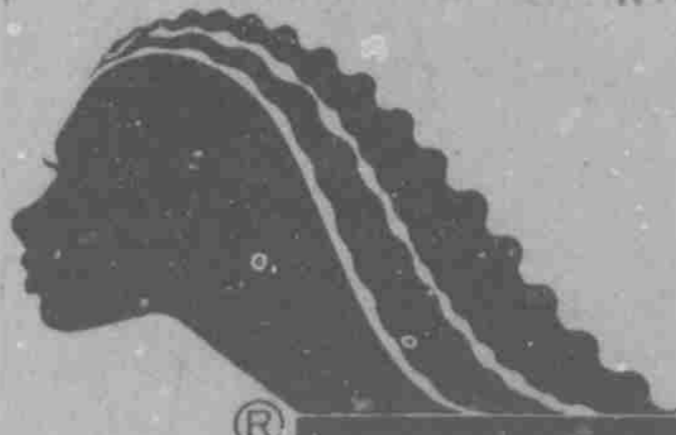

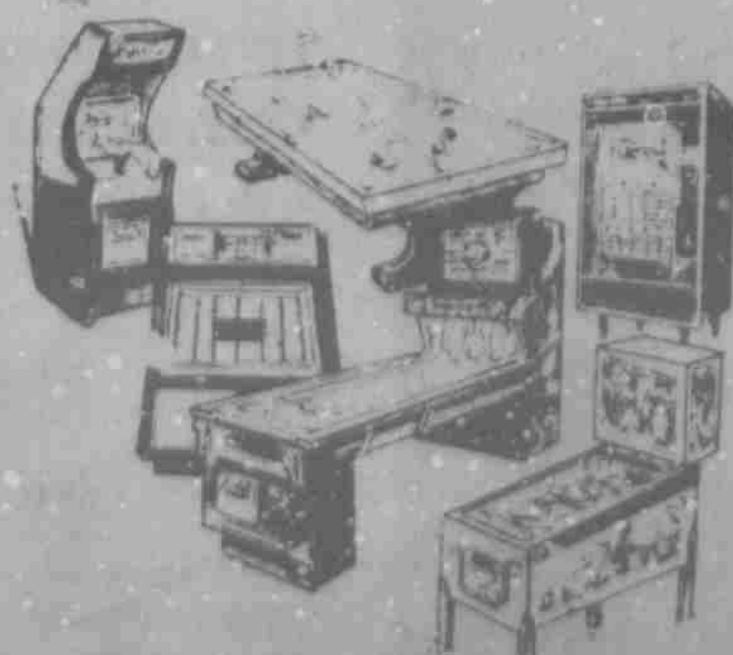
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Hope Deliverance Set Dedication Services

We The People Our Expanding Democracy

The U.S. Constitution, now in its 200th year, is rightly viewed as the heart of American democracy. Yet the document approved in 1787 created a system of representative government very different from the one we know today.

Neither blacks nor women were given the right to vote in the original constitution. Even the ability of white males to participate in elections was limited by the common practice of a "poll tax." Many poor, would-be voters were excluded because of their inability to pay the tax on the right to vote.

Almost forgotten today is that until 1913 senators were not chosen by the people in direct elections. The Senate, as originally created, was to be a check on the democratically elected House of Representatives. The founding fathers feared granting too much power to common citizens. Therefore, senators were chosen by state legislatures.

In the world of 1787, democracy was an experiment uncertain of success. Many openly feared the "rule of the mob," and to achieve ratification, cautious compromises were necessary. Yet the men who met in Philadelphia in 1787 bravely set America on the path to democracy. They had the genius to create a document and a government that contains within itself the mechanism for change. The Constitution of 1787 was the beginning, not the culmination, of democracy in America.

From that beginning, democratic participation has expanded through amendment with the right to vote guaranteed to all races in 1870 and to women in 1920. The 17th Amendment required senators to be elected by direct vote of the people and the 24th Amendment outlawed poll taxes in 1964.

