Concept For Dunbar High School

(Editor's Note: This plan was submitted by Mr. Virgil Johnson, principal of Dunbar-Struggs High School. With more than 25 years in the public schools in the state, he wanted to help the present problem, and give Dunbar-Struggs an opportunity.)

Title: "Enrichment Through Cultural Exchange"

- Objectives:
- (1) to accomplish desegregation of the high schools at a reasonable cost to the district, but without disproportionately placing an undue burden on anyone segment.
 - (2) to preserve the "neighborhood concept."
 - (3) to maximize building use.
 - (4) to update curriculum offerings and provide more high level courses at Estacado and Dunbar High Schools.
 - (5) to provide opportunities for excellent students to earn academic scholarships during their sophomore year.
 - (6) to provide enrichment and cultural awareness through social tolerance and interchange.

REQUIREMENT: "Enrichment through Cultural Exchange" would be a required course for graduation from Lubbock Independent School District; 1/2 credit would be earned per semester.

IMPLEMENTATION:

- (1) sophomore students of Estacado and Coronado would be "paired"; sophomore students of Dunbar and Monterey would be "paired".
- (2) each year, 50% of each high school's sophomores would attend their "paired school" for one semester and remain for four-class periods, returning to their home school during 6th period. During the second semester, the remaining 50% would interchange.

(3) students would be able to meet this LISD course requirement only by taking "Enrichment through Cultural Exchange" at the student's assigned "paired school."

NOTES: A STUDENT WHO TRANSFERS into the district after his sophomore year may take the course in his home school; band and athletics would not be affected.

INCENTIVES:

- (1) students would compete with other paired students from their home school for scholarships provided by LISD as incentives. Criteria for awarding these incentive scholarships would be based near perfect attendance and the highest GPA earned in the course.

SPECIFICS:

- (1) "Enrichment Through Cultural Exchange" would be a unique, innovative, and serious minded course that would be "team taught," utilizing motivational speakers, community resources, area institutions of higher learning, the educational service center, and chambers of commerce.

(2) teachers and administrators would be specially trained for the teaching of this course; parents and students would be afforded orientation sessions.

NOTES: Lubbock High School would not be paired because of its racial balance and successful Leap magnet program. Their students would take the required "Enrichment Through Cultural Exchange" at Lubbock High School.

INCENTIVE SCHOLARSHIPS:

- (1) five \$1,000 scholarships per semester per school would be awarded.
- (2) five \$500 scholarships per semester per school would be awarded.

NOTES:

- (1) each high school would determine its recipients.
- (2) checks would be made out and mailed to the institution of higher learning in the student's behalf as soon as he provides proof of enrollment.

(3) should a recipient choose not to enroll in an institution of higher learning, an alternate recipient would not be chosen, and those funds would remain in LISD coffers.

(4) students who car pooled, with at least three students, to their paired school would receive 14 cents reimbursement per mile per school day.

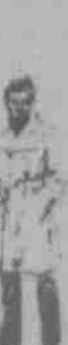

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NOTICE OF CLASS ACTION AND HEARING ON PROPOSED SETTLEMENT

State Farm Insurance Companies has agreed to settle an employment discrimination class action now pending in federal court in Houston, Texas. The lawsuit claimed that State Farm discriminated against women, blacks and Hispanics in the recruitment and hire of insurance sales agents and field claims representatives between 1975 and 1983. The proposed Consent Decree affects only State Farm's Texas Region, which covers roughly the southern half of Texas, including such cities as Houston, San Antonio, Austin and El Paso.

1. **The Proposed Consent Decree.** A settlement fund of \$11.5 million will be established to satisfy individual backpay claims. The money will be distributed through a claims procedure administered by the Houston office of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. Individual claimants may recover up to \$100,000 or more from this fund. In order to be entitled to an award, a claimant will be required to meet certain qualifications and follow the agreed-upon claims procedure.

