The financial assistance requested is as follows:

Cost of this portion of the grant is estimated at \$125,000. Of this amount, \$100,000 will be provided by FTA Section 9 Funds, adn \$25,000 will be provided by the City of Lubbock. The project is proposed to begin October 1, 1992.

OPERATING ASSISTANCE GRANT Program of Projects: This project will consist of providing the transportation services in the Lubbock urbanized area provided by City Transit Management Company, Inc., d. b. a. Citibus, from October 1, 1992, through September 30, 1993.

Cost of this portion of the grant is estimated at \$2,600,000, of which \$1,300,000 will be provided by FTA Section 9 funds, \$650,000 by the City of Lubbook, \$240,000 by the Texas Department of Transportation, and \$410,000 by non-farabox reve-

nues.

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



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

Last week, the Lubbook Avalanche-Journal ran a story about Kress, Texas running out of water. Kress is a little town on 1-27 about ten miles north of Plainview. Apparently their webs are going dry

The availability of water is one of the wild cards that controls the future growth of this area.

The World Health Orgalization estimates by the year 2000 there may be as many as 40 million people infected with HIV which causes AIDS. Currently 163 counties are reporting HIV cases. It is worse in some counties. For example, Kenya reports 700,000 persons out of 24 million are HIV infected.

Lubbock, Texas has HIV and AIDS cases and a real possibility of an increase. As many of you know, Texas has the highest teen pregnancy in the nation and Lubbock has the highest rate in Texas. Our sexually active children are having babies which also means our children are running a high risk that they will contract HIV and pass it on to their babies.

This is a problem that is not going to go away through prayer, assuming it will happen to the other guy, or telling everyone to just say no. I wish it was that easy.

All of us need to get involved, it is a matter of life and death. 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




Vanessa Williams Has Come Back Strong!!

The disciples were appalle at the new style of their Master's teaching. Multitudes of people had followed him. Some were excited by the starting events of the day; otehrs wanted to hear again this great Teacher who had stood up against the scribes and Pharisees and in his own way convicted them by holy jurisprudence of hypocrisy, envy andfallacy. While sitting in a boat, the Lord lesus spoke for the first time in parables to his audience that was standing on the fine white sand of the beach of the Sea

Waht the disciples did not understand was that their Master's instruction in parables was to convey truth in a more interesting manner to the mind, and adding to the truth conveyed the beauty of the narrative; to teach the truth to the unlearned so as to arrest their attention, thereby making an appeal to them through the senses; to convey some offensive truth through words expressive of strong disapproval so as to drive the truth home to the conscience, and to conceal from one part of his audience truth which he intended others to understand.

The disciples were frightened. Perhaps the igniting of their fear spark from the thought that this change of form would irrite and alienate the peop's from their ministry. Their concern was of such that they ask of their Lord, "Why speakest thou unto them in par-

ables?" (Matthew 3:10) To be continued.....

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

At LISD-TV, twenty junior high and high school students are learning about television news so they will have marketable skills for work in broadcast tolevision news "when they grow up."

These teenagers work on Channel 12 Newsroom team to help gather information, write stories, shoot and edit video packages. Students serve as news reporters and anchors; other operate studio cameras, videotape machines, teleprompters, video graphics, and audio equipment. An advanced student serves in the top student position of technical director of the newscast.

This unique newscast locuses entirely on the activities of the Lubbock Independent School District and other eduation-related information and is designed to bring stories about kids and achooks into the homes of this community.

LISD-TV has scheduled this informative newscast to run four times each day so that it is easily accessible to most people. Thuse times aro:

3:30; 5:30; 8:00 and 9:30 p. m. Monday through Friday.

The local Channel 12 Newsroom is followed by national news from CNN Newsroom. CHN Newsroom is a fifteenminute newscast prepared especially for use in public schoolss. Daily classroom guides are available. Teachers may tape both newscasts and use them in their classrooms.

Although Channel 12 Newsroom is in a rebirur period, it has been around in one form or another since 1987 when it began as a five-minute daily newscast called "Focus 5". Today, Newsroom is written and produced by a full-time stal. member.
