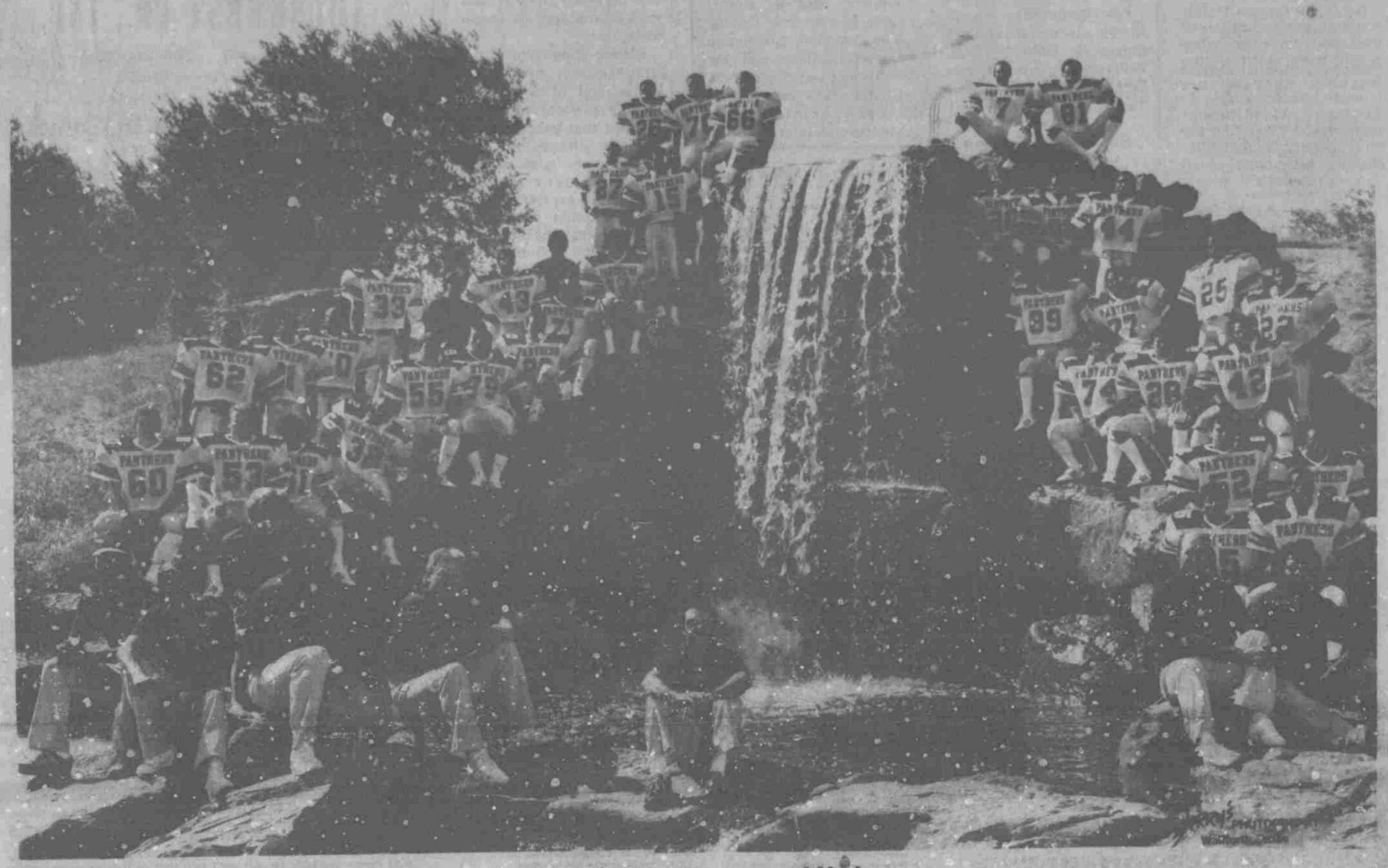

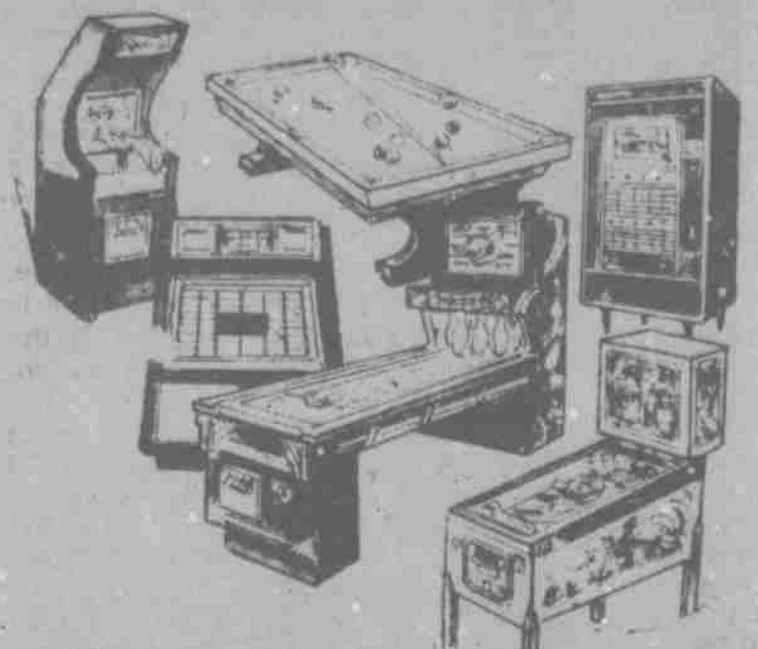

Namibian Atrocities To Be Heard By The UN

(NIS) -- A marked increase in atrocities in South Africa-occupied Namibia is expected to be the topic of an upcoming session of the United Nations Security Council. It was petitioned to hear that case by representatives of the frontline states, nations bordering South Africa, and the South West Africa Peoples Organization.

SWAPO, which is fighting to free Namibia from the apartheid colonial occupation, has documented repression, assaults and intimidation against civilians.

SWAPO Information Secretary Hideo Hamutenya said the Security Council session is expected to be held this month. He insisted that the new evidence of South Africa's war

against the Namibian people "is further proof" of the need to implement UN Resolution 435, a plan for Namibian independence which South Africa refuses to accept.

Reports of atrocities have also been filed by independent press, church and labor organizations inside Namibia. South Africa has stationed approximately 100,000 troops there and instituted several paramilitary units which have been blamed for committing murder, torture, abduction and detentions.

One of the most recent incidents involved a ranking SWAPO member, Daniel Tjongarero, who was being held along with six others incommunicado. He was admitted to the hospital on September 2, reportedly suffering from internal injuries.

According to The Namibian, a weekly tabloid, Tjongarero's family doctor was prohibited from seeing the 40-year-old man who is plagued with a terminal kidney disease.

Other recent reports indicate stepped up shootings in the war-torn northern region where a dusk to dawn curfew has been in effect since 1978. Over the past month several people were shot for alleged curfew violations. In one incident, an older woman and a young girl with her baby strapped to her back were killed instantly by shots from a helicopter gunship.

