Other events planned include an exhibit of works from previous poster artists; And Now for Something a Little Different, a Texas Tech student art exhibit; and a silent auction of serving trays as interpreted by various artists.

In addition to the special activities planned for the evening, all the galleries, including The Artists' Market, The Gallery, Exhibits and Senior Artists' Market will be open for art patrons to make their selections.

Each year, the Lubbock Arts Alliance coordinates the Lubbock Arts Festival, which is now in its fifteen year. The 1993 Lubbock Arts Festival, which is being held April 2-4 at Lubbock Memorial Civic Center, promises to be a source of entertainment for the entire family with activities, performances and exhibits designed to appeal to a variety of tastes.

CHARLES J. GIVENS MONEY STRATEGIES

(Part 2 of a two-part series)

In last week's column, I discussed how you end up paying extra when you use a debt consolidation loan. Another downside to these loans is the potentially higher interest rate.

I have seen debt consolidation loans from finance companies carry interest rates of 15% to 28% per year. With rates like that, it is improbable the borrower will ever get out of debt.

The irony lies in the fact that a high-interest rate, when coupled with an extended payment term of two to three years, can still produce substantially lower payments even though the total debt and total payments have been increased dramatically.

Here's how the consolidation system works. You owe \$12,000 to 13 creditors, including five credit cards, three doctors and hospitals, four department stores and a furniture retailer. Your payments are \$623 per month, which is stretching your income to the maximum.

So you find a lender who will pay off your current bills, cut your payments in half and allow you to write just one check a month instead of 13. How could you not be tempted?

The problem is that you will increase your total debt by thousands in extra interest and increase the payoff terms on each of the accounts from one to four years.

Now look at your situation again. If you continued paying the \$623 per month, even though it would be a struggle, the medical bills and furniture loan would be completely paid in only 12 months and your monthly payments at that moment would instantly drop \$351 per month.

Payments would drop another \$90 after the next 12 months from the payoff of the department store accounts, leaving you with a payment of only \$182 for 24 months on the credit cards instead of \$319 per month for 36 remaining months on the consolidation loans. Struggling in the short term can often ward off struggling for a longer term.

This is old, and has been repeated for years, but, yet and still, it is the only effective way for us to cross the finish line in a competi-

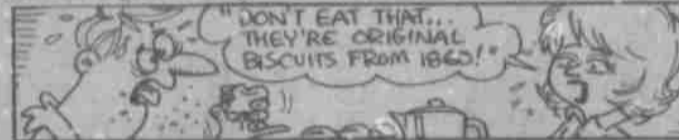
tive manner. Here it is again:

We must educate our money to go where it is wanted and appreciated. Spend our money with people, businesses, merchants, and organizations that support our communities. Those who do not support our communities, organizations, and needs. We must train our money to stay away and not go where it is to wanted.

The same principle should apply to building and re-building our long denied communities. But Trustee DeLeon did not cause the expense! The LISD white majority Trustees caused all of that court expense because they would not follow the law and would not keep their promises! The LISD's white Trustees are the ones responsible for the waste of our tax dollars in useless litigation in court!

We wish the LISD's white Trustees would at least be honest with us. We know what they are up to. They are facing nobody by their talk of "the interests of the whole school district." 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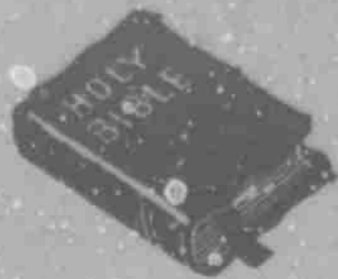
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The Outreach Prayer Breakfast

"But they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint." Isaiah 40:31.

Hope has been defined as confidence in the future. Some people have a tenacious hope in themselves and in their world. They have developed the attitude that "somehow its going to work out in the end." In life it seems as if they go from one tragedy to another; from one disappointment to another letdown and through it all they seem to reach down and pick themselves up by some invisible means and go on hoping. The question is, "Why?" and the suggested answer is that they know if they stop, life will loosen its grip and come crashing down around them because their hope does not reach beyond the grave. The Christian however, has a hope based on God's word. Romans 8:25 says: "But if we hope for that we see not, then do we with patience wait for it."

