DEEDS of VALOR

Not Too Short to Win

Emanuel Stance had just turned nineteen and was only five-feet tall when he applied for enlistment in the U.S. Army. It is reported that the recruiting officer recorded Stance's height as five-one-inch to keep him from being at the low limits of acceptance. Also, since Stance could read and write English well, the recruiting officer visualized him as a perfect candidate for company clerk—a position which most African American units needed desperately.

After passing the military tests, Stance was sent to Texas to serve with Troop F of the Ninth Cavalry. Within a reasonably short time, he was wearing sergeant's chevrons which were not easily acquired. Many of the troops at Fort McKavett, Texas, were ex-slaves and therefore, reluctant to take orders from a black—much less one who appeared barely big enough to enforce his commands. However, after a few of the men had stepped behind the barracks with Stance, they promptly changed their attitudes. Furthermore, whenever the troopers took to the field, Stance always demonstrated his ability to perform as a first-rate fighting man and leader.

By the time Stance reached the age of twenty-one, he was a seasoned veteran of several battles with the Indians. In May of 1870, when the troop was halfway into an area known as Kickapoo Spring, Stance's captain detached him along with ten troopers to do a side scouting mission. During the mission, the small group of Buffalo Soldiers spotted a band of hostile Indians and a small herd of horses. Upon sighting the Indians, Stance gave the orders of "Right front in-

to line. Charge! Open Fire."

The Indians were naturally shocked by this sudden attack from Buffalo Soldiers with blazing rifles and they attempted to run away.

Stance and his men succeeded in chasing the Indians far away from their herd and afterwards, they returned to round up the horses. The Soldiers then drove the horses to the spring where they rejoined their outfit and camped out for the night.

Upon their return to Fort McKavett, the next morning, the command surprised another party of Indian warriors who had attacked a wagon train. Although the troopers were outnumbered, the captain still gave an order for them to charge! They galloped against the warriors and Stance was well in front, leading the left flank. He rattled off about ten rounds from his repeating rifle as he pounced on the Indians and shouted for his men to fire. The Indians were so pressed that they dared not stand. Instead, they rushed away leaving a cloud as they vanished.

The next day, Stance drove off another attack and the Buffalo Soldiers returned to the Fort with approximately twenty-five horses which they had recovered. A report was sent to Washington about Sergeant Stance's actions and he was approved for the country's highest honor for his Deed of Valor.

Once someone said that people could not measure a man by the color of his skin or by the length of his legs. This speaker must have known a man such as Sergeant Emanuel "Buffalo Soldier" Stance.

A Letter To East Lubbock

Dear East Lubbock Citizens:

We are in an awful mess, with drug problems, gang activities, teen pregnancy, unemployment, high school drop-outs, minimal businesses within our community and now, we are facing the loss of our oldest high school. And what is so sad about all of this is the community majority is doing little to turn any of our prob-

lems around. For too many of East Lubbock residents are taking these problems as a fact of life and going happily along the path for continued and even more drastic problems.

East Lubbock must draw the line and stop the problems right where they are now. Fixing is great, but in order for our progress to become reality, we must get off our knees and take some-type action. And the action we take must be double: and be able to withstand obstacles placed in our path. While Lubbock may have dug two feet of the hole, but we of East Lubbock has made the hole six feet deep with our lack of involvement in actions to prevent the hole from getting deeper.

Our recovery will not be quick, nor will it be easy. No one individual has all the answers, the answers lie with each of us. That is why it is so important for more and more of East Lubbock residents to get involved in the problem solving phase. I see us as having a three-fold task: (1) we must prevent further problems and prevent current problems from becoming worse; (2) we must develop ways and means to reduce our current problems to a more acceptable level; and (3) we must insure against recurrence and move forward.

The recent action by LISD to downgrade Dunbar High School to a junior high should be the last straw, the straw that broke the camel's back. This clearly shows what happens when a community does not support or involve themselves in day-to-day activities of their city. Sure, a large group showed an interest after it was too late. The meetings were merely a means to satisfy the Justice Department, LISD knew well before the first meeting exactly what the final outcome would be. We have become an community known to cheat after the animals.

