Ribbon Cutting Held At Lake Six

Lubbock City Council members, city staff and the public joined together Tuesday afternoon to celebrate the completion of Canyon Lake Road No. 6.

In a ribbon cutting ceremony at the low water crossing just below the dam, city leaders officially opened the road.

Funded by a Community

Development Block Grant (CDBG), the road was built in sections as funding became available. The project began in 1977 and was completed last month; at a total contract cost of \$773,937.

Completion of the low water crossing opens the road so that traffic can encircle the lake. The road winds around, following the contours of the lake. The south side is lined with large trees that create an attractive roadway. Combined with the water and topography of the area, it is one of the more picturesque sections of the road in the city.

Lake Road No. 6 is just part of the effort the city has put forth to improve the lake and surrounding area. CD Block Grant funds and money from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department have also been spent to include construction of sanitary facilities, land acquisition, landscaping, construction of picnic units and the pavilion as well as paying for the recirculating pump system for the waterfall at the entrance to the lake.

The Compromise That Saved the Constitution

Looking back 200 years it is all too easy to see the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia as one of calm reflection and wisdom as our Founding Fathers wrote the document that created the American republic. The men who met there are justly honored for their achievement. But what they accomplished only came after weeks of angry, passionate debate.

The most divisive argument among the delegates at the Constitutional Convention 200 years ago was the question of proportional representation in congress. Delegates from the large states, led by James Madison of Virginia, were determined that population should dictate how many members each state could elect to the new congress. The small states were just as determined that each state should have an equal voice in congress. Both sides feared domination.

Large states, such as Virginia and Pennsylvania, were supported by the Southern delegates. Although South Carolina and Georgia had small populations, they expected dramatic growth as settlers moved into their vast western territories.

The argument nearly ended the effort at a national constitution. The large states threatened to form their own, separate union. A delegate from a small state countered with an ominous statement: "Sooner than be ruined, there are foreign powers who will take us by the hand."

Madison and the big state coalition won proportional representation for what became the House of Representatives. Dominant in the convention, they also won preliminary votes on the question of the Senate. The day for the key vote arrived, however, and several Madison supporters were absent.

The roll was taken and the vote tied with only one delegate remaining to vote. Abraham Baldwin of Georgia would decide the issue. In the past, he had supported Madison but he realized that a stubborn insistence on his own preference would bring disaster. Small state delegates were prepared to walk out. One more "victory" for his side would end the convention and any hope for a constitution.

Standing up to immense pressure, Baldwin voted with the small states and the convention was saved. Threats and demands from both sides were put aside. A compromise resulted whereby each state, regardless of size, would have two seats in the Senate.

There were many heroes in Philadelphia 200 years ago. But for that one critical moment, none was more important than Abraham Baldwin, a man with the vision to see the importance of compromise to America.

Ridding Texas Streets of Crime Requires the Adoption of New Ideas

The problems with our Texas prison system are well documented. Few are the days when local newspapers or television and radio stations do not carry stories highlighting overcrowded conditions in the prison system, inmate violence...the list is lengthy.

Those who care to dig a little deeper and delve into the realm of statistics can find plenty of discouraging information to document the gravity of the problem.

For example, 90 percent of the inmates in Texas prisons never completed high school. Scarier still, only 27 percent of the inmates completed the sixth grade.

Even more frightening is the rate of recidivism. Fifty percent of those released from prison will eventually be rearrested unless there is something more promising to them other than a life of crime. Texas now finds itself hard-pressed to house new felons, let alone repeat felons.

One could easily argue that Texans equipped with a high school education and specific job skills would choose a life of productivity over a life of crime.

When it comes to dealing with crime, we are faced with a simple choice: We can either continue to build costly prisons to house criminals, or we can develop better academic and job training programs to make the choice between crime and gainful employment an easy one.

Currently we are marshaling the forces of many state agencies to concentrate on the latter goal. A program, to be coordinated by the Texas Department of Community Affairs, will officially begin on a pilot basis statewide starting Oct. 1. It will be called "Project RIO"—Re-Integration for Offenders.

Initially we will identify about 1,600 non-violent Texas Department of Corrections inmates ultimately destined for release or parole. The goal is to involve them in pre-release and post-release educational and job training programs.

Each of the inmates involved in the

program will be screened and evaluated to determine their specific educational or job skill needs.

