For James and Robbyne Fuller actions speak louder than words

The Fullers place high priority on family involvement. Husband and father James, views the primary incentive for being the best role models possible and helping people, especially young people, is the fact that we are almost at the turn of the century. He states, "The ultimate question is how well will our young people be prepared to take the reigns of responsibility socially, politically, economically, and religiously. The solution is in the context of the family." He adds that kids across our community need to see us doing the things we as adults, only tell them to do, as opposed to actually getting in there and demonstrating the theories behind our admonitions for them to get an education or think seriously about their future.

Robbyne, James, and son Jason are all involved in activities together. She is the founding president and CEO of the Midland Black Chamber of Entrepreneurs, Inc., James is the Vice President of Educational, Cultural, Economic, and Media Affairs, and Jason is the Vice President of the Young Chamber of Entrepreneurs. They are both involved in the local chapter of NAACP. He is President and she serves as chairperson of the Economic Standing Committee. They were instrumental in organizing the Federated Organizations of Citizens United to Serve (FOCUS) and he serves as chairperson of the Constitution and the Municipal Affairs

committees. Both are members of the Eastside Economic Task Force and are involved in the Black Advisory Council. James and Robbyne are graduates of Leadership Midland.

In addition to her full time job with Texas Instruments, Robbyne is the sole proprietor of Flowery Ideas by Robbyne, a business specializing in interior design, silk flower creations, and promotional items.

She is a board member of the United Way, Casa de Amigos, and Big Brother/Big Sisters. She is also on the Oversight Committee for Midland Introspective 1988 and the Trimble Service Award Selection Committee. Robin was recently honored as Woman-of-the-Year by the Permian Basin Black Chamber of Commerce for outstanding community service and entrepreneurial pursuits.

James has been a teacher for 22 years, the last thirteen as an English instructor at Midland College. He is Vice President of the Black American Cultural Exchange, a United Way Ambassador, and Chairman of the Dr. Martin Luther King Celebration Task Force. He volunteers his time as a tutor in the NAACP Stay in School program and to work in Christmas in April.

At VITA sites, trained volunteers will give you free assistance in filling out the simple Form 1040EZ. The basic 1040 or the shorter 1040A federal income tax package, including the tax forms and the preaddressed label. Also bring wage and earning statements from your employer, and any other financial statements for the past year.

Dismal Legacy on Civil Rights

Ronald Reagan appears determined to go down in history as a President who sought actively to set back the cause of civil rights. How else can one read his veto of the four year, bipartisan effort to restore the reach of antidiscrimination laws narrowed by a Supreme Court ruling? Congress appears to have the votes to override the veto. DeConcini argues for doing so, without delay.

Several Federal civil rights laws operated on the principle that when Federal money flows to one department of a school or hospital, the entire institution should be forbidden to discriminate on the basis of race, sex, age or handicap.

But in 1984, in a case involving Grove City College, the Supreme Court accepted an argument advanced by the Reagan Administration to narrow the principle. A 5-to-3 majority ruled that if a school received a Federal subsidy for student aid, only the financial aid office would be bound by the principle. The school still might discriminate in the athletic department, for example, without losing Federal money.

With the restoration bill, Congress restated its intent that the civil rights laws apply according to the broad understanding that prevailed before the Grove City decision. The votes to approve it demon-

strated a powerful bipartisan consensus: 75 to 14 in the Senate and 315 to 98 in the House.

The lawmakers rejected the Administration's arguments that the proposed legislation would overregulate society. Similarly, they now should turn aside the alternate legislation Mr. Reagan offers to show his commitment to civil rights. This counterproposal is a hodgepodge of amendments already rejected by Congress because they would weaken, not strengthen, civil rights enforcement.

If the performance on Grove City was dismaying, it was not surprising. The Administration has consistently pursued a disruptive policy on civil rights, from its attempt to give tax exemptions to racially discriminatory Bob Jones University to its efforts to weaken the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights.

President Reagan's veto of the civil rights restoration bill enlarges this unhappy record and saddles Republican candidates in the 1988 campaign with the burden of having to explain this latest, stubborn insistence on fighting a lost, and ugly, cause. The mystery is why Mr. Reagan wants to leave for himself so dismal a legacy.

