The carnival was held at Lubbock General Hospital.

Bradley invited over thirty of his friends to his carnival. Selling tickets for twenty-five cents each, Bradley was able to raise over one hundred dollars and donated it to the South Plains Children's Shelter, a short term care facility for children in an emergency situation while arrangements for long term care are made.

The shelter serves children who are abused physically, mentally, or sexually. Licensed for a maximum of eight boys and girls, approximately one hundred children stay at the shelter in a year's time. In addition to the city and county of Lubbock, the shelter serves sixteen other counties. There is no discrimination of race, religion, sex, or disabilities.

Have we given-up or have we accepted it as a fact of life that the businesses of Lubbock can continue to neglect our community. Where is a full service gas station that will no minor repairs, lube and oil change? With fast food establishments in west Lubbock galore, we have only Church's Chicken. Cities with a total population of less than our east Lubbock population have at least one nice bar for Blacks. When is the last time a builder has built a group of homes in east Lubbock? As a matter of fact, when has anything been built in east Lubbock for the general public use? Do we have one Black owned business that has an annual gross income of \$50,000. To achieve that income, all it would take is for 2,500 of us to spend \$20.00 a year, in one Black owned business.

To this writer's way of thinking, the NAACP is letting us down. Doesn't

NAACP stand for National Association for the Advancement of Colored People? To me, that means more than coming forward only when a racial injustice has occurred. I say that encompasses social, economical and other areas where colored people are being placed at a disadvantage. Maybe if our local NAACP would spend more time working with the "system" of Lubbock to bring businesses and jobs into our community. They would not need to bring Dr. Hooks to town for publicity. Being we only here from you when you are seeking new members or hosting a fund raising function, why not start a bi-monthly or monthly NAACP Update column in the **Southwest Digest**. The NAACP should become more creative and find projects to help our community. Readers, do you agree that the problems started at the beginning of this article should be primary concerns of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People?

The American Legion, Masons, fraternities and other organizations, look at your charters, goals, and objectives. Are they in line with our needs of today? What are you doing for our community? Having an organization that meet and

collect dues is serving no purpose at all unless something worthwhile is returned to the community. If you are doing things that only a select group can

participate or only a certain group is aware of your activities, than you are still doing an injustice to our community. Our community needs everything, all it takes

is an open mind to find a worthwhile community project for your group to initiate.

To the leaders of organizations, if you can't

march or if you just simply refuse to march to the beat of today, I say pass your leadership to someone who can. You have had your turn, you may have been a "star" but give someone a chance. Also, if you do step down, don't take a negative attitude and bad-mouth the organization like some of us have in the past. Just because years ago something was tried and failed, that does not mean it will fail again. New Book Says Reagan Aides Made Regular Racial Slurs

Washington, D. C. - A book scheduled for publication in March asserts that "mid-level", right-wing staffers" in the Reagan administration regularly uttered racial slurs when discussing issues related to civil rights enforcement. According to the book by former Secretary of Education Terrel H. Bell, during the period just before the president was scheduled to sign a bill making Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday a national holiday, the slain civil rights leader was frequently referred to as "Martin Lucifer Coon." Bell was education secretary for four years and resigned in frustration after several disputes with conservatives in the Reagan administration. However, Bell said he never heard Reagan or top-level cabinet members utter racial slurs. But he would not give the names of those who did. Apparently, Blacks were not the only targets of slurs. The book says Arabs were frequently referred to as "sand Niggers" and the Title IX, which forbids discrimination against women, was called "the lesbian bill of rights."

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An Educator's Opinion

Bringing Realism to Reform

This weekend, in Minneapolis, an historic event is taking place. Educators from America's most innovative public schools are conducting the nation's first symposium of reformers actively engaged—at the local level—in changing how students learn.

The National Education Association is hosting this symposium, and I couldn't be more proud—or more encouraged. For the first time since education reform captured the national spotlight in 1983, educators who are actually implementing bold reforms are meeting in concert.

Over the past five years, since the landmark publication of *A Nation At Risk*, we've listened endlessly to lectures on education reform from national commissions, political leaders, and federal Cabinet-level appointees. These "experts" share one trait: detachment from the day-to-day realities of the learning site. I believe it's now time to listen to the people who know those realities as daily challenges, to listen to the educators and parents who are willing to risk putting ideas into action.

Listening to grassroots reformers is what this weekend's "Symposium on School-Based Reform" is all about. The participants aren't mired in abstractions. They're focused on the practical. In their home institutions, they're reconstructing curricula, radically altering how schools are organized, and making a clean break with the assumptions that have long determined the nature of the learning experience. In brief, they're redefining the educational status quo.

