SPS Signs Contract To Cut Coal Costs

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) has negotiated contracts that will significantly reduce costs customers eventually pay for hauling coal by rail from Wyoming mines for use at SPS power plants, such as Tolk Station near Muleshoe, company officials announced Wednesday.

New contracts with the Burlington Northern Railroad and the Santa Fe Railway will lower costs of delivering coal to the power plants by about \$27 million in 1985, said Bert Ballengee, SPS president and

chief operating officer.

"The new contracts will save our customers an estimated \$790 million through the year 2002," Ballengee said.

Ballengee cautioned, "These contracts provide an excellent overall savings for customers. We're lowering fuel costs by some five to six percent. But, of course, purchasing fuel on the open market—as we must do—remains expensive for us, as it is for everyone."

The new contracts will hold down the average SPS residential customer's electricity bill by about \$1.07 per month, Ballengee said. The reduction could begin as early as 1985.

The average SPS residential customer uses 635 kilowatt hours of electricity monthly. The average monthly bill for a residential customer in Texas is \$45.91, plus sales tax. An average New Mexico customer pays \$46.94, plus tax. The average customer in Oklahoma pays \$49.27 per month, plus tax. In Kansas, the price of 635 kwh is \$51.33, plus sales tax.

Southwestern's last general rate change, an increase, was in mid-1982.

The importance of the new contracts will become more apparent in the future, Ballengee said, when SPS

An interesting and most unusual 'drill' was conducted in Muleshoe on Wednesday night. Unknown to most people, Gerry Pierce of Combination Motors moved a car onto a lot behind the Muleshoe Fire Department truck storage building around dark.

Firemen, EMT's and a few local police officers gathered at the location shortly after 7:30 p.m. and the drill was underway.

Acting as though they were working on a real emergency, but at a slower pace, as it was a teaching session, the emergency crew went through the entire drill for evacuation and rescue of the two real victims who were inside the car which was turned on its side.

Gasoline (real gasoline) had leaked out of the tank, and the gasoline had to be removed, or covered, to provide safety for the firemen and EMT's who were conducting the drill.

A fire truck was moved into

position near the car, the rescue van was moved into position, the firemen and EMT's donned their working clothes, which included helmets, boots, coats, coveralls, gloves and other protective devices and went to work.

As some of the newer firemen are being trained in the use of the "Jaws of Life" the drill was conducted precisely and slowly. Trained Jaws of Life operators opened the car door slowly and carefully, going over each step of the rescue operation as they worked. Other firemen were securing the area, and making sure that the working area for all emergency personnel was as safe as possible.

Once the door was opened, and the windshield removed, EMT's went to work with lifesaving measures before the victims were removed from the car. Once the victims were secured and removed, the EMT's then administered other lifesaving measures to the victims.

Instructors J.O. Parker and Larry Rasco reviewed the exercise after it was all over, making corrections and commending everyone's participation and attendance.

It was suggested that such training be conducted on a regular basis involving fire department personnel, EMT personnel and law enforcement officers.

Fire Department Reporter Wayne Peterson told the Journal Friday that over the last 60 days, the Jaws of Life has been called upon six times.

"With updated training as we had Wednesday night, we think lives can be saved," said Peterson.

