Black Leaders, Organizations Set To Protest

Vote Problems Through Bush Inauguration Anger and frustration with election 2000 has not eased on the part of African-American officials, Black civil rights leaders and organizations. Several rallies and demonstrations will accompany the plethora of lawsuits being filed in Florida. Most leaders are using harsh language to address what they see as blatant violation of civil rights and aimed primarily at African American voters.

A series of events will kick off Jan. 20 with what the NAACP has deemed Dignity Day—an 8-month campaign around voter education, registration and civic awareness.

Despite the Bush administration's recent efforts to reach out to the Black community with the Colin Powell and Condoleezza Rice appointments and his meetings with Black clergy, NAACP head Kweisi Mfume, Revs. Al Sharpton and Jesse Jackson Sr., U.S. Rep. Corrine Brown (D-Fla.) and a growing list of dismissed voters are not idly accepting the the Bush win and are demanding that more attention be given to the fact that so many were disenfranchised election day.

"While the political campaign is over," Jackson said to the press last month, "the civil rights struggle to protect the franchise of our vote will continue."

"It's shameful to hear public testimony about conduct that would clearly suppress the voting strength of Florida's minority voters," Mfume said of the public hearings conducted by the NAACP in response to thousands of complaints of disenfranchisement and irregularity at the polls. "But it's a shame and a disgrace that no one seems to care except us."

In fact, one of the consistent frustrations among minority leaders has been the silence on the part of mainstream national leaders on the issue on harassment and possible fraud.

"The media, the leadership and even the president-elect has sidestepped the fundamental problem," said one congressional aide. "Americans were flatly denied their right to vote and there has been no call to investigate, no sounding of the alarm that our basic democracy is being killed here."

Mayors Speak Out On Supreme Court Decision

Mayor Wellington E. Webb, president of the National Conference of Black Mayors, Inc. (NCBM) and mayor of Denver, Colorado, addressed a rally, organized by the NAACP, in Miami, Florida at the Government Center Building. Mayor Webb was in Florida with 60 other African American mayors in attendance at the organization's Leadership Institute for Mayors (LIM2000) and board of directors' meeting.

He observed that "democracy, as we perceive it, suffered tremendous blow on Saturday...when the Supreme Court, which up to now has consistently championed states rights, made a complete reversal by interfering with the long-established right of a state Supreme Court to be the final interpreter of its own laws."

In Mayor Webb's statement, he likened the Supreme Court's decision to stop the counting of votes in Florida to the Dred Scott case in 1857 that a "black man has no rights which a white man is bound to respect, and with the 1896 decision in Plessy v. Ferguson, that separate but equal is a just result."

In his concluding remarks, he pledged NCBM's support of and NAACP effort of file lawsuits in connection with voting irregularities. He said "we(NCBM) will stand with you by filing an Amicus Brief because in this year of 2000, we are not going to sit idly by while many Americans' most precious gift of casting their vote is being taken away."

NCBM is a 26-year old nonpartisan, nonpolitical, nonprofit organization that provides technical assistance to 478 black mayors who collectively represent over 25 million people nationwide

Groundhog Day and its Ancient Traditions

On February 2, the groundhog is supposed to come out of his burrow, and if he sees his shadow, there will be six more weeks of winter. It's a minor holiday. Yet, Groundhog Day has roots in the ancient pre-Christian *Imbolc*, which occurs midway between the Winter Solstice and the Spring Equinox. *Imbolc* means "in the belly," and it signified the quickening of new life in the womb of Mother Earth as the seeds, planted at Solstice, began to stir. Brigit, "the bright one," goddess of the hearth, of poets, artisans, and craftsmen, and of fertility and midwifery, was honored on this day. Priestesses kept a sacred fire always burning in the temples in her name. Fire was associated with cleansing and purification.

The Catholic Church canonized Brigit, who was sometimes called the foster mother or midwife of Christ, and as the protector of households. "Candlemas" (St. Brigit's Day) marked the ritual purification of Mary, forty days after giving birth. All the candles to be used for the year by the church were blessed that day, and people placed a lit candle in each window of their homes. There was a saying, "If Candlemas Day be fair and bright, winter will have another flight."

