Pat Lawson, anchor of News 4's weekend newscast, is the Parade Grand Marshal for the eighth annual Juneteenth Celebration. The parade will begin at 10 a. m. on the parking lot of the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center.

She joined WRC TV in September, 1982 as a general assignment reporter where she presented reports on Channel 4 News: Live at 5:30, 6:00 and 11:00 p. m. She also provided daily local news reports during breaks in the TODAY Show broadcast. In 1984, she provided political coverage at both Republican and Democratic conventions. From January to September of 1986, Lawson produced and reported a daily news segment, SPECIAL FOCUS, an in-depth look at special people in Washington and their unique contributions.

Lawson came to NEWS 4 from WBAL TV in Baltimore where she was an anchor/reporter at that station for more than two years. She

began her journalism career as a researcher for WRC TV's Contact 4 consumer unit. She subsequently joined WHUR Radio as an announcer/anchor and later was the Mutual Black Network in Washington, D. C. She then moved to WOL Radio as an anchor/reporter and host of a weekly public affairs program.

In 1978, Lawson joined WTOP Radio as an afternoon, drive time anchor/reporter. She remained with WTOP Radio until she moved to WBAL TV in 1980.

Lawson is a member of the Society of Professional Journalists, the National Press Club and the Washington Association of Black Journalists.

A native of Las Vegas, Nevada, Lawson attended Howard University where she studied Broadcast Management and graduated Magna Cum Laude with a Bachelor of Arts Degree.

Former City of Lubbock Employee Rick Childers Named Speaker



Lubbock's Emancipation Proclamation Committee has named Rick Childers, former City of Lubbock employee and currently the assistant city manager of Abilene, Texas, as their Eighth Annual Juneteenth Scholarship Awards Banquet set for Sunday evening, June 19, 1988 at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center, beginning at 7 p. m.

Childers, a former member of the local committee, will speak on the theme: "The True Meaning of Emancipation."

The committee has also announced other activities for the annual celebration which will kick off Friday, June 17th, with a reception at Mae Simmons Community Center at 7 p. m.

Special guest will be Pat Lawson, a broadcast journalist with NBC in Washington, D. C.

An added attraction at the reception will be the selection of the 1988 Miss Juneteenth.

The following morning, June 18th, the parade will begin at 10 a. m., from the north parking lot of the Memorial Civic Center. Mrs. Lawson will serve as grand marshal.

Over the past few months, a group of local clowns have been making preparations for this annual parade, according to Harold M. Chatman, president of the Juneteenth Committee.

"We are looking forward

to these young people as they display their many talents," he said.

The parade will wind up in Mae Simmons Park after marching from downtown where booths will open at 1 p. m. These booths will offer a variety of barbecue, fish and other delicious foods, as well as arts and crafts.

"We are in need of the community to let us know how many of them are interesting in having booths this year. We need to know as soon as possible," said Chatman.

This year, several bands, dance contests and an assortment of games will round out the entertainment in the park on Saturday.

"The fun should last at least until dusk dark," said Katie Parks, chairwoman of the booth committee.

"This year, we will provide additional comfort to the hundreds who will be in attendance with a tent and chairs," she said.

Anyone interested in operating a booth should contact Mrs. Parks at 747 2429 as soon as possible.

Climaxing the annual three day celebration will be the religious services in the park on Sunday afternoon, June 19th, at 3 p. m. when Rev. A. L. Dunn, pastor of Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church, will deliver the annual sermon. There will also be music from a gospel choir.