Spring Training

For baseball fans, spring training represents the beginning of the new year. It is a time when they scan the sports pages for reports on their favorite players and teams and try to get some fresh line on the upcoming season.

The goals of spring training haven't changed all that much through the years. The main thing is to get in shape and get rid of the rustiness that comes from a four- or five-month layoff.

In all honesty, players today are in a lot better shape than when I was playing. More players seemed to have beer bellies back 30 years ago. But it still takes hard work to get in shape both physically and mentally for the new season.

I had my first spring training in Waycross, Ga., where the Braves had their minor league camp. We had so many players in camp that we had to wear big numbers like "115a" on our backs. The Waycross camp was crowded even though our Triple A team was training at Kissimmee, Fla., and the big club was at Bradenton, Fla. Remember, back in those days, major league teams had as many as 12-15 farm clubs. That's a lot of players.

I enjoyed spring training for my first seven or eight years, but then it got to be real work. The older you get the tougher it is to pull yourself out of bed each morning. But you have to do it to get in shape.

Other than getting in shape, it is important to work on the finer points of the game. Although you may have been an excellent batter the year before, you should go to spring training with the intention of refining your technique. Every club has a different way of doing things. Much depends on the manager. He may have everyone working on different plays, such as the hit and run or hitting the cutoff man.

Every year it seems that some so-so team will get hot during the spring games and prompt articles on how they may be the surprise team of the year. Spring training won-lost records are very misleading especially when it comes to good veteran ballclubs. They know what they have to do to get ready. As soon as the bell rings starting the new season, those veterans are going to turn it up a notch, and that hot, young team will settle back into the standings. I always went to spring training with the idea of doing the best I could. I knew that if I had a good spring training I could carry that momentum right into the season. **ll**

"THE RESURRECTION OF JESUS CHRIST"

We believe in and accept the sacred and Holy Scriptures upon this subject at their face value. We believe that Christ rose bodily "the third day according to the Scriptures."

THE EVIDENCE OF HIS RESURRECTION.

