The reunion will come to an end on Sunday afternoon where the family will gather for a farewell bar-b-que at of

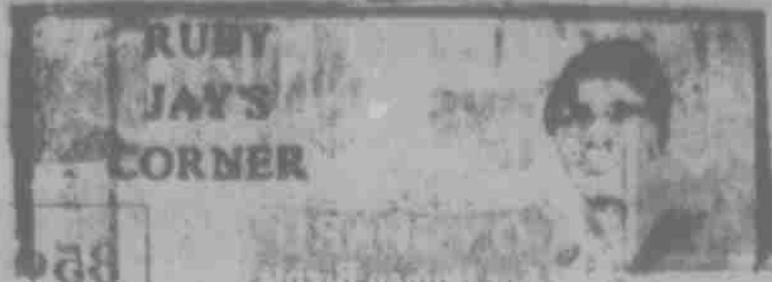

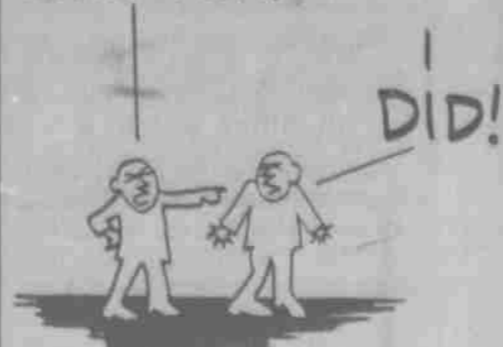

### AT ISSUE

#### Should Public Schools Require Uniforms?

William Howard is principal of Cherry Hill Elementary School in Baltimore, Md., one of the first public schools in a large urban district to initiate the wearing of school uniforms.



YES

Should public schools require students to wear uniforms?

Yes. The social and economic pressures of life today on students and their parents strongly indicate that public schools should require students to wear uniforms or something similar to school. Peer and sometimes parental pressure, along with business advertisements, often place stress and strain on many students to wear and parents to purchase the "in" fads and fashions.

Accounts of students being treated unfairly, hurt, made to feel inferior, mistreated and even murdered over clothing can be documented. Wearing uniforms can practically eliminate these behaviors and eliminate one of the greatest discriminators among students—the competition for clothing.

We have demonstrated at Cherry Hill Elementary School that wearing uniforms is a good idea that can work in any school and can produce positive benefits for the students, parents, school and community. I believe that students who feel good or at least neutral about their clothing tend to feel good about themselves. Thus, they are often better learners.

What effect would this have on students?

Students who wear uniforms in schools where practically all students are uniformed tend to be more self-assured and focused on learning. Student pride, self-esteem, attendance, achievement, human relations and the climate for learning all tend to improve when students wear uniforms. At the same time, student suspensions decrease.

What about parents?

When parents examine the advantages and the disadvantages of wearing uniforms, many of them quickly discover that several significant advantages surface and willingly give their overwhelming support to the idea. They soon discover that uniforms are an attractive, economical, tireless way of dressing their children for school. And parents of such children take pride in their children's appearance and successes.

Should public schools require students to wear uniforms?

No. In several areas of our country, young people are being robbed or killed for wearing expensive designer clothing or athletic apparel. Some school boards have resorted to an easy, but ineffective, answer: uniforms. Dress codes strip students of their rights to free expression and individuality—values schools should teach, not repress. It is important that students have an appreciation of their own individuality as well as the constitutional values that protect that individuality. The Supreme Court has said that students don't leave their rights of expression at the schoolhouse door. Rather, those rights can be abridged only if they substantially disrupt the educational process. Uniforms have their place in the armed forces—where we want to teach soldiers to follow orders, submit to authority and conform to regulations. Ban every form of individual expression and what you have left are not students, but soldiers. Orthodoxy in apparel is inconsistent with the American way. Those who advocate uniforms might be happier with students who look alike, act alike and think alike, but our society will be the real loser.

What effect would this have on students?

Students learn best in an environment free of undue, inappropriate pressures and violence. But dress codes cannot create an environment that schools have otherwise failed to ensure. Further, dress codes will not affect students' apparel after school when most crimes are likely to be committed. Schools should encourage individual expression and protect children from violence.

What about parents?

Requiring uniforms will pose a financial burden on poor families, and abridge the rights of those who don't purchase apparel for religious reasons. Such regulations may well provide a false sense of security for parents worried about their children's safety and learning environment. But requiring uniformity in dress in an attempt to control crime is like banning purses to prevent pickpockets.

