winners in this year's Hispanic
Media Awards held this past

Las Vegas Nevada.

The Fourth Annual Hispanic
Print Awards was sponsored
by the National Association of
Hispanic Publications. In re-
cent years, the event has
grown to be the largest His-
panic media awards with the
United States. Altogether over
3,200 copies of publications,
articles, and photos in 39 print
categories were entered.

El Editor received one third
place award in the Outstand-
ing Bilingual Weekly Newspa-
per category with under
50,000 circulation and honor-
able mention for "Outstanding
reporting of the Hispanic com-
munity in political/economic
news articles."

In the Outstanding Bilingual
Newspaper category, first
place went to La Oferta from
San Jose CA, and second

CAPITAL ASSISTANCE GRANT Program of Projects: This project will consist of the following: the purchase of two computers for the downtown transfer center; purchase of two rubber tired trolleys; repairs to concrete drives at the Citibus maintenance facility; and purchase of two expansion vans for the Demand Response Service as required by the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Cost of this project is estimated at \$561,350. Of this amount \$462,080 will be provided by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA), Section 9 Funds; \$8,000 will be provided by the State Public Transportation Fund, as administered by the Texas Department; \$74,000 will be provided by local private funding; and \$17,270 will be provided by the City of Lubbock.

TECHNICAL STUDY GRANT Program of Projects: This project will consist of: review of current clean air/alternative fuel legislation and the effect on Citibus; a capital and financial needs assessment; a review of present scheduling and maintenance systems for effectiveness and efficiency; update employment, training, and policy manuals to come into compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act requirements; review and come into compliance with alcohol/drug control legislation; monitor system and service development; maintenance of eligibility of federal assistance; and training and professional development.

Cost of this portion of the grant is estimated at \$125,000. Of this amount, \$100,000 will be provided by FTA Section 9 Funds, and \$25,000 will be provided by the City of Lubbock.

OPERATING ASSISTANCE GRANT Program of Projects: This project will consist of providing the transportation services in the Lubbock urbanized area provided by City Transit Management Company, Inc., d. b. a. Citibus, from October 1, 1992, through September 30, 1993.

Cost of this portion of the grant is estimated at \$2,600,000, of which \$1,300,000 will be provided by FTA Section 9 funds, \$650,000 by the City of Lubbock, \$240,000 by the Texas Department of Transportation, and \$410,000 by non-farebox revenues.

Last week, the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal ran a story about Kress, Texas running out of water. Kress is a little town on I-27 about ten miles north of Plainview. Apparently their wells are going dry.

Sometimes we forget we are living in a desert and that there is only so much ground water for all of us. While Lubbock is going to be in pretty good shape with Lake Alan Henry, we should not lose sight of the fact that water may well affect the survival of many of the little towns around here as well as agriculture in the not too distant future. The availability of water is one of the wild cards that controls the future growth of this area.

The World Health Organization estimates by the year 2000 there may be as many as 40 million people infected with HIV which causes AIDS. Currently 163 counties are reporting HIV cases. It is worse in some counties. For example, Kenya reports 700,000 persons out of 24 million are HIV infected.

Lubbock, Texas has HIV and AIDS cases and a real possibility of an increase. As many of you know, Texas has the highest teen pregnancy in the nation and Lubbock has the highest rate in Texas. Our sexually active children are having babies which also means our children are running a high risk that they will contract HIV and pass it on to their babies.

This is a problem that is not going to go away through prayer, assuming it will happen to the other guy, or telling everyone to just say no. I wish it was that easy.

Since her ordeal and resignation in disgrace, Vanessa Williams is a wife and mother.

"It's been about eight years since I was Miss America," she states. "That part of my life is over. It's all behind me, and I have moved on," she will quickly tell you.

Vanessa says: "I've been one to dwell on the past. It's history, in spite of what some people might think of me."

"It really seems like another person went through all of that stuff. It really feels like all he ch... happened to another person. But, in terms of life, it makes you mature when you have to deal with reality in its harshest sense," she said.

Therefore, it's not surprising when Ms. Williams says that being a former beauty queen has been one of the hardest obstacles she has had to overcome.

