The NAACP of Lubbock has now joined with the League of Women Voters in the fight against the LISD's plans to reorganize the school district. The NAACP filed an amicus brief on May 6th supporting intervenors right to participate in the law suit that was filed about twenty years ago by the Department of Justice. The League filed its amicus brief last month. Will there be others?

There are a couple books that have been recently released that claim that the Reaganistas cut a deal with Iran before the 1980 election. "When Israel was a child, then I loved him, and called them, so they went from them: they sacrificed unto Baalism, and burned incense to graven images. I taught Ephraim also to go, taking them by their arms; but they knew not that I healed them." Hosea 11:1-3.