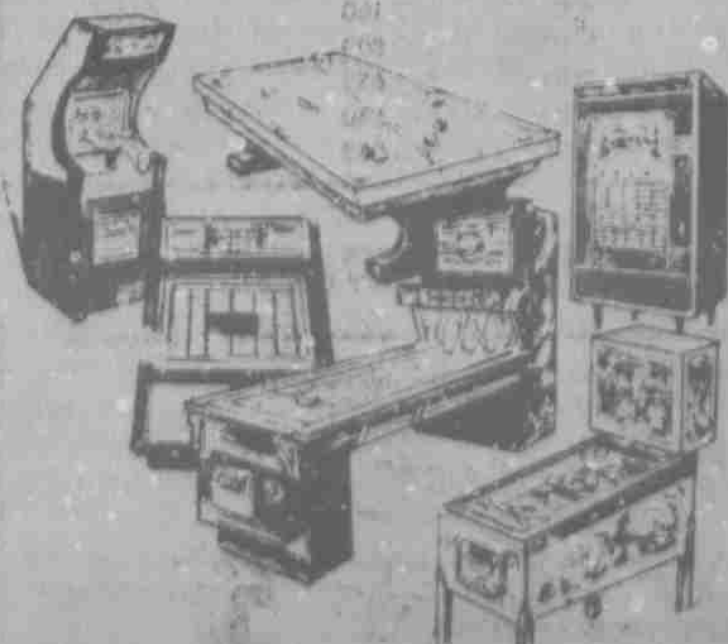

It Needs To Be Said

"When the going gets tough, the tough gets going." going can't get much tougher. Whatever makes times tough, our community has its share. With all the problems facing our community, there is one factor common to all the problems, that factor: "lack of home training."

It has been said by many: "there is nothing that can be done with east Lubbock Blacks, 15 to 40 years old." That our only hope is to work hard with those under 12. This is good, but it's like taking a bath with your clothes on, you can show dirty water and some odor is removed, but underneath dirty and odor is still there. The Boys Club, Little League and all the organizations can go all out providing that child with sportsmanship, team play, hygiene and the many other worthwhile aspects of life they instill. However, as with school, one hour of home environment can ruin an all day session at the Boys Club, etc. Home life must reinforce the training and good character learned elsewhere. What good is it to have rules against profanity at the Boys Club when profanity in the home is used like the air we breathe. Are we helping the child when the community pays for their participation in activities while the parents spend their money on drugs, alcohol and bingo. Yes, there is a "catch 22" to this, why punish the child for the sins of the parent?"

As Blacks, we are caught in the situation of being concerned about our youth while their parents sit idly by concerned about other things. Food, clothing and shelter is only one piece of the pie of parental responsibility. Spiritual, moral, respect, self worth and many other pieces must be instilled to complete the pie. Too many of our children are growing like weeds in a field and the concerned people who work with them are temporarily pruning them, but a weed is a weed.

Parents must take on the responsibility for their children. Any parent who states: "they can't do anything with a child born of them, should be shot at sunrise. If you instill the parent/child relationship even at 40, 50 years old, that child will still heed your words. But too many parents think the toddler's antics are cute and funny, that the pre schooler is going through a period of adjustment and the child in elementary is misunderstood. Well try these: "what makes you laugh can make you cry." "Spare the rod, spoil the child." "What you sow, so shall you reap." If that youth will not listen and mind their parent, can not be controlled by the parent, do not show respect for the parent and has no responsibility within the home, what type adult will they be? Raising the child is the foundation for adulthood. With a good foundation, they will not collapse as adults.

Our prisons are filled with young Black men and women, the drug users among our young Blacks is epidemic in numbers, and Black children having children is way too high. The reason is simple, they are not getting the foundation as a child within the home to be able to cope and survive in the so called "straight world." Blacks can no longer be part time parents, we must return to full time parents. We must not spare the rod, we must be firm with discipline, we must become involved with the activities our children participate in, they must learn responsibility within the home. With home training, programs such as Boys Clubs, Little League will be the reinforcement that shows the child that outside the home require the same "stick to it ness" of the rules as within



the home. One without the other is not producing the desire results simply because after they enter their teens, our community has little to offer. The home must refocus their priority to once again place the development of men and women as their primary objective for their future. What good is hoping your child will be a doctor, lawyer or Indian chief, when all you are instilling is how to be able to live off others.

Letter to Editor "Very Upset"

Dear Sir:

My name is Turley R. Thornton. I graduated from Texas Tech University in 1977. I worked for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company for eight years before completing my degree work at Tech. Since graduating I have taught and substituted three years in area schools. I now live at Buffalo Springs Lake and work for Manpower Temporary Service.