More recently, February 2 has been commemorated in the movie *Groundhog Day*. A cantankerous

weatherman assigned to Punxsutawney, PA for their annual groundhog celebration discovers he must re-live the day until he gets it right. According to Trevor Albert, the film's producer: "Christian groups wrote saying they liked the Christian theology. The Buddhists wrote saying they loved the movies really appreciated the fact that it was made with a Buddhist philosophy. And the Jews wrote us, too."

Cathy Holt, author of the new book *The Circle of Healing: Deepening Our Connections with Self, Other, and Nature*, says "the movie reminds us that we create our own internal 'weather with our attitudes'. Having chosen to live one year (1999) as if it were her last, Holt began to see life differently.

"How would you live if this were the last day, or the only day in your life? Would you step off the same curb, into the same puddle as yesterday? Or would you live as if today mattered? What new flame can you ignite with your creative fire? Let's not take the 'hearth fire' of fossil fuel for granted, but it is as a sacred gift." The *Circle of Healing* (called a "self-help book and motivational guide extraordinaire" by NAPRA ReView) offers honest personal stories of healing, wisdom drawn from many traditions, and practices to promote insight.

Covenant to Offer Quarterly Falls Prevention Program

LUBBOCK—Ice and snow have wreaked havoc on the South Plains this winter, causing many accidents in the region. Although traffic accidents have been the main source of concern, the risk of injury from falls has increased with the inclement weather.

Covenant Health System's Owens-White Outpatient Rehabilitation Center will host a Falls Prevention Program from 1 to 5 p.m., Jan 25, at the Center, 4010 22nd St., geared toward adults who might be at risk of falling, or who think they might have balance problems.

The goal of the program is to provide screenings and recommendations to help decrease the number of falls and injuries associated with the falls. Different aspect of the program include:

- A screening for fall potential;
- Recommendations to prevent falls;
- Home exercise program to improve balance and decrease falls;
- Individuals therapy programs with physician referral;
- Tai Chi classes for fall prevention; and
- Home safety recommendations.

A team of physical therapy assistants will screen participants for balance, postural stability, health risks and environmental risks, and a written list of suggestions will be given to each person.

"Fall are the leading cause of hospitalization in elderly adults," said Linda Veale, director of Occupational and Physical Therapy and Owens-White. "Research has shown that participating in exercise programs and balance activities, safety-proofing the home and participating in a Tai Chi program can help prevent falls and injuries."

