College enrollment totaled 13.1 million in 1988, an increase of about 400,000 from 1987. Some 39 percent of college students in 1988 were 25 or older, compared with 34 percent in 1980. About 36 percent of all undergraduates were enrolled in two-year colleges in 1988.

Whites were more likely than Blacks or Hispanics to be enrolled in college. The proportions for high school graduates aged 18 to 24 were 38 percent, 28 nercent

There were 61.1 million children age 3 or over enrolled in nursery school through college in 1988.

Some 2.8 million students were enrolled in private elementary schools, about 10 percent of all elementary students.

The annual high school dropout rate in 1988was 4.8 dropout rate in 1988 was 4.8 percent, including 4.7 percent for Whites, 6.3 percent for Blacks and 10.5 percent for Hispanics. The difference between Whites and Blacks was not statistically significant. Between 1978 and 1988, the dropout rates decreased for all groups except Hispanics.

Some 4.5 million persons were enrolled in vocational courses in 1988. About 55 percent were women and 78 percent were 25 or older.

As in all surveys, the data are subject to sampling variability and other sources of error.



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
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

On January 15, 1990 banking officials and community leaders in Boston announced the creation of a \$1 billion dollar plan to increase the availability of loans, construction funds, and mortgages to minority communities in Massachusetts.

Negotiations are onging in a lawsuit in Dallas against the Dallas Housing Authority over their segregation practices. It is being rumored that the settlement to end racism in public housing in Dallas will cost \$120 million.

If that still is a problem in the All-American city, I wonder what might be going on in other places less sensitive about racial matters.

According to a March 4, 1990 Lubbook Avalanche-Journal article covering a speech by Texas Land Commissioner Gary Mauro, he stated there were a number of barriers that still crry over today that affect the progress of minorities in our society. Housing and school segregation was one of the barriers. "Lubbock was regarded as the fifth most segregated city in America in the late 1960's," according to Mauro.

The speech was given at Texas Tech before the Hispanic State Conference sponsored by Texas Tech's Mexican-American Student Association.

"Justice for Black people will not flow into society merely from court decisions nor from fountains of political oratory. Nor will a few token changes quell all the tempestuous yearnings of millions of disadvantaged

Should we have a flat income tax rate?

There are really two questions: Should we have a single rate, and will we? My answer to both is no. The public would not buy such a scheme, nor

That taxes should be based on ability to pay has been an accepted canon of taxation at least since Adam Smith advocated such an approach in the 'Wealth of Nations."/Though the measurement of ability to pay and what it implies for income tax rates are debatable, there is widespread consensus that graduated rates are implied.

How would this affect the amount of taxes paid by various income groups?

The latest available data are for 1986, just before we changed the income tax law, including rates. In that year, those with taxable returns paid tax equal to 19.2 percept of taxable income. Those with taxable income below \$20,000 paid an average tax rate of 9.4 percent, while those with incomes in excess of \$100,000 paid 40.9 percent. A flat rate of 19.2 percent would have more than doubled the tax of the first group and reduced the tax of the second group by more than 50 percent; those with incomes between \$20,000 and \$100,000 would have experienced an increase an (ax of about 10 percent. Fasentially, families with incomes below \$50,000 would have paid more on average than those with income, above \$75,000.

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 changes this picture somewhat. No family now pays an average tax rate of more than 28 percent. Thus, the maximum tax reduction experienced by high-income families would be at out one third. But the braid fact remains; moving to a flat rate would represent an enormous shift of burden from the top of the income distribution to those lower down. That explains why this change will not occur. Id

Have you let Jesus deliver your life? If not, then why not try him today.

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