Some significant changes did not require a constitutional amendment. Most voters take for granted the right to cast a secret ballot. Yet, the "Australian" secret ballot did not become common until our constitution was a century old. Before that time, a voter faced retribution from his employer or local politicians if he voted against the candidates they supported.

Famed Supreme Court Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes once wrote, "Our Constitution is an experiment, as all life is an experiment." Now all Americans are free, active participants in this ongoing experiment in democracy. ■

The Blues Is Back

Every few years it seems, there is talk in the music world of a blues revival. But the blues always remained unrevised, its best musicians working the same old clubs. The talk now, however, is for real. In 1988 the blues is news.

Blues music, which grew out of the field hollers and spirituals of slaves, became the popular music among American blacks in the 1930s, '40s and '50s. The music was the framework on which jazz, rock 'n' roll and soul music were built. But as the more commercial rock 'n' roll and soul music grew in popularity, blues musicians fell on tough times. It is only recently that many blues artists have started getting the national attention they deserve.

"The blues seem to follow me everywhere I go," bluesman Little Milton sang almost 30 years ago. Today, blues artists are shown in full-page magazine advertisements. The music is showing up on movie and television soundtracks, commercials and, for the first time in years, on popular radio. Last year, singer-guitarist Robert Cray's single "Smoking Gun" broke into the Billboard Top 25 and a video gained heavy play on cable television's MTV.

Cray's success is just the tip of the iceberg. Longtime blues artists like Albert Collins are enjoying a greatly increased popularity. Last year, Collins appeared on "Late Night With David Letterman," in a wine cooler commercial and in the hit movie "Adventures in Babysitting," besides sticking to his rigorous road schedule. Ken Mortost, publicist for Collins' record label, Alligator Records, says that such opportunities are more available to blues artists today.

"Blues in the mainstream is much more visible than it has ever been," says Mortost. "I don't know that many blues musicians will ever get rich, but the biggest thing they're

getting out of this is the recognition they've worked so hard for."

The recognition is coming in large part from young audiences that are new to the blues. While many fans were first exposed to the music by artists like Robert Cray, Stevie Ray Vaughan and the Fabulous Thunderbirds, all blues artists are now benefiting.

"They've hardly left a stone unturned in looking for these blues artists," says Hammond Scott, owner of New Orleans' Black Top Records. Black Top recently released a new record by Nappy Brown, a singer whose career has spanned four decades.

Recognition is coming to even the most traditional blues musicians. Last November, the acoustic blues team of "Bowling Green" John Cephas and "Harmonica" Phil Wiggins took home the National Blues Foundation's "Entertainers Of The Year" honors.

"I think the award is indicative of the overall increased popularity of the blues," Wiggins says.

Despite their higher public profiles, blues artists remain a close knit family. When the "Queen of the Blues," Koko Taylor, and her band were involved in an automobile accident recently, many of the blues' biggest stars turned out to play a benefit concert in Chicago to help cover the group's medical expenses. Robert Cray and his band took time off from recording a new album to join artists like Albert Collins, Lonnie Brooks, Son Seals and Kim Wilson of the Fabulous Thunderbirds for the benefit. The concert was a sell-out.

But is the current blues revival just a fad that will pass and leave many of the blues' finest musicians again scraping for work? Hammond Scott doesn't think it is.

"I think that blues is winning so many fans now that I can see this thing going on for a long time," Scott says. "Everything is coming up roses." ■

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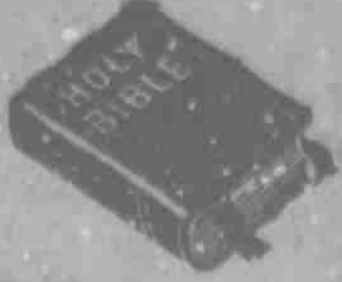

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"THE TRIBULATION PERIOD"

We believe that there will be a great 7 year tribulation period, a time of trouble, such as there never was since the beginning of the world to this time, or ever shall be. This great tribulation period will begin between the resurrection and rapture of the saints and Christ's coming to reign with His saints for a thousand years. We do not believe that the church or any of the saints of this dispensation will go through the tribulation period.

