Cayon Lakes Are **Being Stocked!!**

6700 hybrid striped were delivered to Canyon Lake 1 and 2 and Leftwich Park (60th and Elgin) Thursday, May 14 as a part of the Urban Fishing Program. These fish were furnished by Texas Parks and Wildlife and were supplied through a fish hatchery in Wichita Falls, Texas.

This is the second of several fish stockings that will take place at park lakes this summer. Five hundred native large mouth bass were delivered to Ribble Park lake (62nd and Temple) and Jennings Park lake (73rd and

Winston) on May 7. More hybrid striped bass, catfish, and hopefully rainbow trout are other species to be stocked in city park lakes. Approximately 50,000 fish are expected to be stocked in city

park lakes this summer.

The objective of the Urban Fishing Program is to manage the city's lakes for productive fishery. This program is the result of a cooperative effort

between Lubbock Parks and Recreation, Texus Park and Wildlife, Texas Tech Range and Wildlife Management, and c number of volunteers and civic groups.



In Search Of Leadership **Towards The New Direction**

Now that the case for our struggle has been taken by us to the United Nations, our next move is to begin to give more meaningful definition to the language we use to define our struggle. When we say liberation, we shouldn't mean simple things such as less police brutality, or safe neighborhoods, or more and better jobs, but we must define the words of our struggle so that they mean the same thing to us as they do to the world community whose attention we seek to capture and

In the recent past decades, when Africans demanded "freedom now", they meant that the demand was for independence, territory, sovereignty, and reparations. And we will have no hope of commanding theirs, or anyone else's support to our cause unless and until we mean the same things. Leaders who will accept jobs, law and order, programs, and other intermediary gains as the prize of our struggle, are no longer adequate, and should only accorded the respect due their limited vision. All of these gains are beneficial, and we should take them when we can, but they are not the goal, and must no longer suffice, and any leadership which attempts to appease us or sell out our struggle for such short sighted gains will thereby reveal their betrayal. One other way in which poor quality local leadership reveals itself is in their failure to recognize and respect our national class leaders.

Criticism works best in this regard when it serves to strengthen our week links, and it is my sincere desire that it may serve this end here.

Some of our !zaders who are questionable metal may in the end proove quite worthy of the mantle, with the aid of a little encouragement here, or a little discouragement there. So, we perhaps should not be too quick to condenin, but we must never be slow to give constructive criticism, for it is not only our right and duty, but it is a way to encourage their finest qualities. But in the final analysis, our struggle and cause being paramouitn, the interest of no individual should outweight the interest of us all, and therefore we have an obligation to seek the very best men and women from our ranks for our champions.

One rule of thumb for this selection is to examine closely the ones who are attacked most vehemen ly by our enemies, the government and the press. Another rule that is helpful is to observe which philosophy we follow in the time of supreme crisis; what do we do when our backs are to the wall. And a final criteria is which leadership is the most respected by free men and nations. I will not here apply these criteria to anyone in particular, but rather let it be food for thought for the moment. However, we must begin to think along these lines now if we are to know how to channel our support now and in the future. And it is this thought, support, that brings me to my parting suggestion.

Each and every one of us should belong to an organization. Freely chaose the organization which best suits your consciousness, but join some organization and support it with your time, energy, ambition, and money. In this way, you will be sharing the burden of our struggle, and will assist and assure the ultimate victory of our cause. In truth, it is we the people who are the leadershipp of our struggle, and those at our inrefront are but symbols of our own qualities and purpose.

In conclusion, the real search for leadership towards the new direction begins with introspection, a look within curseives. We must summon from our hearts and minds the vision, resolve, and courage necessary to win.

West Texas Legal Services

When "Child Welfare" (Children's Protective Services) Steps In!

It is a common experience for "child welfare" (Children's Protective Services) to step in and take the children of many parents who would frequently qualify for representation by West Texas Legal Services. If and when this happens to you as a parent, there are several factors to bear in mind in addition to the primary one which is simply "Don't Panic." The primary goal of CPS is not take the child away for life (termination), but rather it is to restore the child to his/her natural parent(s). We turn now to consider several factors which experience has proved will help in having your child returned within the shortest possible time.