Each educator attending the Minneapolis symposium is active in one of these national networks of innovative schools.

The Coalition of Essential Schools, the first of these networks, involves some 45 schools across the United States. Launched in 1984, the coalition is the brainchild of Brown University's TheodoreSizer, author of the widely acclaimed book, *Horace's Compromise: The Dilemma of the American High School*.

In *Horace's Compromise*, Sizer argues that teachers are squeezed by too little time, too many students, and far too many rigid bureaucratic constraints. Sizer's coalition aims to create learning environments free from the tra-

ditional school structures that impose tight reins on teacher autonomy—and stifle the creativity that makes for effective teaching.

The second of the networks at this weekend's symposium is the National Network for Educational Renewal, launched in 1986 by the University of Washington's John Goodlad. This effort now links 17 universities and 115 school districts in 14 different states. The consortium's goal? To explore alternatives to the way schools are structured and the way teachers are prepared for professional practice.

Goodlad, author of the classic *A Place Called School: Prospects for the Future*, insists that school-site renewal, not change mandated from above, is the key to successful reform in education.

The last of these national networks of innovative schools is NEA's Mastery in Learning Project, now in its third year. The project, directed by Dr. Robert McClure, involves 27 elementary, middle, junior, and senior high schools—and 20,280 students, 1,198 teachers, 454 support staff, and 64 administrators.

The NEA project aims to use research-based findings as a foundation on which local faculties can rely as they develop new school policies that will facilitate efforts to help students truly master what is taught.

What unites these networks is a shared conviction that the locus of effective reform must be the local school. Each network emphasizes that the individuals closest to students—teachers, administrators, parents—are best positioned to serve as the architects of education reform.

These networks have worked long and hard to ensure that school reform measures respect local community values and are responsive to community needs. This weekend, the members of these networks will share their insights and critique each others' efforts.

The give-and-take among these architects of practical reform is the heart of our Minneapolis symposium. In the weeks to come, I plan to share with you the lessons these educators and parents have to offer, lessons that could well give new direction, a more democratic character, and long overdue realism to education reform in America.

A late rain shower did dampen the spirits of those who came back at his Homecoming fete at Lowrey Field.

Borger was able to break a 14-14 tie early in the fourth quarter to be able to defeat the Matadors. This win ended a three year drought

against the Mats, who has been giving them a very hard time.

The Bulldogs appear to be in a good position in district play as they improved their record to 7-2 overall, and 6-1 in league play. On the other hand, the Matadors slipped to 6-3 overall and 5-2 in district play.

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THE SIN OF PART-MUTUEL WAGERING

Every Christian should be able to visualize the place where their soul was brought from which is the pit of HELL and we should be able to visualize the crucifixion of Christ. Do you see the angry priests, the weeping woman, and the apostle John? Can you distinguish the sneering thief from the repentant thief? Do you see the nails, the blood and the roughness of those stakes that nailed him to the cross? Please read again Matthew 27:26-50 of the account of the crucifixion. Meditate over it and weep over it!

If your visualization is accurate you will see several soldiers near the foot of the Cross. Perhaps they are on their knees as though in prayer. But look closely. They are not praying! Those thieving and murdering mercenaries are casting lots; wagering and gambling over which of their bloody hands will be privileged to carry the seamless robe of Jesus away that night. See Matthew 27:35.

Those gamblers are the epitome of evil, while on the Cross the incarnation of righteousness. Can you imagine those two reversed? Can you picture Jesus on His knees gambling over the property of another that He Himself has died for to save and forgive their sin?

My friend, gambling is contrary to the principles of Christ and The Word Of God the Bible. It does not belong in the heart of any Godly Christian.

THE HISTORY OF GAMBLING

Wagering is almost as old as the hills. For many hundreds of years before the first coin was minted, men found other things to gamble with. Archeologists have found painted pebbles resembling dice which go back to the days of the Stone Age. Anthropologists tell us that gambling has its roots in the worship of primitive gods. In fact the Hindus until recently worshipped Krishna by gambling and often looting all that they possessed. This tie with idolatry ought to be enough to keep God's people away from the evil vice of gambling.

With the advancement of knowledge and technology, gambling has advanced as well. Not so often do we hear about betting on which oyster will open first or on what day the first freeze will come or the first snow will fall. Now we enlightened people bet on football games and dog races. For many years horse racing was called the sport of kings while dice and cards belonged to the serfs and beggars, but today all of us have access to whatever gambling we want, from the back alley "crap" game and the sleazy bookie joint, to the plush casinos of Reno; Las Vegas; Atlantic City and Monte Carlo. Not only do we have access but multitudes go. Public opinion polls reveal that two-thirds of all adults bet at least once a year and 80% see nothing wrong with it.

