



Billy West Captures Phea Tournament

It was truly a heart warming feeling to see over 40 African Americans tee off in a golf tournament in Lubbock. The numbers should have been greater, but, it's great enough toshow that Blacks are coming together in whatever numbers to promote positive activities.

The first annual Theodore Phea, Jr. Memorial Golf Tournament, sponsored jointly by the Lubbock Black Chamber of Entreprenuers, Inc. and KAN-GOL Golf Club, was held at Meadow Brook Muncipal Golf Course June 29 and 30, 1991.

In a word, it was just "great" to see golfers from Amarillo and Lubbook take part in a first

Lubbock's most popular Black golfer, Billy West, had to come from 5 strokes back to become the winner, with a two day score of 141. Ben Jackson of Amarillo was the first day winner with a 60, followed by Bert McWilliams with a 71. Mannie Williams, Don Shankin of Amarillo and Bill Ferrell had first day scores of s72's. Although West was picked the favorite, few thought he had a chance to over take the other leaders as his first day score was 74. All golfers knew they would be in for a tough second day and the strong winds made it that much harder. But the voteran golfer that he is, West came through with a 67, the bet score for the two days, to finish with a total score of 141. Amarillo's Shanklin was not about to let West win easily, he shot a second day score of 69, tying West. In a play-off, Shanklin over shot the first green, allowing West to par the hole and gain the victory.

Ben Jackson was third overall, with a 143 and Mannie Williams was routh with 145.

Semmie McWilliams, the only female to participate, shot a 179 and was precented a gold putter for representing the females in such an outstanding mariner.

In the children's division, Quincy Whits, Jr. and Brandon Childers were presented trophies for wirning their division. With the children, the total number of golfers in the Theodore Phea, Jr. Tournament came to 42, not bad for a first time event in Black golfing.

A reception for the golfers was held at Big John's BBQ on Parkway Drive on Saturday evening, and the presentation of awards wass also held there on Sunday.

Dorothy Phea, wife of the late Theodore Phea, Jr., along with her son, Grog, and daughter, Erica, witnessed this first event. At the awards presentation, Mrs. Phea recaptured some fond memories of the days her husband ran the boys club. The Phea family presented a donation to the scholarship fund.

Joe Phea, a brother of Theodore Phea, Jr., was also present and saluted the effort.

Byron Davis, President of KAN-GOL Golf Clut, satated: "Theodore Phea played a vital role in the young years of many of the Black golfers present today. And this is our way of showing appreciation for what he meant to us."

Bert McWilliams, Black Chamber board of director and member of KAN-GOL Golf Club, further stated: "Theodore Phea, Jr. was like a father to us, this tournament and scholarship in his honor, hopefully, will keep his name and contributions forever present within our community."

McWilliams also stated, "The LBCE is now moving in the direction it was created, to promote the Black community. That this is just one of the many major events the LBCE will be sponsoring and they will get bigger and better. I am so glad that everything turned out so well."





Crazy Horse by Stephen C. McIntyre

Thurgood Marshall resigned the other day. That means President Bush will have the opportunity to nominate another Reaganista to the Supreme Court. His nominee will swear that she/he supports the Constitution. That is not enough, Hopefuly, the Senate will have the wisdom to slow down the radical transformation of the Supreme Court by requiring that any new nominee also support the Bill of Rights and the other amendments to the Constitution, it is the amendments, our gueranteed rights and freedoms, to the Constitution that make this country unique.

7/7 1971 -- 26th Amendment ratified (18 year old vote).
7/12 1871 -- Birth of Henry David Thoreau, tax resister and author of "Civil Disobedience."

Ms. Hutrchinson, our state treasurer, and some other Republicans have been traveling around the state saying there are no budget problems and that things should stay the way they are. On the other hand, the other day, Sen. Montford came out for a state income tax and a reduction of local property taxes as the fairest way to adequately fund the needs of Texas.

If Montford has come out of for a state income tax then you know there are serious problems. He is going to catch it from the local Reaganistas. Folks should send him a letter of support.

Two recycling plans are being tried out in central Lubbock. One is in our neighborhood. I hope one of the plans will be successful so that we can launch something for the entire city. It is critical that the folks in Lubbock and around the country start doing something so that our children will not have to live on top of our garbage.

Death Penalty Expansion Likely

The New York Times reports that Congressional leaders working on a Senate anti-crime bill have agreed to expand the number of federal crimes punishable by deeth.

And, in a related development, a Supreme Court decision yesterday may lead to an increase in the number of executions.

A crime bill compromise brokered by Sens. Joseph R. Biden, D-Del., and Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., includes measures barring executions of defendants under age 18, extending the death penalty to leaders of drug rings and allowing victim-impact statements to be taken into account when a court decides if the dealth penalty should apply.

Sen. Daniel K. Inouye, D-Hawaii, tried to block the death penalty compromise late yesterday by introducing an amendment to exempt Indian reservations. Because states make their own death penalty laws, the proposed federal bill would affect crimes committed on Federal lands only. Inouye said 80% of the people affected by the federal death penalty would be residents of Indian reservations.

The conferees still have to resolve disagreements on proposals to ban semi-automatic weapons, to establish a waiting period on handgun purchases and to limit state prison inmates' rights to Federal review of their convictions.

Meanwhile, the Supreme Court yesterday agreed to limit the ability of state prison inmates to appeal convictions in federal courts.

The 6-3 opinion overturned a 1963 landmark ruling that guaranteed most rights of state prison inmates to challenge the constitutionality of a conviction or sentence. Petitions for writs of habeas corpus, as the challenges are known, are filed after state court appeals have been exhausted.

Yesterday's high court ruling specifies that almost any failure by a state inmate to meet the state court system's procedural requirements, for almost any reason, will result in forfeiting the right to bring a habeas corpus petition in federal court. The ruling in Coleman v. Thompson No. 89-7662 applies even if an inmate's case was mishandled by his or her attorney.

Nearly 40 percent of all state death sentences in recent years have been set aside by federal courts ruling on petitions for writs of habeas corpus.


