





EHS Yearbood Needs Help!

As the year roars to a start, Estacado year book staffers' purpose is to produce a quality memory book containing all of the school's events.

Sales of the yearbook dropped 50% to rer the last two years; only 130 people, including teachers, bought yearbooks. This was less than one-eighth of the school's population.

Last year's book was only sold to 60 students, a figure that takes all the energy out of the production of a yearbook. In other words, Estacado Publications worked 100% of the time for only 8-10% of the student body.

Those who are not involved in the production of the 160 page history often fail to appreciate the value of their yearbook.

One major problem is that students do not feel they need a yearbook. After all, they know who they go to school with. But if readers could appreciate how a yearbook can be used 5, 10 or 20 years down the line, to remind them of people and memories of the most special time in life, maybe this attitude would change.

Students, however, have valid arguments about the value of owning a yearbook. Mainly they complain about the high price. But did you know that the Estacado High School yearbook is the cheapest out of all the high schools in Lubbook? The regular price of the Matador Yearbook is \$23. It is about \$10-\$13 dollars less expensive than other yearbooks in this city.

The advisor and staff of the yearbook puts The Matador sale for several days for the price of 15 to 17 dollars. Hower, during sales days, there are very few who take advantge.

Another reason students don't buy the yearbook is because it a have to wait for more than a year to receive it. Ever since-there has been a yearbook made here at Estacado the student body has always needed to come back the next year to get it.

As times have changed so has the publications at Estacado. Starting this year the yearbook will be delivered the same year it is being made. The staff if publications are working overtime to turn in all deadlines to receive The Matador by May of 1990.

Estacado Publications received a new Apple Macintosh which has new designs and techniques to make them exciting yearbooks. The Matador was already in motion before school started. It will contain new features about the student body, not only if classmoms and book work, but if the student's life and how this , tar's theme: MORE THAN MEETS THE EYE, shows how everyone at Estacado is much different than what people think. The discount sales of The Matador Yearbook will run from November 1st to November 3rd. The student body will have a chance to purchase this yearbook for only \$15 on the November 1st or \$17 on the 2nd and 3rd. From November 6th on, the yearbook will go back to its regular price of \$23.



Public School Selection—Parental Choice?

Joe Naihan, former public school tercher and administrator, is a senior fellow at the University of Mumesota's Humphrey Institute. He recently edited "Public Schools by Choice" (Meyer-Stone Books).



Would parental "choice" of public schools benefit all children?

Yes. More than 60 percent of the public favors expanding choice among public schools. In East Harlem, N.Y., Cambridge, Mass., Prince Georges County, Md., and the entire state of Minnesota, increasing choice among public schools helped stimulate widespread improvements. In the best public school choice plans, students of all abilities do better in school, graduation rates increase, parents are more involved, and educator morale is higher. In each district cited above, public school choice helped produce significant, system-wide test score improvement. Allowing Minnesota high school juniors and seniors to attend colleges or universities full or part time benefitted both youngsters who stayed in high school and those who enrolled in college. Why? High schools statewide improved programs - for example, quadrupling the number of advanced placement courses offered - since they no longer had a "captive

How would this affect integration?

Well-designed public school choice programs helped produce more effective integration programs. While 60 percent of the general public endorses public school choice, support is even higher among racial minorities and low-income parents, who now have the fewest options. The best choice programs include racial balance guidelines, equal access to schools and extensive parent information and courseling programs.

How would choice affect efforts to improve other school programs?

The best choice programs complement other relorms. That's why after initially opposing efforts to expand public school choice in Minnesota, 61 percent of the teachers in the Minnesota Education Association now like the idea. Expanding choice for parents increased opportunities for educators to help create distinctive programs from which families can select. We have learned that there is no one best school for all students, or all educators.

benefit all children? All children, no - not until our poorer public schools get the resources and help they need to make parents want to choose them. Lots of choice plans assume that if parents could switch schools, 'bad'' schools would shape up or empty out. But that assumes "good" schools have lots of empty places and are willing to take in kids from failing schools. There's little evidence of that, Generally, choice plans enable a few kids - the most talented or those with the most motivated parents - to switch into a better school. That's great for them, but it further destroys the quality of education for the majority of kids left behind in schools that have lost their resources and their role-model students.

How would this affect integration?