In April, 1987, I was placed under arrest. The charge was "Dog at Large." I was forced to turn myself in at the Lubbock County Jail because I was unable to pay a fine of \$100.00 or post a bond of \$200.00. I was booked and placed in the holding area of the jail where I remained for approximately 12 hours. I was never offered a personal recognizance bond, even though I have lived, worked and owned property in Lubbock my entire life.

My elderly parents were helpless as they viewed me through the thick glass in the visiting area. My young son was so upset when he came in with a neighbor later that night that I refunded and let my neighbor make my bond. After getting "sprung" from that awful place, I got a lawyer, another \$112.50. On the day of docket call, my attorney was told over the phone that the District Attorney's Office did not wish to try the case and Judge Stafford did not want to hear it. Was this an "abuse of process" or "malicious prosecution"? P.F. OBABLY BOTH.

Could this happen to you? Maybe not, but if you ever ask questions at Buffalo you could be a visitor in "Mr. Keesee's House."

Travis Ware and Sonny Keesee both rail at the Bureau of Prison Standards about having to provide a hotel for criminals. I can tell you that if they ever spend any time in the place, they would not think it was so great.

Secondly, we have the witness of the angels in Acts 1:11 "Which also said, Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? this same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven." Thirdly, we have the witness of the apostle Paul who says in 1 Thessalonians 4:16 "For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven".
2. His coming will be suddenly. Jesus says in Matthew 24:27 "For as the lightning cometh out of the east, and shineth even unto the west; so shall also the coming of the Son of man be."
3. The day and hour of His coming is not known. Matthew 25:13 says "Watch therefore, for ye know neither the day nor the hour wherein the Son of man cometh." Jesus says in Matthew 24:36 and 42 "But of that day and hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels of heaven, but my Father only. Watch therefore: for ye know not what hour your Lord doth come."
4. We should be looking for His coming soon. James 5:8 says "Be ye also patient; stablish your hearts: for the coming of the Lord draweth nigh." Hebrews 9:28 says "So Christ was once offered to bear the sins of many; and unto them that look for him shall he appear a second time without sin unto salvation."
5. The saved are to prepare for His coming by purifying ourselves. 1 John 3:2-3 says "Beloved, now are we the sons of God, and it doth not yet appear what we shall be: but we know that, when he shall appear, we shall be like him; for we shall see him as he is. And every man that hath this hope in him purifieth himself, even as he is pure." We prepare for His coming by completing the work He has given to each of us. Mark 13:32-37 "But of that day and that hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels, which are in heaven, neither the Son, but the father. Take ye heed, watch and pray: for ye know not when the time is. For the Son of man is as a man taking a far journey, who left his house, and gave authority to his servants, and to every man his work, and commanded the porter to watch. Watch ye therefore: for ye know not when the master of the house cometh, at even, or at midnight, or at the cockcrowing, or in the morning: Lest coming suddenly he find you sleeping. And what I say unto you I say unto all, Watch." Matthew 24:42-51 also says "Watch therefore: for ye know not what hour your Lord doth come. But know this, that if the goodman of the house had known in what watch the thief would come, he would have watched, and would not have suffered his house to be broken up. Therefore be ye also ready: for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh. Who then is a faithful and wise servant, whom his lord hath made ruler over his household, to give them meat in due season? Blessed is that servant, whom his lord when he cometh shall find so doing. Verily I say unto you, That he shall make him ruler over all his goods. But and if that evil servant shall say in his heart, My lord delayeth his coming; and shall begin to smite his fellow-servants, and to eat and drink with the drunken; The lord of that servant shall come in a day when he looketh not for him, and in an hour that he is not aware of, And shall cut him asunder, and appoint him his portion with the hypocrites: there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth." We can also prepare for His coming by reaching our loved ones and others, with the gospel, for it says in Matthew 24:36-42 "But of that day and hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels of heaven, but my Father only. 2.
