man must be delivered into the hands of sinful men, and be crucified, and the third day rise again."

- a. After His death they were disheartened and afraid. John 20:19 says "Then the same day at evening, being the first day of the week, when the doors were shut where the disciples were assembled for fear of the Jews, came Jesus and stood in the midst, and saith unto them, Peace be unto you." Luke 24:37 says "But they were terrified and affrighted, and supposed that they had seen a spirit."
- b. After He revealed Himself to them in His resurrected body, they were very bold in preaching and witnessing about the resurrection. They would die rather than give up this precious doctrine.

(1) Hear what Peter had to say on the day of Pentecost in Acts 2:22-36 "Ye men of Israel, hear these words; Jesus of Nazareth, a man approved of God among you by miracles and wonders and signs, which God did by him in the midst of you, as ye yourselves also know; Him, being delivered by the determinate counsel and foreknowledge of God, ye have taken, and by wicked hands have crucified and slain: Whom God hath raised up, having loosed the pains of death; because it was not possible that he should be holden of it. For David speaketh concerning him, I foresaw the Lord always before my face, for he is on my right hand, that I should not be moved: Therefore did my heart rejoice, and my tongue was glad; moreover also my flesh shall rest in hope: Because thou wilt not leave my soul in hell, neither wilt thou suffer thine Holy One to see corruption. Thou hast made known to me the ways of life; thou shalt make me full of joy with thy countenance. Men and brethren, let me freely speak unto you of the patriarch David, that he is both dead and buried, and his sepulchre is with us unto this day. Therefore being a prophet, and knowing that God had sworn with an oath to him, that the fruit of his loins, according to the flesh, he would raise up Christ to sit on his throne; He seeing this before spake of the resurrection of Christ, that his soul was not left in hell, neither his flesh did see corruption. This Jesus hath God raised up, whereof we all are witnesses. Therefore being by the right hand of God exalted, and having received of the Father the promise of the Holy Ghost, he hath shed forth this, which ye now see and hear. For David is not ascended into the heavens: but he saith himself, The Lord said unto my Lord, sit thou on my right hand, Until I make thy foes thy footstool. Therefore let all the house of Israel know assuredly, that God hath made that same Jesus, whom ye have crucified, both Lord and Christ."

(2) Hear Peter again in Acts 3:14-15 "But ye denied the Holy One and the Just, and desired a murderer to be granted unto you; and killed the Prince of life, whom God hath raised from the dead; whereof we are witnesses."

(3) Note him before the Sanhedrin and others in Acts 4:10 "Be it known unto you all, and to all the people of Israel, that by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom ye crucified, whom God raised from the dead, even by him doth this man stand here before you whole." Acts 4:33 says "And with great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus: and great grace was upon them all." Also in Acts 5:29-32 it says "Then Peter and the other apostles answered and said, We ought to obey God rather than man. The God of our fathers raised up Jesus, whom ye slew and hanged on a tree. Him hath God exalted with his right hand to be a Prince and a Saviour, for to give repentance to Israel, and forgiveness of sins. And we are his witnesses of these things; and so is also the Holy Ghost, whom God hath given to them that obey him."

7. Stephen saw Jesus standing at the right hand of God in Acts 7:54-56 which reads "When they heard these things, they were cut to the heart, and they grashed on him with their teeth. But he, being full of the Holy Ghost, looked up steadfastly into heaven, and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing on the right hand of God, And said, behold, I see the heavens opened, and the Son of man standing on the right hand of God."

THE IMPORTANCE OF THE RESURRECTION.

1. Without it, our preaching and our faith would also be vain. Notice what it says in the book of 1 Corinthians 15:12-14 "Now if Christ be preached that he rose from the dead, how say some among you that there is no resurrection of the dead? But if there be no resurrection of the dead, then is Christ not risen: And if Christ be not risen, then is our preaching vain, and your faith is also vain."
2. Without it, we would be false witnesses for it says in 1 Corinthians 15:15 "Yea, and we are found false witnesses of God; because we have testified of God that he raised up Christ: whom he raised not up, if so be that the dead rise not."
3. Without it, we would still be in our sins. 1 Corinthians 15:16-17 continues to say "For if the dead rise not, then is not Christ raised: And if Christ be not raised, your faith is vain; ye are yet in your sins."
4. Without it, the dead in Christ have perished. 1 Corinthians 15:18 says "Then they also which are fallen asleep in Christ are perished."
5. Without it, all our hope would be in this life only, and this would make us of all men most miserable. In closing, 1 Corinthians 15:19 says "If in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of all men most miserable. But now is Christ risen from the dead."

1 (8 ounce) can pineapple tidbits, drained
½ (3½ ounce) can flaked coconut
1½ cups miniature marshmallows
1 (8 ounce) carton sour cream
½ cup chopped pecans
½ cup seedless green grapes (optional)

In a medium mixing bowl, combine all ingredients. Refrigerate until served. Makes 4 servings.
