




In the late 50's, Mr. Thornton introduced the Gold over White colors to the business. He relocated to its present location in 1958.

A 76 year old gentleman who has lived at Buffalo Springs Lake for 28 years has his \$397 annual lot lease come due on December 31, 1987. After January 10, 1988, the \$397 began to accumulate late charge at the rate of 10% DAILY. Before the end of February he owed well over \$2000. Attempts were made to meet with the board and work out a payment plan. He was refused a hearing, given a choice of "either pay up or move" and eviction papers were served on March 30, 1988. A hearing was had on April 1, 1988 at which time he was given 5 days to pay the full amount or lose his home, clothing, trucks and anything else he might call property. He sold his home, containing 28 years of memories, for just enough to cover his lease, late charges and court costs. ILLEGAL OR JUST IMMORAL???

There have been a number of other instances of this very thing, yet a family came through the gate in an Airstream trailer, driving a late model vehicle and towing another, parked in the campground for six months or better and were charged a VERY REDUCED rate - needless to say, they were friends of someone in authority and were d. emed a "hardship case" - MUST YOU OWN AN AIRSTREAM TO BE A HARDSHIP CASE??? Most of our sensor citizens can't afforo that kind of "hardship"

From the moment these los leases became delinquent the homeowners has to pay the regular gate fee to 30 to their homes. Everytime they went to work, to the grocery store, or to the doctor, upon their seturn they were charged a gate fee to 30 home. WOULD YOU TAKE ACTION IF YOU HAD TO PAY \$1.50 EVERY TIME YOU DESIRED ACCESS TO YOUR HOME? Are there other "villages" who charge an entry fee to visit in their site?

It has been openly stated that this is "a very powerful board, with broad authority and the laws of Texas and the Federal government DO NOT APPLY to this District". IT IS HARD TO BELIEVE THAT 5 MEN CAN BE ABOVE THE LAW. LET'S FIND OUT IF THEY ARE!!!

Board members, village officials and lake employed have stated that "we don't want "undestrables" living here, serving on the board, visiting our facilities". WHO IS CLASSIFIED AS AN UnDESTRABLE - IT COULD BE YOU OR I. If so, what is it that makes us undestrable? What do you think?

These cases are just the tip of the iceberg. The taxpayers of Lubbock County own Buffalo Springs Lake, investing over 3 million dollars to improve the area as a recreational area for all residents of Lubbock County. Lubbock County taxpayers still contribute to the support of the lake through their general admission and permit charges. The voters of Lubbock County elected this board, which in turn hired the manager. Should we now sit back and simply play "follow the leader", become dehumanized, void of sympathy, of opinion, of questions, insensitive to the needs of other human beings, or should we stand up and fight for the basic human rights granted by our land? SHOULD WE, AS TAXPAYERS OF LUBBOCK COUNTY, TEXAS, TAKE HOLD AND INSIST THAT OUR PUBLIC SERVANTS FULFILL THEIR OATH OP OFFICE AND SERVE THE NEEDS OF EYERYONE? WHAT DO YOU THINK? They lived by the code that says, get what you want anyway you can from anybody who has what you want. Steal, Ile, cheat, rob, anything, as long as you get what you want. This is one way to live and hosts of people live like that.

One of the Ten Commandments is "Thou shalt not steal." But this Commandment is broken everyday in many different ways. Outright taking of things from another as the thieves did in the parable of the good Samaritan is one way. Other ways are dishonest dealings, petty larceny, false labeling, unjust weights, lying advertisements and cheating on exams. Anyone who fails to give a full day's work for a full day's pay is a thief. Anyone who won't pay his bills is a thief. To borrow without intent to repay is robbery. To conceal a defect in an Item for sale is dishonest. The adulteration of a product or the misuse of property by tenants is cheating. The most common form of stealing, and one of the worst, is to withhold God's tithe.

There are three ways to acquire a thing. The first is to work for it and to rejoice in honest toll. The second way is to receive a thing as a gift, and to know that someone loves you. The third is to steal it and to bear the wrath of God. Everyone should be sure that he has a moral and legal title to everything he possesses. Don't be a thief. Don't be one who pilfers, (to stear in small quantities) filches (to take another's possession without right and without his knowledge or permission). Don't swindle anybody. On the other hand be on the alert for those who would steal from you or someone alse. Let us all keep our lights on and our eyes open and watch for one another. Call your neighbor when you are leaving home, just for a few minutes. Report crime regardless of where it happens



It Needs To Be Said

by the Mystery Writer

Being late is better than never, therefore the "Letter to the Editor" in the April 14, 1988 edition concerning Dunbar is greatly appreciated. Your letter indicates your cor.cern for Dunbar which is what the article was intended to generate. The racial overtone of the article should not be overplayed, yet it is significant. Too often when race is mentioned, we tend to take it as bias or prejudice, however, there are times when race must be considered as a cause of the problem. In the case of Dunbar's Cosch Lee, I do not refer nor consider him a racist, bias or prejudice. I merely pointed to the fact, does he have the motivation, talent and abilities to get the best out of a majority Black football team. If you will recall, I also questioned Coach Wallace efforts at Coronado.

