### Black Chamber Intern Wins National Competition

Texas Tech Upward Bound student, Tasheba M. Humphrey, recently scored first place in the National Stock Market team competition at Columbia University. The competition, sponsored by the LEAD (Leadership Education and Development) program was held at the New York campus of Columbia University. The National Stock Competition consisted of five-member teams throughout the United States investing \$100,000 in mock venture capital on the New York Stock Exchange. Miss Humphrey's team placed first among six teams at Columbia University. According to Miss Humphrey, "First our team won locally in New York, then we competed against other teams from top schools across the country like Duke and UCLA."

Tasheba, the daughter of Don and Gayle Humphrey, will be a senior at Estacado High School in the fall. She admits that she first became interested in business when she became involved in FBLA (Future Business Leaders of America), where she served as District Secretary. She was introduced to the LEAD program of Boston, Massachusetts, because of her participation in the Upward Bound Program at Texas Tech. Tasheba was one of only 200 students selected from over 800 applicants. Also, while enrolled in the Upward Bound Program this summer, Tasheba served as an intern with the Lubbock Black Chamber of Entrepreneurs, Inc.

Miss Humphrey said, "The internship gave me a valuable exposure into the Black business community of Lubbock. Mr. Eddie P. Richardson, executive director, was great. He even talked about organizing a young entrepreneurs' group. I

am very excited about that." Tasheba also said, "The highlight of the four weeks I spent in New York was going to the Apollo Theater to see Sinbad and meeting Bill Cosby. The classes weren't bad either; we had classes like business law, micro and macro economics, management, and negotiations. ### Shepherd Says: 'The Nigger Word Is Back'

Rev. McKinley Shepherd made it known to the Southwest Digest his concern of former State Representative Dick Waterfield, (Rep.-Canadian) who resigned July 31, 1991 as an assistant commissioner of the Texas Department of Agriculture, after allegations that he made a racist remark to a group of businessmen seeking a state loan.

Charles Wood, president of Mesquite County, Inc. in Abilene, Texas, accused Waterfield of using the term "nigger" while discussing a loan application with Wood and three other company officials in a private meeting in May. Waterfield would not return telephone calls last week. Waterfield said the allegations are "unfounded."

Nevertheless, Waterfield resigned claiming he could no longer function in a manner that is in the best interest of the Texas Agriculture Finance Authority.

Wood stated on July 30,

1991 that "the Texas Department of Agriculture, led by Ricky Perry, has not only created several new abuses, but also perpetuated racism and discrimination coupled with threats."

Woods further stated that "as of today, the Texas Department of Agriculture has employed persons who have practiced unethical and immoral practices." Mesquite County, Inc. requested information regarding employment of minorities. Woods says he received a reply.

According to Woods, the reply was "We already have one nigger in the program. We don't need another."

Woods went on to state that it's "only intention is exposing this corruption to reveal to the people of Texas the type of persons they have chosen to lead their state with the election of Rick Perry."

