# UMC/TTHSC Surgery Department

When 1991 began, most people on the South Plains probably had given little thought to surgery and what types of operations were available to them. Now, not even a year later, almost everyone at least knows that something — something exciting — is going on.

The real excitement started in March when G. Tom Shires, M. D., arrived in Lubbock from Cornell University Medical College in New York. He came to fill the position of chairman of the Department of Surgery at Texas Tech Health Sciences Center and chief of surgery at University Medical Center, positions left open after the deaths of former chairman Peter Canizaro, M. D., and Timothy Hamar, M. D.

Even before the arrival of Dr. Shires, the media started reporting his credentials: most influential academic surgeon in the country, consultant to the Surgeon General, author of hundreds of books and articles and former president of countless national professional organizations. He brought with him a 10-year research grant, one of only a few awarded by the National Institute of Health.

But what he would bring in the coming months was even more impressive. Within a few months, he had recruited some of the most impressive surgeons in the nation, physicians 'any hospital would like to have,' according to Dr. Shires.

Recruits already on board include Drs. William Millikin, a liver surgeon, who is starting the South Plains' first liver transplant program; Matcolm Perry, a peripheral vascular surgeon; George Raschbaum, a pediat-

ric surgeon; and Cathy Ronaghan, a general surgeon.

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
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A special welcome to the vititors who were present last Sunday morning by Sister Julia Swain.

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

Another book that you might want to pick up and read one of these days is "Poorest Of Americans: The Mexican-American of the Lower Rio Grande Valley of Texas' by Robert Lee Maril. It was published by the University of Notre Dame in 1989.

In the future the whole country will be watching to see what if any positive benefits the new trade arrangements with Maxico will have on economic development in the Valley. The fair thing would be to insure that a fair share of the enormous wealth that will be flowing back and forth along the border remains on the border. Unfortunately, doing the right thing has never been a strong point of the powers that be.

As many of you know, there are no major universities below San Antonio. In other words, the kids from the Rio Grande Valley must travel north to get a good education or to attend graduate school . The kids graduating from that area of Texas are in a similar situation a those kids in this state who live in poor school districts. You know what happened in the law suit on behalf of poor school districts and children that was spearheaded by MAL-DEF

On October 1st MALDEF lawyers will be starting a trial in the Valley in Edinburg that will seek a decision declaring the higher education system of Texas illegal. After MALDEF wins it will have a dramatic effect on the funding for the University of Texas and Texas A&M because, unless taxes are raised, there will be a Robin Hood approach to solving the problem that will mean talking money from the two major universities and moving it to the Rio Grande Valley and possibly to West Lexas.

There will be a fund raising banquet for MAI.DEF in San Antonio on October 3rd. Folks wanting to buy tickets or contribute money to support the good work of MALDEF can contact my law

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
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

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FROM THE PARSON D. A. SMITH

When one study the life of the Apostle Peter, there seem not to be any evidence that he ever doubted the supernatural character of Jesus after that first day when he decided to accept Him as the Messiah. Each day of His life was a schoolmaster to Peter for he learned about the nature and purposes of Jesus. He heard the teaching of Jesus, including the parables and the Sermon on the Mount. He was there to witness the miracles of Jesus. He must have been profoundly affected by the feeding of the five thousand when Jesus spread the table in the wilderness and made them sit on the green grass in the sunset and gave them that which to their way rejoicing. The same profounded affect must have captivated Peter as Christ, the Controller of Nature, --- as the bread had proclaim Him its creator -- between three and six o'clock in the morning hushed the wind and tread upon the waves of the Sea of Galilee.

The day after that experience, Jesus entered a synagogue in Capernaum. The crowd was preplexed as to how and when Jesus had gone to the other side of the sea. When they could not find Him on the eastern shore, they came in large numbers to the western shore where they found Him.

This crowd, like all Jews of the time, saw in Jesus the fulfillment of prophecies fondly remembered, of hopes long deferred. They saw the lawgiver as being a second Moses; the Deliverer who was to be a conqueror greater than Joshua; a king more glorious than David, wiser than Solomon, who was here at last. This crowd of rude, simple people had come together from the hill country of Galilee, where traditions had been handed down from age to age by word of mouth. This group of people with an instinct that as truer and stronger than the opinions of the learned Jewish scribes and rulers, perceived that the bred which they received in such abundance could only have been supplied by God Himself, and that in Him who fed them. God was revealed as clearly as when He spoke by the prophots to their forefathers. Peter and the other disciples were also expecting a prophet like Moses.




