Iola Moore Broussard became well-known in the Houston area while working at various clubs, hotels, and restaurants.

In 1985, Iola Moore Broussard began performing at Bill Key's Touch of Class in Denver. She performed there for three years in well known clubs and hotels, before making Denver her new home. Currently, she is performing with Kevin Smith, who has quite an impressionable career himself, having played with Donny Hathaway, Charlie Pride and Stu Gardner. The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal ran an article in last Thursday's paper about the Lubbock Independent School District attempting to do something about the elementary schools in the district that score the lowest on the standardized exams given to the kids. One of the schools is Dupree Elementary. It is also the most overcrowded elementary school in the district.

My daughter will be starting to kindergarten in the fall. She is currently attending pre-kindergarten at Dupree.

I have been known to stick my nose into the LISD's business from time to time. Guess what?

The Supreme Court ruled last Thursday that the Voting Rights Act applies to judicial elections in Texas. The 6-3 decision overruled the 14-1 decision of the Reagan-Bush Fifth Circuit that said it applied to elections but not to judicial elections.

And very soon, hopefully, there is going to be a minority district judge sitting on the bench in the Lubbock courthouse.

Dear Editor:

In your deliberation of the redistricting plans submitted by the Lubbock County respectfully request that you carefully consider Plan A, as I have, and endorse that plan without reservations.

Plan A puts voting blocks 19, 20, and 26 together in precinct 3 and groups the black dominated voting blocks together in that precinct. Plan B, on the other hand, moves blocks 19 and 26 into Precinct 3 into Precinct 2.

Plan B would dilute black voting strength, denying fair representation of our community of 16,871 constituents.

Under plan A, the black community will compose 20% of the voting constituency of Precinct 3, providing an opportunity for us to have a voice in our government.

As the first and only black elected county official, I feel that the only way to maximize black voting strength is to keep voting blocks 6, 40, 70, and 20 together. Had it not been for these voting boxes being together, I would not have won my election.

Mandatory Retirement for State Judges?

Louis P. Peck, a Vermont Supreme Court Justice, successfully fought the Vermont state law on mandatory retirement for judges last year. Having tested the law and emerged victorious, Justice Peck has since retired voluntarily.

Should there be a mandatory retirement age for state judges?

Yes. There are several reasons supporting mandatory retirement age provisions for state judges. First, these provisions are justified in drawing a line at an age when there is often a lessening in mental and physical abilities because society has an interest in a judicial system of the highest caliber. Second, setting a mandatory retirement age avoids the difficult and unpleasant decisions of determining which judges after a certain age are physically and mentally qualified and which are not. Third, mandatory retirement increases the opportunities for qualified younger persons with fresh ideas and techniques to enter the judiciary. Fourth, it assures predictability and ease in establishing and administering judges' pension plans. Fifth, it depoliticizes judicial selection and retention by lessening incentives for judges to time their retirements with anticipated political changes and by avoiding the unseemly prospect of judges trading retirement for other considerations, such as increased retirement pay and benefits.

How should the Age and Discrimination in Employment Act (ADEA) apply to judges?

The ADEA does not pre-empt state law governing selection, retention or tenure for state court judges. In addition, the ADEA exempts persons "elected to public office" and "appointees on the policymaking level." State judges are exempt since they, in some cases, stand for election as well as make policy in deciding cases and supervising judicial systems. Finally, the 17th Amendment prohibits application of the ADEA to state court judges.

What about the equal protection clause of the 14th Amendment?

There is not a single case where a state mandatory retirement provision has been invalidated under the 14th Amendment. In addition, the reasons for mandatory retirement of state judges show that the mandatory retirement provision is a rational method by which states may serve their legitimate goals of maintaining a highly qualified and vigorous state judiciary.

Should there be a mandatory retirement age for state judges?

No. The argument that there could be judges who become so advanced in years that they cannot properly perform their duties is, at best, an alarmist point of view not justified by experience. The "problem" is, in fact, relatively rare. The federal system of life tenure, as well as the clear competency of most retired judges, both tend to corroborate this claim. Most state judges are appointed by the governor or elected by popular vote for limited terms. Retention for successive terms is subject to popular vote in some states, and legislative approval in some others. If a particular judge has become clearly incompetent because of the aging process, it is unlikely he will be retained. In short, the only test is the ability to perform the duties of the position. I may become senile, but I shouldn't be made so overnight as a matter of law.