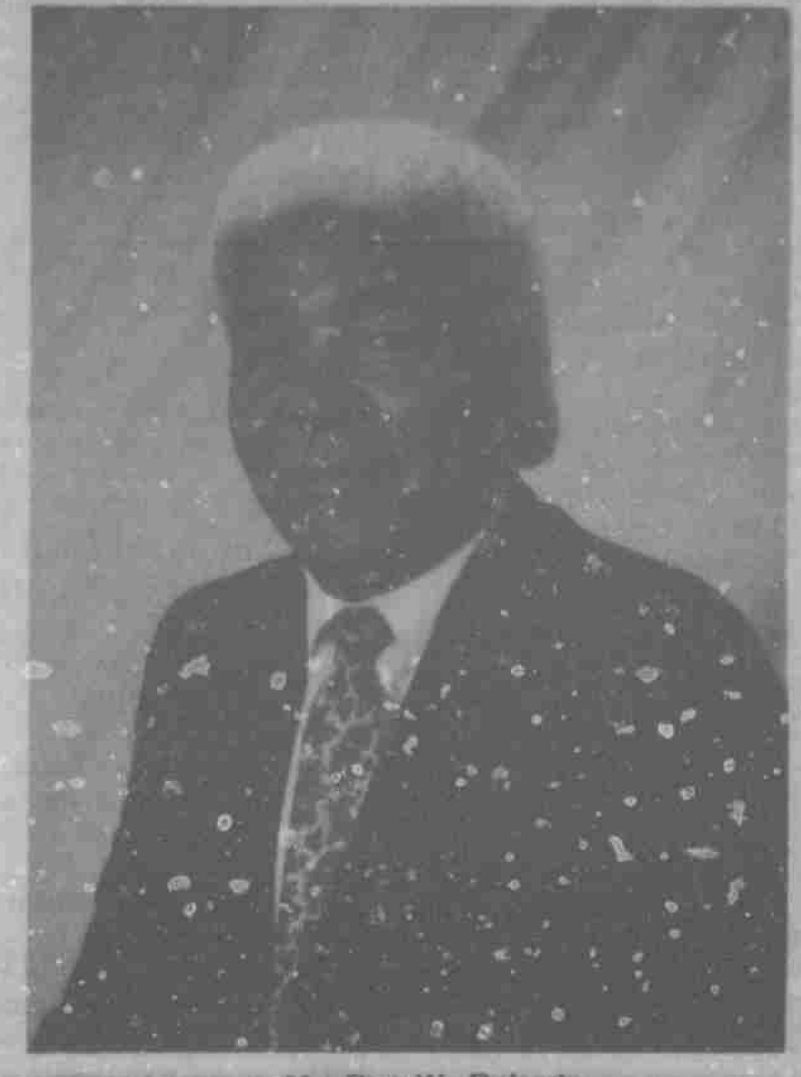

### Roberts Enters Hall of Fame

San Antonio, Tx. -- Roy W. Roberts, former band director at Dunbar High School in Lubbock, Texas, was installed July 29, 1991, in the Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame in ceremonies held in connection with the annual Convention of the Texas Bandmasters Association meeting in San Antonio.

Roy Roberts is an outstanding man who was born November 23, 1923 in Eufaula, Oklahoma. He attended school in Muskogee, Oklahoma, where he played alto saxophone four years in the Manual Training High School marching, concert, and jazz bands. Upon graduation from high school, he received a scholarship to Wiley College in Marshall, Texas. Roy left school after two years to play professionally in Houston. It was while he was in Houston he was drafted into the U. S. Navy, where he played in a Navy band for three years. Upon discharge from the Navy, he wanted to complete his education so he returned to college at Sam Houston College in Austin. He received his bachelor of arts degree and teacher's certification in music. He later received his master's degree in educational administration from Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

Roy's first teaching job was in Frederick, Oklahoma where he spent three years developing a band program at Boyd High School. Moving to Lubbock in 1952, he assumed the duties as band director at Dunbar High School. His Dunbar bands were of such fine caliber he was asked by the area band directors to stage "exhibitions" of marching bands in the U. I. L. marching contests. His jazz bands were in constant demand to perform throughout the area. His concert bands were superior in every respect. The Dunbar

band first attended contest at the Prairie View Interscholastic League, where they won sweepstakes ratings, and then in 1960, the Black West Texas League was formed and Dunbar again won sweepstakes awards. In 1967, Dunbar High School band was accepted into the U. I. L. where they continued their superior ratings.

After 18 years as band director at Dunbar High School, Roy made a decision to become assistant principal at Estacado High School. One year later, he returned to Dunbar with a promotion to principal where he stayed until he retired in 1984.

Roy has always been, and still is, active in many professional and community service organizations. He is always

there for you if you need help of any kind. Through his love and concern for his students, and with lots of encouragement -- many, many of those students who might have dropped out of high school now have a college degree of their own and are very successful. Roy was selected "Administrator of the Year" for the Lubbock independent School District in 1978, and "Man of the Year" by the Lubbock Alumni Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. in 1980. Roy Roberts is an inspiration to all.

The Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame is sponsored by Alpha Chapter of Phi Beta Mu, an International Bandmasters Fraternity. To be eligible for consideration, band director must have produced and maintained an outstanding and consistent band program in the Texas public schools as well as having enjoyed a long and successful career. Hall of Fame members must be over the age of 65 and retired from active teaching. This recognition is also granted posthumously to deceased directors.

The Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame is housed in the state headquarters of the Texas Music Educators Association in Austin. Pictures of all elected members are displayed and portfolios outlining the accomplishments of each director are maintained in files which are available for viewing as well as research. The files also contain recordings of each director's bands. Since Phi Beta Mu initiated the Hall of Fame in 1975, only 82 band directors have been honored. A standing committee of the fraternity accepts nominations once a year and then pursues an evaluation process of each candidate prior to election by the active Alpha Chapter membership.

Roy is married to Harvey Ester Roberts and together they have five children, namely: Roy, Jr., Ramon, Michael, Joey and Royla Michele.

## CRAZY HORSE

There are a number of myths about poor people. You have heard them repeated by Phil Gramm and Larry Combest. There are, however, some facts about poverty. For example:

1. One out of five American children live in small families, contrary to stereotype. About 2 out of 3 families with poor children have only one or two kids.
2. Poverty is split almost evenly between urban and rural areas. It is just an urban problem. Only one-third of poor children live in the city. Suburbs have the fastest growing rate.
3. The poor work. Nearly two-thirds of poor families have at least one employed worker. More than one in five homeless people work at least one job.
4. Poverty has continued to increase despite the so-called economic recovery declared by the Reaganistas. Do not blindly accept the mean spirited declarations of politicians. They are slamming the poor in order to justify further cuts in programs that work and more tax breaks for the rich.

Many of you have heard various vague allegations concerning George Bush and the Reaganistas and relationship to the CIA. Maybe one of these days we will hear just a small part of the whole story. This past week it was pointed out in the national media that the CIA was involved in the BCCI bank scandal. The largest bank scandal in the history of the world. The investigation is ongoing now. They are still not sure whether they are getting the truth. Washington reporters working on sensitive stories still retreat to pay phones for their most delicate calls, and controversial politicians worry about the privacy of files in their offices and homes. Some executive branch officials agree that it is always a good idea to be careful -- one never knows to what lengths the spies of the Soviets, the Chinese, and the other potentially hostile foreign powers might go. But it was not these spies whom the journalists, senators and congressmen feared; it was the ones who work for their own government.\*

