## Justice Bork? We Can Do Better

Judge Robert H. Bork embraces—candidly and without qualification—the judicial doctrine of "original intent," the thesis that a judge's duty is to determine the original meaning of words penned in the Constitution 200 years ago.

In a professional—and personal—sense, I find Judge Bork's original intent doctrine, as well as the definition of the appropriate role of the Supreme Court that it implies, deeply troubling.

Had I lived when the Framers wrote the words "We, the People," I would not have been part of the We. Nor would most of you. The prevailing definition of "people" would have excluded most of us—would have excluded us because we were black, brown, yellow, or red, because we were female, because we were poor. Had liberty in America remained limited to the expressed views of the Founders, the majority of Americans would today still be deprived of basic constitutional rights and constitutional protections.

Had America held tight to the doctrine of original intent, I would today not be a teacher. Nor would most of my colleagues. I would not be a citizen. Nor would most of you. And many of us would be chattel—items at public auctions. America would be a land of a propertyless majority ruled by an elite consisting of white, propertied, affluent males. The democracy you and I cherish would be defective to the core.

Fortunately, at critical junctures in our history, the Supreme Court has rejected original intent and chosen instead to bring to life the implicit ideals that constitute the heart of the Constitution. Particularly during the last 35 years, the High Court has extended the blessings of liberty to ever-growing numbers of citizens—and moved America ever closer to fulfillment of her destiny as the world's citadel of freedom.

Judge Bork, meanwhile, holds fast to original intent. The Senate committee considering Judge Bork's nomination has offered him ample opportunity to disown this disquieting doctrine. Judge Bork has refused each offer.

This steadfast passion explains Judge Bork's repeated assaults on First Amendment free speech provisions, on key provisions of the

1964 Civil Rights Act, on laws prohibiting race and sex discrimination, on the rights of public employees, the rights of the handicapped, on every citizen's right to privacy, even on the decision (*Bolling v. Sharpe*, 1954) that mandated the integration of schools in our nation's capital. For Judge Bork, the doctrine of original intent seems to hold sway over the doctrine of inalienable rights.

Does it follow that Judge Bork would undo the progress toward justice for all that the Court in its finest hours has wrought? Would Judge Bork return us to the judicial America of the 18th century? Of course not. But these are not the decisive questions. More to the point is the question—Would Judge Bork continue America's steady march toward full rights for all Americans?

Judge Bork himself has answered that question. His answer is no.

Judge Bork is philosophically erudite. But can America afford to place on the Supreme Court a man whose erudition carries the threat of judicial stagnation? Do we not need a Supreme Court Justice who sees in the Constitution an unequivocal mandate to ensure that the right to due process under the law is denied to no citizen? Do we not need a Supreme Court Justice committed to a principle nowhere explicitly articulated in the Constitution—the principle that the rights of every American, regardless of race or gender or ethnicity, are sacred?

Such principles—principles now woven into the fabric of American life only because of the Supreme Court's rejection of the original intent doctrine—have elevated and ennobled the nation. But is there one among us who would deny that America needs more elevation still, that we can reach still higher heights?

Would Judge Bork serve to accelerate that upward movement? On that question, the Judge's record and philosophy leave grave doubts.

With America facing a new age of new challenge, with America's destiny still in the making, we, the people, deserve a Supreme Court nominee who will inspire hope rather than foster doubt.

Judge Robert Bork is not that person.

For Black people, there is no grey area for right and wrong. If we want positive things in our life, if we want our community to be a place we all can be proud of, then the majority of us must do the right things. One negative destroys years of positives. We can no longer sit back and allow the same sit back and allow the same handful to be the community correctors. They need help from the tiny tots, the teenagers, the young adults, the middle ages and the senior citizens. Our community needs to start a "home training" program that will instill right and wrong. On our jobs, in our schools, in our daily association with others, we need to stop negative actions and comments about our community. We need to become more

