### Elementary School Enrolment Continues To Increase

Enrollment in the nation's elementary schools increased to 28.2 million from 1985 to 1988, reversing a slide that lasted nearly 14 years, according to a report by the Commerce Department's Census Bureau.

High school enrollment, which continued to decline, totaled 13.1 million in 1988. This was 17 percent below the mid-1970's peak. About 8 percent of high school students were enrolled in private schools.

The proposition of persons aged 18 to 24 who were high school graduates grew from 1968 to 1988. The greatest increase, 17 percent, was among Blacks. Among 18 to 24 year olds, 82 percent of Whites, 75 percent of Blacks, and 55 percent of Hispanics were high school graduates in

1988. College enrollment totaled 13.1 million in 1988, an increase of about 400,000 from 1987. Some 39 percent of college students in 1988 were 25 or older, compared with 34 percent in 1980. About 36 percent of all

undergraduates were enrolled in two-year colleges in 1988. Whites were more likely than Blacks or Hispanics to be enrolled in college. The proportions for high school graduates aged 18 to 24 were 38 percent, 28 percent

and 31 percent. Other highlights from the report are: There were 61.1 million children age 3 or over enrolled in nursery school through college in 1988. Some 2.8 million students were enrolled in private elementary schools, about 10 percent of all elementary students. The annual high school dropout rate in 1988 was 4.8 percent, including 4.7 percent for Whites, 6.3 percent for Blacks and 10.5 percent for Hispanics. The difference between Whites and Blacks was not statistically significant. Between 1978 and 1988, the dropout rates decreased for all groups except Hispanics. Some 4.5 million persons were enrolled in vocational courses in 1988. About 55 percent were women and 78 percent were 25 or older. As in all surveys, the data are subject to sampling variability and other sources of error.

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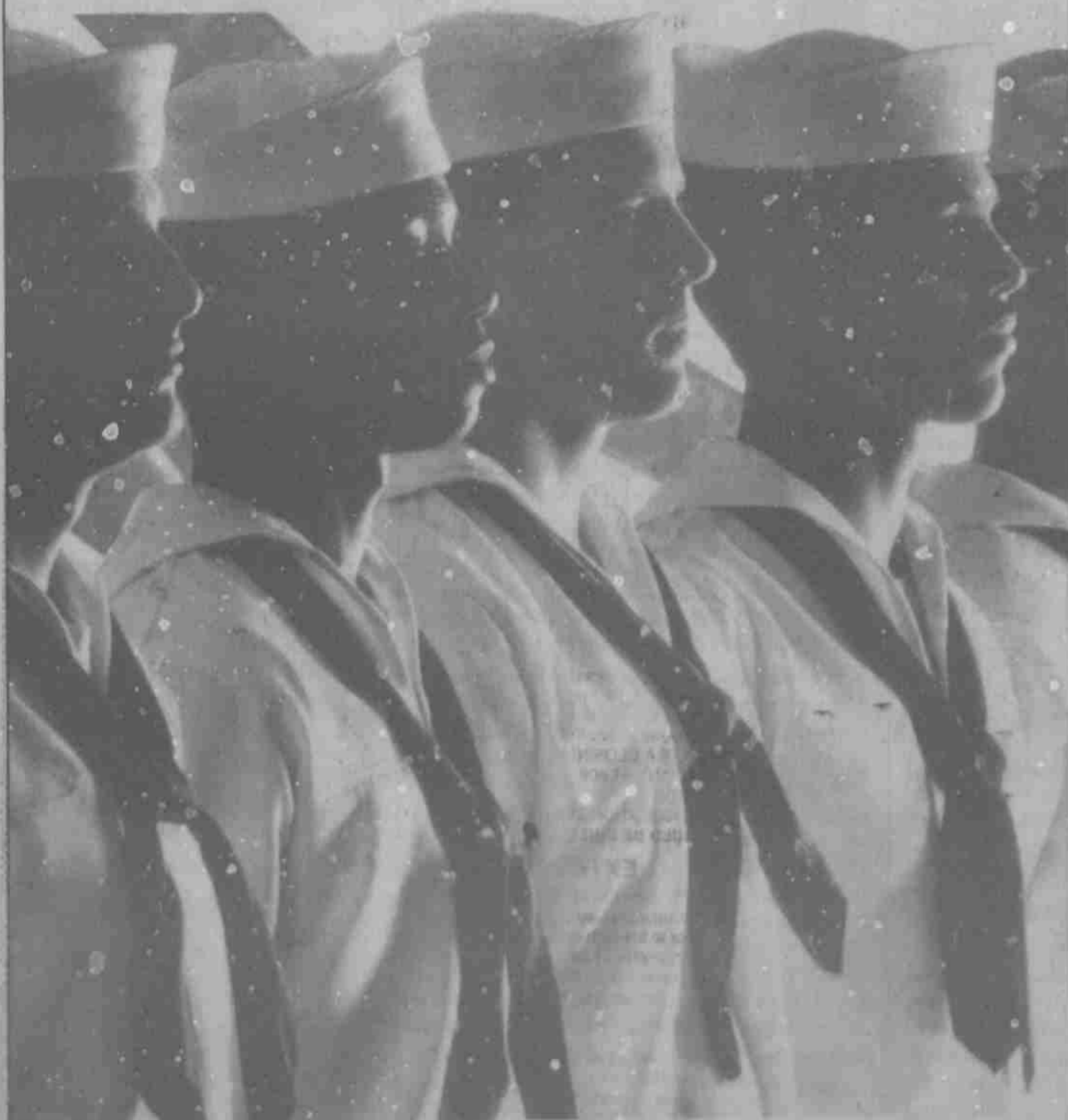

On January 15, 1990 banking officials and community leaders in Boston announced the creation of a \$1 billion dollar plan to increase the availability of loans, construction funds, and mortgages to minority communities in Massachusetts.