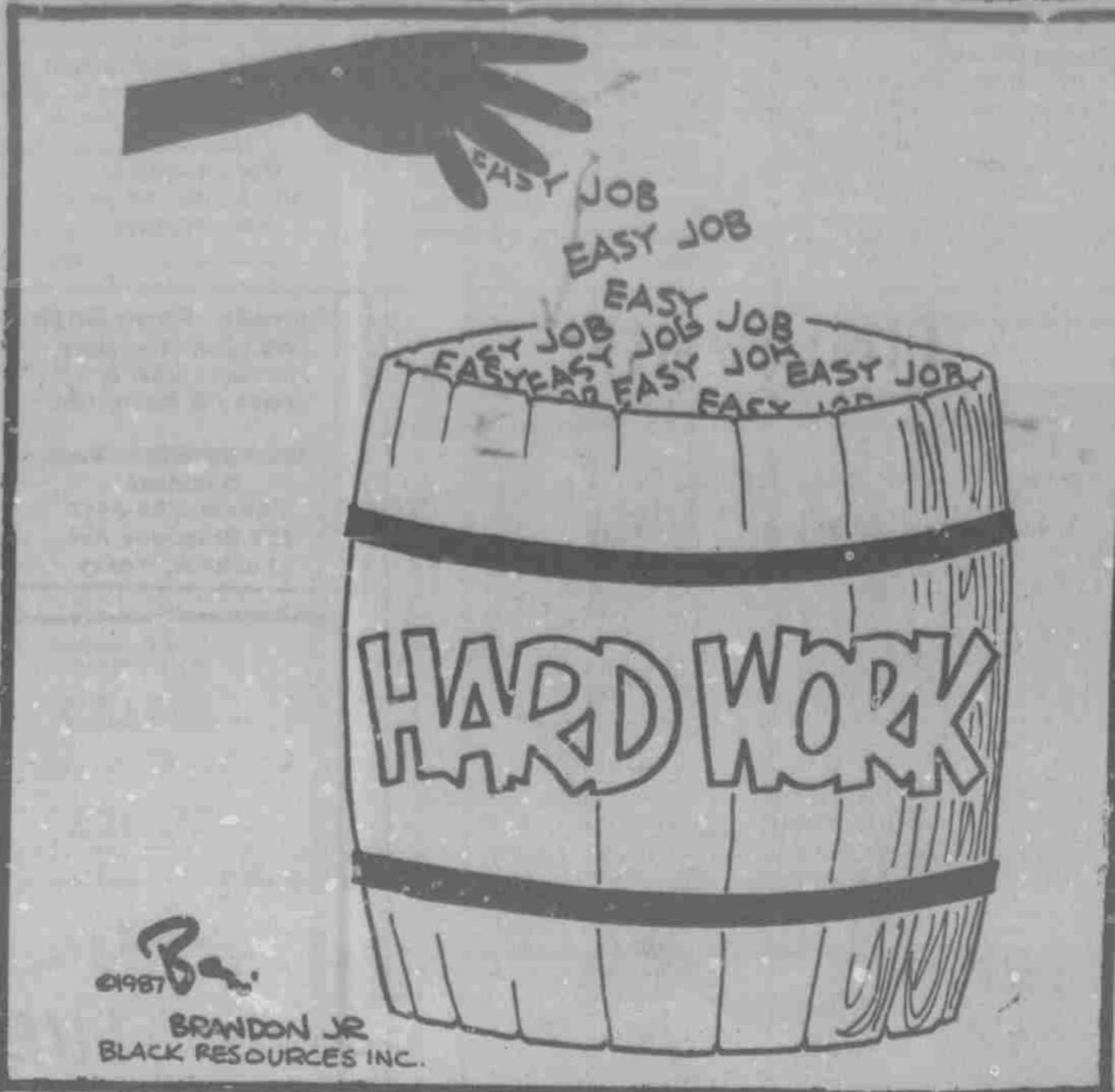

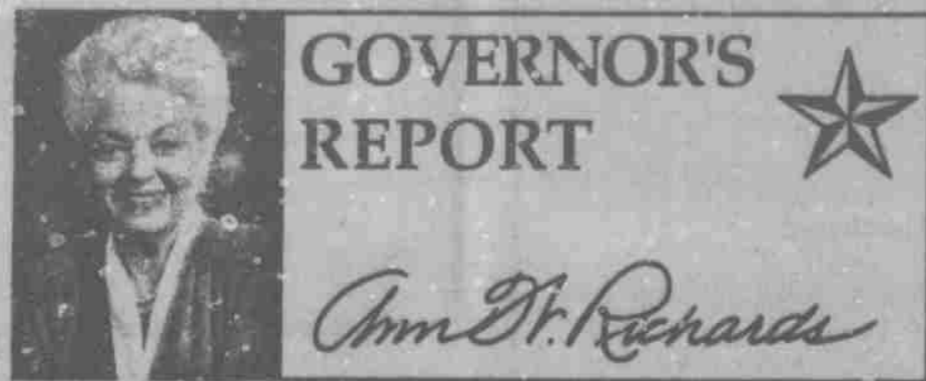

### Setting priorities for government

As the Legislature begins the special called session faced with the difficult task of making significant cuts in state spending, it is important to understand how we arrived at this point.

Texas boards and commissions allowed their agencies to submit budget requests for \$13 billion more than available revenue for the upcoming biennium. Their requests would have burdened the taxpayers of Texas with a new tax bill totalling \$750 for every man, woman and child in the state.

Even after cutting these requests to a level that would only maintain the "current level" of services and still meet federal and judicial mandates, Texas taxpayers would still be facing a bill for a \$4.8 billion shortfall.

I believe it is irresponsible to saddle the people of Texas with that kind of tax burden without first doing our best to cut waste, inefficiency and needless duplication. For that reason, the first bill I signed into law in 1991 charged State Comptroller John Sharp with re-evaluating how Texas spends its money.

