Japanese use of Sambo models may lead to black boycott

Cathy Hughes, owner of WOL radio station, announced consideration of a plan to encourage Blacks to boycott Japanese manufactured products and participate in a huge rally in which people would be asked to bring their Japanese products for a huge bonfire.

Hughes revealed the plan during the Wednesday morning broadcast on her morning show in response to recent reports describing Little Black Sambo and other racist caricatures being used as the mascot of a "hot-selling line" of Japanese toys and beachwear.

The stereotypical depictions of Blacks were brought to national attention following a report in The Washington Post detailing recent marketing trends in Japanese markets.

One example included the report of Sanrio Co., which puts out the Sambo line. Among the items recounted to the Post included a beach cloth featuring Sambo and his sister, Han-

na, with very black faces and round white eyes. Under Sambo is reportedly written: "When I'm hungry there's no stoppin' me. I'll be up a palm pickin' coconuts before you can count to three (An' I can count way past three too!)"

Sanrio is not alone in its marketing of black caricatures. Black mannequins with "grossly distorted lips and greased hair" have been found in department stores in Japan modeling suits and other clothing,

according to the Post.

Bill Reed, Business Editor of Capital Spotlight and President of The Business Exchange Network, Inc. supported the actions considered by radio host Cathy Hughes saying, "The Japanese seem not to recognize us as equal partners and human beings. It appears to me the only way we can get their attention is to withdraw our economic support for their products and goods."

Reed, who has written ex-

tensively on the subject of Japanese/Black American trends," said, "Japan has yet to reciprocate with Black America to any extent. In 1987 Black Americans have bought 20% of all goods sent into the country. One out of every four Japanese cars sold in America is bought by Black Americans, yet there is not even one US Black Dealership for Japanese cars."

Bipartisan Repudiation of Reagan/Bush Discrimination Policy

President Reagan has lost eight of his veto override fights. In his recent bout, he was dealt a knockout blow by override of the Civil Rights Restoration Act veto.

The Act was passed by a vote in the Senate by 75 to 14 and in the House by 315 to 98. Seeing one of his last ditch efforts to set back civil rights with one giant sweep fail, the President vetoed the Act.

Mr. Reagan made a trip to Capitol Hill, the day the veto override was being voted on. He lobbied hard to get members of Congress to sustain his veto. After passage of the Act, Reagan then presented a civil rights bill.

Commenting after the Act had passed, Senator Alan Simpson (R-Wyoming), Minority Whip, said "we ended up with good language that does not interfere with religious liberties. Federal funds should never be used to subsidize discrimination—we did indeed strengthen those laws protecting women, minorities, the elderly and the handicapped against discrimination."

Mr. Reagan's proposal stated that farmers, who accept federal subsidies, small grocery stores and supermarkets that accept food stamps, and religious liberties are jeopardized by the Restoration Act.

Senator Rudy Boschwitz (R-Minn.) sent President Reagan a letter asking that he sign the Civil Rights Act instead of vetoing it. Boschwitz stated that the bill puts an end to institutional discrimination done by the Grove City decision. He reminded the president that minorities, women, disabled and other groups battle discrimination daily, and while hearts cannot be changed by legislation, behavior can. Boschwitz informed the president of his intention to vote to override the veto.

The Catholic Bishops and the Association of Independent Colleges and Universities sent the president urgent letters asking him to sign the bill.

Senator Edward Kennedy, floor manager of the Civil Rights Restoration Act, speaking on the veto, said, "This Republican Administration has never met a civil rights bill it didn't dislike." Kennedy related the Administration's civil rights history, it opposed extension of the Voting Rights Act, advocated tax credit for segregated schools, delayed enactment of the Martin Luther King Holiday, resisted strengthening the fair housing laws and enactment of strong sanctions against South Africa.

Responding to the president's bill, Kennedy said that all of those measures had been introduced as amendments and rejected before the bill passed the Senate.

Representative John Conyers (D-Mich.) said "President Reagan and Vice President Bush have shown that they are not friends of civil rights, and just how far from the mainstream they have taken their administration and party."

Conyers stated how the Meese/Reynolds Justice Department has consistently opposed affirmative action and school desegregation consent decrees.

Vice President Bush said because of loyalty to the president, he supported the veto. Bush placed loyalty above justice. Bush is certain to be haunted by his veto actions during his campaign. While the Senate override of the veto was 73 to 24, and the House override 292 to 133, there were a few switch votes.

