Several months ago an alliance of California environmentalists proposed a ballot initiative that would phase out 24 carcinogenic agricultural pesticides, ban offshore oil development, prohibit the cutting of old-growth redwoods, require developers to plant trees to counter global warming, cut statewide carbon dioxide emissions 40 percent by the year 2010 and create an environmental advocate with the power to sue violators of the law.

Why do the people have to do the common sense things that the government was elected to do?

The Reagan Administration tried for years to do away with legal services to the poor. After failing every year he appointed a crew of nuts to be on the Legal Services Corporation Board. In turn, the crew adopted various harrasing regulations and procedures that severely restrict the ability of legal aid lawyers to do their jobs. One of the regulations restricted legal aid lawyers from filing law suits to enforce the Voting Rights Act. As we all know, there is a mysterious connection between race and poverty in this country. One way poor minorities in this country can protect themselves is effective access to the political process. Consequently, the law suits of Texas Rural Legal Aid and West Texas Legal Services attorneys against teh city council and school board districts in Hereford, Lubbock...

Last year, TRLA, California Rural Legal Aid, and Northern Mississippi Rural Legal Services sued LSC in Washington. A month or so ago Judge Gessell struck down LSC's regulation. There will probably be an appeal.

It is tough to get a little democracy in this country. Perhaps, poor people in this country should get together with the folks in East Germany, Soviet Union, .... The problem of an elite group trying to maintain control is a problem on both sides of the Iron

## AT ISSUE

### "No Pass, No Play" Policy for Student Athletes?

Dr. Thomas K. Hoarn Jr. is president of Wake Forest University in North Carolina, where he has initiated special programs in student life, institutional planning and international education.



YES

Should schools adopt a "no pass, no play" policy for athletes?

The answer is "yes," but it is a complex affirmative. Student athletes should be admitted to colleges only if they have an honest chance to succeed academically. Admitting athletes for their playing skills, keeping them academically eligible in easy courses, then sending them away uneducated is shameful exploitation of young people. It is also corruption of higher education at its core.

What effect would this have on the athletes and the schools?

It would ultimately have a positive effect where education begins: in primary and secondary schools. If high school athletes know they must meet a firm academic standard to be admitted to a college, the athletes will work to meet the standard. Younger students will see that only good students are chosen to play college ball. The key is to set the standard high but not beyond the reach of students from disadvantaged backgrounds. Current eligibility requirements are inadequate and too low.

How else can we promote academically competitive athletes?

Students must have time to live the student life. Research shows that student athletes spend unreasonable amounts of time on their sport, both in and out of season. Restrictions must be adopted to deal with every aspect of time demand. Also, I favor a special "bridge" year of academic preparation for underprepared students in a remedial setting. Students who do not want to attend college but must to qualify for a professional basketball or football career should have another choice. The professional leagues might develop minor league opportunities in football and basketball, unaffiliated with colleges, for such athletes. We cannot give college athletes non-student status. Proposals to pay players who are not students would destroy the tie of athletic programs to education. Professional minor leagues should not and cannot be operated by universities.

Larry Hawkins is president of the Institute for Athletics and Education. He also is director of the office of special programs at the University of Chicago.



NO

Should schools adopt a "no pass, no play" policy for athletes?

No! A school's sports program should be organized to enhance education for athletes and the students who watch them. Eligibility standards must be enabling, not prohibitive. At a time when students drop out of big city schools in large numbers, all school programs should reach out to students in any way possible. The sports program can reduce delinquent behavior, participation in gangs and drug use. This is especially important where students have little to do after school. The idea should be to bring students into the school, not send them away.

What effect would this have on the athletes and the schools?

Blind enforcement of a "no pass, no play" rule would hurt the individual student, his family, school and community. Conversely, a properly administered sports program acts as a bonding agent between school and student, particularly for at-risk youngsters. Further, both the coaches and the athletes are role models who can influence the total student body positively and bring parents and community organizations together to help the school carry out its educational mission. Research supports the fact that those in organized school activities, including athletics, are more likely to be successful in the classroom and to graduate.

How else can we promote academically competitive athletes?

We must begin at the elementary school level and create a cooperative academic/athletic process that moves the young person on to high school and college. Teacher-coach educational support systems must be developed that include academic tutoring, test prep and counseling. Players who don't make the grade should be helped by mandatory tutorials during practice time to keep the student-coach relationship in place, rather than banished from the team. Keeping the students involved, although they are not playing, is critical. This extra effort could result in young men and women graduating from high school and college, which is a contribution to the common good.

## Money For College: It's Still Available

As many high school graduates prepare for their first college experience in the fall, many capable youngsters may fail to advance their education because of one substantial obstacle: money.

Therefore, in this column I would like to identify sources of tuition funds available to students needing financial assistance. There are both grants, which need not be repaid, and low interest loans, which require repayment upon graduation from college or upon leaving school.

The Pell Grant is available to undergraduates who have not earned a bachelor's or first professional degree. The maximum award is \$2,000 per academic year is limited to five full years of academic study -- a sixth year is permissible if your degree requires more than four years to complete. For complete details on this grant program and other mentioned, contact the Department of Education in Washington, D. C., the college financial aid office where you intend to enroll, and perhaps your high school guidance counselor.

A Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG) is for undergraduates with exceptional financial need (priority is given to Pell Grant recipients). Up to \$4,000 per academic year may be available. Unlike the Pell Grant program, the Department of Education may not have ample funds to provide all SEOG applicants with money.

The Perkins Loan Program is a low-interest loan (5%) that is available for both undergraduate and graduate students. Various amounts are available depending on your level of study and other restrictions.

