

Austia --- Lt. Governor Bob Bullock last week awarded Senator John Montford (D-Lubbcok) an official Senate gavel in recognition of Montford's appointment as Chair of the Senate Finance Committee. The presentation took place in Bullock's office at a ceremony honoring Senate committee cheirs.

In addition to the Finance Committee post, Montford serves on the Adn. inistration Committee, the Health and Human Services Committee and the Jurisprudence Committee. Montford, a former U.S. Marine, was first elected to the Texas Senate in 1982 and has previously served as Chair of the Senate Affairs Committee.

# "Motor Voter" Legislation

State Senator Rodney Ellis of Houston last week filed legislation that would register indivduals to vote when they fill out forms at certain state agencies, such as the Department of Public Safety.

"90% of Texans have driver's license, while only 65% are registered to vote," Senator Ellis said. "This legislation will add hundreds of thousands of individuals to voter registration rolls in Texas, while increasing the efficiency of the voter registriation pro-C883.\*

Presently, Washington, D. C., Minnesota, Maine, North Carolina, and Nevada all have some form of motor voter registration. Voter turnous in these states was 10% higher than the national average in the 1990 elections.

Secretary of State JohnHannah said, "As chief election offier, I strongly support any measure that makes registering to vote more accessible to the public. Senator Ellis' bill would, in my opinion, go far in increasing voter registration and voter turnout."

"Voter registration is not only a question of fairness and equal participation; it is an issue that has implications for every dimension of government," Senator Ellis said. "When new people are

brought into the electoral process - people who in the past have been denied a voice in government -- there will be a corresponding change in the composition, accountability, and basic posture of our government.'

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

Last Friday I got up early and drove down to Abilene to testify in a law suit against Shackleford County. It seems a family sued the county for shelter assistance. They were being evicted by their landlord and had nowhere to go. The case is similar to one I filed about ten years ago against Lubbock County and the lawyer had asked me to testify as an expert on the responsibility of counties to care for the poor.

As I was driving to Abilene I day dreamed a bit. I remembered what my life was like as a military brat and I wondered about this country and where it was heading. I thought about the immense wealth of this country, the goodness of most of the people, and then, the mean spirited folks who keep slashing programs for the poor and the short sighted politicians who only worry about lining their pockets and getting re-elected instead of doing what is needed and right to solve the tremendous problems in this country with health care, housing, education, jobs, clean water and air.....

It has been amazing to me how our democracy has failed to represent the majority in this country. Tax breaks for the rich. Big houses and good education for the rich. Health care for the rich or folks lucky enough to have insurance. Plenty of water for industry and agribusiness and dirty water for us to drink.

One of these days we will elect honest and caring folks to represent us. One of these days better come soon. It was a long drive to Abilene. It was similar to other long drives to Ft. At Wells (Maine) Junior High, students are no longer grouped by ability. The Wells faculty reorganized instruction so that students with differing abilities work together and help each other learn. Parents and teachers have noticed real improvement in student learning and attitudes toward school.

Imagine if every school in America were like Silver Ridge and Wells. Imagine if all faculties were able to design the educational programs best suited for their students. Imagine if all communities were involved in their schools. Imagine if all students were engaged in learning.



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

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