Waiting! There is much involved in the word. The difference between a waiter and a quitter is that the waiter keeps trying and believing.

At the heart of waiting is obedience. To "wait on" is another term for service. Whenever we pray we wait on God and waiting is never so blessed as when we pray. The root idea of waiting is not devotion. The root idea is obedience. We wait on God when we strive to do his will, and when we say "not my will, but Thine be done." We wait on God when we do a deed of kindness. When we help those that are down and out, when we visit those who are sick, when we take out time and teach a class for Jesus' sake, when we hold out a helping hand to those in need we are waiting upon God.

Isaiah could empathize with his people. He knew that so much in their life seemed to just happen. Often they found loneliness instead of love, false hopes instead of far horizons, pain instead of pleasure, inactivity instead of activity, tears instead of song, oppression instead of freedom, futility instead of fulfillment. For them this was life. But this was not all of life. The prophet wanted his people to remember that they could have singing for sighing, gladness for gloom, melody for mourning, usefulness for uselessness if "they would wait upon the Lord."

Waiting on the Lord is not passive behavior. To do his will at all times is necessary. It is important that we learn early in life to wait upon the Lord.

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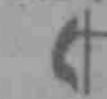

A View From the Hill

BREAKING THE WELFARE CYCLE

There are some cycles that no matter what we do, can't be broken — such as the cycle of hereditary disease, the cycle of hereditary baldness, and the cycle of twins being born into some families.

But there are some cycles that can and must be broken. It pains me to see more and more people going on welfare, not just because that means another family can't make it on their own, but because chances are the children in that family will still be on welfare when they have children. Thus the cycle goes on and on.

President Clinton has some ideas for drastically reforming welfare. The President's goal is to take welfare and make it a second chance — not a way of life. To do that, there must be an incentive to get off welfare. I believe the most important incentive to a family is showing that the cycle can be broken.

Over 21 million families in the United States are currently receiving some type of welfare from the government. The welfare system was not created to discourage the unemployed from seeking jobs, or to provide endless free handouts. It was designed to provide "temporary" help for those unfortunate victims of a faltering economy or those with financial difficulties for other reasons. But not many people use the words "welfare" and "temporary" in the same sentence anymore.

The President's Welfare Reform Package would provide education and training for welfare recipients, along with access to health care and child care. Welfare recipients would then have to take a job within two years after training, or their benefits would be discontinued. This part of the

program would give welfare recipients that small chance some of them need to leave the welfare system behind.

President Clinton believes, as do I, that fathers should support their children — not the federal government. Over 10 million women live alone with their children, and only half of those women receive support from the father. And of the 5 million women who have those orders, only half of them receive full payment. Child support enforcement must be strengthened by establishing paternity at birth; using the IRS to collect seriously delinquent child support; and setting up a national registry to track down dead-beat parents.

We also need to encourage experimentation on state and local levels. Several states have already addressed the issue by implementing their own programs. New Jersey is working on a new welfare system that encourages employment by allowing welfare recipients to earn higher wages without losing benefits. The New Jersey plan would also deny any increase in benefits to women who have more children while receiving welfare benefits.

Welfare reform is a tough job, and it's not a job that belongs solely to government. Businesses need to get involved as well, by providing jobs for those welfare recipients who decide to go to work.

A child learning to ride a bike needs someone to hold on to the back of the bike, until the child is ready to ride off by himself. I believe we've held on to the back of the welfare system long enough. It's time to create a system that gives a hand-up, not a hand-out.

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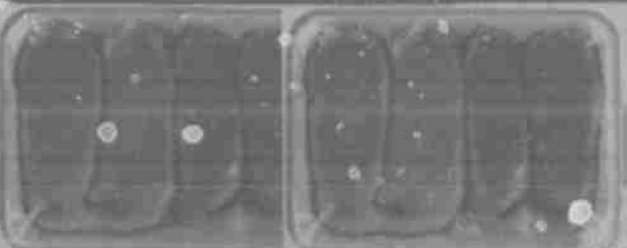
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