Some choice plans have helped integration; many others have not. It depends on the type of plan. The most difficult integration problem we face is not so much racial as economic class. Choice plans may benefit middle-class minorities, but few have helped poorer children. Their parents often don't have the information to make choices—and wealthier public schools, like private schools, aren't very eager to admit these kids. Let's face it: Until poorer schools are improved, middle-class parents of all races aren't going to choose them.

hiow would choice affect efforts to improve other school programs?

If choice is part of an overall improvement strategy, it could lead to distinctive, quality programs that meet the needs of diverse students. Unfortunately, many choice proponents act as if choice by itself will lead to improvement.

It won't. It would be like rearranging a few seats on the Titunic: a few people might get a better view, but the ship — public education will sink. Iil

Trauma Caused Ry

Tootbrush Abresion

Abrasion is the wearing away or loss of tooth structure that is not caused by occlusal or incloal wear. The most common cause of abraision is incorrect use of the tootbrush. The defect produced by incorrect brushing is situated on the buccal (cheek side) and labial (lip side) surfaces. It is most often a sharply defined, wedge-shaped. groove which is initially produced at the juction of the crown (enamel) portion of the looth and the root, called the cementcenamel junction, after having forced the gum toward the root. The extent and size of the defect depend on how long and vigorously the incorrect brushing is continued. This type of abrasion invariably stimulates the formation of secondary dentin produced by the culp (nerve) when trauma is caused to the tooth. The process of destruction may continue through the secondary dentin, severing the tooth in two and still leaving a vital pulp (nerve) in the root portion. These teeth maybe extermely sensitive to cold and heat While destruction of normal enamle is not readily accomplished by brushing, it is, in some instances, markedly enhanced by the ingestion of solids and liquids that are highly acid and by regurgitation of vomiting of acids from the stomach. If caught early enough these abrasions can be repaired. See your dentist if you suspect your teeth of having these types of abrasion. Your dentist can also instruct you on the proper brushing techniques to avoid further





social welfare has been neglected at the expense of weapons as world military expenditures continue to grow at record levels. An interesting and probing entitled "World Military and Social Expenditures," by Ruth Sivard, provides an eyeopaning account of how many notions neglect the welfare of their citizens. As we review our own budgetary priorties in this nationthe worldwide data from this book should help all of us reflect and consider what our commitment to social welfare should be at home. For example:

* The chances of dying from social neglect (mainutrition and preventable disease) are 33 times greater than the chances of dying in

*The U.S. and U.S.S.R., first in the world in military power, rank 17th and 45th among all nations in their infant mortality rates.

* Six times as much public research money goes for research on weapons as for research on health protec-

*Every minute 15 children in the world die for want of essential food and inexpensive vaccines, and every minute the world's military machine takes another \$1,900,000 from the public treasury.

Everyone recognizes the need for a sound national defense. But we must keep things in proper perspective. Perhaps President Eisenhower, a military professional, said it best when he stated. "The problem in defense is how far you can go without destroying from within what you are trying to defend from without."

Destroying from within. These are naunting words to think about. However, this is precisely what our nation is uoing when we fail to invest in programs which improve educational opportunity for poor children, or provide affordable health care and decent housing. In past news columns, I have herped on the issue about the need to invest in the Womens, Infant and Children (WIC) program, Head Start and other cost effective programs. Wo need to invest to the level where every woman and child who are eligible for these programs receive these vital services.

I am tried hearing about individuals who play politics with children, profess to be on the vanguard for their well-being, and then don't follow through by not supporting funding increases in good programs with proven track records. it is simply hypocrisy in the extreme. During his candidacy, President Bush spoke proudly of his support for Head Start. He went on to get dubbed as the "Education Presiden: "But where is the follow through? The President's budget for

education does not adequately address our national needs. His recent aducation summit was simply a trumped up public relations event, rather than a substantive examination and commitment to school improvement. The President's Secretary of Education, Lauro F. Gavazos, is currently arranging regional conferences across the nation to promote an educational scheme called "CHOICE" which has absolutely nothing to do with his responsibility of promoting federal education programs

Not only are we at educational risk, but our citizen's health is at risk. We sometimes forget that there are 37 million Americans who have no health insurance. Infant mortality, AIDS, and other health problems are plaguing our communities. The health of our nation requires a greater focus and priority in our national budger. We have enough "guns." What we now need is a lot more "butter" in order to prevent turther social neglect of Ame loa's citizens.