\* \$4,500 if you're enrolled in a vocational program or have less than two years toward your bachelor's degree.

\* \$9,000 for undergraduates completing more than two

years academic work and reaching third year status. (Includes sums under Perkins and National Direct Student Loan (NDSL).)

\* \$18,000 for graduate or professional study. This amount also includes past Perkin/NSDL funds.

The Stafford Loan Program (formerly the Guaranteed Student Loan) is a low-interest loan from banks and credit unions.

And of course, there is the College Work Study Program. This program provides jobs for undergraduate and graduate students who need financial aid to pay for college expenses.

The above assistance programs are a few of the federal assistance programs. Parents and students should also inquire into state programs now available and various other college assistance programs.

A lack of money should not prevent capable students from advancing their education. Getting it, however, will require intense homework.

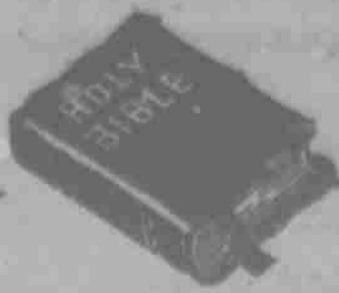

### Testing Dates Announced

Major V. J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Lubbock, has announced a change in testing dates for those persons interested in becoming a State Trooper. Entrance tests will be

administered on every second and fourth Wednesday of each month at the Department of

Public Safety offices in Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls.

Persons interested in a career in Law Enforcement should contact your local DPS trooper or go by any DPS facility to pick up an application. A completed

application and birth certificate are required prior to beginning the testing process. Testing will begin at 8:00 a. m. and will take most of the day to complete.

Requirements for becoming a State Trooper are: (1) 20 to 35 years old, (2) good moral character, (3) in excellent physical condition, (4) a U. S. citizen and (5) sixty (60) semester hours of college or equivalent military or police experience.

Major Cawthon advised the monthly pay scale while attending the recruit academy is \$1,622.00, \$1,869.00 upon graduation and \$2,362.50 after completion of the twelve month probationary period.

"Even though we have not announced a beginning date for the next academy, we are actively seeking applicants in order to begin the testing and background stages of our hiring process," Major Cawthon stated.

## LUBBOCK INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT Revised Dress Code

Note: The revised dress code is published below to provide information to parents and students. Each campus had input, and a central committee of parents and staff members wrote the revised dress code that has been approved by the Board of Trustees. The code - FNCA (Local) - is in effect for the 1990-1991 school year. There are some changes from the past year's code, including guidelines that concern hair and symbols and pictures on clothing.

### Purpose

The District's dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, instill discipline, prevent disruption, avoid safety hazards, and teach respect for authority.

### General Guidelines

Students shall be dressed and groomed in a manner that is clean and neat and that will not be a health or safety hazard to themselves or others. The District prohibits any clothing or grooming that in the principal's judgement may reasonably be expected to cause disruption of or interference with normal school operations.

The District prohibits pictures, emblems, or writings on clothing that:

1. Are lewd, offensive, vulgar, or obscene.
2. Advertise or depict tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, drugs, or any other substance prohibited under FNCF(L). (Policy on alcohol, drug use.)
3. Reference heavy metal rock groups.
4. Refer to satanic, cult, or gang activities.

The student and parent may determine the student's personal dress and grooming standards, provided that they comply with the general guidelines set out above and as outlined in policy a. 3 found in the student handbook and/or discipline management plan.

### Specific Guidelines

1. Clothing (dresses, skirts, shorts, culottes) may not be shorter than the top of the knee. This rule excludes students in primary grades.
2. Clothing that has been modified in a revealing manner will not be allowed.
3. Bicycle shorts will not be allowed.
4. Footwear shall be a part of regular attire. Thongs and bathroom or house shoe-type footwear are not acceptable.
5. A bare midriff is unacceptable.
6. Appropriate undergarments shall be worn at all times.
7. The hair shall be clean, well-groomed, and not covering the eyes. A variety of hairstyles shall be

permitted if the following extremes are avoided:  
-geometric or unusual patterns shaved or cut in hair

- color variations in hair
- ponytails, rat-tails, and braid (for boys)
- longer than shoulder length (for boys)

8. Sideburns shall be kept trimmed so as not to form a beard and shall not be extreme in fullness. Mustaches shall be acceptable if neatly trimmed. Beards shall not be acceptable.

9. The neck opening on any type shirt or blouse may not exceed the equivalent of the second button below the collar of a dress shirt or blouse. Underwear type shirts, such as tank tops or muscle shirts, are not acceptable. Shirts that have sleeves out of them are also unacceptable.

10. Male students shall not wear earrings. Nose studs may not be worn by any student.

### Violations

**Grooming** If the principal determines that a student's grooming violates the dress code, the student shall be given an opportunity to correct the problem at school. If not corrected, the student shall be assigned to in-school suspension for the remainder of the day or until the problem is corrected.

**Dress** A student whose clothing violates the dress code shall be assigned to in-school suspension either for the remainder of the day or until a parent or designee brings an acceptable change of clothing to the school.

Repeated offenses may result in more serious disciplinary action. Appropriate discipline procedures shall be followed in all cases.

### Extracurricular Activities

The principal, in cooperation with the sponsor, coach, or other person in charge of an extra-curricular activity, may regulate the dress and grooming of students who participate in the activity. Students who violate those standards may be removed or excluded from the activity for a period determined by the principal or sponsor and may be subject to other disciplinary action.
