'Silent March' Set By NAACP August 26th

A 'Silent March' protesting four recent adverse decisions by the U. S. Supreme Court on civil rights and affirmative action, and calling on Congress to undertake legislative remedies has been scheduled

by the NAACP for Saturday, August 26, 1989, at noon in Washington, D. C., according to Dr. Benjamin L. Hooks, Executive Director, NAACP, and Dr. William F. Gibson, Chairman, NAACP National

Board of Directors. The route and other details of the march remain to be worked out, but Dr. Hooks said it would closely resemble the famous 'Silent March' of 1977 when over 5,000 men, women, and

children headed by Dr. W. E. DuBois and James Weldon Johnson of the NAACP marched in silence down New York City's Fifth Avenue, protesting "Jim Crowism", lynching, segregation, disenfranchisement and race riots in Waco, Memphis, and East St. Louis.

"Our 'Silent March' will be concerned with one issue alone — the Supreme Court and its recent hostile decisions. We will be sending a message primarily to the Administration, Congress and the American people that the decisions of this Court are harmful to the body politic of this nation and prompt action must be taken to reverse them through legislative means," Dr. Hooks said at a press conference in Washington on Thursday, July 20th.

Dr. Hooks had earlier announced the March at the conclusion of the NAACP's Annual Convention in Detroit on July 13th. The press conference was called to provide further details. Dr. Hooks said at the press conference that the Supreme Court decisions emerged as the single most important issue at the NAACP Convention, reflecting the general mood throughout the black community. "Where the question is being asked — in many places and in many ways — since a five member majority of the court is

Lawmaker Dies In Airplane Crash

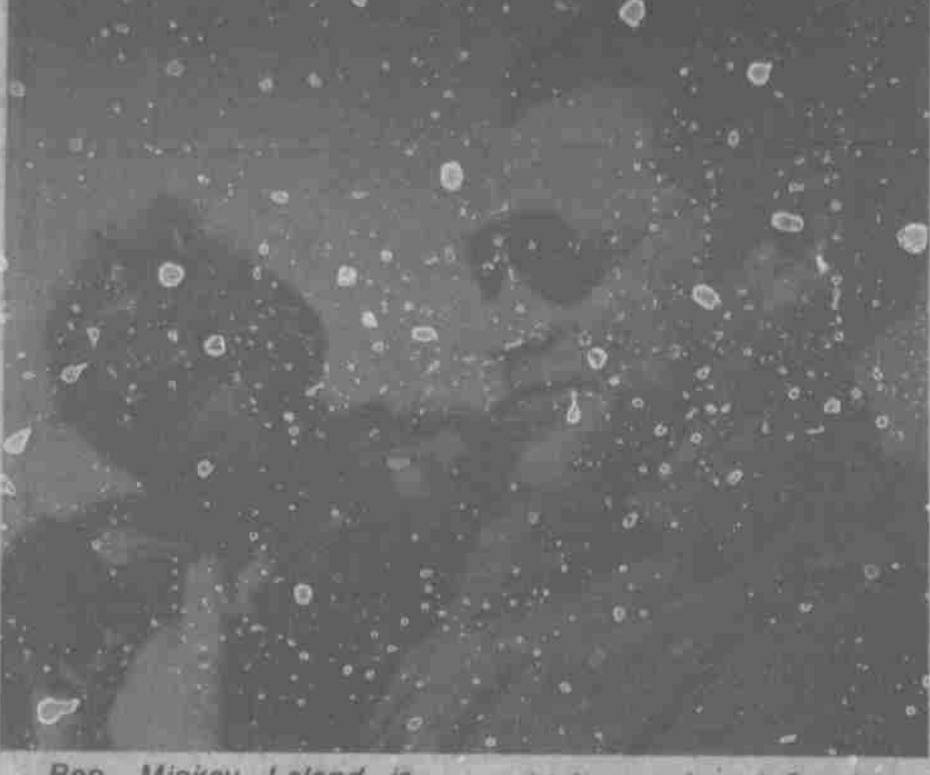
Last Sunday, the world was advised of the death of George Thomas "Mickey" Leland who was on his fifth visit to refugee camps near the Sudan border when the plane carrying his party crashed.

Over the years, he was tormented over a dying girl in Ethiopia years ago. This time, which proved to be his last time, he was drawn again and again to the place he called "the end of the Earth."

A six term Houston Democrat and chairman of the House Select Committee on Hunger, he visited Lubbock last October to campaign for Michael Dukakis who was running for President of the United States. In his short visit, he held a press conference in front of the Southwest Digest, 510 East 23rd Street.

At the time of his short visit, one could easily see the frustration he had about people who were hungry in this world.