Those three and a fourth victim, a man identified as Dishela, were all taken to the Ondangua air base where he later died. Five days later, residents reported that the dead had not been buried or turned over to relatives.

In another incident reported early last month, 13-year-old Line Eelu was discovered in a state of hysteria and taken to a hospital in northern Namibia for treatment. She was one of several victims reportedly tortured with electric shocks during military interrogation about the movement of SWAPO fighters.

FACTS & FIGURES

Every community has quite a few, although most people don't know who they are. More than 13 million American children or one out of every five are poor. Solving the problem of poverty among children today may help them become more productive members of society as adults.

The National Association of Social Workers (NASW) is conducting an education campaign to remind the public of the needs of this vulnerable population. The campaign is entitled "Children in Poverty: Is a Fair Chance Too Much to Ask?" According to social workers, poverty-stricken children are more likely than others to have birth defects and illness; less likely to receive medical, dental and eye-care which may lead to poorer health throughout childhood; less likely to receive immunizations; and more likely to suffer from hunger and malnutrition.

NASW suggests the average citizen can contribute to the alleviation of poverty. The association's director, Mark Battle, says: "By working through business or community organizations or by taking a personal interest in a poor child, we can make significant progress toward this goal. Poor children are not helpless children. The potential is there. Sometimes the opportunity is not." For free leaflets about helping children, write: Children, P.O. Box 8548, Silver Spring, MD 20907.

