NAACP Legal Defense & Educational Fund NAACP Supports Petition By Stearnes' Lawyers

In an article in the Lubbock Avalanche Journal dated Saturday, April 22, 1989, and written by Joe Gulick, the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund has filed a brief in support of capital murder detendant Michael Dewayne Stearnes' attempt to retain his defense attorneys, who were removed from the case March 6, by 99th District Court Judge Thomas Clinton.

The matter, at this report, is currently pending before the nine member court of Criminal Appeals in Austin. The Texas Criminal Defense Lawyers Association and the Lubbock Criminal Defense Lawyers Association jointly undertook representation of Stearnes in his efforts to retain Carlton McLarty and Chuck Lanehart as legal counsel.

Lawyers for the NAACP in New York filed a 37 page "friend of the court" brief regarding the situation. The brief will be read and reviewed by all nine members of the Court of Criminal Appeals, McLarty told the Southwest Digest on Monday morning.

Clinton removed both lawyers from the case after

saying that McLarty had compromised his ability to represent Stearnes. This appearance of impropriety on McLarty's part made it necessary to take the action, the judge said.

He referred to McLarty's

and attorney Quinn Brackett's visit on the night of February 28 to the residence of Anita Hanson, a witness whose life reportedly had been threatened on several occasions.

Stearnes is one of four defendants charged with capital murder in the September 10, 1987, shooting deaths of Vivian Webb, 42, Napolean Ellison, 22, and Quinnie Smith 27.

It Needs To Be Said

It is very encouraging to see new faces appearing to continue the East Lubbock fight to attain our rightful status as a total community. It has always been a concern as to who would replace the Harold M. Chatman, Joan Y. Ervin, Rose Wileon and the few others who have long kept our community just above obscurity, who would step forward when these fighters could not or would not, carry the banner. For years, these individuals have played the role of community watch dogs and spokespersons and have been most instrumental in many noteworthy East Lubbock accomplishments. Although they are still with us and reamin in the thick of things, this writer see and hear that Fulton Berry, Don Rolfe, Bert McWilliams, Stephanie Hill, Oscar Jones and a few others are beginning to make their presences felt within the community and Lubbook.

These new faces have been around the block a few times and have geared their strategy to working within the frame work of the system to bring about defired changes. More progress is on the way and could come a great deal faster with more community support, especially in the financial area. East Lubbock desperately needs to show that we are not a poor community. It is difficult to gain the confidence of investors and businessmen to come into East Lubbock when our income level reflects that we are economical poor. What is not understood by many outside East Lubbock is, though we have many using food stamps and on welfare, we still have an abundance of cash flowing. The Black Community must work with those out front to create a receptive atmosphere for those much needed and required

The current stigma attached to our community is low income, unemployables and drugs. Net much is publicized about the beauty of Mae Simmons Park, MLK Park with our lake, the nice homes, churches and citizens who are law abiding and hard working. It would be great if someone would donate about 300 to 500 bumper stickers that state: "I AM PROUD TO LIVE IN EAST LUBBOCK". We need to promote our community as a place that is worthy to be a part of, be it a resident, business person or a regular visitor. Today's world requires you to look out for yourself, to pat yourself on the back. Who better than those who live, work and play in East Lubbock should in!tlate an all out campaign to promote our community as the greatest place in Texas.

To the new community watch dogs, don't become dismayed or feel your efforts are not being noted and appreciated. You must always keep in your mind that we still have too many who must be "spoon fed", pampered and provided unnecessary attention before gaining their support and cooperation. For this reason, more people are needed to handle "spreading the true gospel" about



Press Conference Of ELDA

(Editor's Note: Here is a copy of the release issued by the members of the newly formed East Lubbock Development Association (ELDA) on Tuesday, April 18, 1989 at 2 p. m. in the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce office. Making the presentation was Lon Rolle, board member; with Rev. Kado Lang and Eddie P. Richardson, both Lubbook Black Chamber of Entreprenuers, Inc. members and T. J. Patterson, City Councilman, District II, were present).

"Why ELDA?"

We must examine Lubbook historically to paint the

scenario to validate the need for ELDA.

Americans of African decent have been in Lubbock since 1910, for approximately 80 years. Logically, this 80 year perior can be divided into 2, forty (40) year periods. The significant of this division is readily obvious. Furthermore, this division allows for an easily discernable approach to presenting pertinent and specific points peculiar to each forty year period.

A. The first 40 year per'ad was characterized by the following:

(1.) On January 25, 1923, the city was asked to restrict Americans of African Lecent to a cartain portion of the Southeast part of the Old Town Addition. The ordinance for such was established and successful; the location of the Black population was controlled.

(2.) In 1926 an ordinance was introduced which restricted Americans of African decent from riding the bus. That ordinance was in effect until 3 years later when the city commission amended the ordinance, but stated that passengers were required to ride in the rear in a separate space or compariment provided for them.

(3.) Furthermore, a city ordinance was developed which required all wild west shows, carnivals and the like to be performed "east of the tracks."

(4.) Inspite of these degarding attitudes and practices, certain men stood in the community and homes were established, businesses were developed, and churches grew.

B. The second 40 year period was characterized by the following.

(1.) Liban renewal destroyed the sense of community developed in the first 43 year period. (2.) Large areas of vacant land exists now where

homes and prosperous businesses once were. (3.) Drugs are now rampantry being distributed and used. Consequently, our youth are being destroyed daily. Officials are helpless to stop it.

Cardiovascular Fitness Dr. Heenan Johnson, ill

Almost everyone believes that exercise is peneficial to good health. Studies have shown that the risk of hert shown that risk of head diseases such as myocardial interction and coronary artery disease can be reduced.