2. **The Affected Classes.** The following persons may file claims under the proposed Consent Decree:
All women, blacks, and Hispanics who were not hired within 18 months after applying or constructively applying for a Trainee Agent position in State Farm's Texas Region at any time from January 1, 1975 through December 31, 1983;

All women and blacks who were not hired within 18 months after applying for a Field Claims Representative Trainee position in State Farm's Texas Region at any time from January 1, 1979 through July 1, 1983; and

All women employed as claims secretaries or inside claims representatives in State Farm's Texas Region who applied for promotion to Field Claims Representative Trainee positions at any time from January 1, 1979 through July 1, 1983, but were not selected within 18 months of their initial application.

3. **Rights of Class Members.** If you are a member of one or more of the classes listed above, you have four options:

- A. You may participate in the settlement proceeding.
- B. You may request exclusion from the class and the settlement.
- C. You may object to the proposed Consent Decree.
- D. You may do nothing.

4. **IMPORTANT NOTICE TO POTENTIAL CLASS MEMBERS WHO HAVE RECEIVED NO NOTICE THROUGH THE MAIL.** Mailed notice has already been sent to the last known addresses of those individuals believed to be potential class members. If you believe you are a class member, but received nothing in the mail similar to this notice within the last month, then you must notify the EEOC if you wish to participate in the class. To notify the EEOC, please call the EEOC Claims Counselor at the following toll-free number: 1-800-253-1175 or in Houston 650-1557. Once the EEOC has been notified, your name will be placed on the class mailing list, and you will receive further notices and instructions by mail. Failure to notify the EEOC will result in your receiving no further notice regarding this action.

5. If you wish to object to the proposed Consent Decree, you must mail written objections to either Mari Mayeda, counsel for plaintiffs, or A.L. Dent III, counsel for State Farm, at the addresses listed below, no later than January 15, 1991. A hearing will be held regarding the fairness of the proposed Consent Decree on January 28, 1991 at 9 a.m. and persons who have mailed written objections will have an opportunity to voice objections at the hearing.

Don't get me wrong. I think Madden and Summerall, who have now been together on CBS for 10 years, do a heck of a job. It's just that Madden's lighter side seems to have inspired every other color man to become a regular stand-up comic.

Dan Dierdorf, the color man for ABC's "Monday Night Football," sometimes goes in the opposite direction. Dierdorf is too prone to praising players' efforts for being "incredible," "unbelievable" and "the best," when their feats are often just the result of poor play by the opposition. Many times, what Dierdorf means to be great insights are not grounded in good football.

Believe it or not, I miss Howard Cosell on Monday nights. Sure he used too many big words, but he really knew a lot about football. Sometimes I'll turn off the sound on television and listen to the radio broadcast of "Monday Night Football" with Jack Buck and Hank Stram. Those guys are about as old school as you are likely to find in this day and age.

I really think that the best football commentary on television is on cable's ESPN. Chris Berman is in a league by himself. Unlike CBS' Terry Bradshaw, who is all style and no substance, Berman has hit the right mix of humor and serious football insight. His mind and mouth move quickly and, as opposed to many sportscasters, are connected. If Berman wanted to be a telecast color man, I believe he'd be even better than John Madden. I try to catch him every time he's on.

If there were more Chris Bermans out there, TV's new school of football broadcasters would be better off. We could laugh and learn. lol