Over the years, he

encouraged persons to stand tall for what was right, but right when attempting to do what you can.

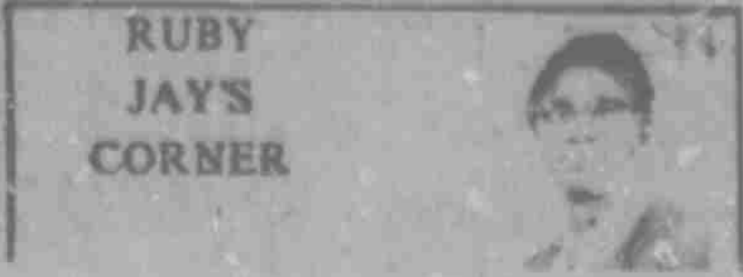
Workers Face Danger

The federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) has been asked to investigate possible danger to human health at the Thomas Flyers Produce potato shed in Cotton Center, Texas. On August 19, 1989 a Texas Rural Legal Aid (TRLA) client filed a complaint against the shed with OSHA, asking OSHA to conduct an immediate investigation of the potato shed. Thomas Flyers Produce employs Plainview residents.

"The Thomas Flyers Produce Company has already endangered the health of its employees," said Kay Mares, staff attorney at TRLA. "Employees have been forced to seek medical attention due to suspected inhalation of carbon monoxide at the shed."

Mares also tells all present and former Thomas Flyers shed employees to contact their family lawyer or Texas Rural Legal Aid if they have suffered any health problems as a result of their work at the shed. "Under the law, an employer such as Thomas Flyers Produce cannot fire a worker who has complaint about unsafe working conditions."

"Workers can call us at 1-800-358-5846 for more information," concluded Mares.

"Can I Improve The Appearance Of My Smile?"

Do you ever cover your mouth when you smile, because of a gap between your front teeth? Does a chipped tooth bother you? Or do you feel self-conscious about teeth that are badly stained?

All of these tooth defects can be easily corrected through an effective dental technique called bonding.

When your dentist bonds your teeth, he or she attaches (bonds), a natural-looking material to your tooth surface. Bonding can close a small gap between teeth, repair a chipped or fractured tooth, or cover up discolored teeth. Bonding can be performed in one or more appointments, depending upon your needs. Sometimes teeth become badly discolored as a result of taking certain medications (like tetracycline antibiotic) during childhood. Bonding effectively masks those stains.

A popular method used to treat moderately discolored teeth is called "bleaching". Bleaching is often used on stains which cannot be removed by routine professional cleaning. It can usually be done in two to five office visits and a touch up every two to four years. A bonded restoration may last for about five years before needing to be touched up. The materials used in bonding aren't as strong as your natural tooth enamel, so it can chip easily. Bonded areas are prone to stains, so it's important to take good care of your restored teeth at home and through professional cleaning. Although bonding sometimes substitutes the need for a crown (cap), severely fractured, decayed or badly damaged teeth require the strength and durability of a crown. There are other means by which your defective teeth can be corrected to enhance your smile.

AT ISSUE

Death Penalty for Minors?

Kentucky Attorney General Fred Cowan successfully argued a recent death penalty case involving a minor before the U.S. Supreme Court. He previously served in the Kentucky General Assembly.



YES

Do you support the death penalty for 16- and 17-year-old convicted murderers?

Yes. To suggest that a 16- or 17-year-old street-wise youth who engages in a hideous and deliberate rape, sodomy and execution-style murder should be exempt from the death penalty because he is a "child" is disingenuous. Every jury and judge is required by law to consider the youth's level of maturity and entire background before imposing the death penalty. The real question in this issue is why should the arbitrary date of a birthday exempt someone, no matter how mature? We all mature at different rates emotionally, intellectually and morally. Our criminal justice system is built upon individualized consideration of each defendant and his crime. Judges and juries can best mete out justice to the few youths who engage in the abhorrent criminal behavior for which the death penalty may be appropriate.

How does this relate to the Eighth Amendment "cruel and unusual punishment" clause?

In *Stanford v. Kentucky*, the U.S. Supreme Court held that capital punishment for those 16- and 17-year-olds did not violate the Eighth Amendment. Since 37 states authorize the death penalty, 25 of them for persons under 18, the Supreme Court found there was no national consensus against executing 16- or 17-year-olds. The Court said a state legislature may grant mercy to juveniles for any number of reasons if it so desires.

How can juvenile felonies be deterred?

As young people have become more sophisticated, they increasingly have been involved in violent crimes. In *Stanford*, a 17-year-old robbed, raped, sodomized, abducted and murdered execution-style a young mother who worked at a gas station. He then boasted and laughed about it.