It makes little sense that budget writers pull out their pencils every two years to write a budget, only to consider state agency budgets that automatically add to whatever they spent the year before. We must cultivate the habit of looking first at what we spent last year to see whether we need to spend that amount again.

Comptroller Sharp performed that vital task for us this time. He delivered on his promise to "break the mold" of inefficient state government. His multi-agency task force of talented auditors, including several from my office, identified opportunities to cut \$4.0 billion from the shortfall that faces us.

We now have an obligation to the people of Texas to enact the cuts recommended by Sharp's *Texas Performance Review*. The chart outlines how I propose to eliminate the budget shortfall, and address our budget priorities.

The special called session which began on July 15 will be divided into three priority areas:

#### Priority I -- Cutting State Government

- Pass the Performance Audits and cut \$4 billion from the budget shortfall.
- Eliminate and consolidate executive agencies and reduce the number of appointed board positions.
- Save money through consolidation and streamlining.
- Reorganize agencies with the customer in mind; provide the best service for the lowest cost.

#### Priority II -- Spending State Money Wisely

- Get Texas out of court. Spend our money wisely to resolve lawsuits over:
  - mental health
  - mental retardation
  - prisons
  - county jails
  - public education
  - Medicaid payments to hospitals
- Provide funds so that all teachers will have health insurance.
- Provide a cost of living increase in benefits to retired teachers.
- Protect state employees from the rising cost of health insurance.
- Build 15,000 new prison beds to keep the most violent offenders behind bars.
- Provide treatment for substance abuse so that we can break

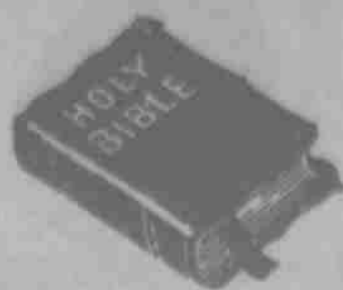

The word backbiting means to say and evil things about another person behind his or her back. It means to harm another person by slander or libel. The sin of backbiting is the sin of evil speaking so as to condemn, to lower or disgrace the reputation of another, to malign another. As such, the backbiter is a defamer, an evil speaker, a slanderer.

Pernicious and evil speaking floods the world as some weeds cover the fields in early summer. One year as I drove through an abundance of farmland, I saw many acreage of grain almost hidden by a yellow sea of flowering weeds. For the moment, one would think that it was not possible that any corn would come to perfection. However, among the weeds a harvest is reaped, but the harvest would be much greater had the field been clean. Evil speaking, backbiting, like one dominant weed, covers the surface of our world's society and chokes much of the growth of the good seed.

This common and accepted sin today is listed of a generation that practiced every vice that could be conceived of by the wicked imagination of a degenerate and deprived people. It is listed with adultery, murder, disobedience, idolatry, unrighteousness, and envy. It is with this unholy company all backbiters belong and are associated.

The sin of backbiting is a sin of untruth or half truths. Usually this evil speaking consists of half truths designed to slander a person. If you should ever quote the person who told the lie, that person would deny it or tell you that you misunderstood them.

## Sen. Johnson Urges Passages Of Amendments

Austin -- State Senator Eddie Bernice Johnson (D-Dallas) called on Texans to vote in favor of both proposed constitutional amendments on the special election ballot August 10th.

The vote on Amendment One will decide whether "... to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property," the ballot reads.

"Approval of Amendment One empowers the new County Education Districts to grant certain exemptions authorized by the voters," Senator Johnson said. "This amendment is particularly important to homeowners who are disabled or over 65 years of age."

Texas' new finance law, created by Senate Bill 351 during the regular session, calls for the establishment of 188 county education districts.

If Amendment One is approved, the governing bodies of county education districts will not have the authority to grant these partial exemptions or to decide whether to tax personal property not used to produce income. Instead, the voters of each county will make these decisions at an election held for that purpose.

Amendment Two reads, "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."

"Education is vital to the future of our state," the Senator said. "These bonds will provide the resource for thousands of Texans financially unable to seek a college or university education."