There are certain stimulants Blacks respond to that Whites in most instances can't supply. There also is a possibility that the black players simply refuse to give their best for a White coach. Therefore, race is involved, not in an overt manner, but behind the scene. As concern supporters of Dunbar, we must explore all alternatives to come up with a solution. As adults of the community, we are either part of the solution or part of the problem.

I also agree, Estacado has a larger enrollment and a better feeder program and for those reasons we give them the edge. An edge is a slim margin, however, Dunbar is compatitive with Estacado in other activities in reference to sports, band, academic. The point here its, if Estacado 10-0, 9-1 annually, why can't Dunbar be at least 5-5, 6-4, in short have a winning season. That was the basis for the comparison. If you and I both brought identical material from Cloth World, the same patterns why would one outfit be superior to the other? Would you blame it on one house being better than the other, the annual income, or would you say, it was the skill of the seam stress?

As the writer stated, "parents do need to take control of the situation within our schools and stop the excuses." We as Blacks must be atuned to the steps we can take to resolve our concerns with school problems. Do you feel Coach Wallace's transfer to Estacado was not an "offer he best not refuse?" This is the same type tactic we must learn to employ. We tend to do a great deal of tongue flapping "in-house" or "in-community", yet when times require us to back-up our words, we become deaf and dumb. We tend to tolerate situations that are against our beliefs or that we know are totally wrong, as the fear of hurting someones feeling overcomes our sense of right and wrong. Rescuing a Nation at Risk

In my last column, while discussing the fifth anniversary of the A Notion at Risk report, I said that if America is to compete economically with other nations, we must restructure education in profound, rather than superficial, ways. I also said that the previous five years have produced little leadership from the Reagan Administration in financing American education.

This past Friday, at an NEAsponsored conference in Washington, D.C., nationally renowned

Harvard economist Robert B. Reich tackled this critically important issue of restructuring education. Reich began by pointing to two missed opportunities in recent American history.

Pirst, as the high-tech information age rose from the ashes of the

industrial age, public policymakers took little note. Our schools continued to prepare students for jobs that demanded conformity rather than creativity. Assembly-line schools designed to prepare students for essembly-line jobs remained the norm.

Second, policymakers hid from the chillenges posed by the emerging global economy. Schools met this new economic reality with old educational habits, and America remained wedded to a two-tiered system that sharply divided the educated elite from semi-educated, semi-literate workers. As a result, America now

shares the marketplace it once

Our schools became anachronisms. Our curricula became obsolete. Our workers became unprepared for the changing economic environment. America became a nation at risk.

Reich insists that today's challenge is "to provide our children not with more education, but rather with a different kind of education." An education that introduces them to high-tech creativity. An education that

stresses experimentation, not only repetition and drill.

Reich notes that the engine of American productivity is no longer fueled by an elite corps of managerial wizards. The new engine is collaborationcollaboration among workers at all levels.

That kind of collaboration demands schools that place less emphasis on competition, more emphasis on cooperation. We in NEA are working hard to build this cooperation. In over 100 school buildings around the country, NEA experimental programs are empowering teachers, helping faculties make decisions at the school site.

Professor Reich understands that rescuing a nation at risk demands turning the educational status quo upside down. Cosmetic changes in education will produce cosmetic results. A nation at risk will be saved only by a nation of risk-takers.



"THE RESURRECTION OF JESUS CHRIST"

We believe in and accept the sacred and Holy Scriptures upon this subject at their face value. We believe that Christ rose bodily "the third day according to the Scriptures."

THE EVIDENCE OF HIS RESURRECTION.

1. The testimony of the angel. Matthew 28:6-7 says "He is not here: for he is risen as he said. Come, see the pisce where the Lord lay. And go quickly, and tell His disciples that he is risen from the doad; and, behold, he goeth before you into Galliee; and there shall ye see him."

2. The testimony of Jesus to the apostles. He told them in Luke 24:39 "Behold my hands and my feet, that It is I myself: handle me, and see; for a spirit hath not flesh and bones as ye see me have."

3. His invitation to Thomas in John 20:27 "Then saith he to Thomas, Reach hither thy inger, and behold my hands; and reach hither thy hand, and thrust it into my side; and be not faithless but believing."

4. The declaration of the Holy Scriptures in 1 Corinthians 15:4 "And that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day according to the scriptures." Mark 16:6 says "Ye seek Jesus of Nazareth, which was crucified; he is risen; he is not here: behold the place where they laid him."