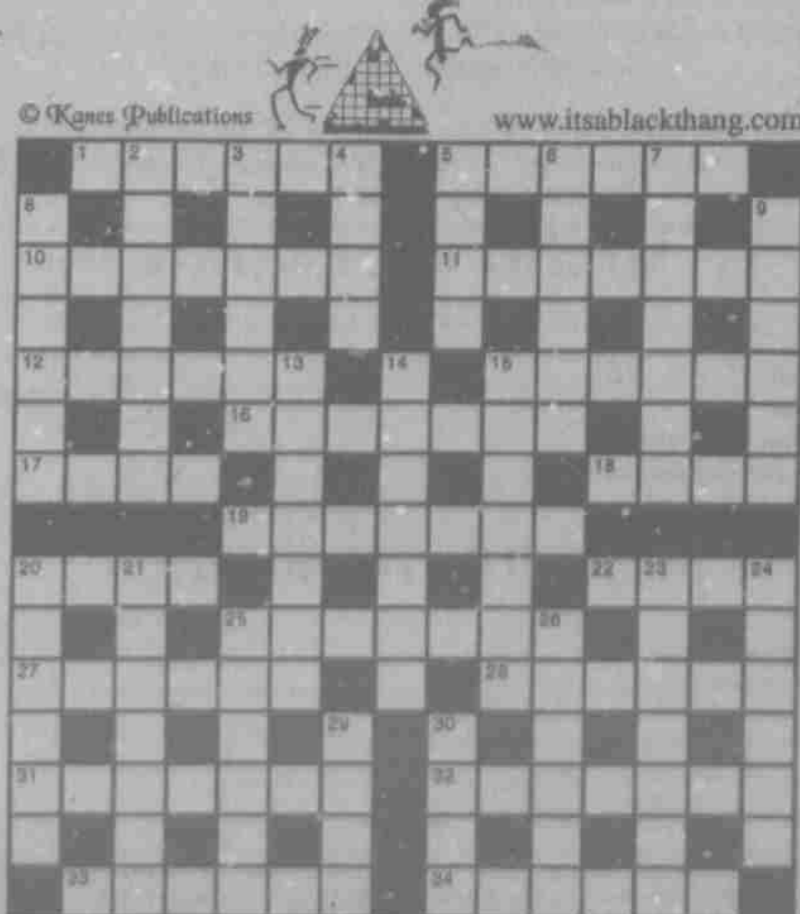

Health Club Membership

by John Cornyn, Attorney General of Texas

Q. One of my New Year's resolutions is to get into shape. I'm thinking about joining a health club, but I've heard troubling stories about health clubs and their contracts. What should I watch out for when shopping around for a health club?

A: Health clubs have become increasingly popular with people wanting to work out and get in shape. While many people are happy with the service they receive from health clubs, some are not.

Careful investigation before joining a health club is key. Visit a few health clubs you are interested in during the time of day that you plan on working out and compare. Is the health club crowded? Is there a long wait for the machines that you would like to use? Do you like the atmosphere? Are the machines, locker rooms, showers, and pool clean and well-maintained? Is the staff readily available for assistance? What qualifications or special training do the instructors have?

When speaking to a health club representative, find out if the health club offers free

trial memberships. If it does, give it a try and see if it meets your expectations.

Also, ask how many members the health club has and if there is a limit on the number of people who can join. The health club may not have been crowded during your initial visit. However, if the health club is new, or if you visited before everyone started working on their New Year's resolutions, the number of members may change.

In addition, find out what days and hours you can use the health club. Some health clubs are open seven days a week, while others are open to men on certain days and women on other days. If you're interested in puffing in some extra work-out time during the holidays, get their holiday schedule. Some health clubs have shorter hours or are closed on holidays.

It may be wise to take a few days to read the contract thoroughly. Make sure everything the representative promised is written in the contract. What is the health club's cancellation policy? Will you be able to get a refund for the unused portion if you do need to cancel? Will you be able to use other branches of the health club or transfer your

membership if you move?

When calculating payments, take finance charges and annual percentage rates into consideration. Check the contract for any additional sign-up or maintenance fees. Also, calculate the cost per week and per day to give you a better idea of how much you are paying to use the health club. You may wish to contact the Consumer Protection Division (CPD) of the Office of the Attorney General for complaints on file against a particular health club you are interested in joining. While CPD cannot attest to the legitimacy of a business, it can advise you whether any complaints have been filed against a business in the last two years.

It may be to your advantage to pay a little more money and join the health club for only a few months. You can see if it meets your needs and lifestyle, and if it doesn't, you won't be obligated to years of payments.

If you do have a dispute with a health club, you can take advantage of the dispute resolution service offered by CPD. You can request a complaint form by calling (800) 621-0508 or download the form from the Office of the Attorney General's Web site at www.oag.state.tx.us.

"No" to Raising the Salaries of Federal Judges

It may be somewhat suicidal for an attorney, who spends much of his time in federal court, to argue against a proposed salary hike for federal judges, recommended by Chief Justice William Rehnquist in his report to Congress. However, Rehnquist's proposal brings into focus the issue of public service vs. private sector parity, for which there is little or no public debate.

Currently, federal trial judges earn \$145,100 annually; and appellate judges, \$153,900 per year.

These are healthy salaries. And there is a bit more here than meets the eye. Federal judges also have law clerks, who are attorneys, to assist them. They have good office staffs, and excellent medical and pension benefits. There is also an excellent "senior status" (semi-retirement) plan whereby a retired judge can

continue to work at a reduced caseload.

A part from job and pay security — they have life tenure, federal judges receive great respect and prestige in our system of government, and, as the recent election demonstrated, have enormous power, even to the extent of deciding whom the President will be.

Rehnquist's argument is that the salaries of federal judges should get closer to what the jurists would earn in private practice, and he mentions \$500,000/year as a salary that a judge might command in the private sector.

I am of the view that attorneys' salaries in big law firms are obscenely high, and that, in any respect, so long as federal judges make a comfortable living compared to the rest of us, they should view their job as a public service. If they wish to make more money, they have the option of returning to the pri-

vate sector. There is no logic to the argument that taxpayers should reimburse them for what they would make if they were not judges. We don't accept that argument for other public servant positions; why do it for the judiciary?