When Senator John Warner (R-Va.) announced that he was going to sustain the veto because of so many calls, Blacks in Mecklenburg County, Virginia became angrily aroused. This county has one of the largest and most active NAACP chapters in the country. Edward Davis, the chapter's president, and two other officials came to Washington to Warner's and Senator Paul Trible's (R-Va.) offices. Davis had testified before the House Judiciary in support of the Restoration Act. Mecklenburg County's Black school children are discriminated against by the county's track system. The Civil Rights Office of the Education Department found that the county does discriminate but because of the Grove City decision, nothing could be done.

The group saw neither Warner nor Trible, but they did see their administrative assistants. Davis strongly emphasized that in voting to sustain the veto, the senators would be voting for discrimination against their Black children. The group also emphasized that when the senators come up for reelection or election for any other public office, that unless they voted against the veto they would have no alternative but to campaign hard against their election, since a vote for sustaining the veto will prove that they are for discrimination.

Ralph Nease, Executive Director of the Leadership Conference, said "the veto override was a clear bipartisan reaffirmation for civil rights and a repudiation of the Reagan/Bush federal funding of discrimination."



DIANETICS MAY HELP COMPUTERS

What makes some people smarter and able to think more clearly than others? Do they have more brain cells? Or is it just that they have been taught to think better? Perhaps they just have more information to think with.

It turns out that intelligence and the full potential of the human mind have not been particularly well understood. At least, that's what computer scientists have discovered in trying to develop computers that can think the way people do.

When the search for ways to develop smart computers with "artificial intelligence" or AI first got underway, scientists focused on activities they considered must require high intelligence, such things as playing chess or solving complex logical problems. A great deal of scientific effort and millions of dollars poured into the development of powerful computational techniques to accomplish such "intelligent" tasks.

But then these scientists discovered that the way they got computers to solve these complex problems was not the way that people solved the same problems. In other words, even the intelligence experts didn't really

know how people think!

"AI [artificial intelligence] focuses on intelligence, something that remains mysterious and elusive," said Roger Schank, chairman of the computer science department at Yale University, when commenting upon the situation.

However, American writer L. Ron Hubbard has come up with what may be the key to the puzzle that, if solved, will launch a new generation of computers. As detailed in his international bestseller Dianetics, he discovered that the self-confident, well-balanced person thinks in differences and similarities to resolve problems.

"Intelligence is the ability to recognize differences, similarities and identities," he said. In other words, intelligence involves perception as well as thought.

For years, millions of people have used Dianetics to increase their intelligence, to improve their ability to think clearly and to realize their full potential. But now, Dianetics may open the door to the first truly intelligent computer.

Computers, it seems, could benefit from Dianetics as well!