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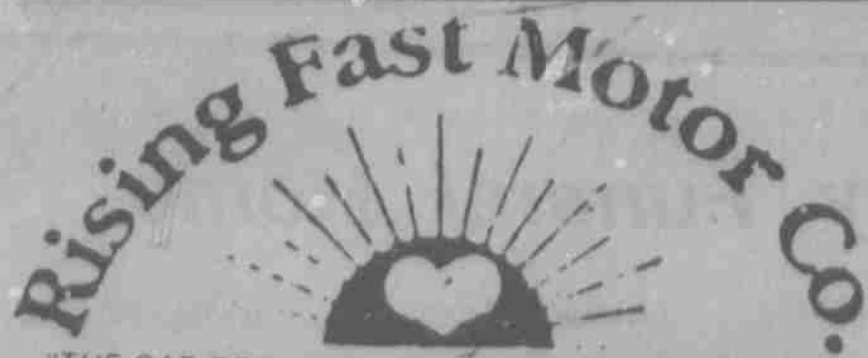

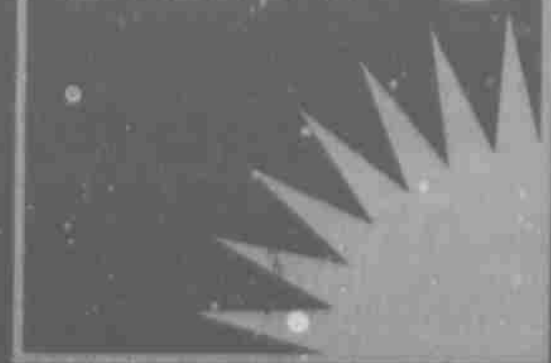

When one reads the miraculous story concerning the demon-possessed man in St. Mark 5:1-20, the narrative seems to be arranged in scenes in which the point of interest shifts from the man to the herd of swine, then to the residents of the city and back again to the man, almost like a drama in four acts.

A close observation of the story will reveal that beside the account of the Gerasene demoniac being restored to health and peace by Jesus, there is a second miracle. This miracle centers around the dramatic moment in the narrative when Jesus has been told to leave the neighborhood and has started to get into the boat. The Gerasene man who had been possessed looked first at Jesus and his disciples as they were preparing to depart. Next he looked at the townspeople who were filled with alarm in the presence of the supernatural and who urged Jesus to leave. A moment of panic threaten a relapse into manic behavior and in desperation the former demon-possessed man begged Jesus to go with him. But can you believe this: The Master-Teacher refused the man's request and said to him, "Go home to your family and tell them how much the Lord has done for you, and how he has had mercy on you" (verse 19 New International Version). And the next sentence says, "So the man went away and began to tell in the Decapolis (a group of Ten Greek cities) how much Jesus had done for him. And all the people were amazed."

The second miracle is the mysterious action of God which commissioned the man to "go and tell". This miracle moved the man from a sense of utter panic to the point of enjoying the opportunity to tell what Jesus had done for him.

In a troubled world like ours, we need people like this demon-possessed man to come forth and tell others about their life transforming experiences that radically altered their outlook on life. Will you share your personal experience of transformation and deliverance so that others may come to know the living power of Christ?

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## Post-Enumeration Survey Underway

The 1990 Post-Enumeration Survey, a major vehicle for measuring the completeness of the 1990 Decennial Census, is underway.

The idea behind a pes is quite simple. After the basic Census Enumeration, interviewers return to the field in a sample of blocks throughout the nation. Over 2,000 interviewers will be employed for the operation. They will visit about 150,000 housing units and try to identify all people living in them at the time of the Pes.

PES. Since the PES is used to measure the completeness of the Census, interviewing cannot start until nonresponse follow-up is finished for an area.

The interviewers are scheduled to be completed in five weeks within the period from the end of June through the end of July/Mid-August.

An adult member of each household will be asked for the names and characteristics (age, race, sex and date of birth) of each resident and where each individual lived on April 1, Census Day. The interview is expected to last about 15 minutes per household. After the PES interviews come back, they are matched to the Census. Most will match, but there will be some people in the Census and not in the PES and vice versa. Most of these people will be followed up again from mid-November through mid-December.

From the percentages not counted and incorrectly counted in the Census, we can estimate the degree to which the population of the nation was undercounted during the Census. Furthermore, we can compute and study these undercount estimates for different sections of the country and for different age, sex and racial groups.

The Post-Enumeration

Survey is part of the regularly planned Census evaluation effort of each Decennial Census. Such a survey has been taken after each Census since 1950.

A second way of measuring the completeness of the Census will be to analyze sources of information, such as those found in administrative records, other than the Census of 1990 itself, to estimate how good the coverage of the total population was. This second method is referred to as Demographic Analysis.

The results of all these efforts, coupled with the results of studies that will tell us how good the PES and the Demographic Analysis were, will provide information necessary to decide whether or not to adjust the Census counts. If the Census is to be adjusted, the announcement will be made no later than July 15, 1991.
