Free Tax Assistance Is Available

Free tax assistance is available through VITA, the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program sponsored by the Internal Revenue Service February 8 through April 11, the IRS said.

VITA helps lower income, elderly, handicapped and non-English speaking taxpayers fill out Form 1040EZ, Form 1040A, or a basic Form 1040. Volunteers also alert taxpayers to be also alert taxpayers to the special credits and deductions for which they may be eligible, such as the child care and earned income credits, the tax credit for the elderly, and deductions for certain medical and dental expenses.

However, VITA volunteers do not handle complicated tax matters, according to the IRS.

Taxpayers coming to Mae Simmons Community Center should bring this

year's tax package, usually received through the mail, wage and earnings statements (Form W-2) from all employers, the interest statements received from

banks (Form 1099), a copy of last year's tax returns, if available, and any other relevant information concerning income and expenses.

Opportunities At TTU This Summer

TTU-Prep, an academically intensive program designed for quality students, will be offered during the Summer of 1988 by the Department of Mathematics at Texas Tech University.

TTU-PREP is designed for all high-ability students (regardless of sex, race, or economic status) who are currently (1987-1988 School Year) in the 8th, 9th, 10th, or 11th grade, and who are interested, or think that they might be interested in, an engineering, a mathematical, or a scientific career. The program includes courses in mathematics, engineering, science, and computer science, with emphasis on problem-solving. Besides experiencing some college level courses, the participants will hear invited speakers from several disciplines discuss current and future professional engineering, mathematical, and scientific opportunities, and explain their research. The program is conducted as a mini-college to provide the

participants a college experience.

All participants will be expected to spend the hours between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. engaged in class work, seminars, and research each Monday through Thursday between June 13 and August 4. All participants will attend daily classes in which they will be given assignments and examinations. All participants are expected to do the work required to maintain a C average in the PREP program.

No tuition or fees are charged for this program. Certain students who come from limited income earning families will be able to earn up to \$700.00 while attending this program.

All applications must be postmarked no later than March 25, 1988. Successful candidates will be notified by April 10, 1988, and they will have until April 25, 1988, to indicate acceptance.