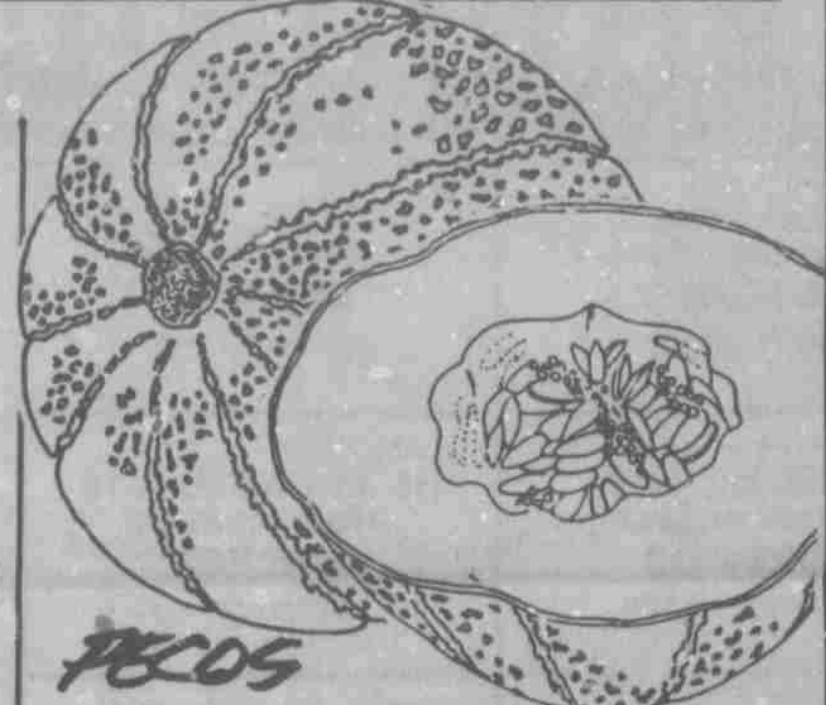

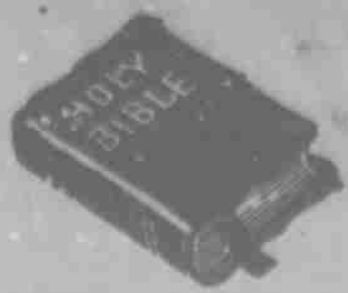

Therefore being a prophet, and knowing that God had sworn with an oath to him, that of the fruit of his loins, according to the flesh, he would raise up Christ to sit on his throne;"

HIS REIGN WILL BE DIFFERENT THAN OTHER RULERS.

1. The power of His reign. It says in I Corinthians 15:24-26 "Then cometh the end, when he shall have delivered up the kingdom to God, even the Father; when he shall have put down all rule and all authority and power. For he must reign, till he hath put all enemies under his feet. The last enemy that shall be destroyed is death." The book of Revelation 20:1-3 John states "And I saw an angel come down from heaven, having the key of the bottomless pit and a great chain in his hand. And he laid hold on the dragon, that old serpent, which is the Devil, and Satan, and bound him a thousand years, And cast him into the bottomless pit, and shut him up, and set a seal upon him, that he should deceive the nations no more, till the thousand years should be fulfilled: and after that he must be loosed a little season."
2. The quality of His reign. It says in Isaiah 32:1 "Behold, a king shall reign in righteousness, and princes shall rule in judgment." Isaiah 11:4-5 says "But with righteousness shall he judge the poor, and reprove with equity for the meek of the earth; and he shall smite the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips shall he slay the wicked. And righteousness shall be the girdle of his loins, and faithfulness the girdle of his reins."
3. The extent of His reign. It says in Psalms 72:8-9 and in verse 11 "He shall have dominion also from sea to sea, and from the river unto the ends of the earth. They that dwell in the wilderness shall bow before him; and his enemies shall lick the dust. . . . Yes, all kings shall fall down before him: all nations shall serve him." and Zechariah 14:9 says "And the Lord shall be king over all the earth: in that day shall there be one Lord, and his name one."
4. The length of His reign and the people who shall reign with Him are told in Revelation 20:4,6 which John says "And I saw thrones, and they sat upon them, and judgment was given unto them: and I saw the souls of them that were beheaded for the witness of Jesus, and for the word of God, and which had not worshipped the beast, neither his image, neither had received his mark upon their foreheads, or in their hands; and they lived and reigned with Christ a thousand years. . . . Blessed and holy is he that hath part in the first resurrection: on such the second death hath no power, but they shall be priests of God and of Christ, and shall reign with him a thousand years."

CRACKLING FRESH SALAD GREENS

Gone are the days when salads meant the same old lettuce and tomato combinations. Today's time-conscious cooks know how to make the most of salads by using a wide variety of garden fresh greens from light-colored Belgian endive to crisp, dark green spinach.

When using fresh greens to create great salads, follow three simple rules: wash and thoroughly dry greens; refrigerate them until they crackle when you eat them; and toss with a moderate amount of dressing immediately before serving to prevent the leaves from becoming soggy.

MEXICAN TURKEY SALAD

- 3 cups cooked and diced turkey
- 1 (15 ounce) can tomato sauce with mushrooms
- 1 (1.25 ounce) package taco seasoning mix
- 2 1/2 pint containers cherry tomatoes, sliced
- 1 bunch leaf lettuce, torn into bite-size pieces
- 2 (7 1/2 ounce) cans ripe olives, drained
- 2 purple onions, sliced in rings
- 2 ripe avocados, sliced or diced
- 1 (9 ounce) can Frito-Lay's® brand Cheddar & Jalapeño Flavor Cheese dip
- Tostitos® brand Tortilla Chips — Traditional Flavor

In a straight-sided glass salad bowl, layer all ingredients except dip and tortilla chips. Warm dip in the top of a double boiler and pour over the salad. Serve with tortilla chips. Serves 6 to 8.