How should the Age and Discrimination in Employment Act (ADEA) apply to judges?

This question embraces the very issue presently pending before the United States Supreme Court in a case originating in the state of Missouri. If the Supreme Court affirms the circuit decision that Missouri's mandatory retirement for state judges does not violate the ADEA, I would hope that Congress might be persuaded to amend the act to extend protection to judges. Regardless of the outcome of the pending litigation, I believe state judges and justices are already within the definition of employees protected by the act.

What about the equal protection clause of the 14th Amendment?

Given expanding life expectancy and the resulting increase in the number of older people, the time has come for courts to reevaluate current interpretations of the equal protection clause as a matter of constitutional law. Forcing a large and growing population of a physically healthy and mentally astute segment of society to retire is no more valid than discrimination based on sex, race, religion or national origin. Physical and mental competency to perform is the only legitimate test in age cases. All the others are discriminatory and should be relegated to the museums of historical curios like witchcraft and slavery. M

Habitat for Lubbock is one member of an international association of non-profit organizations to help people in need live in decent houses and in decent communities. Families who qualify purchase their homes at cost and no interest is charged whatsoever.

The houses are built by a combination of hired labor, volunteers, homebuyers and other members of the Habitat Community.

To qualify, the families:

1. have minimum income of \$650 per month and maximum of \$1,200 per month.
2. must be willing to invest "sweat equity" of 500 hours in building the house.
3. must have reasonable employment history and reasonably good credit.
4. must have resided in the City of Lubbock for the past year.

Lawn care may be taxable

If you hire someone to take care of your lawn and landscaping, you may have to pay sales tax for their services. There is an exemption on lawn services provided by neighborhood kids under the age of 18 and older adults age 65 or older.

Youngsters don't have to collect sales tax on yard work as long as their income is less than \$1,000 during the preceding calendar quarter.

Lawn care services by older adults qualify for tax exemption if their total receipts for lawn care and landscaping during the previous four calendar quarters were \$5,000 or less.

Lawn care services don't include mowing street and highway rights-of-way for government agencies, mowing cemeteries, mowing or fertilizing farm or forest land and trimming trees away from utility lines. Although similar to lawn maintenance, these services are not lawn care and aren't taxable.