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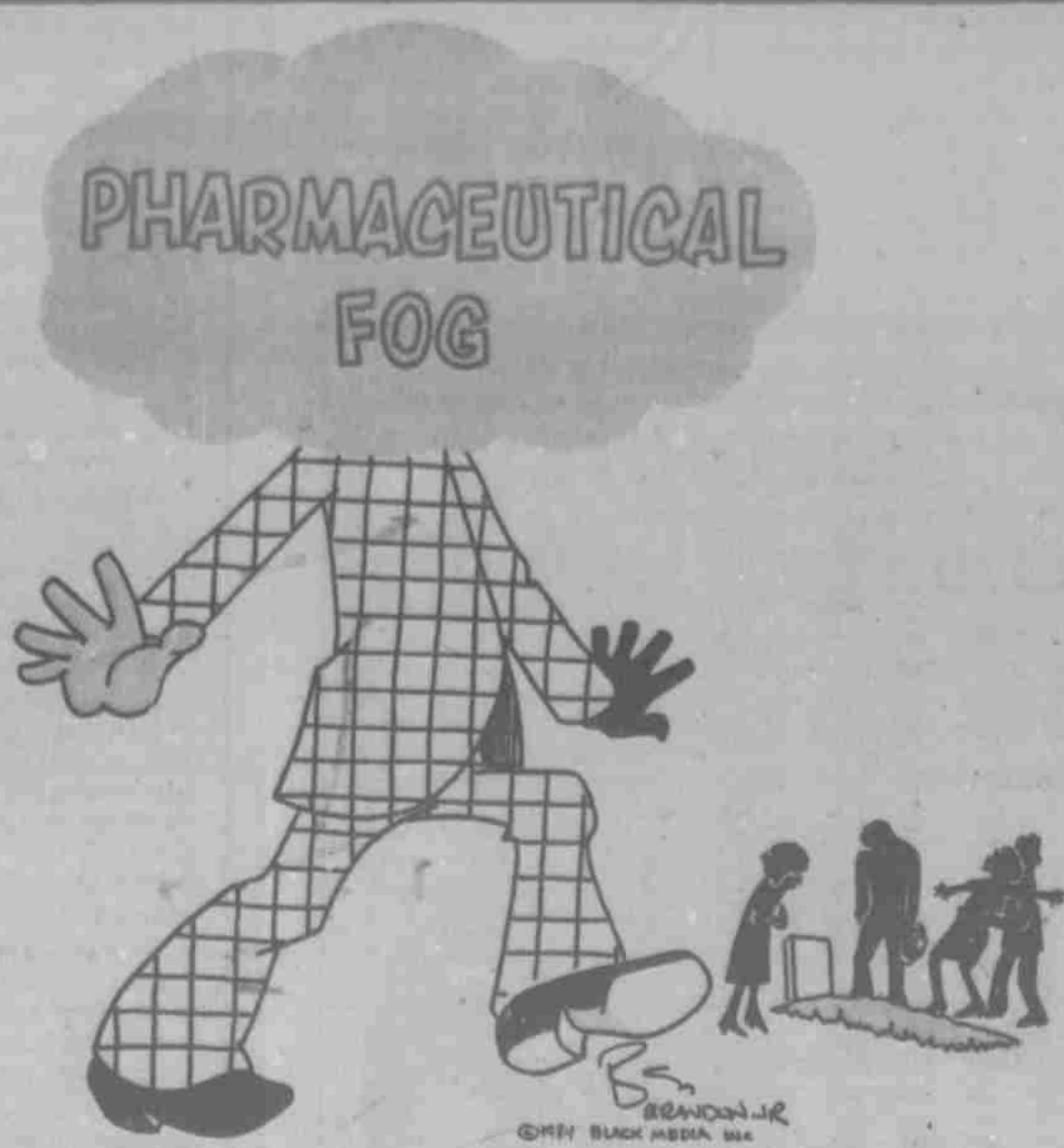
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The Big-Waste, High-Tax, Budget Bill Rip-off

The recent budget agreement, touted by its supporters as the "largest deficit reduction program ever enacted," fails to address the root cause of the deficit explosion: government waste.

In 1983, the President's Private Sector Survey on Cost Control, popularly known as the Grace Commission, came up with 2,478 cost-cutting, efficiency-enhancing recommendations — the implementation of which could save taxpayers \$424.4 billion over three years and prevent accumulation of trillions of dollars in additional deficits by the year 2000.

But because the Washington establishment rejected and ignored hundreds of the most critical Grace Commission recommendations, the national debt tripled during the past decade.

The federal government accumulates chronic deficits because Washington refuses to cut waste. And this year's budget agreement only continues the tax-and-waste approach. The budget compromise contains \$164.6 billion in new taxes and a minimum of \$245 billion in new domestic discretionary ("pork barrel") spending.

Here are some of the expenditures our legislators consider so vital:

- \$67,000 for Belgian endive research in Massachusetts.
- \$995,000 for a performing arts and cultural center in North Miami Beach, Fla.
- \$500,000 to restore the home of Lawrence Welk in North Dakota.
- \$5 million to design and construct a parliament building in the Solomon Islands.
- \$4 million for a Japanese-American museum in Ontario, Ont.
- \$1 million for a Seafood Consumer Center in Oregon.
- \$120 million for 56 highway demonstration projects not requested by

the president.