### 1991-92 Dress Code

Note: Most of the provisions of the dress code, Board Policy FNCA (Local), are the same as for the past school year. Two changes have been made: 1. Under general guidelines for pictures, emblems, or writing on clothing, there no longer is a statement referring to heavy metal rock groups. 2. Under specific guidelines, number: 1, a statement explaining how the regulation on the length of dresses, skirts, shorts, and culottes applies to elementary students.

#### Purpose

The District's dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, instill discipline, prevent disruption, avoid safety hazards, and teach respect for authority.

#### General Guidelines

Students shall be dressed and groomed in a manner that is clean and neat and that will not be a health or safety hazard to themselves or others. The District prohibits any clothing or grooming that in the principal's judgment may reasonably be expected to cause disruption of or interference with normal school operations.

The District prohibits pictures, symbols, emblems, or writings on clothing that:

1. Are lewd, offensive, vulgar, or obscene.
2. Advertise or depict tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, drugs, or any other substance prohibited under FNCF(L). (Policy on alcohol, drug use.)
3. Refer to satanic, cult, or gang activities.

The student and parent may determine the student's personal dress and grooming standards, provided that they comply with the general guidelines set out above and as outlined in policy and found in the student handbook and/or discipline management plan.

#### Specific Guidelines

1. Clothing (dresses, skirts, shorts, culottes) may not be shorter than the top of the knee for secondary students. Similar clothing (dresses, skirts, shorts, culottes) for elementary students must meet standards of good taste as determined by the building principal.
2. Clothing that has been modified in a revealing manner will not be allowed.
3. Bicycle shorts will not be allowed.
4. Footwear shall be a part of regular attire. Tongs and bathroom or house shoe-type footwear are not acceptable.
5. A bare midriff is unacceptable.
6. Appropriate undergarments shall be worn at all times.
7. The hair shall be clean, well groomed, and

not covering the eyes. A variety of hairstyles shall be permitted if the following extremes are avoided:

- geometric or unusual patterns shaved or cut in hair

- color variations in hair
- ponytails, rat-tail, and braid (for boys)
- longer than shoulder length (for boys)

8. Sideburns shall be kept trimmed so as not to form a beard and shall not be extreme in fullness. Mustaches shall be acceptable if neatly trimmed. Beards shall not be acceptable.

9. The neck opening on any type shirt or blouse may not exceed the equivalent of the second button below the collar of a dress shirt or blouse. Underwear type shirts, such as tank tops or muscle shirts, are not acceptable. Shirts that have sleeves cut out of them are also unacceptable.

10. Male students shall not wear earrings. Nose studs may not be worn by any student.

#### Violations

**Grooming** If the principal determines that a student's grooming violates the dress code, the student shall be given an opportunity to correct the problem at school. If not corrected, the student shall be assigned to in-school suspension for the remainder of the day or until the problem is corrected.

**Dress** A student whose clothing violates the dress code shall be assigned to in-school suspension either for the remainder of the day or until a parent or designee brings an acceptable change of clothing to the school.

Repeated offenses may result in more serious disciplinary action. Appropriate discipline procedures shall be followed in all cases. (Outlined in policies FO, FDA, and FOD.)

#### Extracurricular Activities

The principal, in cooperation with the sponsor, coach, or other person in charge of an extra-curricular activity, may regulate the dress and grooming of students who participate in the activity. Students who violate those standards may be removed or excluded from the activity for a period determined by the principal or sponsor and may be subject to other disciplinary action. (Outlined in policies FO, FDA, and FOD.)





## Fans vs. Players

Lately, we have had a series of nasty incidents of direct physical confrontations between fans and players. Over and over again, players have gotten into shouting matches with fans who were heckling them. A few have thrown baseballs into the stands, usually hitting an innocent spectator, and others have actually left the field and climbed into the seats to confront fans.

In my opinion, this is wrong. Fans are too important to baseball to be treated this way. Without them, the players, owners and everyone else involved with the game would be out of jobs.

It is unusual in one sense that this problem has become so bad now. The new ballparks place the fans much farther away from the players. In the old parks, like the Dodgers' Ebbets Field in Brooklyn, fans were right on top of us. It was the same in the old park in St. Louis.