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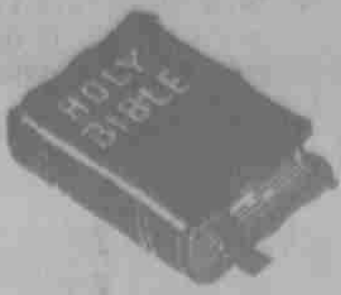
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The Outreach Prayer Breakfast

FROM THE OF PARSON D. A. SMITH

Most of us can look back over our lives and testify to the fact that many of the unusual things which happened, whether good or bad, have been unexpected. Without prior warning the unexpected seem to have exploded in our lives. These experiences are corners that we turn in our spiritual growth and development.

A biblical event illustrating such an experience is Moses' unexpected meeting with God at the burning bush in the Midian desert (Exodus 3).

Moses had received no advance notices concerning what was about to happen in his life. He had gone from prince of Egypt to shepherd, considered by the Egyptian to be the lowliest of all occupations. On this particular day, he was at the backside of the Midian desert, at Mount Horeb, a place of extreme solitude. Moses had been here before. Here in the loneliness of the place he had communed with himself, with nature, and with God. Here Moses had been under the special instruction of the Lord. His books were the silent stars and giant hills; the shrub that grew at his feet; and the flock of sheep that were around him browsing on the grass.

This day as Moses was tending his sheep, God used an instrument to manifest His presence that was an unique as the location. A scrubby, old acacia bush, seared and blistered by the hot desert sun and winds, was enveloped by a strange fire, and it was consumed. And the angel of the Lord appeared in the fire with a startling command to Moses. Why would Moses have such a spectacular experience that would occur in a "bush"? -- the small, the ordinary. Moses was about to embark on the most important mission of his life. Before he could represent God to the Hebrew people, he had to receive a vision of the ineffable glory of God in his own soul.

All too often we miss God in our everyday lives because we overlook the bush that is full of mystery, containing a heavenly presence, a divine voice, that will make us unique for useful and fruitful service.