MULTIPLE GREENS SALAD

- 1/2 pound fresh spinach
- 1 large head Boston lettuce
- 1 medium-sized head romaine lettuce
- 1/2 small head escarole

Pour salad oil into a 10-inch skillet and heat over medium heat. Saute mushrooms and green onions in oil until tender, stirring occasionally. Stir in vinegar, sugar, and spices; heat to boiling. Boil 1 minute, stirring constantly. Pour hot dressing over salad greens and gently toss to coat well. Makes 1 1/2 cups.

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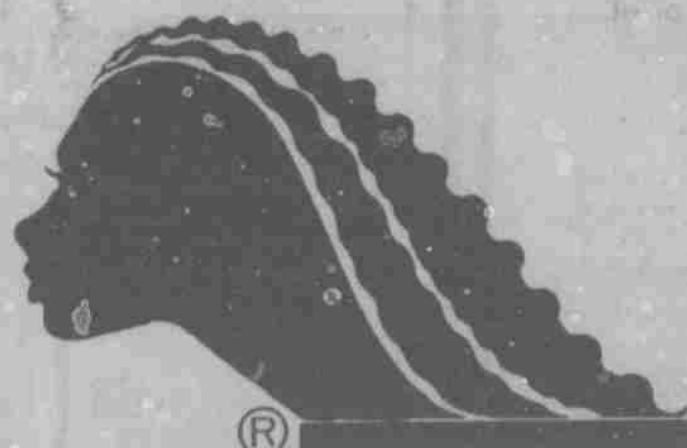


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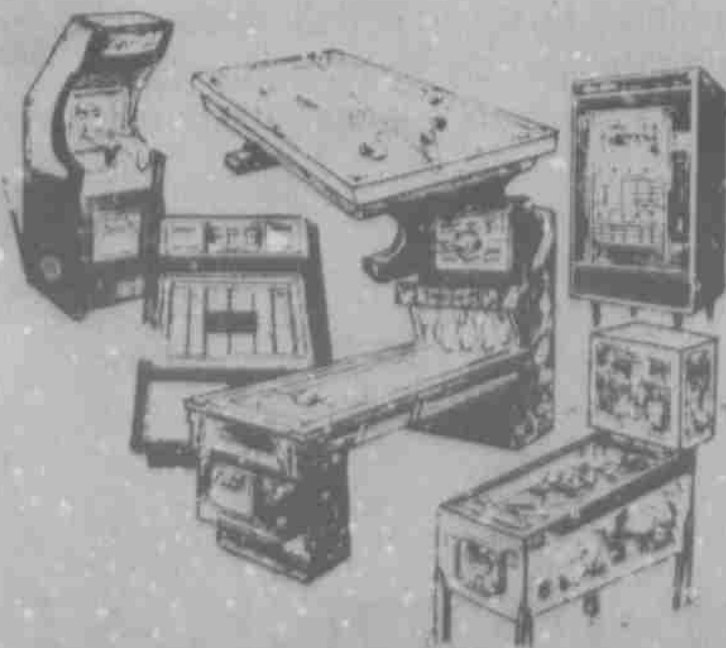

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Students Will Register Aug. 17th

Elementary, junior high, and senior high students new to the Lubbock Independent School District may register Wednesday, August 17, at their local school campus. Students who have moved into a new school attendance zone should also register on the 17th. Those who pre-registered at the end of the 1987 and 1988 school year, however, need not to register again.

At the present time, certain school and immunization records must be presented to enroll a new student in the Lubbock ISD.

The records should include the previous year's report cards for students

entering second through twelfth grade. Birth certificates or other proof of age must be made available for kindergarten and first grade students.

Also required for students in each grade is a full immunization record, which is mandated by the state law. Immunization records should include polio vaccine, three oral Sabine doses through age 18 with the last dose after the fourth birthday; diphtheria tetanus (DPT or TD) vaccine, three doses with the last dose since the fourth birthday or within the last ten years for grades 6 through 12; rubella

vaccine, one dose through age 11; measles vaccine, one dose since fifth birthday through fifth grade; mumps vaccine for all

children through age 13. Parents with further questions concerning registration of students may contact their respective school or the District Office, Student Services, 766 1109.

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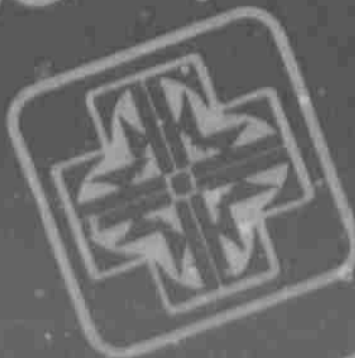
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