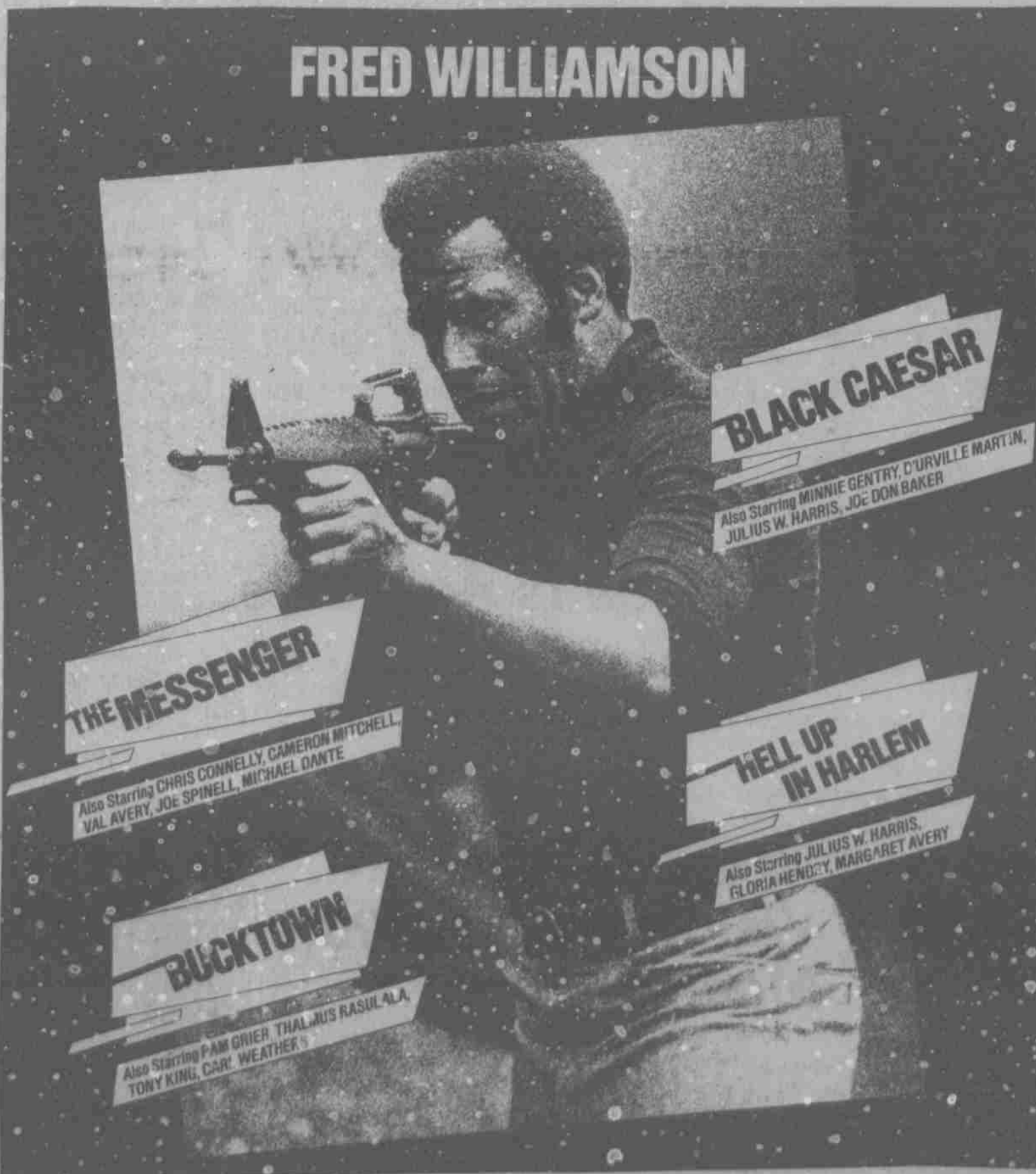

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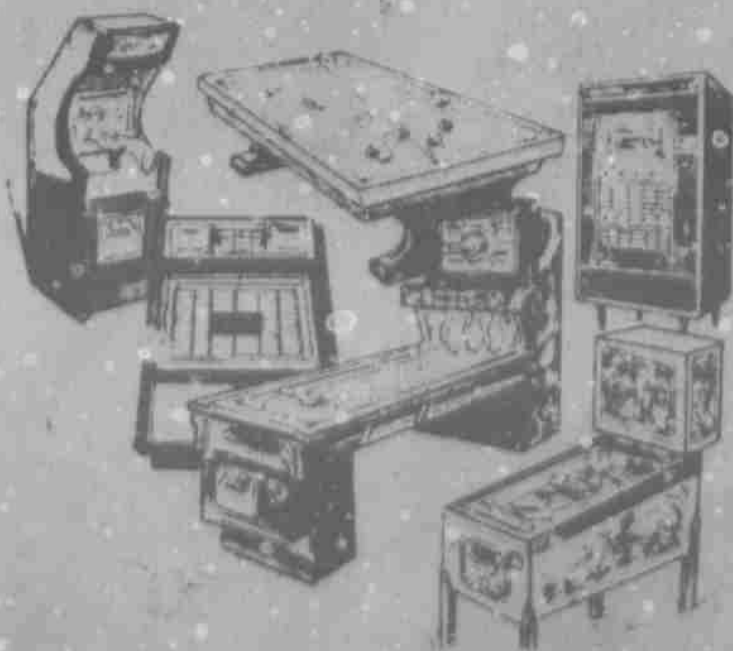

It Needs To Be Said

The time is NOW for a serious and dedicated effort by the entire community to bring to a Halt, the rash of house burglaries our area is experiencing. Neighborhood Watch Programs are great so long as there is someone at home. With the thieves ever watching for us to leave home, our personal property is an easy prey. Alarms, bars, dogs don't seem to be doing a good enough job preventing burglaries. The thieves are like headaches that fall upon you when you least expect.