5. The empty tomb. Luke 24:1-7 "Now upon the first day of the week, very early in the morning, they came into the sepulchre, bringing the spices which they had prepared, and certain others with them. And they found the stone rolled away from the sepulcher. And they entered In, and found not the body of the Lord Jesus. And It came to pass, as they were such perplexed thereabout, behold, two men stood by them in shining garments: And as they were afraid, and bowed down their faces to the earth, they said unto them, Why seek ye the living among the dead? He is not here, but is risen: remember how he spake unto you when he was yet in Galilee, Saying, The Son of man must be delivered into the

hands of sinful men, and be crucified, and the ghird day rise again."

6. The change wrought in the apostles. a. After HIs death they were disheartened and afraid. John 20:19 says "Then the same day at evening, being the first day of the week, when the doors were shut where the disciples were assembled for fear of the Jews, came Jesus and stood in the midst, and saith unto them, Peace be unto you." Luke 24:37 says "But they were ferrifled and affrighted, and supposed that they had seen a spirit."

b. After He revealed Himself to them in His resurrected body, they were very bold in preaching and witnessing about the resurrection. They would die rather than give up

this precious doctrine. (1) Hear what Peter had to say on the day of Pentecost In Acts 2:22-36 "Ye men of Israel, hear these words; Jesus of Nazareth, a man approved of God among you by miracles and wonders and signs, which God did by him in the midst of you, as we yourselves also know: Him, being delivered by the determinate counsel and foreknowledge of God, ye have taken, and by wicked hands have crcified and slain: Whom God hath raised up, having loosed the pains of death: because it was not possible that he should be holden of it. For David speaketh concerning him, I foresaw the Lord always before my face, for he is on my right hand, that I should not be moved: Therefore did my heart rejoice, and my tongue was glad; moreover also my flesh shall rest in hope: Because thou wilt not leave my soul in hell, neither with thou suffer thing Holy One to see corruption. Thou hast made known to me the ways of life; thou shalt make me full of Joy with thy countenance. Men and brethren, let me freely speak unto you of the patriarch David, that he is both dead and buried, and his sepulchre is with us unto this day. Therefore being a prophet, and knowing that God had sworn with an oath to him, that the fruit of his loins, according to the flesh, he would raise up Christ to sit on his throne; He seeing this before spake of the resurrection of Christ, that his soul was not left in hell, neither his flesh did see corruption. This Jesus hath God raised up, whereof we all are witnesses. Therefore being by the right hand of God exalted, and having received of the Father the promise of the Holy Ghost, he hath shed forth this, which ye now see and hear. For David is not escended into the heavens: but he saith himself, The Lord said unto my Lord, sIt thou on my right hand, Until I make thy foes thy footstool. Therefore let al! the house of Israel know assuredly, that God hath made that same Jesus, whom ye have crucified, both Lord and Christ."

(2) Hear Peter again in Acts 3:14-15 "But ye denied the Holy One and the Just, and desired a murderer to be granted unto you; And killed the Prince of life, whom God hath raised from the deed; whereof we are witnesses."

(3) Note him before the Sanhedrin and others in Acts 4:10 "Be it known unto you all, and to all the people of Israel, that by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom ye crucified, whom God raised from the dead, even by him doth this man stand here before you whole." Acts 4:33 says "And with great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus: and great grace was upon them all." Also In Acts 5:29-32 it says "Then Peter and the other apostles answered and sald, We ought to obey God rather than men. The God of our fathers relsed up Jesus, whom ye slew and hanged on a tree. Him hath God exaited with his right hand to be a Prince and a Saviour, for to give repentance to Israel, and forgiveness of sins. And we are his witnesses of these things; and so is also the Holy Ghost, whom God bath given to them that obey him."

7. Stephen saw Jesus standing at the right hand of God in Acts 7:54-56 which reads "When they heard these things, they were cut to the heart, and they gnashed on him with their teeth. But he, being full of the Holy Ghost, looked up steadfastly Into he ven, and saw the glory of God, and Jesus sranding on the right hand of God, And said, behold, I see the heavens opened, and the Son of man standing on the right hand of God."

THE IMPORTANCE OF THE RESURRECTION.

I. Without It, our preaching and our faith would also be vain. Notice what It says in the book of 1 Corinthians 15:12-14 "Now 1f Christ be preached that he rose from the dead, how say some among you that there Is no resurrection of the dead; But If there be no resurrection of the dead, then is Christ not risen; And if Christ he not risen, then is our preaching valu, and your faith is also valu."

2. Without it, we would be talse witnesses for it mays in I Coninthirms 15:15 "Yes, and we are found talse witnesses of God; because we have testified of God that he raised up Christ; whom he raised not up, Haron be that the dead rise rot."

A. Without It, we would still be in our sins. I Cominthians 15:16-17 continues to say "For If the dead rise not, then is not Christ reised; And if Christ be not reised, your faith is vain; ye are yet in your sins."

4. Without it, the dead in Christ have perished. I Corinthians 15:18 says "Then they also which are fallen esleep in Christ are perished."

5. Without It, all our hope would be in this life only, and this would make us of all men most miserable. In closing, 1 Corinthians 15:19 says "if in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of al! men most miserable. But now is Christ risen from the deed," Sunday School 9:45 a.m.