That screening will include a review to determine what jobs are in demand in the community where the inmate will be returned once he is cleared for release. A copy of the report will be sent to the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles to aid in its parole review.

It must be stressed that participation in the project will not speed the release of the inmate from prison. Participation in the project will, however, do a better job of preparing inmates for life outside the prison.

Federal funds will be used to purchase added computers for the prison system's school district so that a self-paced educational program can be established to aid in the learning process.

Once released from prison, the inmates will return to their communities to find many of those same educational and job training programs in place. Those programs will be administered on a local level by units of government funded primarily with federal Job Training Partnership Act money.

Each released inmate will be given a voucher worth about \$1,200 to pay for those services. That voucher will have no cash value, but will help pay for some needed support services, including transportation to and from the local education or job skills program.

Once the job training is completed, or a high school equivalency degree is earned, the Texas Employment Commission or local agencies will help find jobs or offer job locating classes for the ex-offender.

Most of the program—at the state and local level—will be funded with federal money.

The program will be evaluated late next year to determine its effectiveness.

I'm confident the money spent on the project today will have significant benefits for tomorrow—including safer streets.

Panthers Lose Another District Tilt

Hereford, Tx. -- After being riddled with touchdowns by the Estacado Matadors the previous week, the Hereford Whitefaces took off where it all ended. The kids from Hereford evidently picked up where it all stopped and defeated the Dunbar Panthers handily by a score of 25-13.

At least the Panthers scored first in the second quarter of the game last Friday night -- but proved that the beginning doesn't mean a thing, it's the end that counts. That wasn't enough as the District 1-4A matchup gave Hereford its first win of the season.

After this contest, both teams brought their records to 1-4 overall, but the win gave Hereford a 1-2 record in district play, and the Panthers dropped to 0-3 in district.

The Panthers were only able to muster 125 total yards, compared to Hereford's 342 total yards. With this bottom line, Dunbar had only 6 first downs, while the Whitefaces traveled for 22 first downs.

The Panther's Craig Ross got things started with a 12-yard run when he scored in the second quarter. James Palmer kicked the extra point. But this was not the end of the scoring as the boys from Hereford came back with two scores and led at half-time, 13-7. A run by Marcus Brown, who had 109 yards for Hereford on 22 carries, and a pass from Jason Scott to Rodney

McCracken, gave Hereford the lead for good.

In the second half, the Herd took over as Keith Brown scored from 5-yards out and McCracken returned an interception 25 yards for a score before Dunbar's 65 yard interception return by Ross.

Dunbar only had one fumble, while Hereford had two. Penalties included: 2-10 for Dunbar; 4 for 30 yards for the Herd. Dunbar had 3 for 15 passes completed while three were intercepted and Hereford, on the other hand, had 5 for eleven, and one intercepted.

Back in 1956, the Milwaukee Braves were chasing the Brooklyn Dodgers for the pennant. Other than Warren Spahn and a few others, we were a young team with players like Eddie Mathews, Johnny Logan and Billy Bruton. The Dodgers, of course, had been through it all before.

We went into St. Louis with a one-game lead needing to win two out of three to clinch our first pennant. We were almost to the end of the rainbow. But we weren't quite there yet. Spahn and Lew Burdette pitched good ballgames but we lost both. The Dodgers swept the Pirates and won the pennant.

There's tremendous pressure on young players in a series like that one. Everyone is uptight. You don't want the ball hit to you. You don't want to come up with the bases loaded and risk popping up with the tying or winning run at third base. Any mistake will be one you think about all winter. It's a very scary feeling. To survive September, a team should be a blend of young players and veterans. The veterans calm the rookies down and the rookies keep the veterans hustling.

Now winning a pennant is one of the greatest moments that anyone can ever experience in sports. I was lucky enough to hit a 12th inning-homerun in Milwaukee to clinch the 1957 pennant for Milwaukee. To be very honest, I don't remember what time I got home after the game. I think the game was over about 11:30 that night and I got home about 11:30 the next morning. What a thrill that was!

It is also true that the best team doesn't always win the pennant. I have always felt the 1959 Braves were far and away the best team in the National League. We had won two pennants in a row and were sure of winning another. But come September, there were the Dodgers. We tied for first place and they won the playoff.