She had a hard time getting a record deal, because a lot of people just didn't take her seriously. Probably because of who she was and what she had gone through, a lot of people just assumed she was another air headed bimbo who though she could sing.

She credits her family for teaching her the importance of working hard for whatever she wanted and getting a good education to prepare her for her show business career.

Both her parents are music teachers. Her father started her out with piano lessons when she was about five. Then her mother took over and made sure she learned the basics of music. She can read music and playing an instrument in her home as a requirement.

Vanessa says she's really glad her parents made sure she had a solid background in music. When she goes into the recording studio, the musicians and producers realize that she knows what she's talking about and takes her seriously. She's so well versed in music, working on her latest album was a lot less difficult than she thought it would be.

This time out, she had an established track record, and people were willing to craft songs especially for her. She has been pleased with the results.

Ms. Williams says her husband, Ramon Harvey, who was first hired as her assistant in 1984, was instrumental in guiding her career and overcoming her downfall and shame. They married in 1987, and have two children - Meloine and Julian - who are the most important things in her life.

Ms. Williams admits the personal/professional relationship that she shares with her husband can be stressful at times and juggling a successful career with motherhood is ever harder.

So far, the joint decision between her and her husband seem to be working out just fine. In addition to her career and raising

her family, Ms. Williams also works with a literacy program. "And now, after two albums and two children, I am looking forward to taking my act on the road," she says.

One of her biggest worries will be what to do with her kids. "Her problem is: 'Should I take them with me or leave them at home.' If she leaves them at home, how long can she go without them?"

She is really looking forward to getting out there and letting people see what she can do. She plans to start touring early 1992, and it will definitely be a challenge.

The Vanessa Williams saga shows no matter how low you go, if

you're good at what you do and know your profession or trade and have a positive mental attitude, there is always room at the top.

Closing thoughts: "I don't think one is necessarily born courageous, but one is born with the potential. Without courage, we can not practice any virtue with consistency. We can't be kind, true, merciful, generous, honest, or open.

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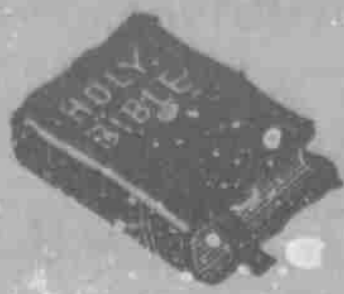

Frederick S Periss said of anxiety, that, it is "the excitement, the elan vital which we carry with us, and which becomes stagnated if we are unsure about the role we have to play." Peris's statement perhaps characterized a day in life of Jesus' worldly followers, the voices of power that were bent on the elimination of Jesus and maybe even the disciples of Jesus who's anxiety tolerance had reach its maximum level.

This particular beautiful Eastern day had been a stressful one for Jesus. A demon-possessed man who was blind and mute had been healed by Jesus; the Pharisees in a violent and strenuous way made the accusation that he had communication with Satan and even suggested that he could cast out the demon because he was Satan himself, the king of devils; his loved ones on this day felt that they had a need to monitor his work and designed a system of strategic defense for fear of his safety; a day when at a Pharisee hoise as an invited guest he was catechized with angry and involving questions that would implicate him in the scribes and Pharisees evil scheme of things. "The same day Jesus went out of the house, and sat by the sea side" (Matthew 13:1).

Having dealt with the raging antagonism, Jesus now is quiet and prayerful. In the holy calm of his soul he was able to think of those persons who had a need of him, that day when things had not been so peaceful, teach in such a way that many would grasp the meaning of his words.

The disciples were appalle at the new style of their Master's teaching. Multitudes of people had followed him. Some were excited by the startling events of the day; others wanted to hear again this great Teacher who had stood up against the scribes and Pharisees and in his own way convicted them by holy jurisprudence of hypocrisy, envy and fallacy. While sitting in a boat, the Lord Jesus spoke for the first time in parables to his audience that was standing on the fine white sand of the beach of the Sea of Galilee.

At first the disciples Lord's words had been direct. He had preached insuch a plain and unique way that those who heard him marveled at is words of grace. But on this day he had adopted another method of teaching and the disciples were flabbergasted at the change.