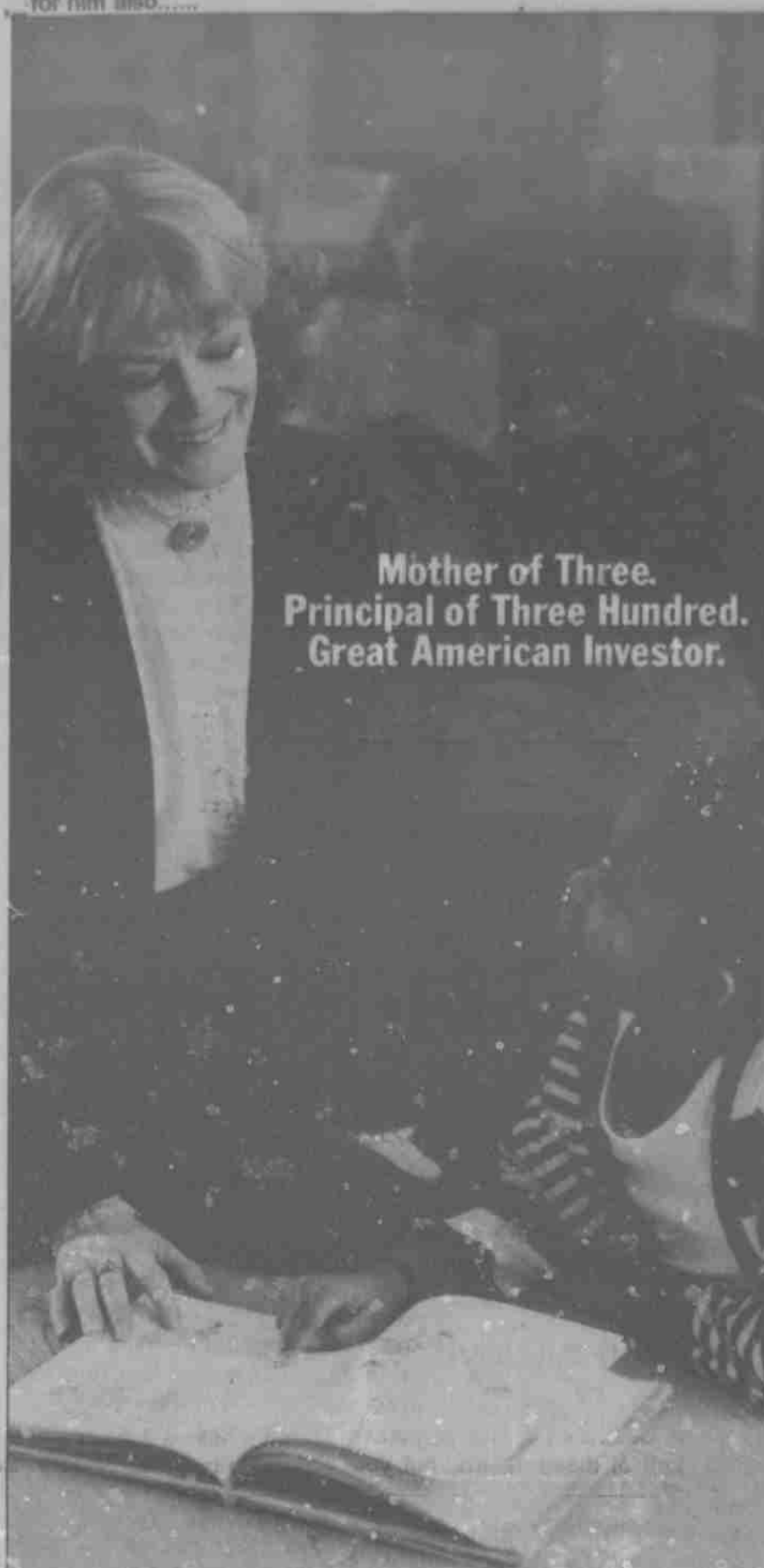

"Where is boasting then? It is excluded," Romans 3:27. Religious pride can blind people to genuine spirituality. This was the problem with Jews in the first century of the Christian era. Their boastfulness took the form of religious conceit. They could not boast of being rich or strong; but when their fortunes were at the lowest they had one source of self-importance. In being the selected favorites of heaven, they found consolation so flattering that they looked down in disdain on the Gentiles, often referring to them as "dogs." Many resisted Christianity, because it refuted or discredited the false notion they held. The Jews boasted they had the law of God. They boasted that they were able to keep it. They boasted that they were righteous because of their ability to keep it.

Having reached the end of his argument, namely, that God, through the sacrifice of Jesus Christ is able to justify all who trust in Him; the Apostle Paul suddenly halts, as though he were looking for something that had vanished, and abruptly asks, "Where then is the boasting of the Jews?" The answer being "there is no more room left for it." What shuts it out? Not the law of works which is understood to prescribe obedience as a means of reward. No, boasting is really excluded only under the new and better way of being just before God. That new principle of acceptance with God cuts self-righteousness down to the roots as nothing else does.

How does the Apostle Paul words speak to us? This vicious boastfulness is not a thing essentially Jewish. There is a natural tendency to brag about one's self and one's accomplishments. But let us be aware that, when it comes to spiritual relationship with God, there is no room for boasting. He bestows grace, and we receive it. All glory belongs to Him alone.

Count It All Joy!! by Annie Day

Count it all joy, my brethren when you meet various trials. (James 1:2). The Christian should seek joy in every experience. When forced to the sick bed, there is joy to be derived, for we are relieved from a pressing schedule and forced into time for needed reflection. When we are under financial pressure, there is joy to be experienced, for we acquire trust and dependence upon God. When we are prosperous there is great joy in helping others. Into life comes a temptation, an affliction, an unwanted experience.