The fans in Philadelphia and New York are tough, but they are educated fans. They really know their baseball in those cities. I guess the fans who were toughest on me were the "bleacher bums" in Chicago. But again, they are very knowledgeable, very smart fans. They know baseball, and when you loaf, they know it. When they see a million-dollar player doing something he shouldn't, they let him have it. And there's nothing wrong with that.

That's where the line should be drawn. I don't think fans should get so abusive as to talk about a player's family or turn the situation into a personal vendetta. Those fans don't need to be in the ballpark. But if they want to yell, "You bum, you struck out!" that doesn't bother me.

As for the players, I believe that if they were more involved in their own game rather than in what fans were yelling, then no amount of heckling would bother them. No player has ever taken the abuse Jackie Robinson took when he broke into the major leagues. But he could really take it because he was concentrating on his job, which was playing good baseball.

When I was chasing Babe Ruth's record, there were some ballparks at which I was really taunted. But for the life of me, I can't imagine what the fan in the 15th row could say that would upset me enough to throw a baseball into the stands. That makes no sense to me.

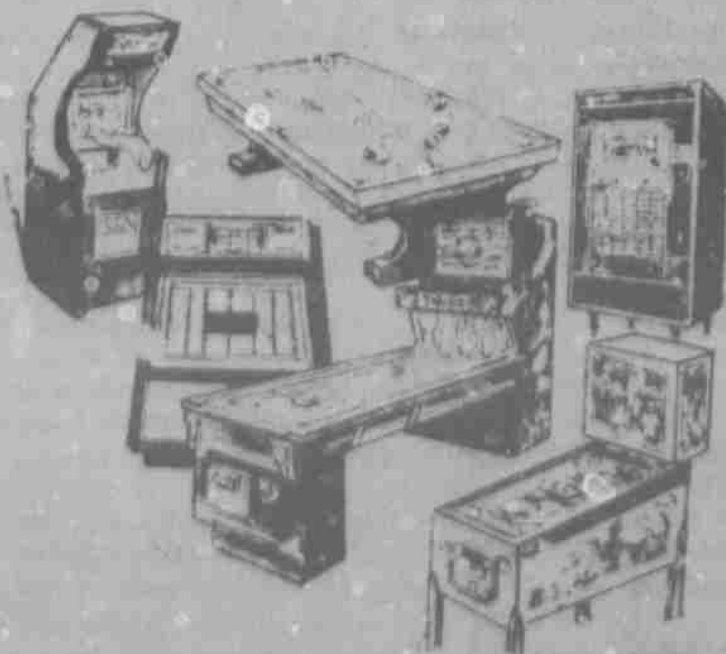

## Judge Shephard Gives Gov. Richards A "Good Report Card"

According to Judge McKinley Shephard, "Governor Ann Richards should receive an 'A' on her report card for her handling of state government."

Gov. Richards began her administration by declaring: "Texans aren't getting their money's worth out of government," and immediately went to work to cut cost, improve efficiency and identify untapped sources of revenue. Shephard says, "The Governor is fed up with the continuing growth of red tape, lack of accountability and the unchecked reward system in state government. That's why she's seeking the authority it will take to be an effective manager and get to the root of the inefficiencies and corruption in state government."

Her first step was to sign into law a bill that placed a freeze on state spending and called for performance audits of all state agencies to attest to her performances the Texas Monthly cheered Gov. Richards saying, "For the first time in goodness-knows-when, Texas has a real Governor." In a message from Governor Richards, Judge Shephard states that Gov. Richards said the following:

"During the recent legislative session we made important

progress in reordering the priorities of our state government. But laws don't work unless government does. That's why I've called a special session of the Legislature so we can reorganize state government from top to bottom and make it effectively meet the needs of the people of Texas. Texans deserve to get their money's worth out of state government -- but too much money is getting trapped in bureaucracies and not getting to the police officers, teachers, and others we depend on.

Continuing she said, "And I'm not going to listen to one word about taxes until we know what we're paying for. There are many other issues you and I care about -- but we cannot move one step further until we bring some sense to state government and make it accountable.

Concluding, Gov. Richards said: "In these next few weeks, I will continue to depend on your thoughts, your input, and your willingness to make your voice heard."
