LISD Sets Deadline For Transfer Requests

All requests for student transfers and assignments in the Lubbock-Independent School District for next school year, 1991-92, must be made during the period of February 1 - March 15, 1991. Only those transfer requests on the appropriate forms provided

by the school district will be considered. Decisions will be made in writing.

Any transfer requests to be considered must be filed by the March 15 deadline. All types of transfer requests are included; however, these dates could change for targeted grades and schools in the desegregation plan should desegregation orders create a need for additional time.

The majority to minority transfers are included in the February 1 - March 15 application period.

Students who attend school where their ethnic classification is in the majority. For purposes of the majority to minority transfer policy, minority students are Hispanic and Black, and majority students are Anglo and ethnic groups other than Hispanic and Black.

A "majority" school is largely Anglo and would receive minority transfer students. A "minority" school is largely Hispanic and/or Black and would receive majority transfer students. Enrollment at the close of the first semester, January 17, determines the classification of schools for this type of transfer.

Additional information regarding transfer requests for 1991-92 may be requested from the Office of Student Services, 766-1972, or school principals.

Farmworkers Receive \$10,000 In Settlement With Plainview Farmer

On February 5, 1991, thirty-eight migrant farmworkers received \$10,000 in a settlement with Plainview farmer Billy F. Sylvester. The farmworkers were represented by Texas Rural Legal Aid of Plainview and Hereford, Texas.

The workers harvested pickles in fields near Plainview during 1988 and 1989. Because the workers were paid far less than the minimum wage (then \$3.35 per hour) for each hour they worked, they filed suit against their employers. The workers accused W. C. Gunter, the Plainview Pickle Place, and Gayley Managers, Inc., a business entity which ran the Pickle Place during 1988 and 1989. The lawsuits against Gunter, the Pickle Place, and Gayley Managers are scheduled to go to trial in federal court in Lubbock, Texas during

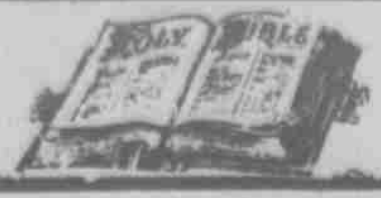

CRAZY HORSE

It was reported by AP in the December 5, 1989, Lubbock Avlanche Journal that on Monday, December 4, 1989 Eileen Rosin, the sole-representative of the Los Angeles based Medical Aid to El Salvador,

left the country. Her office has been ransacked by 20 men in uniform early on Saturday morning. For eight years the organization had been providing prosthetic devices, delivering medicine, and sending children to the U. S.D. for medical care. On December 1, 1989, the United Nations stated it was transferring its offices to Guatemala because the safety of the offices and the employees would not be guaranteed by the government. Equipment in the main offices of the UN were discovered smashed after fighting in San Salvador. Army troops had occupied the offices of UNICEF and refugee projects after UN personnel were ordered evacuated.

El Salvador's attorney general had previously accused the Catholic bishops of being subversives and asked them to leave the country.

Some may recall that the only paper in El Salvador that printed the position of the rebels alongside the government's press release burned to the ground about two weeks ago.

Buckle Up For Love!

This Valentine's Day, parents can show how much they love their children by taking the time to buckle them in safety belts correctly. Buckle them up and do it right every time, on every trip. Be part of the Buckle Up for Love! week, February 10-16, 1991. Join the effort that saved the lives of 238 children in 1989 alone.

A study by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration shows the correct safety seat use would prevent about 53,000 injuries and could save about 500 lives each year. That's a lot of hugs and kisses from happy, healthy and safe children for just the few moments it takes to protect them in a child safety seat or safety belt.

All 50 states and the District of Columbia have child passenger protection laws. Every person who drives is responsible for protecting the lives of children who ride with them. The good news is that many people have heeded the word. A recent study shows that about 83 percent of children under five years of age are buckled in safety seats. The bad news is that about a third of these safety seats are being used incorrectly.

We urge parents and other adults with child passengers to make sure you are using the safety seat correctly to give your children and others the best possible protection. Correctly used safety seats and belts are 71 percent effective in preventing fatalities and 67 percent effective in preventing serious injuries in children under age of five.

Once children are too old for safety seats, don't forget to keep up the good habit already established. Insist that they wear their safety belts snug and low on the hips. And make certain that they use them whenever they are riding in a vehicle -- even if you aren't with them.

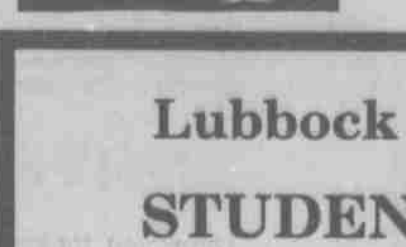

Lubbock Independent School District STUDENT TRANSFER REQUESTS FOR 1991-92 SCHOOL YEAR

DEADLINE FOR REQUESTS: MARCH 15, 1991

All requests for student transfers and assignments for next school year, 1991-92, must be made during the period of February 1 - March 15, 1991. Transfer requests on the appropriate forms provided by the schools will be considered, and decisions will be made in writing. Any transfer requests to be considered must be filed by the March 15 deadline.

Additional information regarding transfer requests for 1991-92 may be obtained from the Office of Student Services, 766-1972, or school principals.

