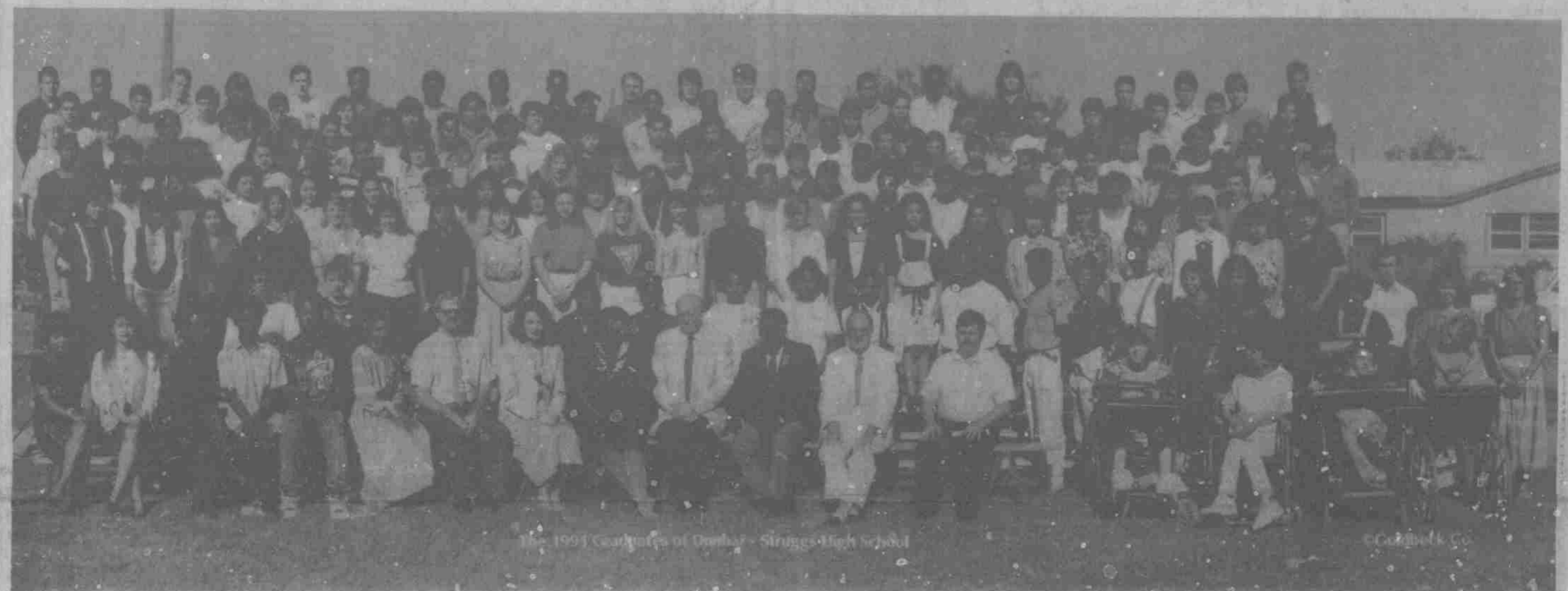

AKA Domestic Travel Tour Winners Named

Chicago, Ill -- Three Texas high school honor students are among 30 international grant winners who will tour Chicago, Washington, D. C., Atlanta, Ga., and Orlando, Fla. July 21-28, 1991 as part of Alpha Kappa Alpha (AKA)'s 1991 Domestic Travel Tour.

Sandra Elizabeth Bennett, Lubbock; and Tiffany Jewel Griffin and Wendi Morrow, both of Houston, were selected on the basis of their essays

which addressed the effects of television on adolescents.

The educational tour, open only to academically talented females in grades 11-12, will provide the opportunity for the students to meet some of the nation's movers and shakers, visit sites which they have read about in their history books, and learn more about the African-American heritage.

The 1991 selections were made without regard to

states/regions, and 15 states and the Virgin Islands are represented. In the past, state/regional selections had been made to provide more diversity, but all of the 1991 entries were judged as one group.

Bennett, a senior at Monticrey High School, is a member of the National Honor Society, president of the Spanish Club, and secretary of the Dare to Be Different Club.

