

-On The Two Hundred Years Of The United States Constitution: 1787 to

1987 - Part 8

On this two hundreth year anniversary of the signing of the U. S. Constitution, some interesting things are happening. For example, Justice Thurgood Marshall's speech at the San Francisco Patent And Trademark Law Association in Maui, Hawaii, on May 6, 1987, stirred some controversy from some right flag wavers and praise from the more liberal elements.

We will run excerpts of this speech and a series of articles on the Constitution and Bill of Rights and other information of Justice Marshall, the Black justice on the U.S. Supreme Court bench, since this is his 20th anniversary and the 200th anniversary of the U.S. Constitution.

With the resignation of Justice Lewis F. Powell, Jr., and the nomination of Judge Robert Bork, who is being opposed by many minority groups, this anniverary year should be very interesting to watch and see how the highest court will shape up. Follow our series for interesting information.

As we started in past articles during this 200th year Constitution Anniversary, we gave you information on our Black Justice Thurgood Marshall, the Bill of Rights --- now the Constitution of the United States of America. Starting with the Declaration of Independence.

The Declaration of Independence

For cutting off our Trade with all Parts of the World:

For imposing Taxes on us without our Consent:

For depriving us, in many Cases, of the Benefits of Trial by Jury: For transporting us beyond Soas to be tried for pretended Offences.

For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighbouring Province, establishing therein an arbitrary Governments, and enlarging its Boundaries, so as to render it at once an Example and fit Instrument for introducing the same obsolute Rule into these Colonies: For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws, and altering

fundamentally the Forms of our Governments: For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with Power to legislate for us in all Cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging

He has plundered our Seas, ravaged our Coasts, burnt our Towns, and destroyed the

Lives of our People

He is, at this Time, transporting large Armies of foreign Mecenaries to compleat the Works of Death, Desolution, and Tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty and Perfidy, scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous Ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a

He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the Executioners of their Friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands.

He has excited domestic Insurrections amongst us, and has endeavoured to bring on the Inhabitants of our Frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages, whose known Rule of Warfare, is an undistinguished Destruction, of all Ages, Sexes and Conditions.

In every stage of these Oppressions we have Petitioned for Redress in the mast humble Ter:ns: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated Injury. A Prince, whose Character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the Ruler of

Nor have we been wanting in Attentions to our British Brethren. We have warned them from Time to Time of Attempts by their Legislature to extend an unwarrantable Jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the Circumstances of our Emigration and Settlement here. We have appealed to their native Justice and Magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the Ties of our common Kindred to disavow these Usurpations, which, would inevitably interrupt our Connections and Correspondence. They too have been deaf to the Voice of Justice and of Consanguinity. We must therefore, acquiesce in the Necessity.





Black Coaches in the NFL: When?

It never ceases to amaze me why there are not more black assistant coaches as well as black head coat, es in professional sports, particularly football. In professional sports such as basketball and football the black athlete has become the forminant figure, "the superstar."



reports that 57 percent of NFL players are black. But there are no black head coaches. Black assistants average 1.4 a team on staffs that usually carry 9-12 assistants. As low as the figures appear it still presents an increase in the number of black assistants in the NFL. In 1980 there were 14 black assistants in the NFL, today there are 38. Of those 38 black assistants 6. - / one, Tony Dungy of Pittsburgh, is a coordinator, just below head couch. Usually the next step for a successful offensive or defensive coordiffusor is the hard coaching position. It's sad to know that in a sporting environment where blacks are so dominant that there is only one black assistant qualified enough to occome a brad coach. Although no black managers remain, Major League P yebali has had three black ma. agers, Frank Robinson (Cleveland, 1975-77, San Francisco, 1981-83); Larry Doby (Chicago White Sox, 1976) and Manry Wills (Scuttle, 1980-81). so I took it. As it turned out I quickly realized that coaching was not for me. It wasn't the hours, salary or work that turned me off, but the limited room for advancement. When I sat in Coach Landry's staff meetings and I looked around the room and saw one coach sitting next to me with 25 years' coaching experience, another 15 years, another with well over 20 years experience, those observations led me to believe that this may not be the right job for me. I could not see myself being an assistant coach for the next 15-20 years. The only way that I wanted to be an assistant coach is if I knew that it would eventually lend to a head coaching job in the NFL. I observed no guarante of that even happening. So I retired from coaching after one year so that I could direct my energies into something positive that would one day lead me to the top of a particular profession.