Lubbock Independent School District MAJORITY TO MINORITY TRANSFERS

Parents who desire to request "majority to minority" transfers for their children for the coming school year of 1991-92 should make the request during the period of February 1 - March 15, 1991.

A "majority" school is largely Anglo and would receive minority transfer students. A "minority" school is largely Hispanic and/or Black and would receive majority transfer students. For purposes of the majority to minority transfer policy, minority students are Hispanic and Black, and majority students are Anglo and ethnic groups other than Hispanic and Black.

Schools will be classified as "majority" or "minority" based on the ethnic makeup at the close of the first semester, January 17. Under the majority to minority transfer policy, four elementary schools are not available to receive such transfers because they are involved in magnet school assignments: Iles, Ramirez, Tubbs, and Wilson.

Students who attend schools where their ethnic classification is in the majority may transfer to schools where their ethnic classification is in the minority.

Transfer request forms may be picked up and returned to principals of the schools where students are presently enrolled.

Additional information regarding the majority to minority transfer procedures may be obtained by calling school principals of the Office of Student Services, 766-1972.

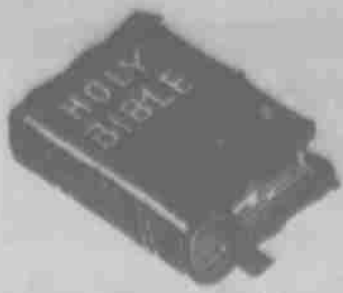

The Pharisees were very careful to fulfill the commandments of the Law and to practice the ritual regulation that governed worship, food preparation, diet, dress, and interaction with gentiles. That what was of paramount importance to the Pharisaic Jew of the first century A. D. were such matters as table fellowship, ritual cleanliness and ceremonial status.

The Pharisees fell into the "greatness trap." This pride was evident on many public occasions. Most Pharisees evidently believes that, because of their exemplary religious practice, they should be given seats of special honor. They used their scrupulous religious practices as a basis for excluding other persons from their fellowship and they truly expected that the God of their fathers, would reward them above everyone else. Because of their negative behavior, these zealous Jewish laymen, known as Pharisees, who had arisen 150 years before Christ to reform and purify Judaism succumbed to the evil influence of pride and exclusiveness by the life and time of Jesus Christ.

Jesus used them as examples to remind his disciples that the true greatness comes from godliness within. It focuses on service to others, not on acts requiring audible praise.

We need to beware of the visible signs of greatness -- especially when we begin to feel of them as our own making: The "important" positions, the distinguished titles, the fine houses and clothes, the sight of our name in print. These visible signs can become end in themselves and we can become decorated plastic Easter egg -- look good on the outside but have nothing on the inside. Jesus said, "For whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and whoever humbles himself will be exalted" (Matthew 23:12 New International Version).

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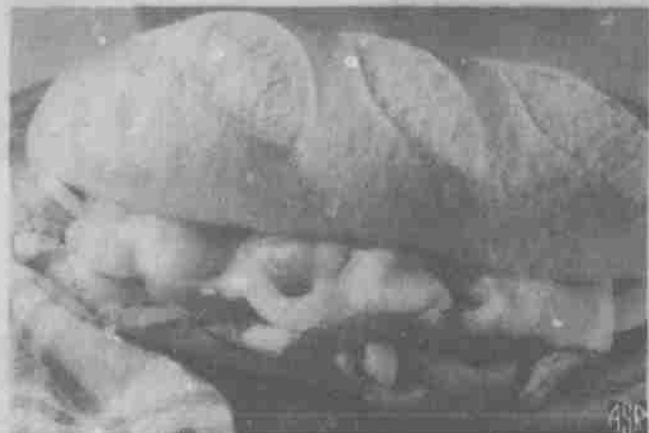

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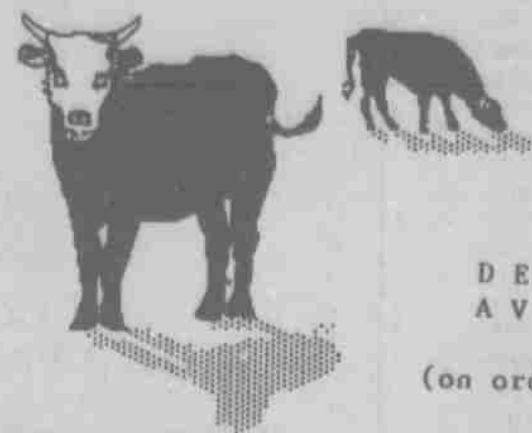

Plastics are helping to bring windpower costs down to earth. Wind machines borrow from current aerospace technology in which composites (reinforced plastics) are used to make the turbine blades that rotate to produce electrical energy. More than 14,000 windmills now dot California's hills. There, strong tropical winds generate enough electricity to meet the residential needs of a city the size of San Francisco or Washington, D.C.

Used plastic containers, car parts and computer housings, collected, cleaned and chopped, can be a valuable commodity. By mixing used plastics with ground glass, one company has been able to manufacture durable road construction products that won't rust, corrode or rot. These products include highway signs and the "chairs" and "bolsters" that support the steel reinforcing rods for roads and bridges.