She is also a varsity cheerleader, was homecoming queen, and has been named to Who's Who Among American High School Students and Outstanding Students of America.

Her parents are Elizabeth and Roy Minugh.

The experience will get underway in Chicago with stops at the DuSable Museum of African-American History, the Carter G. Woodson Library,

While in Chicago, the students will also be special guests at the closing banquet of AKA's 1991 Leadership Seminar, where they will be presented by AKA president Mary Shy Scott of Atlanta.

The tour will culminate with a fantasy escape to Epcot Center, the Disney futuristic theme park in Orlando, Fla.

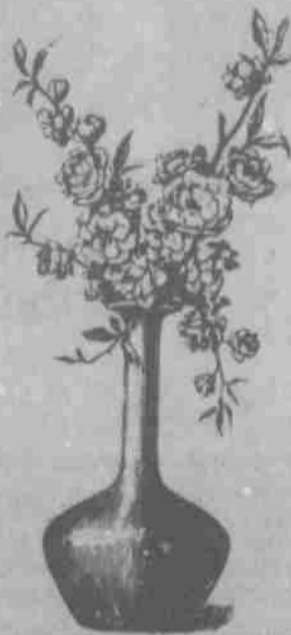

Crazy Horse by Stephen C. McIntyre

The local fighting over redistricting may be heating up. Discussions are being held by the USD and the county commissioners will be deciding on a plan soon. Local politicians are very similar to state and national politicians. They want to get elected again and so they will push for districts that they think will enhance their ability to win again. It is a rare politician who simply looks at the Voting Rights Act and then uses his good common sense to do the right thing.

Most politicians mouth fairness and equality but usually mean it fair to them and will give them more than an equal chance to win in the next election.

The Voting Rights Act was passed to protect the right of the people to vote and have an equal say in our government. It was not passed to aid a particular politician. All of us should carefully look at the new lines that are being drawn and listen and remember what is being said by the politicians. And then when the lawsuits start coming because of the blatantly illegal lines being drawn, listen to the explanation of the current elected politicians for paying all the attorney's fees for their lawyers in defending the mess and then more attorney's fees to the winning lawyers who clean up the illegal mess.

It seems to me that the tax payers should be getting a little tired of paying lawyers. It might be an interesting change to see the incumbent politicians simply obey the law.

A lot of us took the day off on Memorial Day. Some of us even thought about all the young soldiers who died fighting for this country. A few of us recall the reasons for the various wars. A couple of us may have some idea why we risked the lives of our young men and women in the Gulf War. But will any of us do a damn thing when the next politician gets elected President and decides that our children must go to \$\$\$\$\$\$ because of some reason that is too complicated for us to understand or is too secret because it is based on classified information.

The next time someone orders your child to go somewhere to kill and be killed ask them why. There should be straight forward response. If it does not make sense then do something. The response may be a patronizing "just thank me" because if you had the information I had you would agree with me that what we are planning to do is necessary in order to defend our American way of life. Sound familiar? If it does grab your kids and join the next protest in Washington.

The L. C. Anderson High School, an African-American public high school in Austin, Texas founded in 1907, had its doors closed in 1971 by a federal court order to satisfy public school integration guidelines. This year being the twentieth anniversary of the school's closing, a massive reunion is being planned in Austin June 28-30 for all ex-students and faculty members who attended or were employed at the school between 1907 and 1971.

The Original L. C. Anderson Alumni Association (OLCAAA), created in 1989 by Dorothy C. Hunter and Joseph Reid of the 1958 class, is planning all the reunion activities, and has tried to locate Anderson ex-students nationwide. Many of the alumni have not returned to Austin in years, and a special welcome is being prepared for them. Among the planned activities is a golf tournament, a shopping tour, and a tour of the city. All reunion attendees will register at the last standing Anderson campus site, which is one of four different sites called Anderson High School in Austin's east side. The picnic, banquet, and church services will take place at some of the finest facilities the city has to offer.

The school enjoyed a rich tradition when it was active. There were perennial academic and athletic achievers who contributed to the school's heritage that was the pride of everyone in the community. At the all-school reunion, the tradition of the Anderson institution will be recaptured through the enthusiasm and support of the alumni. The reunion theme is "Pride and Heritage From The Past, Unity and Friendship For The Future."