1. The testimony of the angel. Matthew 28:6-7 says "He is not here: for he is risen as he said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay. And go quickly, and tell His disciples that he is risen from the dead; and, behold, he goeth before you into Galilee; and there shall ye see him."
2. The testimony of Jesus to the apostles. He told them in Luke 24:39 "Behold my hands and my feet, that I am I myself; handle me, and see; for a spirit hath not flesh and bones as ye see me have."
3. His invitation to Thomas in John 20:27 "Then saith he to Thomas, Reach hither thy finger, and behold my hands; and reach hither thy hand, and thrust it into my side: and be not faithless but believing."
4. The declaration of the Holy Scriptures in 1 Corinthians 15:4 "And that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day according to the scriptures." Mark 16:6 says "Ye seek Jesus of Nazareth, which was crucified; he is risen; he is not here: behold the place where they laid him."
5. The empty tomb. Luke 24:1-7 "Now upon the first day of the week, very early in the morning, they came into the sepulchre, bringing the spices which they had prepared, and certain others with them. And they found the stone rolled away from the sepulchre. And they entered in, and found not the body of the Lord Jesus. And it came to pass, as they were much perplexed thereabout, behold, two men stood by them in shining garments: And as they were afraid, and bowed down their faces to the earth, they said unto them, Why seek ye the living among the dead? He is not here, but is risen: remember how he spake unto you when he was yet in Galilee, saying, The Son of man must be delivered into the hands of sinful men, and be crucified, and the third day rise again."
6. The change wrought in the apostles.
 - a. After His death they were disheartened and afraid. John 20:19 says "Then the same day at evening, being the first day of the week, when the doors were shut where the disciples were assembled for fear of the Jews, came Jesus and stood in the midst, and saith unto them, Peace be unto you." Luke 24:37 says "But they were terrified and affrighted, and supposed that they had seen a spirit."
 - b. After He revealed Himself to them in His resurrected body, they were very bold in preaching and witnessing about the resurrection. They would die rather than give up this precious doctrine.
 - (1) Hear what Peter had to say on the day of Pentecost in Acts 2:22-36 "Ye men of Israel, hear these words; Jesus of Nazareth, a man approved of God among you by miracles and wonders and signs, which God did by him in the midst of you, as ye yourselves also know: Him, being delivered by the determinate counsel and foreknowledge of God, ye have taken, and by wicked hands have crucified and slain: Whom God hath raised up, having loosed the pains of death: because it was not possible that he should be holden of it. For David speaketh concerning him, I foresaw the Lord always before my face, for he is on my right hand, that I should not be moved: Therefore did my heart rejoice, and my tongue was glad; moreover also my flesh shall rest in hope: Because thou wilt not leave my soul in hell, neither wilt thou suffer thine Holy One to see corruption. Thou hast made known to me the ways of life; thou shalt make me full of joy with thy countenance. Men and brethren, let me freely speak unto you of the patriarch David, that he is both dead and buried, and his sepulchre is with us unto this day. Therefore being a prophet, and knowing that God had sworn with an oath to him, that the fruit of his loins, according to the flesh, he would raise up Christ to sit on his throne; He seeing this before spake of the resurrection of Christ, that his soul was not left in hell, neither his flesh did see corruption. This Jesus hath God raised up, whereof we all are witnesses. Therefore being by the right hand of God exalted, and having received of the Father the promise of the Holy Ghost, he hath shed forth this, which ye now see and hear. For David is not ascended into the heavens: but he saith himself, The Lord said unto my Lord, sit thou on my right hand. Until I make thy foes thy footstool. Therefore let all the house of Israel know assuredly, that God hath made that same Jesus, whom ye have crucified, both Lord and Christ."
 - (2) Hear Peter again in Acts 3:14-15 "But ye denied the Holy One and the Just, and desired a murderer to be granted unto you; and killed the Prince of life, whom God hath raised from the dead; whereof we are witnesses."
 - (3) Note him before the Sanhedrin and others in Acts 4:10 "Be it known unto you all, and to all the people of Israel, that by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom ye crucified, whom God raised from the dead, even by him doth this man stand here before you whole." Acts 4:33 says "And with great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus: and great grace was upon them all." Also in Acts 5:29-32 It says "Then Peter and the other apostles answered and said, We ought to obey God rather than men. The God of our fathers raised up Jesus, whom ye slew and hanged on a tree. Him hath God exalted with his right hand to be a Prince and a Saviour, for to give repentance to Israel, and forgiveness of sins. And we are his witnesses of these things; and so is also the Holy Ghost, whom God hath given to them that obey him."
7. Stephen saw Jesus standing at the right hand of God in Acts 7:54-56 which reads "When they heard these things, they were cut to the heart, and they gnashed on him with their teeth. But he, being full of the Holy Ghost, looked up steadfastly into heaven, and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing on the right hand of God. And said, Behold, I see the heavens opened, and the Son of man standing on the right hand of God."

THE IMPORTANCE OF THE RESURRECTION.

1. Without it, our preaching and our faith would also be vain. Notice what it says in the book of 1 Corinthians 15:12-14 "Now if Christ be preached that he rose from the dead, how say some among you that there is no resurrection of the dead? But if there be no resurrection of the dead, then is Christ not risen: And if Christ be not risen, then is our preaching vain, and your faith is also vain."
2. Without it, we would be false witnesses for it says in 1 Corinthians 15:15 "Yea, and we are found false witnesses of God; because we have testified of God that he raised up Christ: whom he raised not up, if so be that the dead rise not."
3. Without it, we would still be in our sins. 1 Corinthians 15:16-17 continues to say "For if the dead rise not, then is not Christ raised: And if Christ be not raised, your faith is vain; ye are yet in your sins."
4. Without it, the dead in Christ have perished. 1 Corinthians 15:18 says "Then they also which are fallen asleep in Christ are perished."
5. Without it, all our hope would be in this life only, and this would make us of all men most miserable. In closing, 1 Corinthians 15:19 says "If in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of all men most miserable. But now is Christ risen from the dead."