And, of course, outrageous examples of waste still abound in the Department of Defense for large purchases of small items, including:

- \$120 for a cup dispenser that retails for \$25 in commercial outlets.
- \$67.50 each for 4-inch-wide rubber gaskets, while similar plug-type seals for toilets sell for about \$1 in commercial hardware stores.
- \$1,868 for a steel-reinforced toilet cover/assembly for the C-5 cargo plane, while similar covers for commercial aircraft go for one-tenth the price — about \$182.

Why focus on these bathroom supplies? They are the obvious signs that our tax dollars are being flushed down the drain in Washington.

Staggering cost overruns, expensive program failures, multimillion-dollar procurement scandals and billion-dollar losses in federal programs occur so often they almost seem to be our government's stock-in-trade. The budget agreement only compounds the problem by transferring additional billions from the private sector to the inefficient public sector, and from taxpayers to the congressional pork barrel.

Fortunately, this year saw the birth of a nationwide taxpayer's action movement. On Oct. 27, many thousands of people rallied all over the country to protest higher taxes and government waste. This event, known as Taxpayer Action Day, was the first time in American history taxpayers gathered in this fashion during a non-presidential election year.

Their message was simple: "Time for a clean sweep."

- Time to eliminate the hundreds of billions of dollars in government waste.
- Time to stop being squeezed between higher property taxes and state and federal income taxes.
- Time to adopt reforms with real "teeth" in them.

As our overtaxed economy declines, as state and federal deficits soar, and as billions of new tax dollars vanish down the sinkhole of government waste, we can expect more and more Americans to join the taxpayer's action movement.

The tax-and-waste politicians in Washington may be riding high this year, but their days are numbered. lol

Use of Force in the Persian Gulf?

Is the use of force by the United States against Iraq justifiable and/or inevitable?

Saddam Hussein has now launched his second war of aggression in less than a decade, a war that has included pillaging, murder and hostage-taking on an unprecedented scale. He has built and threatened to use weapons of mass destruction, including an arsenal of biological and chemical weapons, some of which he has used on his own population. He is racing to acquire nuclear weapons. There is no doubt that he intends to dominate the Persian Gulf by force and intimidation, to use control over oil as a political weapon, and to lead the Arab masses in an anti-Western holy war. He must be stopped, and the use of force to stop him is fully justified.

What other alternatives exist to resolve this crisis?

Naturally, it would be better to resolve this crisis through continuing application of sanctions, especially the embargo, now in effect. But the sanctions are unlikely to work — and they certainly will not work quickly.

The weakness of the sanctions is that they aim too low — only at Iraq's withdrawal from Kuwait. But that is not enough. It is also necessary to dismantle or destroy Iraq's instruments of aggression, including Saddam Hussein's capacity to build and use weapons of mass destruction. How could we hope to deal with Saddam Hussein once he has nuclear weapons? How could the weak states of the Persian Gulf hope to protect themselves against further invasions by his million-man army? How can there be any lasting peace while this war machine casts its shadow over the region and the world? lol

Is the use of force by the United States against Iraq justifiable and/or inevitable?

No. It is, in my view, wrong for the administration to be pressing the issue of using force among other nations when it has no mandate regarding the clearly expressed feelings of the American people. We have no treaties in this region. None of the countries involved are democracies. Our troops have not been attacked. Using a United Nations vote as a lever to force the Congress to support offensive action is perplexing and even cynical. The administration needs to clarify our national goals in the event force is to be used.

Recent history indicates that, had the president dispatched a modestly structured air-ground presence to Saudi Arabia and then begun negotiating a mutual withdrawal of American and Iraqi forces from their respective positions, the crisis may have been over by now.

What other alternatives exist to resolve this crisis?

In my view, the proper course of action for our country would be to immediately and dramatically reduce the number of troops committed to the region and consolidate them into a defensive posture. The president should use his well-known connections around the world in order to persuade other affected countries that they should commit soldiers toward the goal of containing and eventually reversing Iraqi aggression.

