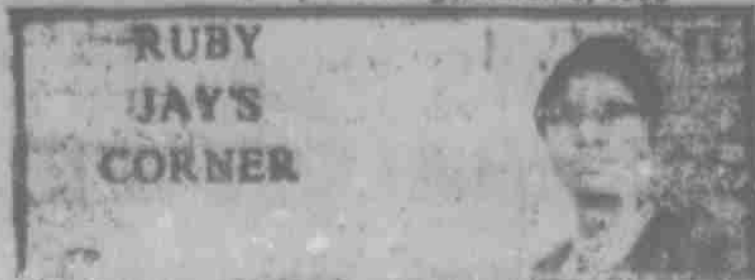

### Over-the-Counter Products Cause Inhalant Deaths

The Texas Attorney General's Office has recently taken action to stop the sales of a dangerous drug, commonly known by its users as "poppers." The use of the drug has resulted in deaths and violent crimes in Texas.

The products are advertised as room odorizers and liquid incense, but have a putrid scent. They contain a chemical — butyl nitrite or isopropyl nitrite. A spray product, marketed as Ethyl Gaz and Medusa, contains ethyl chloride, and has no scent.

#### SALES FOCUS ON SEXUAL ORIENTATION

These items are sold in sexually-oriented businesses and "head shops" under names such as Black Jack, Cobra, Blast, Bullet, Cum, Rush, Locker Room, Hardware, Thrust, Double Eagle, Quicksilver and Texas Gold.

These products are sold for one purpose only — to be inhaled and supposedly to get high and to increase sexual pleasure. However, the advertising doesn't tell you that these products have caused a number of heart-related deaths and cancer.

In Austin, one young State Capitol employee was killed in an automobile accident while using ethyl chloride. It has caused others to act violently and commit murder.

#### BAN OF PRODUCTS SOUGHT

The Attorney General's Office has notified one California manufacturer that the company will be sued under State and Federal laws for distributing the product in Texas. And further action has been taken to halt

the sales of these products in Dallas, Houston, McAllen and San Antonio.

The actions were taken pursuant to the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices and Consumer Protection Act because of the misleading labeling of these products. If the intended use was listed on the item, it would be banned under the Federal Food and Drug Act.

The Attorney General's Office is warning all manufacturers, distributors and retailers of products containing derivatives of alkyl nitrites, or ethyl chloride or ethylene chloride to remove these products or face litigation.

#### LEGAL SOLVENTS ALSO ABUSED

Inhalant abuse of products with legitimate purposes — such as spray paint, glue and typewriter correction fluid — is also increasing. As with the "room odorizers," these legitimate products can produce a cheap high and have led to death and violence.

In 1988, for example, nine men, ages 12 through 30, all high on solvents and typewriter correction fluid, burglarized and beat to death an 86-year-old woman in her Austin home. The law enforcement community is calling for more public attention to the problem of inhalants as "gateway" drugs that lead to use of harder drugs and serious crimes.

Inhalants are cheap and easily available to youngsters with limited resources. But the results of inhalant abuse are not cheap. As growing statistics indicate, the cost is very high. They are destroying families and ruining young lives.



## FACTS & FALLACIES

When it comes to your safety, knowing the difference between fact and fallacy could steer you in the right direction.

*Fact or fallacy?* You don't need a safety belt when you're traveling at low speeds or going on a short trip. That's a fallacy. More than 80 percent of all accidents occur at speeds less than 40 mph. Fatalities involving non-belted occupants of cars have been recorded at speeds as low as 12 mph. In addition, three out of four accidents causing death occur within 25 miles of home.

Examination could detect 85 percent of these tumors. No other screen-

ing test has a higher rate of return than palpation, the examination of the rectum by the doctor's fingers. The test costs nothing when part of a routine physical examination, and it simultaneously checks for rectal tumors and collects materials for a stool occult blood test, the most cost-effective test in medicine. It should be a part of all physical examinations of men 50 or older.

We would also propose teaching men in this age group about the importance of diet in cancer prevention. Low-fat diets may help prevent cancer of the prostate. A lower incidence of prostate cancer has also been linked to consumption of green and yellow vegetables, which are rich in vitamin A. The high-fiber, low-fat diet common among Orientals also seems to promote a low incidence of cancer of the prostate.

### Simple Test Can Detect Prostate Cancer

Most people are shocked to learn that only 14 percent of women over 50 have their breasts mammogrammed yearly. And men are neglecting another lifesaving test. Men are literally sitting on the problem—prostate cancer. It's the third-largest cancer killer of men, and the test that can help prevent these deaths is simple and inexpensive. We know we could

stop many prostate cancers from spreading to the bones if only more men would have their prostates palpated.

In a *Saturday Evening Post* cancer-prevention survey of approximately 4,000 men, an astounding 62 percent of the men over age 60 had not had a rectal examination within the last year. Even more disconcerting was that

32 percent—nearly 1/3 of the sample—had never had a rectal examination.

The prostate is a circular gland about the size of a walnut. It surrounds the outlet of the bladder and produces most of the seminal fluid.

Each year the 76,000 cases of prostate cancer diagnosed result in 25,000 deaths. Yet a simple ex-

## NAACP REAFFIRMS ITS ENDORSEMENT AND SUPPORT OF THE 1990 CENSUS



Benjamin L. Hooks, Executive Director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), has called upon every Black American to be counted in the upcoming 1990 census and urged NAACP branches throughout the nation to participate fully in helping achieve the most accurate and complete census ever.

Population and housing figures from the 1990 census will be used to allocate billions of dollars each year in federal, state, and local funds for many programs that directly benefit Black

Americans, including education, social services, housing, and public safety. Dr. Hooks pointed out that the population totals from the 1990 census will become the basis for reapportionment of seats in the U.S. House of Representatives, State legislatures and local election districts.

In its joint venture with the Census Bureau, the NAACP emphasizes that under the law of Confidentiality no agency such as welfare, Immigration and Naturalization Service, Internal Revenue Service, the courts, police or any other agency can obtain information about individuals from census questionnaires.

In its reaffirmation of support for the 1990 census, the NAACP urges its branches, state and area conferences and youth chapters to support the Census Bureau's efforts in its promotion of public-awareness and education programs and its recruitment of minority community residents for census jobs, and to assist in any other way possible to ensure an accurate and complete census count.

The Executive Director urges everyone to BE COUNTED in the 1990 census.

"A near fatal automobile accident in 1948 left the famous "baseball catcher", Roy Campanella a semi-invalid. His autobiography tells about a discovery that marked a turning point in his life. He wrote: "The doctors and nurses tried to get me interested in things. They'd turn on the radio and read the sports pages to me. They ever bought me a TV set, but I didn't want to watch it. I just lay on my back, my brain full of panic. There were times when I was close to hysterics. I know I cried myself to sleep many a night." "One day the doctor came in, asked the nurse to leave and closed the door. I couldn't turn my head. I couldn't see him. High Blood Pressure

Everybody needs blood pressure. It's what pushes your blood through your arteries, capillaries and veins. Nobody needs high blood pressure. If the push is too great, your heart, brain, kidneys and eyes could suffer.


A normal blood pressure reading is one of 120/80 or lower. One of 140/90 is considered the upper limit of normal. Anything over that can be considered dangerously high blood pressure.

An estimated 35 million Americans have high blood pressure, also known as hypertension. Many don't even know they have it. Everyone over the age of three should have his or her blood pressure checked every

year. Diagnosis is simple, painless and instant. Physicians have drugs that can treat the condition.