Better team or not, we lost because the Dodgers wanted it more than we did and were determined to win. Determination and desire put them in the World Series.

One thing's for certain, anything can happen during a September pennant chase.

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TITHING—THE GRACE OF GIVING

I. GOD'S PLAN FOR GIVING.

A. God's Plan Before The Law.

1. Abraham tithed. Gen. 14:18-20; Heb. 7:1-10
2. Jacob vowed to tithe. Gen. 28:22
3. Abraham was very likely not the first tither.
4. Abraham's tithing was over 400 years before the Law. Gal. 3:16,17

B. God's Plan Under The Law.

1. The tithe is the Lord's. Lev. 27:30
2. The tithe is holy unto the Lord. Lev. 27:30
3. The tithe must be given honestly. Lev. 27:31-33
4. The tithe is commanded by God. Lev. 27:34
5. The tithe commanded in the last O.T. book. Mal. 3:10

C. God's Plan Under Grace.

1. Jesus endorsed the tithe. Matt. 23:23
2. Jesus doubtless tithed. If He had not done so, the Pharisees would have no doubt criticized Him for not doing so.
3. The New Testament nowhere disannuls the tithe.
4. The tithe is proportional giving. Proportional giving is taught in I Cor. 16:2 and II Cor. 8:12-14.

II. GOD'S PLACE FOR GIVING.

A. Under The Law God Chose The Place —The Storehouse.

1. Tithes, offerings and sacrifices to be brought to the place of God's choice. Deut. 12:5,6,8,13
2. This pattern continued through the O.T. Mal. 3:10. The storehouse was the Tabernacle and then later on it was the Temple. This was God's choice.

B. Under Grace God Chose The Place —The Storehouse.

1. In the N.T. the offerings were brought to the Church Acts 4:34,37
2. The Church is the storehouse. I Cor. 16:2. Compare I Cor. 1:2 and note that he was writing to the Church.
3. This order was given to Churches. I Cor. 16:1
4. Paul's appeals for offerings were addressed to Churches and not to individuals. II Cor. 8:1-7; 9:1-7. Compare with II Cor. 1:1. Individuals would give, but it was through their Church that they gave.
5. Paul commends the Philippian Church for their giving to missions. Phil. 4:10-17
6. Every Christian should be a member of a Scriptural N.T. Church and do their giving through it.
 - a. No Christian should give to an unscriptural cause, but through a Scriptural Church.

b. Many false causes and man made religious parasites would be eliminated if this plan was practiced.

III. GOD'S PROMISE FOR GIVING ACCORDING TO HIS PLAN.

A. God Will Bless Obedience.

1. Bountiful sowers will be bountiful reapers. II Cor. 9:6,7
2. He will pour out blessings and protect property. Mal. 3:10,11
3. Prosperity as God blesses. Prov. 3:9,10; 11:25
4. God's good measure given. Luke 6:38
5. Treasure in heaven. Matt. 6:19-21

B. God Will Chasten For Disobedience.

1. There will be less to reap. II Cor. 9:6. If you sow sparingly, you will reap sparingly.
2. It will tend to poverty. Pro. 11:24
3. It will hinder service to God. I Tim. 6:9,10
4. It will bring a curse. Mal. 3:9

Scriptural giving is one of the fundamentals of the Faith. II Cor. 8:7. "Therefore, as ye abound in everything, in faith, and utterance, and knowledge, and in all diligence, and in your love to us, see that ye abound in this grace also."

We are commanded to bring our gifts into the storehouse (common treasury of the church) upon the first day of the week.

I Cor. 16:2. "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him, that there be no gatherings when I come."

Under grace we give, and do not pay, the tithe—"Abraham GAVE a tenth part of all"—"Abraham GAVE the tenth of the spoils"—Heb. 7:2,4—and this was four hundred years before the law, and is confirmed in the New Testament; Jesus said concerning the tithe, "These ye ought to have done" Matt. 23:23.

We are commanded to bring the tithe into the common treasury of the church.

Lev. 27:30. "The tithe is the Lord's." Mal. 3:10. "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord, your hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

In the New Testament it was the common treasury of the church.

Acts 4:34,35,37. "And brought the price of the things that were sold, and laid them down at the apostles' feet... Having land, sold it, and brought the money, and laid it at the apostles' feet."