When you go into the alley to empty your trash and look both ways in the alley, have you ever seen anyone in either direction? When you are in your alley, except for city vehicles, how many times have you seen a car or truck? Yet, people are reporting their homes being broken in daily. How do the thieves move the stolen merchandise? In my daily travels within the community, I have never seen anyone walking down the street with a T. V., VCR or a bag that could contain stolen property, have you? I have never seen anyone loading a car or truck, that was not moving the entire house. Therefore, how do the thieves transport their stolen wares?

One major contributor to our homes being such an easy target is the wooden fences. The privacy fence allows the thief ample cover to work on bars and windows without worry of being seen by a neighbor. Look out your back window, can you see into your neighbor's yard? No, you can't. Therefore, even if someone was broken in and you looked out your window, you would not see anything. Once that thief enters a yard, they are home free.

A conclusion of mind, our thieves are closer to the scene, they are within walking distance, they are not strangers in the community, our thieves are people that can watch our daily routine without arousing our suspicion. How else can you explain our homes being ripped off without the culprit being seen, that they know exactly when our households are empty of people. And in some cases, they know exactly where the good stuff is.

One of my first recommendations is to remove those wooden fences that provide the cover thieves need to gain entry into our homes. Next, we can think like a thief and prepare our homes to make illegal entry a great deal more difficult. We can vary our daily routine as much as possible to keep the thieves off-guard. Those of you who are home during the day time, occasional trips into the alley just to look around may help. We can start paying more attention to who, what and when about our neighborhood. We can start pointing some fingers at those individuals that bring "hot goods" to us to buy. They may not be the thief, but they sure know who is. And parents, if that child of yours is not working but generally has money, where is it coming from? We all work too hard to buy things for our homes to have some lazy, good-for-nothing, lay in wait to steal our personal properties and damage our homes. There are some folks within our community that have been robbed as many as a half a dozen times, now you know those folks are killing mad.

Being our community is drug infested, too many must steal to support their habit. This need for drugs makes them bolder, braver and more dangerous. But, the drugs also make them less alert and more prone to make a mistake if the house is difficult to get into. For the majority they look for easy marks, where entry can be made

- criminal liability;
- an elderly person may request protective services;
- district courts can issue orders for emergency protection services for 72 hours, which may be renewed for another 72 hours.

KINDS OF ABUSE

The elderly can be abused by their children or other family members and they can be abused by caretakers including nursing home personnel.

Abuse takes many forms: it can be psychological or physical; it can range from neglect of basic dietary needs to sexual assault.

Evidence of psychological abuse is hard for untrained observers to recognize. But many warning signs of physical abuse, neglect and sexual abuse are visible and apparent.

Frequent injuries, burns, bruises in unusual patterns, or passive and withdrawn behavior are warning signs of physical abuse.

Obvious weight loss, lack of personal cleanliness, dirty or torn clothes, and obvious fatigue and listlessness are warning signs of neglect.

Evidence of injury to the genital area, difficulty in sitting or walking, or physical signs of sexually transmitted diseases are warning signs of sexual abuse.

HOW TO REPORT

If you know of a case of abuse, exploitation or neglect of an elderly Texan, report it to your nearest office of the Department of Human Services. If you cannot make the report during normal working hours (Mon.-Fri. 8 a.m. - 5 p.m.), call the 24-Hour Abuse Hotline: 1/800/252-5400 or the Nursing Home Hotline if it occurred in a nursing home; 1/800/252-9106.

WHAT THE LAW SAYS

Chapter 48 of the Texas Human Resources Code deals with abuse of the elderly. It provides that:

- the report may be made orally or in writing;
- DHS will investigate within 24 hours of getting the report;
- anyone reporting in good faith is immune from civil or

Investigations into abuse of the elderly by the Texas Department of Human Services have risen by more than 150% since 1983. DHS estimates that at least 110,000 incidents of elder abuse occur every year in Texas, many of which go unreported.

million Texans age 60 or older in 1980 and projects 2.4 million by 1990 and more than 3 million by the year 2000. Abuse of the elderly will undoubtedly increase as well, unless we do something about it.