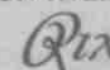

BAPTISMAL REGENERATION VERSUS BLOOD REGENERATION

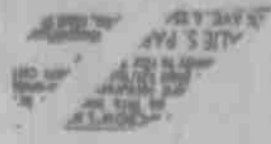

I recently read an article which referred to the man of Ethiopia and Philip in Acts 8:26-39 which said that the Ethiopian "was baptized for the forgiveness of sins". This is a false teaching by the Church of Christ denomination, Catholics and others who believe that the waters of baptism brings about the salvation and forgiveness of sin for a lost sinner. This is a false doctrine called "Baptismal Regeneration" or "Salvation by Baptism". The reason that these false religions of our day use sprinkling as a mode for baptizing infants is that they believe infants and everyone else must be baptized in order for them to have salvation. It is not the traditions of men who determines the salvation of the human race but it is the authority of the Word of God that will judge the whole world. Acts 5:29 tells us that "We ought to obey God rather than men." The forgiveness of sins or washing away sins by baptism is not found in Acts 8:26-39 or any other scriptures in the Word of God. On the contrary in Acts 8:35 it states that Philip "preached unto him Jesus" and after the man "believed with all his heart that Jesus Christ is the Son of God." Philip baptized him after the man "believed" and his sins had already been forgiven. The only way that the sins of a lost sinner can be forgiven or washed away, is by the precious "BLOOD" of Jesus Christ. Hebrews 9:22 says "without shedding of blood is no remission." The word "remission" in Greek means to receive a pardon; be delivered and have forgiveness of sins. Leviticus 17:11 says "It is the blood that maketh an atonement for the soul." The word "atonement" in Hebrew means: to cover; cancel; cleanse; forgive and pardon the sins of a lost soul. Jesus said himself in Matthew 26:28 "this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for the remission of sins." God's Word says in 1 John 1:7-10 that "the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin. If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us." The Bible says in Revelation 1:5 that Jesus Christ "washed us from our sins in his own blood." Colossians 1:13-14 says that the Father "hath delivered us from the power of darkness, and hath translated us into the kingdom of his dear Son: in whom we have redemption through his blood, even the forgiveness of sins." The word "redemption" in God's Word in Greek means: a ransom paid in full, salvation and deliverance from sin.

The Word of God says in Luke 3:3 that John the Baptist came "preaching the baptism of repentance for the remission of sins." The word "of" in the term "baptism of repentance" means in English: baptism as a result of salvation or because of salvation. The word "for" in the term "for the remission of sins" also means in English: baptism as a result of salvation or because of salvation, that a person has repented of their sins and have "brought forth therefore fruits worthy of repentance" as it says in Luke 3:8. The Greek meaning for the word "repentance" means that God changes a lost sinner's mind and direction toward God only for salvation and God turns us from our sins and God transforms us and makes us into a new creature in Christ. 2 Corinthians 5:17 says "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things have passed away; behold, all things are become new." In Acts 2:37-38 we have another passage of scripture which means the same as in Luke 3:3 which reads: "Now when they heard this, they were pricked in their heart, and said unto Peter and to the rest of the apostles, Men and brethren, what shall we do? Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." Please notice that Repentance comes always before Baptism. Also notice that the word "for" in verse 38 means that baptism was a result of salvation or because of salvation and were to be baptized because they had already received salvation. They were commanded to "repent" of sins or perish in hell as Jesus says in Luke 13:3-5. All must believe in the finished work of Christ on the cross at calvary, that Christ died for our sins, was buried and rose again the third day according to the scriptures and shed His blood for the remission or your sins. Acts 10:43 says "To him give all the prophets witness, that through his name whosoever believeth in him shall receive remission of sins." Acts 13:38-39 says "that through this man is preached unto you the forgiveness of sins: and by him all that believe are justified from all things, from which ye could not be justified by the law of Moses." The word "justified" in Greek means: to be made holy; just or innocent; free from sin and made righteous in God's sight. Acts 2:41 says "Then they that gladly received his word were baptized;" and in Acts 2:47 says "And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved." Those that "gladly receive" the Lord Jesus Christ as their personal Lord and Savior should then submit to baptism as a result of salvation and because of salvation by the GRACE of GOD only, through the "BLOOD" of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness and remission of all sins. Salvation by BLOOD REGENERATION.

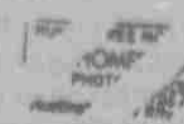