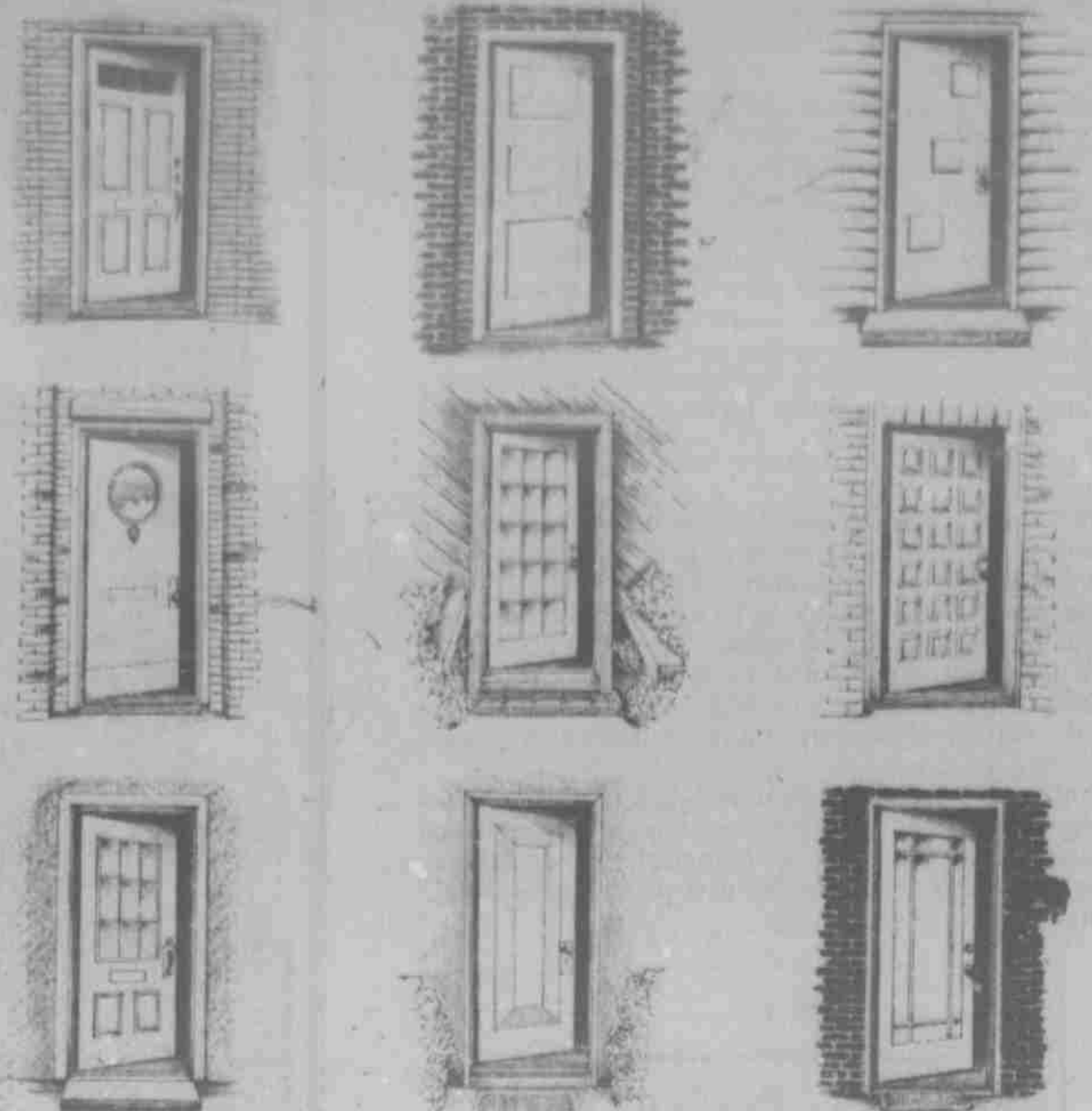

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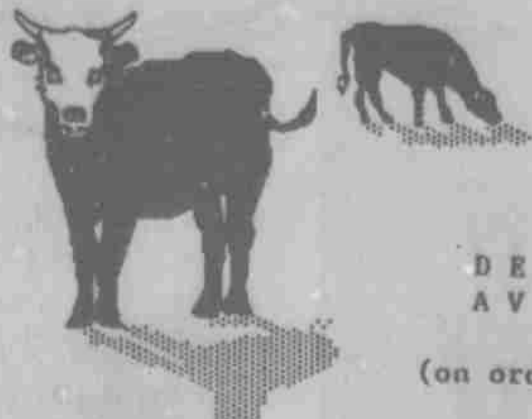

High Tech Live Welding Demonstration Set For SPC

LEVELLAND — A live demonstration of the latest welding and cutting techniques available on the market today will be conducted Feb. 13 at the South Plains College welding shop.

The demonstration, presented by South Plains Welding Supply in conjunction with SPC's two-year welding program, is scheduled from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and is open to the general public as well as student's said Pete Stracener, assistant professor of welding technology.

Orda Smedley, district sales manager for Miller Electric Co. in Appleton, Wisc., will use a specially-equipped van to demonstrate inverter power sources used for shielded and gas metal arc welding and gas tungsten arc welding processes, Stracener noted. Smedley will also demonstrate plasma arc cutting equipment. Miller Electric Co. is one of the world's two largest manufacturers of welding and cutting equipment.

"Inverter power sources have been on the market less than 10 years and they are beginning to gain popularity in the welding industry," said Stracener. "They are smaller, more lightweight and more versatile and a lot more advanced than previous power sources," he added. "You can get a lot of state-of-the-art electronics inside these machines."

Smedley will give an overview of the equipment in use and then do individual demonstrations as needed, Stracener said.

"I would recommend this demonstration to anyone in the welding or cutting industry or anyone who is thinking about purchasing some new welding equipment. This will be an excellent chance to see how the new technologies work," said Stracener.

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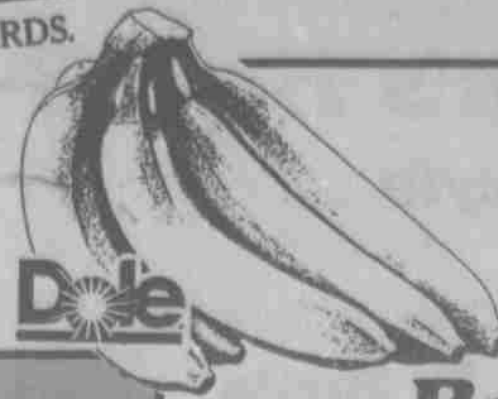
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