What the disciples did not understand was that their Master's instruction in parables was to convey truth in a more interesting manner to the mind, and adding to the truth conveyed the beauty of the narrative; to teach the truth to the unlearned so as to arrest their attention, thereby making an appeal to them through the senses; to convey some offensive truth through words expressive of strong disapproval so as to drive the truth home to the conscience, and to conceal from one part of his audience truth which he intended others to understand.

The disciples were frightened. Perhaps the igniting of their fear spark from the thought that this change of form would irritate and alienate the people's from their ministry. Their concern was of such that they ask of their Lord, "Why speakest thou unto them in parables?" (Matthew 3:10)

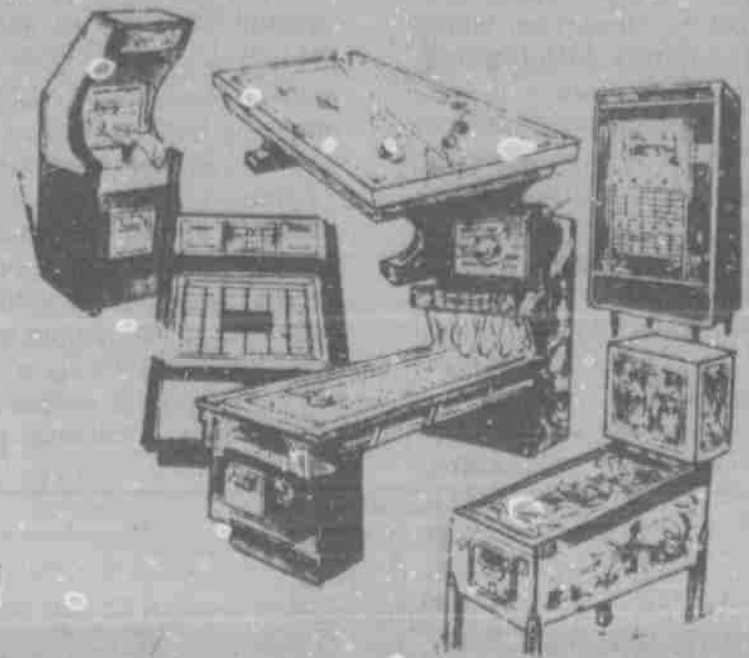

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Lubbock Teens Train In TV News

Yes, this is news. Not really, but it's about news. And, we thought it might make an interesting feature story for you sometime.

At LISD-TV, twenty junior high and high school students are learning about television news so they will have marketable skills for work in broadcast television news "when they grow up."

These teenagers work on Channel 12 Newsroom team to help gather information, write stories, shoot and edit video packages. Students serve as news reporters and anchors; other operate studio cameras, videotape machines, teleprompters, video graphics, and audio equipment. An advanced student serves in the top student position of technical director of the newscast.

This unique newscast focuses entirely on the activities of

the Lubbock Independent School District and other education-related information and is designed to bring stories about kids and schools into the homes of this community.

LISD-TV has scheduled this informative newscast to run four times each day so that it is easily accessible to most people. Those times are:

3:30; 5:30; 8:00 and 9:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The local Channel 12 Newsroom is followed by national news from CNN Newsroom. CNN Newsroom is a fifteen-minute newscast prepared especially for use in public schools. Daily classroom guides are available. Teachers may tape both newscasts and use them in their classrooms.

Although Channel 12 Newsroom is in a rebirth period, it has been around in one form or another since 1987 when it began as a five-minute daily newscast called "Focus 5". Today, Newsroom is written and produced by a full-time staff member.



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Frederick Douglass was born a slave in Maryland in 1817. In 1838 he escaped from bondage and became an abolitionist, lecturing around the world on the evils of slavery. Instead of fleeing quietly and safely, he wrote and lectured about his life as a slave so that everyone would know what slavery was really like. He published a newspaper called the North Star and helped recruit black troops during the Civil War. Later in his life he served as U.S. Marshal for the District of Columbia.

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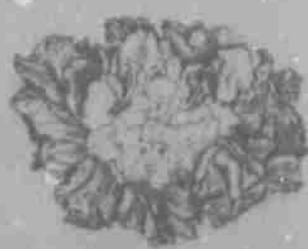
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