WHAT THE RAPTURED SAINTS WILL BE DOING DURING THE TRIBULATION PERIOD.

1. The saints will be rewarded at the Judgment Seat of Christ. Romans 14:10 says that "We shall all stand before the Judgment seat of Christ;" and in II Corinthians 5:10 it says "For we must all appear before the Judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad." Notice that the Word of God is speaking to Christians only.
2. The marriage supper of the Lamb to local Churches. Revelation 19:7-9 says "Let us be glad and rejoice, and give honour to him: for the marriage of the Lamb is come, and his wife hath made herself ready. And to her was granted that she should be arrayed in fine linen, clean and white: for the fine linen is the righteousness of saints. And he saith unto me, Write, Blessed are they which are called unto the marriage supper of the Lamb. And he saith unto me, These are the true sayings of God." The Apostle Paul speaks to the local church which was at Ephesus and tells them that the Church is the Body of Christ and therefore is the Bride of Christ. Ephesians 5:30-32 says "We are members of his body, of his flesh, and of his bones. For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall be joined unto his wife, and they two shall be one flesh. This is a great mystery: but I speak concerning Christ and the church." Verse 23 of this same chapter says "The husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church: and he is the saviour of the body." Also, Ephesians 1:22-23 says that God "gave him to be the head over all things to the church, which is his body," and another local church at Colosse was told in Colossians 1:18 "He is the head of the body, the church:"

THE REIGN OF THE ANTI-CHRIST.

1. The tribulation period will be reigned by the Anti-Christ and covers the 7 year period. Revelation chapter 6 through chapter 18 covers the tribulation period and the reign of the Anti-Christ.
2. The church is never mentioned a single time in all of this period. Why? Because the church has been raptured out of this sinful world into heaven to ever be with the Lord.

THE RUIN OF THE ANTI-CHRIST.

Revelation 19:11 through 20:15 John says "I saw heaven opened, and behold a white horse; and he that sat upon him was called Faithful and True, and in righteousness he doth judge and make war. His eyes were as a flame of fire, and on his head were many crowns; and he had a name written, that no man knew, but he himself. And he was clothed with a vesture dipped in blood: and his name is called The Word of God. And the armies which were in heaven followed him upon white horses, clothed in fine linen, white and clean. And out of his mouth goeth a sharp sword, that with it he should smite the nations: and he shall rule them with a rod of iron: and he treadeth the winepress of the fierceness and wrath of Almighty God. And he hath on his vesture and on his thigh a name written, KING OF KINGS, AND LORD OF LORDS. And I saw an angel standing in the sun; and he cried with a loud voice, saying to all the fowls that fly in the midst of heaven, Come and gather yourselves together unto the supper of the great God; That ye may eat the flesh of kings, and the flesh of captains, and the flesh of mighty men, and the flesh of horses, and of them that sit on them, and the flesh of all men, both free and bond, both small and great. And I saw the beast, and the kings of the earth, and their armies, gathered together to make war against him that sat on the horse, and against his army. And the beast was taken, and with him the false prophet that wrought miracles before him, with which he deceived them that had received the mark of the beast, and them that worshipped his image. These both were cast alive into the lake of fire burning with brimstone. And the remnant were slain with the sword of him that sat upon the horse, which sword proceeded out of his mouth: and all the fowls were filled with their flesh. And I saw an angel come down from heaven, having the key of the bottomless pit and a great chain in his hand. And he laid hold on the dragon, that old serpent, which is the Devil, and Satan, and bound him a thousand years, and cast him into the bottomless pit, and shut him up, and set a seal upon him, that he should deceive the nations no more, till the thousand years should be fulfilled: and after that he must be loosed a little season.