1. You, the parent(s), hold the key and, indeed, are the key for the return of the child. The recognition and acceptance of this fact is crucial. However, understandable, displays of anger and hositlity toward CPS hinders rather than furthers the goal of getting the child back in the home. Likewise, denial of any needed change in you and your home for the benefit of the children is not productive. The bottom line here is simply that you must engage in an honest selfappraisal as a parent and pinpoint the changes that need to be made and determine how you are going to go about making these changes; this requires not only genuine cooperation with CPS but determination to embark upon the very difficult road of selfimprovement and rehabilita-

tion. 2. Based on the assumption that knowledge diffuses confusion and its attendant anxiety, the general and routine scenario of a typical CPS may be helpful. First, CPS is charged with the duty of protecting the best interest and welfare of all children in the State of Texas. This is not only a vast responsibility it is also, an experience has proved, an extremely necessary one. Child abuse is rampant Second, when a child is taken udner emergency conditions, there is a hearing withing twenty-four (24) hours of the taking and then a ten (10) day hearing is set. Ordinarily, CPS at the 10-day hearing will seek a court order giving CPS custody of the child for six months. This is routinely asked for but it does not mean that the child cannot be released to the home before six months return of the child. These hearings involve custody only and termination is not involved. The wisdom of agreeing to the period of custody or contesting it has to be made on a case by case

3. The parent(s) need to begin immediately on a personal rehabilitation program which generally involves the introduction of a higher degree of stability in the parent(s) life. Achieving this stability and self-improvement touch upon a wide range of endeavors: Counseling (both parents and psychological); Education (GED to example); Securing and Maintaining Employment; Housing; and, Social and Personal Relationships. This is a process that takes time to accomplish. Circumstances often limit the potential but it is important that a real effort be made to make some progress in the inadequate areas.

4. Visitation is very important. It is important for





It's luxurious to dawdle over a delightful, endless brunch, but a snack on-the-run, prepared with special care, can say "good morning" in the same way.

This week, we begin a four-part series of exciting breakfast and brunch recipes. You'll discover new ideas for old favorites and surprises that quickly will become new favorites. Try one recipe or a whole menu. The idea is to start every morning on the top.

SPANISH SCRAMBLED EGGS

Vegetable cooking spray

1/4 cup chopped green pepper 1/4 cup finely chopped green onions with tops

1/4 cup skim milk

1/8 teaspoon pepper 1/4 cup Frito-Lay's® brand Picante Sauce

1/4 cup (1 oz.) grated extra sharp cheddar cheese

Coat skillet with cooking spray; place over medium-low heat until hot. Add green pepper and onions; cook until vegetables are tender, stirring occasionally. Remove vegetables from skillet and set aside. Combine eggs, milk, pepper, and picante sauce; beat well, and pour into skiller. 6 fresh strawberries, hulled and quartered

2 medium oranges, peeled, seeded and sectioned 1 grapefruit, peeled, seeded and sectioned

Combine first three ingredients in a medium bowl; toss gently. Add romaining fruits; cover and chill. To serve, arrange fruit on individual plates. Serves 6.

WHOLE WHEAT BISCUITS

1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

3/4 cup whole wheat flour 1 tablespoon sugar

1 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon baking soda 1/4 teaspoon salt

3 tablespoons butter or margarine, softened

package dry yeast 1/4 cup warm water (105°F to 115°F)

2/3 cup buttermilk

Combine first six ingredients in a medium bowl; cut in butter or marg trine using a pastry blender until mixture resembles coarse meal. Dissolve yeast in warm water. Combine yeast mixture in buttermilk. Add to flour mixture, stirring gently. Turn dough out onto a lightly floured surface and knead one minute. Roll dough to 1/2-inch thickness; cut into biscuits with a 2-inch biscuit cutter. Place each on a greased baking sheet. Bake at 425°F for 12 minutes or until golden. Makes 18 biscuits.

NOTE: Biscuit dough may be stored in refrigerator for 3 to 4 days.
