Fire Prevention Week In Lubbock

Few people think much about it until a fire sweeps through a home of a friend. relative or even their own house. Only then after witnessing the devastation. disruption and often, death, does anyone consider what could have been done to prevent it.

Next week, Oct. 4-10, the Lubbock Fire Department will join with other fire departments around the country and the National Fire Protection Association in promoting "Fire Prevention Week."

Fire Prevention Week is somewhat of a misnomerbecause as fire officials point out, fire prevention is a year-round job for everyone.

"Almost 80 per cent of the people killed in fires die in their own home or apartment." Lubbock Fire Marshal Jack Carlile pointed out. Most fires happen at night, when people are asleep. With a small amount. of money and a few precautions, you can usually survive a fire," Carlile said.

The small amount of money would be for smoke

sense of security. Carlile remarked.

"When we have a low fire death rate that is fortunate. Maybe people are becoming wiser and fire prevention is working. But we also know that it can only take a few minutes for a fire to spread through a home or building and kill people. We have to keep the people aware of fire safety every chance we get.

"And with the colder weather coming up heaters and fireplaces can be very dangerous: We just want people to practice common sense and not be the victim of a fire," Carlile added.

The Fire Marshal went on

to say that beyond the deaths and injuries, the financial burden of a fire can be enormous. In 1986 in Lubbock, fires caused more than \$1.648,000 in insured fire losses. Thus far this year. fire damage has totalled \$1,012,000 and the winter months are still ahead. Nationally, in 1985 the two and a half million fires reported totaled more than \$7.3 BILLION in fire losses.



SWAPO Leaders Hospitalized

during South Africa's crackdown late last month have required emergency treatment at the Windhoek State Hospital, according to news service. reports from Namibia.

National Chairman Daniel Tjongarero, the highest ranking SWAPO official in Namibia, underwent surgery last week and is in satisfactory condition after suffering from a kidney disorder. Tjongarero's family physician was initially denied access to him.

SWAPO Advocate Anton Lubowski, a leader of the National Union of Namibia Workers, was also removed from prison detention to undergo hospital treatment for a kidney ailment.

At press time, attorneys for the six had filed an urgent appeal for their release. They were the targets of a country-wide sweep that drew international condemnation.

UK Dockworkers Boycott South Africa Uranium

(NIS) -- Liverpool dockworkers, continuing a boycott of South African uranium, recantly cited the arrival of five containers of uranium hexafluroide from the U.S. which were destined for the British Nuclear Fuels Ltd. (BNFL) Capehurst Plant.

While the plant management claimed that the uranium was from Canada, the dockworkers insisted that the highly enriched level was characteristic of Nambian or South Africa.

TRhe uranium was aboard the U.S. "Atlantic. Compass." The Reagan Administration has been accused of importing uranium in violation of the 1986 sancations law, according to members of Congress who are pushing for a stronger embargo against South Africa.

Some 1500 Liverpool dockworkers last month refused to handle 80 tons of uranium from Namibia and South Africa. They say over two thirds of uranium processed by BNFL comes from South Africa or South Africa - occupied Namibia, site of the world's largest open uranium oit.

Namibia Church Leaders Charge Slander

(NIS) -- The Council of Churches of Namibia, accusing South African Administrator-General Louis Pienaar of waging a "smeare campaign", has adamantly dismissed the allegation that the CCN should take responsibility for a recent combing in the capital city, Windhoek

Piennar publicly suggested the cossibility of oriminal charges being filed against church leaders. although no evidence has been produced to uphold his claim.

No one was injured in the July bomb blast which occurred in a parking garage adjacent to the South African military command. The Peoples Liberation Army of Namibia (PLAN), SWAPO's fighting wing. claimed responsibility for the explosion.

Chemical Warfare In Angola

(NIS) -- The Cuerie province in Angola has been hit by chemical weapons of South Africa's invading forces, according to reports filed by the BBC.

Provincial Commisar Pedro Mutinde reportedly urged civilians of that southern province to join the army and the people's defense brigades to guard against what he termad South Africa's attempts to "annex Cunene to establish a buffer zone."

Cuene sits near the border with Namibia, the frequent launching ground for South Africa's raids Into Angola.

Cuban Troops Withdrawal Not UN Concern

(NIS) -- United Nations Special Envoy Maarti Ahtisaari, recently back from a mission to South Africa, said the South African government remains entrenched in the position of linking Nambian independence with the withdrawal of Cuban troops from Angola.

Antisari told the Star that the issue must be resolved by South Africa and Angola. He stressed that the Cuban troops are not an issue officially recognized by the LIN.

South African officials maintained that they are interested in implementing Socurity Council Resolutin 435, considered the blueprint for Namibian independence. Bur despite that claim, the UN envoy left Johannesburg with no end to South Africa's 21-year illegal occupation in sight.

"The 'Greatness' Trap"


Several weeks ago, I was talking with a friend of mine. In the course of the conversation he boasted of his position and the power that he had over other lives. is one who's much more important loving others. Let's not get confused. Just


"LOVE" all especially those of the Body of Christ.

TITHING-THE GRACE OF GIVING

I. GOD'S PLAN FOR GIVING.

A. God's Plan Before The Law.

- 1. Abraham tithed. Gen. 14:18-20; Heb. 7:1-10
- 2. Jacob vowed to tithe. Gen. 28:22
- 3. Abraham was very likely not the first tither.
- Abraham's tithing was over 400 years before the Law. Gal. 3:16,17

B. God's Plan Under The Law.

- 1. The tithe is the Lord's. Lev. 27:30
- 2. The tithe is holy unto the Lord. Lev. 27:30
- 3. The tithe must be given honestly. Lev. 27:31-33
- 4. The tithe is commanded by God. Lev. 27:34
- 5. The tithe commanded in the last O.T. book. Mal. 3:10

C. God's Flan Under Grace.

H. GOD'S PLACE FOR GIVING.

A. Under The Law God Chose The Place -The Storehouse,

- Tithes, offerings and sacrifices to be brought to the place of God's choice. Deut. 12:5,6,8,13
- This pattern continued through the O.T. Mal. 3:10. The storchouse was the Tabernacle and their later on it was the Temple. This was God's choice.

B. Under Grace God Chose The Place -The Storehouse.

- In the N.T. the offerings were brought to the Church. Acts 4:34.37
- 2. The Church is the storehouse, I Cor. 16:2. Compare I Cor. 1:2 and note that he was writing to the Church.
- 3. This order was given to Churches, 1 Cor. 16:1
- 4. Paul's appeals for offerings wer: addresse 1 to Churches and not to individuals. Il Cor. 8:1-7: 9:1-7. Compare with Il Cor. 1:1. Individuals would give, but it was through their Church that they gave.
- Faul commends the Philippian Church for their plving to missions, Phil. 4:10-17
- Every C visition should be a member of a Scriptural N.T. Church and do their giving through it.
 - a. Fo Christian should give to an unscriptural car o, but through a Scriptural Church.

We are commanded to bring the tithe into the common treasury of the church.


