Special guest will be The Gospe! Warriors of Dailas, Texas. These young people





CEBA

A DECADE OF EXCELLENCE

The time that has passed since 1978 — the year that the CEBA Awards were first introduced — is perhaps best measured by events than by years. A cursory review of what occured during the past ten years, however, would probably not reveal the most significant developments. While the period does not lend itself to easy labels like The Seventies or The Eighties, the theme of this year's CEBA Awards is very appropriate: A Decade of Excellence.

The African-American experience has changed dramatically in ten years. In 1978 there were only 170 Black mayors. Today there are 303. There were only 56 Blackowned radio stations in the nation. Now there are 140. The population for African-Americans was 22 million. It has since grown to 27 million.

It was during the final years of the Seventies that a new movement among Black Americans grew in evidence. Armed with the gains from the Civil Rights struggles of the Sixties, Black Americans surged into the mainstream of society as never before. It was the beginning of a new consciousness about the vital role African-Americans were having on corporate America's bottom line and profit margins.

In 1978 the late D. Parke Gibson, a pioneer in research on the Black consumer market, released his book, "\$70 Billion In The Black." In that prophetic text Gibson endeavored to call attention to the untapped potential of Black consumers:

"Today as never before, those who would sell goods and services to expanding markets must become familiar with the characteristics, behavior patterns in the marketplace, and socio-economic data on minority consumer markets. The Black consumer market... will continue to be a prime marketing opportunity...

"Valuable consumer franchises could be lost if they are not protected now for the future. Those companies who would want to benefit from the future increasingly important minority market purchases will have to look extremely hard at their future market development projections..."

The discriminating consumer

Not only did more marketers begin to give Black consumers more consideration, but Black consumers started paying greater attention to the efforts of marketers. In exchange for their patronage, advertisers were expected to be sensitive to how they portrayed and addressed Black consumers. But until that time there had been no guidelines, no means of comparison, no recognition of the best way to tout this audience. The Communications Excellence to Black Audiences Awards changed that. For the first time, corporations and Individuals who communicated with Blacks were being judged for the contents of their messages. CEBA provided an additional incentive for those who already recognized the financial benefit of depicting Blacks in an accurate and positive manner. It seems that America's own racial consciousness matured in many ways during the past ten years. The growing presence of other ethnic groups who are part of the American mosaic has heightened awareness about the impact of minorities in the marketplace. Black Americans, however, continue to be a dominant force in all aspects of this society. Throughout history, the lifestyles of African-Americans have influenced the lifestyles of all Americans. In the arts, sports, politics, business and other endeavors, the contributions made by Blacks continue to change the world.

has not gone unnoticed by corporate America. As competition in the marketplace increases, and avenues to profits become more treacherous, the potential of Black consumers grows in appeal, even to those who once ignored it.

In what book is it written that "You must wait until May to line up that summer job." Why not start now talking with those people that reed additional help during the summer. Be persist int, but don't turn the potential employer off. Let them know, you want a joba them know, you want a joba this summer, that you are applying now so you can be the first on the list.

We, Blacks, have been denied because the "System" uses loop holes to keep us out. One such loop hole, All the positions are filled. Plug that loop hole by placing your name on file in November or December.

Have you driven down East Broadway between Quirct and Idalou on a Saturcay morning in the last month Did you notice all those whites in the field working. Did you what they were using? Well, they were building a Kingdom Hall and they viere not getting paid. Now wouldn't it be nice if during the winter months, one of our organizations would stari gathering supplies and volunteers for a community project? That's how things are being done folks. Planning, allowing sufficient time to beg, rebeg alost everything needed to complete you: proect. You will be surprised how many stores will contribute building materials for a worthwhile cause. Don't demand, explain what you are trying to do and take what is given. We can do a lot more if we will stup defeating ourselves before we really apply ourselves. Nothing ventured, nothing gained. Let's start now planning, organizing and working on a better summer of '88.

Integration vs. segmentation

The hard earned advances made by Blacks to enter the mainstream should not be taken as signs of being fully integrated into society. Even as we observe the bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution, Blacks are still struggling to achieve the full equality entitled to them as citizens. However, cultural, historical and social characteristics distinguished African-Americans from other market segments and these impact on virtually all of their perceptions, decisions and conclusions. For marketers, this presents a unique opportunity.

Demographers have already foretold of the "new America," a nation where ethnic minorities will represent the majority of the population. Market segmentation has already been identified by many advertisers as the best strategic approach to successfully luring future consumers. In this respect, the black consumer market continues to offer the most incrative opportunities.

Measured against all other target audiences, the Black consumer market is still the second largest consumer market in the nation. Black consumers earn and spend more than the Hispanic and Asian consumers combined. By 1990 Blacks are projected to have more than \$225 billion in income. Again, more than is projected for both Hispanics and Asians.

The promects for marketing success by targeting the Black consumer market will be as rewarding a decade from now as they were ten years ago. But some advertisers remain unconvinced. This despite the consistent growth of entries placed in the CEBA competition each year. It has always been our hope that by honoring excellence by those who communicate with Black audiences, reluctant companies would be persuaded to reevaluate their position.

Additionally, we have long felt the irrefutable evidence presented in statistical research would be just the spark of information necessary to encour age further investigation. That is why we are presenting indices to demonstrate the increased importance of Black purchasing in a broad crosssection of consumer product categories.

If you have participated in the CEBA Awards for all or part of these past ten years, we are certain that you have come to realize that the philosophy expressed by D. Parke Gibson a decade ago still rings true.

"Today a market exists that can be effectively recognized. Identified with, and invited to purchase goods and services. These consumers happen to be Black.