In sum, initiating a violent clash because another nation has not agreed to the president's timetable for unconditional surrender is not the appropriate approach at this time toward achieving peace.

ing Education Department, LEARN Educational Talent Search, ASAP In-School GED, South Plains College, and the Private Industry Council.

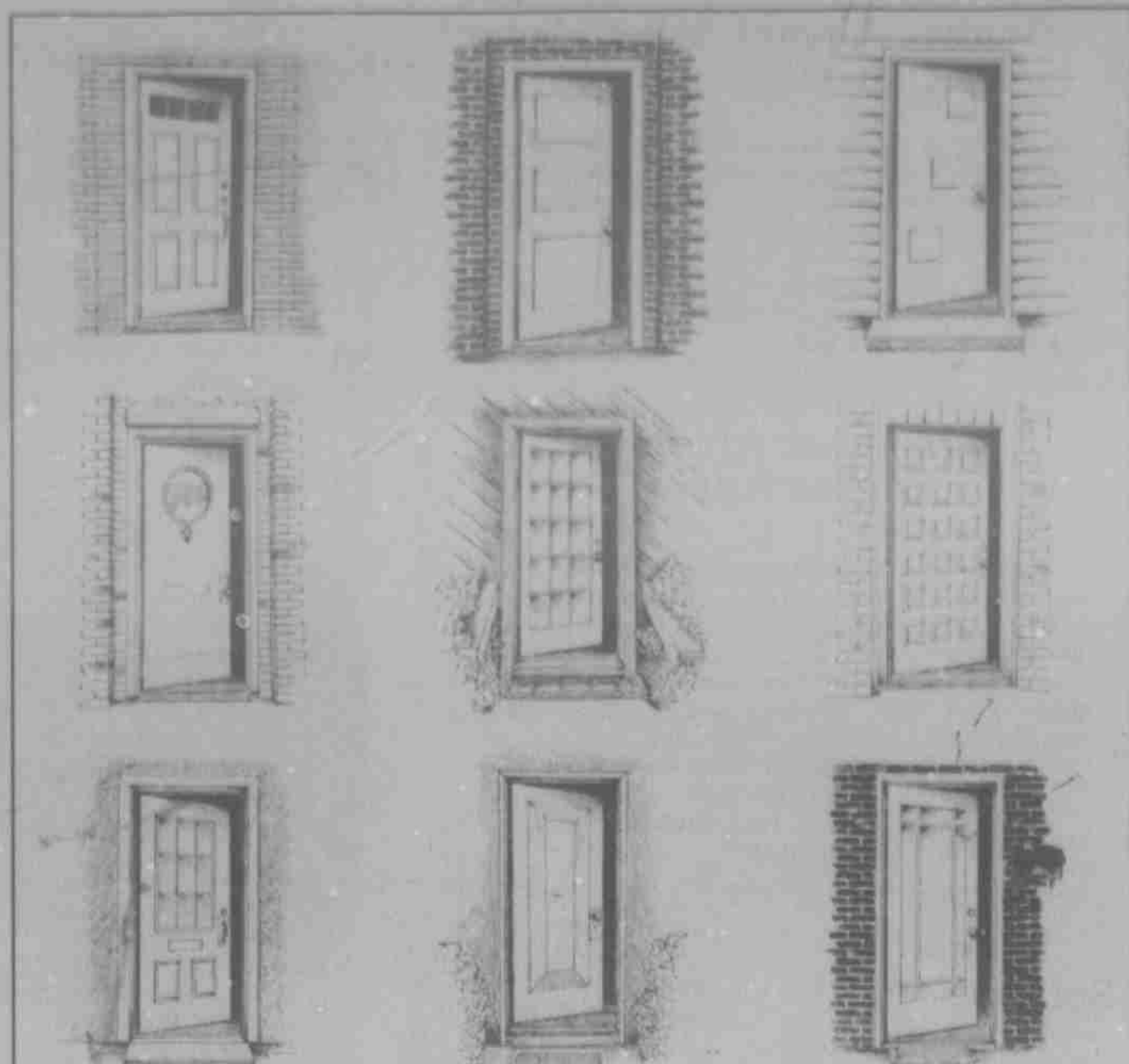