So what does the future hold for black head coaches in the NFL? How much longer will it take to hire a black head coach? Bill Walsh, president/head coach of the San Francisco 49er's, who has a league high four black assistants, seen progress toward hiring a black bead coach: "It will happen, I believe, in this decade." Tony Dungy is not so optimistic. "If I had to guess. I'd probably say between 1992 and 2000," Dungy said. "I don't see it harpening before then."

I, myself, don't see any trends happening right now which would lead me to believe that the NFL will have its first black head couch by 1990. The black athlete will continue to dominate professional football, but black administrators and concluswill continue to lag behind. NFL Commissioner Lete Rozelle and other NFL exautives are not color blind. Unfortunately, the only color they see is green. Money





Any Word From The Lord?

Over two thousand and six hundred years ago, there lived a king by the name of Zedekiah. This king was known to be indecisive and torn apart by conflicting emotions, in regard to the prophet Jeremiah and his inability to act in good faith on his word with Jeremiah. Ezekiel described this king as the "profane wicked prince of Israel" and "whose day si come when iniquity shall have an end" (Ezek. 21:25). Because this puppet ruler (who was placed on the throne by Nebuchadnezzar) could not act in faith on-the word of God through the prophet Jeremiah, he brought misery to himself, death to his family members, and Jerusalem was destroyed

When we read the life of Zedekiah in the narratives of Jeremiah 37-39 and 52, we can easily see that Judah's days were numbered. BAPTISMAL REGENERATION VERSUS BLOOD REGENERATION

I recently read an article which referred to the man of Ethlopia and Philip in Acts 8:26-39 which said that the Ethlopian "yes baptized for the forgiveness of sins". This is a false teaching by the Church of Christ denomination, Catholics and others who believe that the waters of baptism brings about the salvation and forgiveness of sin for a lost sinner. This is a false Joctrine called "Baptismal Regeneration" or "Salvation by Baptism". The reason that these false religions of our day use sprinkling as a mode for baptizing infants is that they believe infants and everyone else must be baptized in order for them to have salvation. It is not the traditions of men who determines the salvation of the human race but it is the authority of the Word of God that will judge the whole world. Acts 5:29 tells us that "We ought to obey God rather than men." The forgiveness of sins or washing away sins by baptism is not found in Acts 8:20-39 or any other scriptures in the Word of God. On the contrary in Acts 8:35 it states that Philip "preached unto him Jesus" and atter the man "believed with all his heart that Jesus Christ is the Son of God." Philip baptized him after the man "believed" and his sins had already been forgiven.

The only way that the sins of a lost sinner can be forgiven or washed away, is by the precious "BLOOD" of Jesus Christ. Hebrews 9:22 says "without shedding of blood is no remission." The word "remission" in Greek means to receive a pardon; be delivered and have forgiveness of sins. Leviticus 17:11 says "it is the blood that maketh an atonement for the soul." The word "atonement" in Hebrew means: to cover; cancel; cleanse; forgive and pardon the sins of a lost soul. Jesus said himself in Matthew 26:28 "this Is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for the remission of sins." God's Word says in 1 John 1:7-10 that "the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin. If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we contess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If 'e say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us." The Bible says in Revelation 1:5 that Jesus Christ "washed us from our sins in his own blood," Collossians 1:13-14 says that the Father "hath delivered us from the power of darkness, and hath translated us into the kingdom of his dear Son: In whom we have redemption through his blood, even the torgiveness of sins:" The word "redemption" in God's Word in Greek means: a ransom paid in full, salvation and deliverance from sin.