### TITHING—THE GRACE OF GIVING

#### I. GOD'S PLAN FOR GIVING.

##### A. God's Plan Before The Law.

1. Abraham tithed. Gen. 14:18-20; Heb. 7:1-10
2. Jacob vowed to tithe. Gen. 28:22
3. Abraham was very likely not the first tither.
4. Abraham's tithing was over 400 years before the Law. Gal. 3:16,17

##### B. God's Plan Under The Law.

1. The tithe is the Lord's. Lev. 27:30
2. The tithe is holy unto the Lord. Lev. 27:30
3. The tithe must be given honestly. Lev. 27:31-33
4. The tithe is commanded by God. Lev. 27:34
5. The tithe commanded in the last O.T. book. Mal. 3:10

##### C. God's Plan Under Grace.

1. Jesus endorsed the tithe. Matt. 23:23
2. Jesus doubtless tithed. If He had not done so, the Pharisees would have no doubt criticized Him for not doing so.
3. The New Testament nowhere disannuls the tithe.
4. The tithe is proportional giving. Proportional giving is taught in I Cor. 16:2 and II Cor. 8:12-14.

#### II. GOD'S PLACE FOR GIVING.

##### A. Under The Law God Chose The Place —The Storehouse.

1. Tithes, offerings and sacrifices to be brought to the place of God's choice. Deut. 12:5,6,8,13
2. This pattern continued through the O.T. Mal. 3:10. The storehouse was the Tabernacle and then later on it was the Temple. That was God's choice.

##### B. Under Grace God Chose The Place —The Storehouse.

1. In the N.T. the offerings were brought to the Church. Acts 4:34,37
2. The Church is the storehouse. I Cor. 16:2. Compare I Cor. 1:2 and note that he was writing to the Church.
3. This order was given to Churches. I Cor. 16:1
4. Paul's appeals for offerings were addressed to Churches and not to individuals. II Cor. 8:1-7; 9:1-7. Compare with II Cor. 1:1. Individuals would give, but it was through their Church that they gave.
5. Paul commended the Philippian Church for their giving to missions. Phil. 4:10-17
6. Every Christian should be a member of a Scriptural N.T. Church and do their giving through it.
  - a. No Christian should give to an unscriptural cause, but through a Scriptural Church.

b. Many false causes and man made religious parasites would be eliminated if this plan was practiced.

#### III. GOD'S PROMISE FOR GIVING ACCORDING TO HIS PLAN.

##### A. God Will Bless Obedience.

1. Bountiful sowers will be bountiful reapers. II Cor. 9:6-7
2. He will pour out blessings and protect property. Mal. 3:10,11
3. Prosperity as God blesses. Prov. 3:9,10; 11:25
4. God's good measure given. Luke 6:38
5. Treasure in heaven. Matt. 6:19-21

##### B. God Will Chasten For Disobedience.

1. There will be less to reap. II Cor. 9:6. If you sow sparingly, you will reap sparingly.
2. It will tend to poverty. Pro. 11:24
3. It will hinder service to God. I Tim. 2:9,10
4. It will bring a curse. Mal. 3:9

Scriptural giving is one of the fundamentals of the Faith. II Cor. 8:7. "Therefore, as ye abound in everything, in faith, and utterance, and knowledge, and in all diligence, and in your love to us, see that ye abound in this grace also."

We are commanded to bring our gifts into the storehouse (common treasury of the church) upon the first day of the week.

I Cor. 16:2. "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him, that there be no gatherings when I come."

Under grace we give, and do not pay, the tithe— "Abraham GAVE a tenth part of all"—"Abraham GAVE the tenth of the spoils."—Heb. 7:2,4—and this was four hundred years before the law, and is confirmed in the New Testament; Jesus said concerning the tithe, "These ye ought to have done" Matt. 23:23.

We are commanded to bring the tithe into the common treasury of the church.

Lev. 27:30. "The tithe is the Lord's." Mal. 3:10. "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

In the New Testament it was the common treasury of the church.

Acts 4:34,35,37. "And brought the prices of the things that were sold, and laid them down at the apostles' feet... Having laid, sold it, and brought the money, and laid it at the apostles' feet."