Negotiations are ongoing in a lawsuit in Dallas against the Dallas Housing Authority over their segregation practices. It is being rumored that the settlement to end racism in public housing in Dallas will cost \$120 million.

If that still is a problem in the All-American city, I wonder what might be going on in other places less sensitive about racial matters.

According to a March 4, 1990 Lubbock Avalanche-Journal article covering a speech by Texas Land Commissioner Gary Mauro, he stated there were a number of barriers that still cry over today that affect the progress of minorities in our society. Housing and school segregation was one of the barriers. "Lubbock was regarded as the fifth most segregated city in America in the late 1960's," according to Mauro.

The speech was given at Texas Tech before the Hispanic State Conference sponsored by Texas Tech's Mexican-American Student Association.

"Justice for Black people will not flow into society merely from court decisions nor from fountains of political oratory. Nor will a few token changes quell all the tempestuous yearnings of millions of disadvantaged



Black people. White America must recognize that justice for Black people cannot be achieved without radical changes in the structure of our society. The comfortable, the entrenched, the privileged cannot continue to tremble at the prospect of change in the status quo.

When millions of people have been cheated for centuries, restitution is a costly process. Inferior education, poor housing, unemployment, inadequate health care -- each is a bitter component of the oppression that has been our heritage. Each will require billions of dollars to correct. Justice so long deferred has accumulated interest and its cost for this society will be

## AT ISSUE

### Flat Income Tax Rate?

YES

Should we have a flat income tax rate?

Yes. In the interests of fairness, simplicity, and economic growth, there should be a single low tax rate on personal income. In the past 10 years, top tax rates have fallen from 70 percent to the current 28 percent, helping fuel our nation's longest period of peacetime economic growth. It is time to discard the antiquated notion that the coercive power of government should be used to more harshly tax upper-income individuals. All around the world people have recognized that capitalism, not big government and the politics of envy, is the path to freedom and prosperity. As part of this revolution, and also to strengthen our international competitiveness, the United States should further reform our tax code, creating a single low tax rate on income. For those concerned about the deficit, the cut could be "paid for" by eliminating or restricting various credits, deductions and exemptions. This would have a side benefit of dramatically simplifying the tax code, a goal not achieved when the 1986 Tax Reform Act was enacted.

How would this affect the amount of taxes paid by various income groups?

That depends on the tax rate selected. A 15 percent rate should not significantly alter the tax burden on most low- and middle-income taxpayers. Upper-income individuals, however, would benefit from a lower tax rate, but also would be the group most impacted by the loss of tax deductions since they are the most likely to itemize tax returns. Thus, the greatest change would not necessarily occur between income groups, but within the high-income group. Those with few deductions would benefit since their relatively unsheltered income would be taxed at a lower rate while those with lots of deductions would pay more because the amount of their income subject to the tax would rise significantly.

Should we have a flat income tax rate?

There are really two questions: Should we have a single rate, and will we? My answer to both is no. The public would not buy such a scheme, nor should it.

That taxes should be based on ability to pay has been an accepted canon of taxation at least since Adam Smith advocated such an approach in the "Wealth of Nations." Though the measurement of ability to pay and what it implies for income tax rates are debatable, there is widespread consensus that graduated rates are implied.

How would this affect the amount of taxes paid by various income groups?

The latest available data are for 1986, just before we changed the income tax law, including rates. In that year, those with taxable returns paid tax equal to 19.2 percent of taxable income. Those with taxable income below \$20,000 paid an average tax rate of 9.4 percent, while those with incomes in excess of \$100,000 paid 40.9 percent. A flat rate of 19.2 percent would have more than doubled the tax of the first group and reduced the tax of the second group by more than 50 percent; those with incomes between \$20,000 and \$100,000 would have experienced an increase in tax of about 10 percent. Essentially, families with incomes below \$50,000 would have paid more on average than those with incomes above \$75,000.

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 changes this picture somewhat. No family now pays an average tax rate of more than 28 percent. Thus, the maximum tax reduction experienced by high-income families would be at most one-third. But the basic fact remains: moving to a flat rate would represent an enormous shift of burden from the top of the income distribution to those lower down. That explains why this change will not occur. lol

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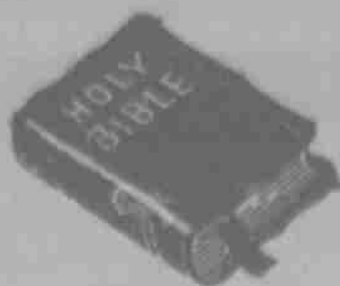

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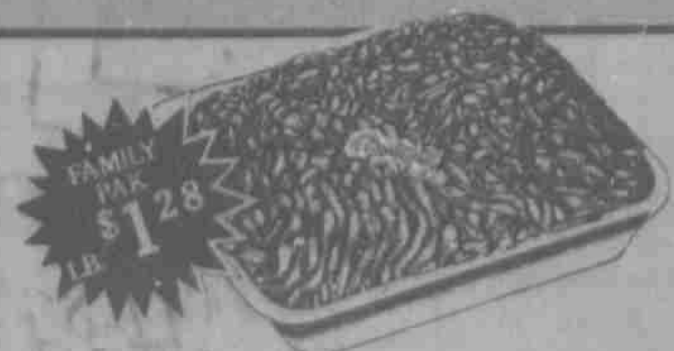
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