The Word of God says in Luke 3:3 that John the Baptist cam "preaching the baptism of repentance for the remission of sins:" The word "of" in the term "baptism of repentance" means in English: baptism as a result of salvation or because of salvation. The word "for" in the term "for the remission of sins" also means in English: baptism as a result of salvation or because of salvation, that a person has repented of their sine and have "brought forth therefore fruits worthy of repentance" as it says in Luke 3:8. The Greek meaning for the word "repentance" means that God changes a lost ainner's mind and direction toward God only for selvation and God turns us from our sins and God transforms us and makes us into a new creature in Christ. 2 Corinthians 5:17 says "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things have passed away: behold, all things are become new." In Acts 2:37-38 we have another passage of scripture which means the same as in Luke 3:3 which reads: "Now when they heard this, they were pricked in their heart, and said unto Peter and to the rest of the aposties, Men and brethren, what shall we do? Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." Please notice that Repentance comes always before deptism. Also notice that the word "for" in verse 38 means that heptism was a result of salvation or because of salvation and were to be baptized because they had already received salvation. They were commanded to "repent" of sins or perish in hell as Jesus says in tuke 13:3-5. All must believe In the flalshed work of Christ on the cross at calvery, that Christ died for our sins, was buried and rose again the third day according to the scriptures and shed His blood for the remission or your sins. Acis 10:43 says "To him give all the prophets witness, that through his name whosoever believeth. In him shall receive remission of sins." Acts 13:38-39 says "that through this man is preached unto you the forgiveness of sires And by him oil that believe are justified from all things, from which ye could not be juliffled by the law of Mosas." The word "justifled" in Greek means: to be made hely: just or innocent; free from sin and made righteous in God's sight. Acts 2:41 says "Then they that glodly received his word were baptized:" and in Acts 2:47 says "And the Lord added to the church delly such as aboutd be saved." Those that "gladly receive" the Lord Jesus Christ es their persone; Lord and Savier should then submit to baptism as a result or salvation and because of salvation by the GRACE of GOD on /, through the "BLO"D" of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness and remission of mil sins. 





MIXED SALAD

- I bunch watercress
- I head Boston lettuce I red, ripe tomato, cored
- and cut into eighths 6 radishes, trimmed and
- 2 taolespoons tarragon vinegar
- thin!y sliced

I clove garlic, peeled and finely minced

I tablespoon imported prepared mustard such as Dijon or Düsseldorf 6 tablespoons olive oil Salt and pepper

Trim off the tough stems of the watercress. Core the lettuce and separate the leaves. Rinse the greens and shake off any excess moisture. Put the greens in a salad bowl and add the tomato and radishes. Blend the vinegar, garlic and mustard in a small mixing bowl. Stir with a whisk, gradually adding the oil. Add salt and pepper to taste. Toss the salad vegetables with the dressing just before serving. 4 servings.

GRILLED SALMON WITH SALSA

About 4 Servings: Preparation time: About 15 minutes Grilling time: About 10 minutes

Juice of 1 lime

I cup Salsa (recipe follows)

4 salmon, haddock, or cod (about 4 ounces) steaks

In small bowl, stir lime juice into salsa, set aside. Prepare grill for cooking or preheat broiler, greasing grill or broiler rack thoroughly. Grill fish over medium-hot charcoal or broil 5 inches from heat source, 10 minutes. Brush salsa over top. Cook 5 to 7 minutes longer or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork; do not overcook. Serve with remaining salsa and lime wedges.

Let stand about 3 minutes. Slice potato lengthwise through the center but not through the skin at bottom. With fork, fluff up potato with 1/2 tablespoon butter in each half, reaching down to bottom to include all pulp. Sprinkle with crumbled bacon,