There is a groundless assumption at play here: that higher pay attracts better judges. No one has ever offered a shred of evidence for this startling proposition. Does that mean that higher paid lawyers are better attorneys? Nothing in our history supports that premise.

I personally know scores of highly competent and dedicated lawyers all across the country, many of them already in public service, who would make excellent judges, and who currently draw salaries in the range of \$40,000-\$60,000. These lawyers may even have a greater sense of the day-to-day struggles of common

people than do attorneys from the large, politically-powerful, silk-stocking law firms. Yet, Rehnquist is not talking about these good, dedicated, and decent public servants; he is talking about maintaining a legal system (oligarchy, if you will) that is elitist.

Nowhere in Rehnquist's report does he even offer a plea to increase funds for legal services programs for poor and low-income people, who are critically under served. Nor does Rehnquist mention funding to establish pro bono programs to encourage and organize wealthy lawyers to provide more community service themselves. And, of course, the Chief Justice makes scant mention of providing funds to help shore up the country's abysmal public defender system.

One wonders, when reading the Chief Justice's report, whether he really even has thought about look-

ing after the American court system as a whole, and trying to improve it so that it delivers better and more equal justice. One is left with the idea that he has only two goals in mind: expand the number of federal judges, and augment their salaries.

Until the Chief Justice of the country and Congress focus on improving the legal system of all the people, we should leave the salaries of federal judges where they are, increasing annually according to the cost of living — just like for the rest of us. Being a federal judge is a great honor and a public service, not an occupation where judges should get paid according to what they might earn if they were in private practice. A sense of public purpose will do more to improve our legal system than raising the salaries of those who already earn more than anyone else in the system.

Who Would Be Free, Themsevels Must Strick the Blow

Part 1

What troubles Parson Smith in January 2001 is the political and racial climate in Lubbock and across America:

First, the recent speech of the Mayor Windy Sitton assailing the Hampton University coach's lawsuit against the city of Lubbock, yet traveling to Virginia to apologize to the coaches seems hypocritical.

Second, the trouble with Lubbock city attorney Anita Burgess to understand and express the letter of the law in its true sense as it relates to the appellate court's decision in the Hampton case.

Third, the agenda of the conservatives of the Republican Party and the use of a puppet king, which will ultimately bring ruin to America from the inside if not constrained.

African American in American and across the African Diaspora will not continue suffer abuse by those who would subject us to injustices.

Frederick Douglass, a slave in Baltimore, Maryland, before he escaped to Massachusetts in his early twenties, said in an address some 20 years after the emancipation: "Blacks in the United States continue to suffer injustices almost the equal of those experienced under slavery. Although no longer treated as property, freed men and women cannot find jobs that pay well, are not permitted to join trade unions, are still subject to lynching, are not afforded protection by the court system, do not have access to quality education, and are not afforded the civil and political rights of whites. Thus, emancipation was only the beginning of the quest for black equality, not the end."

When Black Americans look at their present stance from a broad spectrum, the words of Fredrick Douglas, seems like the spoken words of today. Douglas continues his speech to White America: "Born on American soil in common with yourself, deriving our bodies and our minds from its dust, centuries having passed away since our ancestors were torn from the shores of Africa, we, like yourselves, hold ourselves, to be in every sense American citizens. Have watered your soil with our tears, enriched it with our blood, performed its roughest labor in times of peace, defended it against enemies in time of war, and at all times been loyal and true to its best interests, we deem it no arrogance or presumption to manifest now a common concern with you for its welfare prosperity, honor, and glory."

If we listen we hear the voice of Douglas asking "How many young Black Americans died in Viet Nam (for a white man's ego police action) because of love of country, and the survivors of the "fail action" suffers under the hands of the white religious right conservative oppressor?"

Frederick Douglass speech, "Who Would Be Free, Themselves Must Strike the Blow" probably would never have taken on life in the Clinton years or a Democratic successor as president. The smoothness of the man and the hour led to complacency. However, a new king is on the throne and his cesspool of whatever around him, who "know not Black America!" We, who would be free, must use up and fight politically these evil degenerates until sweat run down like drops of blood. Will the king of Babylon rise again?