A Christian And A Woman by Ann Day

While reading a Bible passage one day, I suddenly understood that for Jesus' women did not constitute a "problem." He never derided, patronized or stereotyped them. Instead, He accepted financial support from them, commended the integrity and generosity of a poor widow, allowed his mother to over rule Him when the wine ran out at the wedding at Canaan. He revealed who He was to two different women. And sent women out as the first evangelists. No where did He make pronouncements but women's "proper" role in society. In fact, the only time He was drawn into this situation, He rejected the traditional domestic stereotype, telling Martha not to be obsessed with kitchen duties, but to come and learn more about the Gospel Jesus, by relating to women as individuals, cut across tradition and rose above the narrow views of his day. For example, He held a deep theological discussion with the Samaritan woman at the well, quite unbothered by the fact that she was both a woman and a racial outcast. From another woman of dubious reputation, He accepted the sacrifice of perfume and tears to wash His feet. With yet another, the

woman with an issue of blood, He ignored traditional taboos and practices of ritual contamination and healed her. Even the language Jesus used included women. His parables often featured women in their everyday situations: grinding baking bread, looking for a lost coin, sweeping rooms. He used words which offered women affirmation and place, rather than blame or guilt. Not surprisingly, women were among His closest followers; several are mentioned by name. These include: Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Susann, and Mary and Martha. Several of these women were in his traveling party, even making the arduous journey from

Galilee to Jerusalem. And women, were with Him at the end of His life, still loyal and persistent even when one disciple had betrayed Him. The women saw Him die, located the tomb and came to pay their respects in perfuming His body on the third day after burial. It seems wonderfully fitting that the women who received the glorious news of the resurrection were commissioned to pass it on. Knowing Jesus as Liberator, as well as Savior, has helped me to understand more about His teaching on sacrifice and leadership -- the two are one. Being a leader does not mean having status and authority over others as much as it means being a servant to others. Leaders are not meant to give orders, but to give of themselves. If the Church lived more like the body of Christ, our lives as human beings would be enriched and more open to others around us. Knowing more about the spirit of God would show us how to help people find their identity in Christ, not in role functions. Going beyond me,

myself and I to cultivate the fruit of the Spirit would show us that love, joy, peace, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control are the characteristics that God wants both men and women to have. Each of us is called to make our unique contribution in Christ's name. I long for the time when Christians can be given all the means possible to make that contribution and to be empowered to live as responsible citizens of the Kingdom of God.

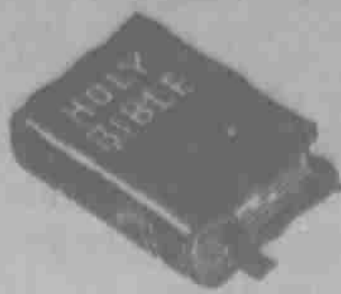

"It is expedient for you that I go away," John 16:7. These words perhaps, startle the apostles of Jesus. One cannot help but notice the face of impetuous Peter who had'n with Jesus on the Mount of Transfiguration and witness his Lord's transcendent glory and while caught up in the moment said to Jesus. "Let us make three tabernacles: one for Thee, and one for Moses, and one for Elias." Look at the face of John, a man who meditated day and night on his Master, and his Master's words, till he was like David's tree that was planted by the rivers of water so that its leaf never withered, nor was its fruits ever wanting in its season. Observe the ruddiness of the face of James -- he being a special confidant of Jesus -- as he contemplated on his Master's words. These apostles along with the others had doubtless come to consider the personal presence of Christ as indispensable. He was the principle of cohesion among them, and His departure would be the signal for the disintegration of the brotherhood. Their whole being rested on Jesus. He epitomized to them everything that was sacred; they had forsaken occupation and had suffered contempt for following their Savior and now He was about to leave them. Their whole being; everything in their knowledge, affection, and understanding rebelled against it. They could not understand the "why" in either it relationship to Him or to themselves. Their Master had given to them what influence they had in the nation and without Him they would be nothing they perhaps thought, but a group of ignorant fishermen. What these apostles did not realize was that the high priest was more useful to them within the veil than without. He could do for them out of sight what He could not accomplish in their view.