Dr. Igor Kusyszyr of York University has said, "We are pluck in the middle of a pleasure explosion. People are searching for kicks and a good time. They want to experience new and pleasurable sensations... Gambling will pleasantly take people out of reality, suspend them at a comfortable level of arousal and allow them to test their power of decision-making. Gambling also allows the individual to be a leading actor—a hero in a dream of their own making." Perhaps Dr. Kusyszyr has pinpointed the reason for our rapid descent into gambling dens.

THE WASTE OF GAMBLING

A 1962 Atlantic Monthly article said, "Gamblers look upon it simply as taking a chance." But they are taking a chance which our State and it's economy cannot afford. They are pouring dimes and dollars day by day into a vast stream of cash which most illegal underworld activities. Here in the good old U.S.A.? Yes, sir! even in Texas.

Some argue that legalized gambling ends the illegal gambling. Actually, studies in the United States indicate that states where gambling is legal also have the highest amount of illegal gambling. The U.S. Justice Department's Organized Crime Section says, "Legal gambling creates a whole new (gambling) market, but the effect on illegal is negligible." Illegal bookmakers are still popular, because they offer better odds than state-run operations, and the winners are completely tax-free.

THE POPULARITY OF GAMBLING

Gambling has never been so popular! Never has such a large percentage of our population been so addicted to it. Never have governments been so pleased that their children are so mesmerized.

The Greeks claimed that gambling was detrimental to the state; today we use it to support the state. The Egyptians used to call it effeminate, because it turned working men into lazy louts; today the welfare leech often cashes his check at the race track. Tertullian denied that dice players could be Christians; today churches head the betting parade and make fortunes off the weaknesses of betting fools. England

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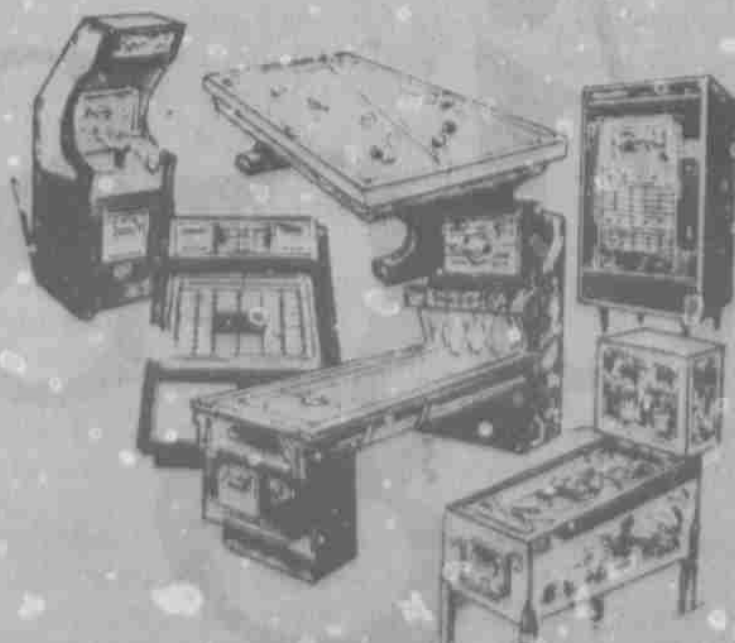

once outlawed gambling entirely because wise officials could see what a terrible effect it was having on the people. Today England is one of the worst countries in the world for gambling debts.

One has said, "Swindling; forgery; theft—every crime that extreme necessity and outright desperation can suggest to a person who has lost all the moral ties—follows in the train of gambling."

John Cotton said that gambling was "a witching disease that makes some scratch their heads, while others, as if bitten by a tarantula, are laughing themselves to death."

U.S. President George Washington said of gambling, "This is a vice which is productive of every possible evil, equally injurious to the morals and health of its votaries. It is the child of avarice, the brother of iniquity, and the father of mischief. It has been the ruin of many worthy families, the loss of many a man's honour, and the cause of suicide. To all those who enter the lists, it's usually fascinating. The successful gambler pushes his good fortune, till it is overtaken by a reverse. The losing gambler, in hopes of retrieving past misfortunes, goes on from bad to worse, till grown desperate, he pushes at everything and loses his all. In a word, few gain by this abominable practice, while thousands are injured."

A former Supreme Court Justice accurately noted that "gambling" is a general evil. It leads to vicious inclinations, the destruction of morals, abandonment of industry and honest employment, and a loss of self-control and respect...."

