The Department of Housing and Urban Development will accept applications from nonprofit organizations for rental or cooperative housing under the Section 202 Direct Loan Program for Housing for the Elderly or Handicapped subject to the maximum number of units and loan authority identified below:

Metropolitan Area	128	\$5,338,000
Nonmetropolitan Area	102	\$4,254,000

Notwithstanding the maximum number of units identified above, this office has established a maximum unit limitation per individual application of 60 units for metropolitan areas and 40 units for nonmetropolitan areas. (See the Application Package for limitations applying to substantial rehabilitation and projects for the nonelderly handicapped.)

The Fiscal Year 1988 Appropriations Act specifies that 25 percent of Section 202 funds shall be used to provide housing for the handicapped. Also, Congress has expressed concern for the shelter needs of the homeless chronically mentally ill. Accordingly, sponsors serving handicapped individuals are especially encouraged to apply.

It Needs To Be Said

The young Blacks in east Lubbock are probably very angry over the recent events at Butler Park. They have blamed Councilman Patterson, the neighbors, the police, the mayor and God knows who else for the heavy patrol on Sundays. I just wonder if there is one in the group who has given one minutes thought as to the real reason for the turn of events at Butler Park.

To share my thoughts with them in hopes they gain some understanding of just "what's happening." In my experience with Lubbock, we of the east side general operate on rumors with the truth being known by only a select few. To our young adults that frequent Butler Park, the increased patrol resulted from your undiscipline, irresponsible and disrespectful behavior. Yes, you were only "doing your thing," but your thing was at the expense of others. We do not desire this type behavior in our community. We all live here, not just those of you with clean rides and loud music. We tolerated the loud music but drew the line at gun and knife incidents as well as "pot parties." Blocking our driveways and streets surrounding the park also contributed to our becoming very upset with you. And one thing I have yet to comprehend, how can there be enough of you to make a Tarzan movie on the park, and yet, when something happens, no one saw anything? Closing your eyes and mouth made it necessary to deal with all participants.

Let me stop for a moment to clarify one point, not all of our young adults fall into the above category. I will go further and say, only a small percent of the mass at Butler Park are guilty of anything. However, the small percent's actions well condoned by the mass and since the mass failed to correct the problem, would not cooperate to rid themselves of the problem, then you also must accept the consequences. Being you all appeared to enjoy being at the park, then you should have accepted the responsibility of insuring you did your individual part to keep it enjoyable for everyone. Whenever you fail to do your part, then you leave the door open for someone else to do it for you. And in most instances, you will not like the actions others will take.

Butler Park was not, is not your park, it is our park, the entire community and city. Whenever there is a place where all of us do not feel comfortable, then we will take steps to correct the situation. Do not complain about the police or Councilman Patterson, they are only doing what was requested by the more responsible citizens of the community. The blame lies with each person who frequent the park and allow those actions to occur that are not tolerated in a civilized society. If you do not conduct yourself in accordance with the expectation of the community or society, then you must accept the consequences, or move somewhere they will accept your behavior. We have had it with those of you who don't want anything worthwhile and try your damness to ruin everything good. The small percentage of ill mannered and disrespectful people who "do your thing" without regards for others, your days are limited in east Lubbock. CLEAN UP YOUR ACT; IT IS AS SIMPLE AS THAT!!

Land Commissioner Garry Mauro Urges Black Texans to Use Veterans Programs

Over the next several weeks a series of articles on the various Texas Veterans Land Board programs will be featured. These programs are available to eligible Texas Veterans and are funded by bonds which are repaid by Veterans using the programs.

In 1946, the Texas Legislature created the Texas Veterans Land Program, which was approved by the voters of Texas by almost a 3 to 1 margin. This program was designed to provide capital for land purchases by eligible Texas Veterans.

The Veterans Land Board was created to administer the program. The Board consists of the Texas Land Commissioner, who serves as Chairman, and two members appointed by the Governor who represent the financial and Veterans communities. The Texas Veterans Land Board made its first loan in 1949 and has made more than 94,000 since.

Under the terms of the original Texas Veterans Land Program, the VLB would lend money to Texas Veterans returning from World War II to use for land purchases. Texas Veterans were charged only loan amount and administrative costs. Texas' approach was in sharp contrast to cash bonus programs begun by the majority of other states. In cash bonus states, each Veteran received a one-time, no-strings-attached cash amount for service rendered, ranging from \$30 to as much as \$300.

Today the Texas Veterans Land Program lends eligible Texas Veterans up to \$20,000 for the purchase of five or more acres of land. The current interest rate is 8.75 percent and the maximum

term of the loan is 30 years. There is no penalty for early pay-off of the loan. In 1983, newly-elected Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro successfully obtained the approval of the Texas Legislature and an overwhelming majority of Texas voters to create a Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program. This program was expanded in 1986 to include the Texas Vet-

erans Home Improvement Program.

The Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program (VHAP) lends eligible Texas Veterans up to \$20,000 at 9 percent interest to use toward the purchase of a home. These loans can be used in conjunction with VA, FHA or conventional loans. In most cases a Texas Veteran can buy a home with no down payment by combining a federal VA loan with a Texas VHAP loan.

The Texas Veterans Home Improvement Program lends eligible Texas Veterans up to \$17,500 at 10.5 percent interest for 15 years to make improvements to their homes. Veterans can receive loans for a variety of home improvements including room additions, roofing, attached garages, sidewalks, driveways, screened porches, patios, decks, fences and thermal windows.

In 1986, the Board increased the benefits available to Texas Veterans by allowing eligible Veterans to participate in all three loan programs one time. Prior to 1986, Texas Veterans were limited to one loan through the Texas Veterans Land Board. Participation in any of the VLB programs does not prevent a Texas Veteran from receiving any other benefits offered through federal Veterans programs.

Today, eligible Texas Veterans are entitled to up to \$57,500 in long-term, low-interest loans through the VLB to acquire land, houses, or make home improvements. Land Commissioner Garry Mauro is making a special effort to increase Black participation in the programs. A contract has been entered into with two Black-owned firms to assist in the implementation and attainment of this goal. Commissioner Mauro states "The Texas Veterans Land Board programs are the best in the nation and are enabling thousands of Texans to buy houses, land, or make improvements to existing homes. I am committed to ensure that Black Texans receive their fair share."

The Veterans programs create jobs in the private sector by increasing the availability of af-

fordable capital to consumers. The programs use local lenders, builders and contractors which generate economic activity.

A study by Drs. Bernard Weinstein and Harold Gross at the Edwin L. Cox School of Business at Southern Methodist University found the Texas Veterans programs made \$538 million in loans across the state between 1984-1986. These loans generated more than \$1.1 billion in economic activity and created more than 20,000 jobs.

The Texas Veterans Land Board currently has more than \$300 million available to Texas Veterans for long-term, low-interest loans.
