Letter to Citizens "System Does Work"

(Editor's Note: This letter comes from the brother of Lambet Wilson who was recently freed from an incident which needs to make known to the community. The letter is from his brother, James Wilson, a resident of Virginia Beach Dear Sir:

I am sure you are aware of the details surrounding the murders that occurred in Lubbock concerning Lambert Wilson and others. I am an older brother of Lambert and have just recently received a letter. I was really touched not only by the letter and its contents, but also by the tone and sincerity of message he was trying to convey to me.

When I received his letter I really was expecting something reflecting how bitter he might be because it is a strong feeling aong Blacks and Spanish Americans in the West Texas area that good legal representation does not exist and that they are easy prey for convictions in most cases. These same feelings are probably prevaalent nation wide by poor minority groups.

I realize that I could probably be influenced in my interpertation of the letter because of my personal involvedment in the situation and Lambert being my brother. Therefore, I had serveral friends that do not know Lambert read the letter and they received the same message.

In conclusion, where this happened and who was involvedd is not important. Lubbock, Texas could be anyplace in the United States and this situation could apply to any family. There is a very strong message for drug users, potential users, educated, uneducated, rich and poor. We all realize that the drug situation is at a crisis state and presents a very complex problem for our sciety to deal with. My brother being one that knows that from experience, has pointed a message we often hear and can confirm it to be a workable solution the national drug problem. Although seeing drugs as a national problem, he alludes to a very simple act that anyone can do, and if done could help wipe our national daug problem that action is "To Just Say No."


The second message received from his correspondence is that the legal system does work. Doubt existed in my mind and a lot of the family members with the court appointed lawyer. Things did not happen as quickly as we might have wanted, but justice was served. I cannot say the system is not without faults, and that all cases will have the same results, but we can still have faith in our legal system

and th American way of doing things. Lambert was looking for a drug program to enter to attempt to overcome his drug problem when this all happeried. I know he is drug free at this time. Three years is a long time to dry out. It also seems like he is rady for the final step to a complete rehabilitation. It seems that he is aware of where he has been and knows where he wants to go. I also feel it is going to be very difficult to weather the storm in Lubbock, but I admire his willingness to face up to what has happened and still push forward.

Small Town, U. S. A. can be a very difficult place to be, with a lot of small town influence in the legal system. However, a lot of good people also romain in small towns and

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

Crazy Horse

Admiral Crowe and General Jones, former chairmen of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, recently testified before Congress that they advised caution before getting into a war in the Middle East. They also urged the President to allow time for the sanctions to work.

A recent poll of former men who sorved as Secretary of Defense also revealed that a majority encouraged the President to allow time for the sanctions to work.

Some folks may interpret my desire to see Congress debate this issue before rushing into war as anti-military. It is not. We do not live in a perfect world. While I might turn my cheek in many circumstances, I can envision many situations where I would out-Rambo George Bush. I was raised that way.

My Uncle George was a Seebee in WWII. Uncle Joe and Uncle Ed were in Vietnam on several tours. Uncle Ed and Uncle John retired from the Navy. Uncle John served on nuclear submarines. Cousin John Allen was in Vietnam and Cousin Paul was in the Army In Europe. Grandpa Lonsbury moved to Oklahoma and built bombers during WWII and Grandpa McIntyre was in the Navy in WWII. My brother turned down his chance at West Point and Alir Force Academy. He was more interested in science and they really only wanted him for football. My father was a sergeant in the Air Force and his sister works at Ft.. Chaffee back home.

I am raised in a military oriented family. We followed orders. We are fighters. But being willing to fight does not necessarily mean you are naive. Our Constitution says that the Congress, those hundreds of men and women we elect, will declare the wars for this country, not the President. It was set up this way 200 hundred years ago to avoid the problem of the "King" getting involved in wars without the approval of the people. The Constitution was also set up in this country so that we would have a civilian commander in chief of the military, not a military one. This was to avoid the obvious problems with the military. Some may recall Truman having to fire McArthur when he would not follow orders. Finally, our system gives the purse strings to Congress so that if there are problems with the way the President leads the military, the people through their elected Congressmen can cut off the finances for the

But first things first. Let's see if Congress is willing to declare war. We must have a debate of the people, not sound bites from Bush and his advisors with a different reason for war each week.

Is it possible that Bush and his small circle of advisors are wrong? If so, it will be a heck of a mistake.

This issue must be debated.

Local Group Calls
On
President Bush

Dear Editor:
We, the members of the Lubbock Worship Group of

the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers), call upon the Bush administration to reconsider its current policy in the Middle East crisis. Specifically:

We urge the continued use of economic sanctions and the scaling down of Amercian troop commitments in Saudi Arabia.

We are disturbed by the

President's drive to obtain the U. N. Security Council's approval of an ultimatum to Iraq with a deadline. It is far from proven that such preparation for war is the only alternative to the present crisis. It is far from certain that the ultimatum will have the desired effect. We are encouraged by word o administration plans to enterr into talks with the Iraq govern-

mont.

 We urge the President to assume leadership in promoting a re-examination of America consumption patterns.

The underlying reasons why our government considers the Iraqi Invasion of Kuwait a major threat to our own security are related to our own habits of excessive consumption, paticularly of petroleum> Abhoorrence of aggression alone does not explain our commitment of over 400,000 troops to Saudi Arabia; we have tolerated comprable acts off aggression elsewhere in the Middle East. We have known, at least since the petroleum shortages of the mid-70's, that our desire for middie eastern oil might fleadd us into just such a situation as the one we now face.

The words of the 18th century Quaker John Woolman come to our minds: 'Maay we look upon our treasurerss, the furniture of our houses,, and our garments in which we array ourselves, and try whether the seeds of war have nourishment in these our possessions, or not." It is a great traagedy unfolding — a trageddy which is quite avoidable — If what we are actually doing is wandering into a war merely to protect our treasure.



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



"Lord, No, I Don't Wanna Goll" (My Salvation On My Damascus Road)

Jeremiah 26:13 -- 'Therefore now amend your ways and your doings, and obey the voice of the Lord your God; and the Lord will repent him of the evil that he hath pronounced against you.

- 1 (16-ounce) can pumpkin (about 2 cups) 1 (14-ounce) can sweetened condensed milk (NOT evaporated milk)

 - 11/2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice 1 teaspoon almond extract
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 cup sliced almonds

Preheat oven to 425°. In large mixer bowl, combine all ingredients except pastry shell and sliced almonds; mix well. Pour into pastry shell; top with almonds. Bake 15 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 350°; bake 35 to 40 minutes longer or until set. Cool. Refrigerate leftovers.

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

Pour mixture into springform pan. Freeze until firm, 8 hours or overnight.

Let cheesecake stand at room temperature 5 to 10 minutes. Carefully loosen cheesecake by running sharp knife around sides; remove side of pan. Return to freezer until serving time. Makes 12 servings.

Long-Term Freezing Directions

After removing from pan, wrap securely in aluminum foil and return to freezer. Let cheesecake thaw until soft enough to cut (15-20 minutes at room temperature, 1 to 1-1/2 hours in refrigerator). Eggnog Cheesecake can be frozen for up to three months.