Texas law requires any person who has reasonable cause to believe an elderly or disabled person has

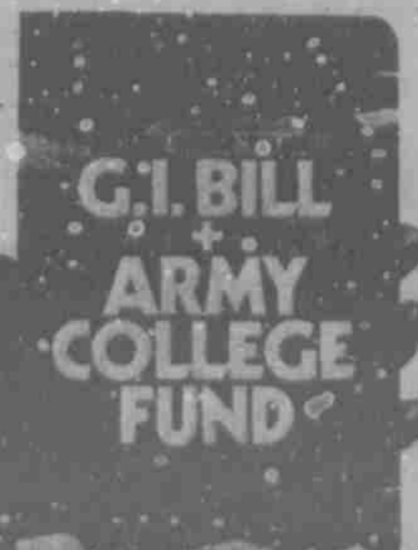
quickly. We must do whatever is legally possible to protect our homes. The police can not be everywhere, therefore, the people of the community must send the message to the thieves, "our homes are not shopping markets," that they are OFF LIMITS, that you enter at your own risk.

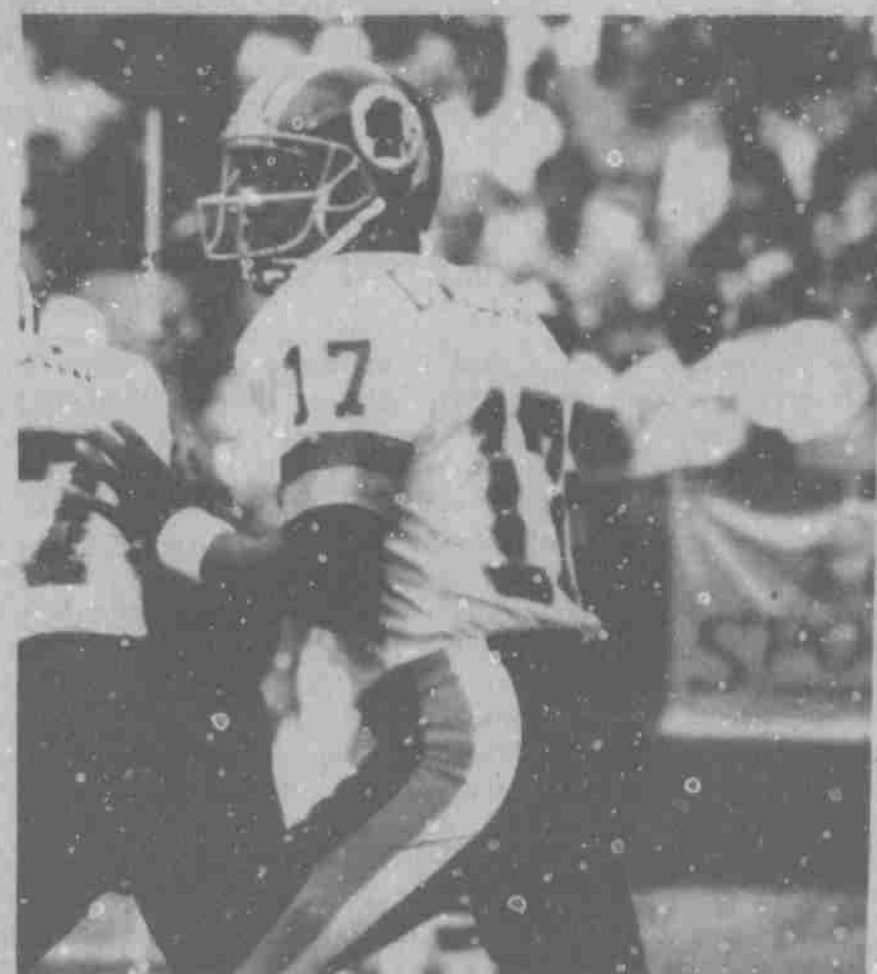

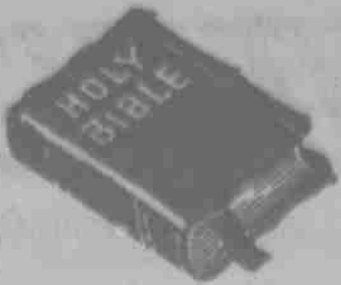

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WHEN JESUS IS COMING AGAIN

As stated last month, I read an article entitled "Jesus is Coming Again". The writer of this article stated that he "Did not know when he is coming". The Word Of God, the Bible, tells us clearly when Jesus is coming again, thereby we can know when He is coming again.

Verse 42 says "Watch therefore: for ye know not what hour your Lord doth come." Verse 44 says "Therefore be ye also ready: for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh." Verse 48 says "But and I: that evil servant shall say in his heart, My lord delayeth his coming:" And verse 50 says "The lord of that servant shall come in a day when he looketh not for him, and in an hour that he is not aware of. And shall cut him asunder, and appoint him his portion with the hypocrites: there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth." Jesus is coming SUDDENLY. Mark 13:35-37 says "Watch ye therefore; for ye know not when the master of the house cometh, at even, or at midnight, or at the cockcrowing, or in the morning: lest coming suddenly he find you sleeping. And what I say unto you I say unto all, Watch." 2 Thessalonians 2:2 says "that the day of Christ is at hand." James 5:7-8 says "Be patient therefore, brethren, unto the coming of the Lord...for the coming of the Lord draweth nigh." The Lord told John in Revelation 3:11 "Behold, I come quickly." The Lord also told John in the last book and the last chapter in the Word of God in Revelation 22:6 "These sayings are faithful and true: and the Lord God of the holy prophets sent his angel to show unto his servants the things which must shortly be done. Behold I come quickly." The Lord says in verse 10 "Seal not the sayings of the prophecy of this book: for the time is at hand." Notice is hereby given that an opportunity for a public hearing will be afforded in the Citibus Conference Room, 801 Texas Avenue, at 12:30 p. m., Tuesday, March 3, 1988, for the purpose of considering projects for which financial assistance is being sought from the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964, as amended, generally described as follows:

CAPITAL GRANT Program of Projects: The project will consist of the purchase of three lift-equipped vans and miscellaneous shop equipment.

Cost of this portion of the grant is estimated at \$134,971. Of this amount, the City of Lubbock will provide \$26,994 and \$107,977 will come from UMTA Section 9 funds. The project is proposed to begin October 1, 1988.

TECHNICAL STUDY GRANT Program of Projects: The project will consist of five elements: alternatives financial and operational scenarios, monitor system and service development; maintenance of eligibility; develop a comprehensive long-range service plan; purchase commuter system.

Cost of this portion of the grant is estimated at \$75,000. Of this amount, the City of Lubbock will provide \$15,000 and \$60,000 will come from UMTA Section 9 funds. The project is proposed to begin October 1, 1988.

OPERATING ASSISTANCE GRANT Program of Projects: This program will consist of the transportation services in the Lubbock urbanized area provided by City Transit Management Company, Inc., from October 1, 1988, to September 30, 1989.

Cost of this portion of the grant is estimated at \$1,700,000, of which \$558,900 will be provided by the City of Lubbock, \$291,100 from non-farebox revenues, and \$850,000 from UMTA Section 9 funds.

No persons, families, or businesses will be displaced by these projects. There will be no significant environmental impact upon the area. The proposed projects are in conformance with comprehensive land use and transportation plans for the area.

The City of Lubbock will provide both a demand response system, which will serve the needs of the elderly and handicapped and half-fare on all regular transit routes.

Interested persons or agencies may submit orally or in writing evidence and recommendations with respect to said projects on or before March 3, 1988.

The preliminary program of projects is also available to the public at the Citibus offices and the final program of projects will also be available to the public at the Citibus office, 801 Texas Avenue.