James tells us how to meet such difficulty: "Count it all joy." The Greek word for "count it" has to do with the internal attitude. The idea is "to think forward." As you live in the present think forward to the future. Gloom now, but glory in the days to come. As the psalmist said, "Weeping may endure for a night, but joy

cometh in the morning (Psa 113:9). Christianity has large reserves.

The growth of the soul is like the growth of a tree. The major part of a tree is undergoing. Similarly, the Christian life grows deep. Storms will whip its branches furiously, but there is a source of life far deeper. So, goes the Book of James, solid practical advice, giving to know how to deal with life. It's our prayer that this special issue on this practical New Testament book will be a blessing to us.



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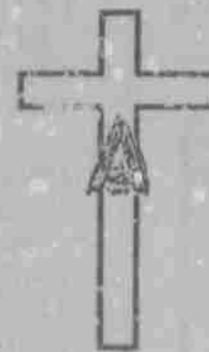

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The Comeback Trail

There has never been an active baseball player who was a member of baseball's Hall of Fame. A player isn't even eligible for election to the Hall of Fame until he has been in retirement for at least five years. This year there is one old-timer who is trying to do the impossible.

Baltimore's Jim Palmer was a very good pitcher — so good that he was voted into the baseball Hall of Fame five years after his original retirement. But now, at the age of 45, Jim is back in spring training with the Orioles, hoping to make the team.

I won't say it is impossible, because I've seen too many things happen that people said could never happen. But it is hard for me to picture anyone coming back to play any major-league sport — baseball, basketball or football — after five years in retirement. You just can't lay off that long and then come back and get the adrenalin flowing again.

Forty-five is very old for a baseball player, but the five-year layoff will hurt Jim more than his age. I played with several pitchers who continued well into their '40s. Hoyt Wilhelm didn't retire until he was nearly 50 years of age, but he played every year. He didn't stop for several years and then return.

Sports health care has made great advancements in recent years, and Jim will be well taken care of in the training room. He will be in good physical shape.

As an outfielder, I'd have to say that it would be easier for a pitcher to make this comeback than a hitter. A starting pitcher only goes out onto the field once every four days, and that would make it easier on a physical basis.

The mental challenge may be greater than the physical. Baseball is still a mind game. You have to be mentally, as well as physically, ready to get out of bed and face going to the ballpark. Your mind and body are trained over time until it is second nature. That readiness does not come overnight, and it is not something you maintain in retirement.

A pitcher also has to mentally prepare for every team and every batter. Most of the hitters Palmer used to pitch against are no longer around. He will be pitching against kids who were in diapers when he was in his prime. He will be like a rookie, without all the intricate knowledge of each batter that makes veteran pitchers such competitors.

Jim Palmer was a great pitcher, and I wish him well. If anyone can do it, he can. **tl**

GRILLED RAINBOW TROUT WITH APRICOT SALSA

- 1 cup diced fresh or canned apricots
- 1/4 cup diced fresh or canned pineapple
- 1 small avocado, diced (1/4 cup)
- 1/4 cup diced red bell pepper
- 3 tablespoons lime juice
- 1 teaspoon finely chopped cilantro
- 4 Clear Springs® Brand Idaho Rainbow Trout Fillets, butterflied (6 oz. each)
- Coarsely ground black pepper, to taste

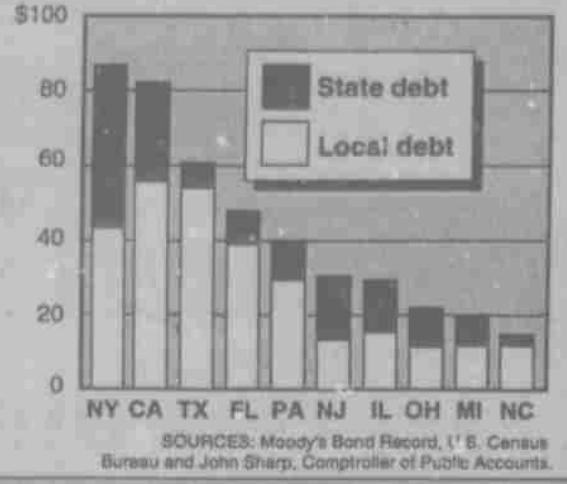