We need more effective social programs. We need more effective parents. We also need a criminal justice system that holds 16- and 17-year-olds accountable and that can treat them as adults when appropriate.

Do you support the death penalty for 16- and 17-year-old convicted murderers?

Amnesty International opposes the death penalty in all cases, considering it a particularly heinous violation of human rights when a government kills children. The United States is one of only five countries — including Rwanda, Bangladesh, Barbados and Pakistan — which has legally sentenced juveniles to death since 1976.

Teen-agers do not have the maturity to grasp the finality of death. They are not considered mature enough to vote, drink or serve in the military before 18, but they are held capital responsible for crimes committed before the legal age of adulthood. Teen-agers cannot serve on juries, disallowing juvenile offenders from being tried by a jury of their peers. Ironically, our doubts about the maturity of teen-agers are suspended when trying them for capital murder.

How does this relate to the Eighth Amendment "cruel and unusual punishment" clause?

The most common forms of execution are electrocution, lethal injection and gas chamber. Electrocution burns internal organs; discolors and swells flesh, sometimes setting it afire; and can make the prisoner defecate, urinate and vomit blood. Lethal injection is continuous intravenous injection of poison into the body. If veins are hard to reach or prisoners struggle, poison may enter an artery or muscle tissue, causing extreme pain. Gasping causes slow and painful asphyxiation, depriving the brain and heart of oxygen. These methods illustrate cruel and unusual punishment, effectively torture until death.

How can juvenile felonies be deterred?

FBI statistics and other studies show that in some death penalty states, homicides have actually risen. Congress did not include killing juveniles as a method for reducing drug-related crime in the 1988 Anti-Drug Abuse Act. Solutions to violent crime may lie in effective criminal justice, but making children casualties of our frustration with crime exceeds boundaries of criminal justice and becomes human rights abuse.

LISD Students May Register Friday, August 18

Elementary, junior high, and senior high students now to Lubbock Independent School District may register Friday, August 18, at their local school campus. Students who have moved into a new attendance zone within the school district should also register on the 18th. Those students who pre-registered at the close of last school year or during this summer need not register again. Classes begin September 5.

At the time of registration for students new to the district, certain school and

immunization records must be presented. For transfer students, a 30-day grace period is permitted for receipt of immunization records.

The records should include the previous year's report cards for students entering second through twelfth grade. Birth certificates or other proof of age must be made available for kindergarten and first grade students.

A full immunization record is mandated by state law. Immunization records should include polio

vaccine, three oral Sabin doses through age 18 with the last dose after the fourth birthday; diphtheria-tetanus (DPT or TD) vaccine, three doses with the last dose since the fourth birthday or within the last ten years for grades 8-12; rubella vaccine, one dose through age 11; measles (rubeola) vaccine, one dose since the first birthday through 12th grade; and mumps vaccine for all students who have not had the disease for which certification from a physician is required.

Friday is also the suggested deadline for parents to request transfers for their children under the "majority-to-minority" procedure. Students who attend schools where their race is in the majority may transfer to schools where their race is in the minority. A "majority" school is largely Anglo and would receive minority transfer students. A "minority" school is largely Hispanic and/or Black and would receive majority transfer students.

Parents with further questions concerning registration of students may contact their respective school. Information is also available in the Office of Student Services, 766-1109.

obviously determined to lead a stampede to the rear on civil rights, what can we do?"

The 'Silent March', in which the men will wear black and the women and children white, is a response to that question, according to Dr. Hooks. He added, however,

"If Congress does not act, then we must call upon our citizenry to mount other demonstrations until our voices are heard and our just demands are acted upon."

He added, "We are not looking toward bringing vast numbers of people to Washington. In this instance the medium is the message and the medium is the 'Silent March' that bespeaks the seriousness of our dissatisfaction and the need to move without hesitation to correct the mistakes of this court."

"We are reaching out to a cross section of other national organizations and institutions seeking their participation. We are also sending a message to private citizens who share our concerns to join us in the 'March.'"

It was in 1985 when Leland recalled standing in a refugee camp 10 months earlier and asking a relief official about a girl "who looked to be about 70 to 80 years old -- a skeleton of a person with a thin layer of brown skin draped on her, who had just a faint breath of life in her."

"While I was talking to him, she died. I can see her face right now. Everyday I see her face," Leland said at the time.

Mrs. Annie Mae Jones, a former social worker in Lubbock, called the Southwest Digest Monday night and talked about Mickey Leland as she had met him. "I am glad I had an opportunity to meet him and talk with him. You just don't know what is going to happen next," she said in a sad voice.

Rep. Leland, who campaigned for State Rep. Froy Salinas, was twice chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus.

He was born in Lubbock in 1945 while his father was stationed here.