YOU CAN'T WIN AT GAMBLING

Despite all the warnings of wise and good men, billions of dollars are wagered annually. How much of all this wealth is returned to the average foolish bettor through winnings? Ask Earnest Blanche, author of "You Can't Win". Mr. Blanche studied 256 horse races. If he had bet on the favorite horse in every race to win, he would have lost his shirt. If he bet the favorite to show, he would have lost even more, and if his money went to the favorite simply to place, he still would have lost money.

The Irish Sweepstakes is perhaps the best known lottery. Did you know that only 40% of the proceeds go towards prizes, and that the chance of winning is 1/305,000? The reason why we see more and more of these lotteries is because there is no way that the sponsor can lose. The largest Canadian lotteries turn over a meager profit of 20% only because millions of dollars are spent on advertising each year. Even lowly bingos make a 50% profit for the accursed organizations which sponsor them.

Christian, if you know of someone who has broken even over a long period of time with lottery tickets, raffles, horses, football pools, or any other kind of gambling, you have found a rare individual. If for no other reason but the soundness of Christian stewardship, no saint of God ought to gamble.

THE DANGER OF GAMBLING

Earlier this year one prominent church leader spoke in general terms on the evils of gambling and then tried desperately (hypocritically) to defend his church's long time association with bingos. He said that there is a sharp distinction between gambling as a relatively harmless diversion and gambling with the specific aim of "making money fast through chance...."

I fail to see his point. 95% of bingo players play for the money they can win, and more. Someone should ask this gentleman if he also advocates an occasional visit to the pornography shop for recreational purposes. Why not shoot a little "speed" or give your two year old son or daughter a shot of bourbon every other day? Just as it's a fact that the disco leads many into immorality, it's a fact that gambling on a small scale leads many to gambling on a big scale. Ask the local members of Gamblers Anonymous—it's a sin and habit which always begins small. Every saint should oppose the desires of professional gamblers to expose the young to the "pleasures" of gambling, and while they're at it they should fight off-track betting for the same reason.

CHRISTIAN, DON'T GAMBLE!

Why shouldn't the Christian gamble? Because it has the same relationship to theft that dueling has to murder. It used to be legal for two fools to kill each other with pistols or swords, yet at the same time it was murder for one man to do it to an unarmed opponent. Gambling is a legal theft. When will wise governments see that, like dueling, gambling is detrimental to society?

It is morally wrong because it is an attempt to get something for nearly nothing. It leads men to get that for which they did not work. It destroys initiative and creates laziness. It is completely contrary to God's Word the Bible.

And when will someone see that government sponsored gambling, lotteries and horse races, are really a regressive tax on people who, many times, can't afford to pay any more? Many of the poorest citizens spend hundreds of dollars gambling that ends up with the government, yet if these poor people were taxed directly there would be a cry for revolution. Why can't people see that this is nothing but a tax on idocy and foolishness? It's the opposite of income tax, it's an out-go tax.

There is only one good way to open a lottery pouch, and that's with dynamite. There is only one good throw of the dice, and that's to throw them away. There's only one way to cut a deck of cards, and it's with a pair of scissors.

The Christian gamblers are financing sinners, hurting their families, perhaps destroying their marriages, ruining their testimony and shaming their Saviour. They are displaying to the world that their hearts are in earthly rather than in heavenly treasures. They are not permitting the Lord to have His way with their lives and future, but in a round about way they are asking the Devil to be their guide and benefactor.

I have never yet met a Christian gambler who also was consistent in their tithing to God. Gambling and the withholding of God's tithe are cousins in the theft family. God's Word says in the book of Malachi chapter 3 and verses 8 and 9 "Will a man rob God? Yet ye have robbed me. But ye say, where in have we robbed thee? In tithes and offerings. Ye are cursed with a curse: for ye have robbed me, even this whole nation."

Whether it is matching for a coke or the coffee, a football pool, a dice game, a lottery ticket, a pool game or the casinos, it all has the same principle and leads to the same end.

CONCLUSION

Reader, if you are not saved from your sin and addiction to gambling or anything else, let me point you to the ANSWER. Jesus Christ died on the Cross at Calvary to redeem you from the bondage of sin in every form. He is the Saviour and only one who can deliver you from your lusts and even yourself. If you will just repent and turn from your sins and turn to Him only for salvation and forgiveness from your sin. If the Lord has convicted your heart about these things, then admit your helplessness and sinfulness, and turning from them, putting your faith in the sacrifice of Christ. Jesus says, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, he that heareth my word, and believeth on Him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life." (John 5:24). God's Word also says in Romans 10:9 "That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved." And in verse 13 of this same chapter "For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved." Jesus also said "I tell you, Nay; but, except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." (Luke 13:3 and 5). Romans 6:23 says "For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." I urge you to confess your sin and turn to HIM.