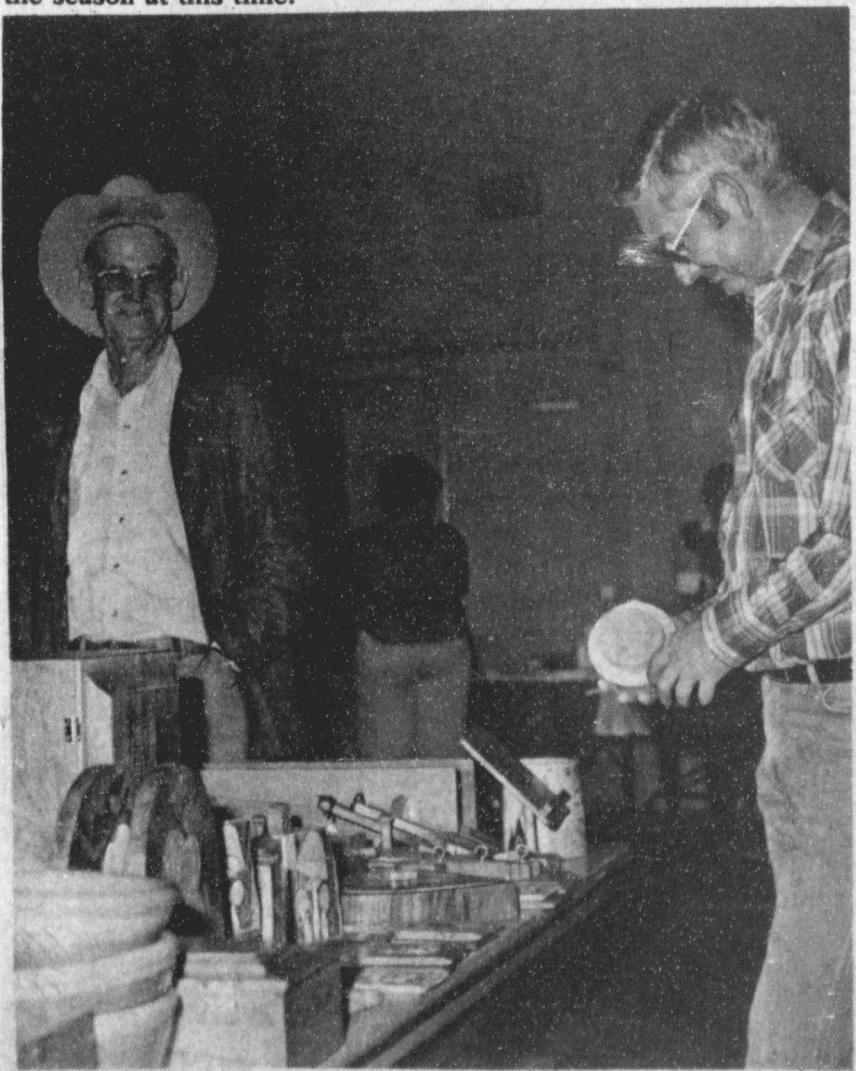

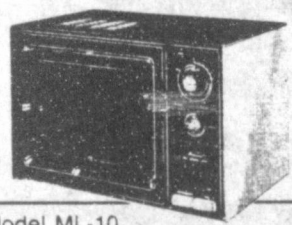

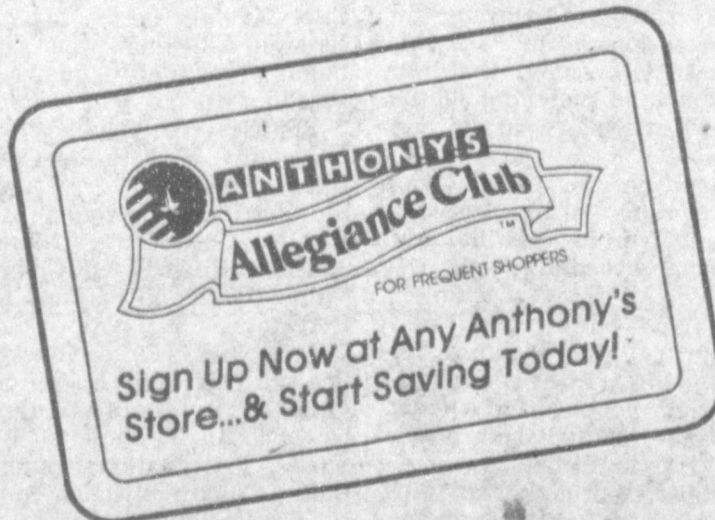

Attending this were Ila Ruth Gilreath, Verdine Gann, Earlene Kropp, Esther Meeks, Seva Ray and Ouida Parrish.

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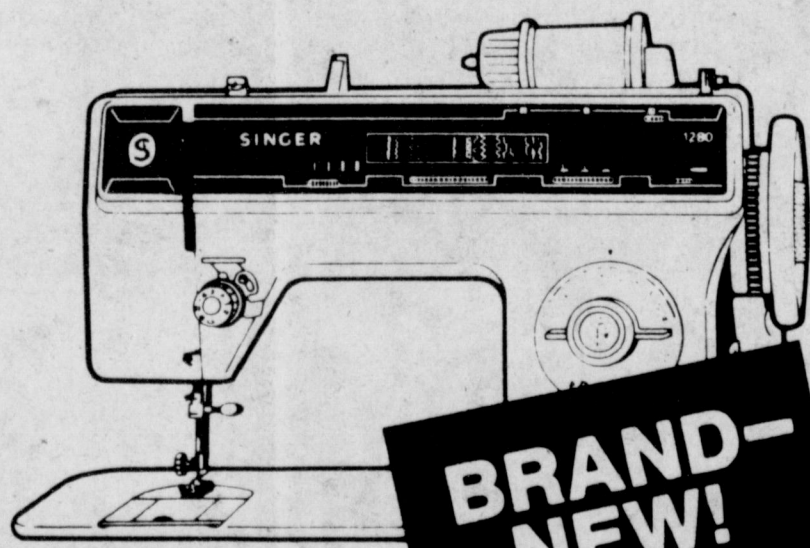
WMU of the Trinity Baptist Church met Tuesday, Nov. 27 at the church for Bible study with five members present.

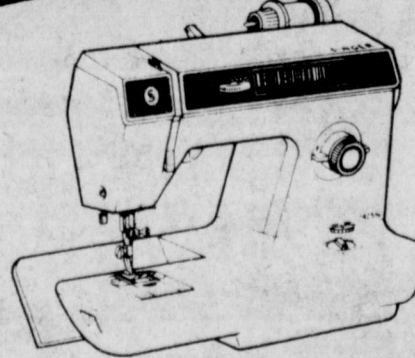
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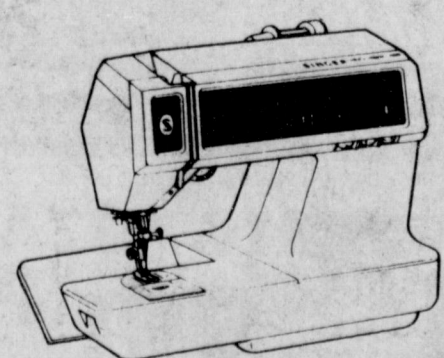
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The Creative Woman

generates significantly greater proportions of its electricity at coal-fueled plants. The company will bring a new coal-fired power plant unit into service in August 1985, and plans still another for service in the early 1990s.

Presently, coal fuels the boilers at two SPS power plants, near Amarillo and near Muleshoe, generating about 56 percent of the company's electricity. Natural gas fuels the boilers at the company's other power plants.

The coal-fueled plants generate significantly less expensive electricity than do the natural gas-fueled plants. Ballengee said. "Our fuel costs at the coal-fueled plants are less than one-half of the fuel costs at the natural gas-fueled plants. Our coal-fueled plants are playing a major role in keeping electricity affordable."

He said the newly renegotiated contracts with the Burlington Northern and the Santa Fe railroads, signed last week, are particularly important because in recent years the cost of transporting coal by rail from Wyoming to the Texas power plants had grown higher than the costs of the coal itself. "For our customers' sakes, we had to reverse that trend," Ballengee said.
