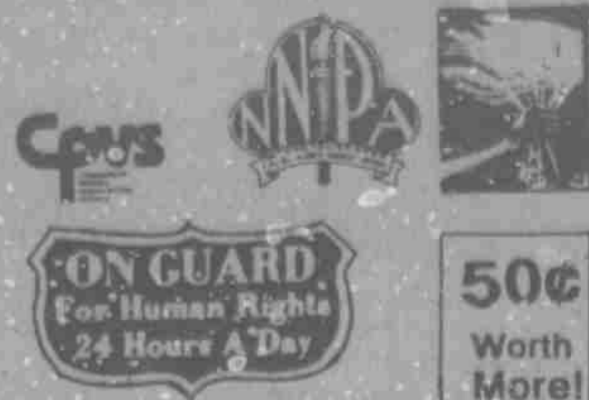

Future Problem Solving Bowl

More Lubbock Independent School District teams than ever before will be in Austin May 1 for this year's Texas Future Problem Solving State Bowl. Nine LISD teams have been invited to compete.

Teams qualified by submitting researched solution proposals to problems posed by the state board of Future Problem Solving (FPS). Two were practice runs on the subjects of student stress and world hunger. Invitations were based on evaluations of the third submission on the topic of oceans.

Teams prepare for the state bowl by doing research on a global topic. The subject for this year's bowl is drug abuse. Each team at the competition will receive a sealed envelope with a hypothetical situation. Two hours are given for the response.

Texas Future Problem Solving is an extracurricular program that fosters research and concentration techniques. It also is designed to sharpen students' abilities to think, work as a team, and attack problems with the knowledge that they can be solved. Although sponsored by the district's gifted and talented program, team members are not restricted to that program.

Each team in FPS is composed of four students with a possible fifth student who serves as an alternate.

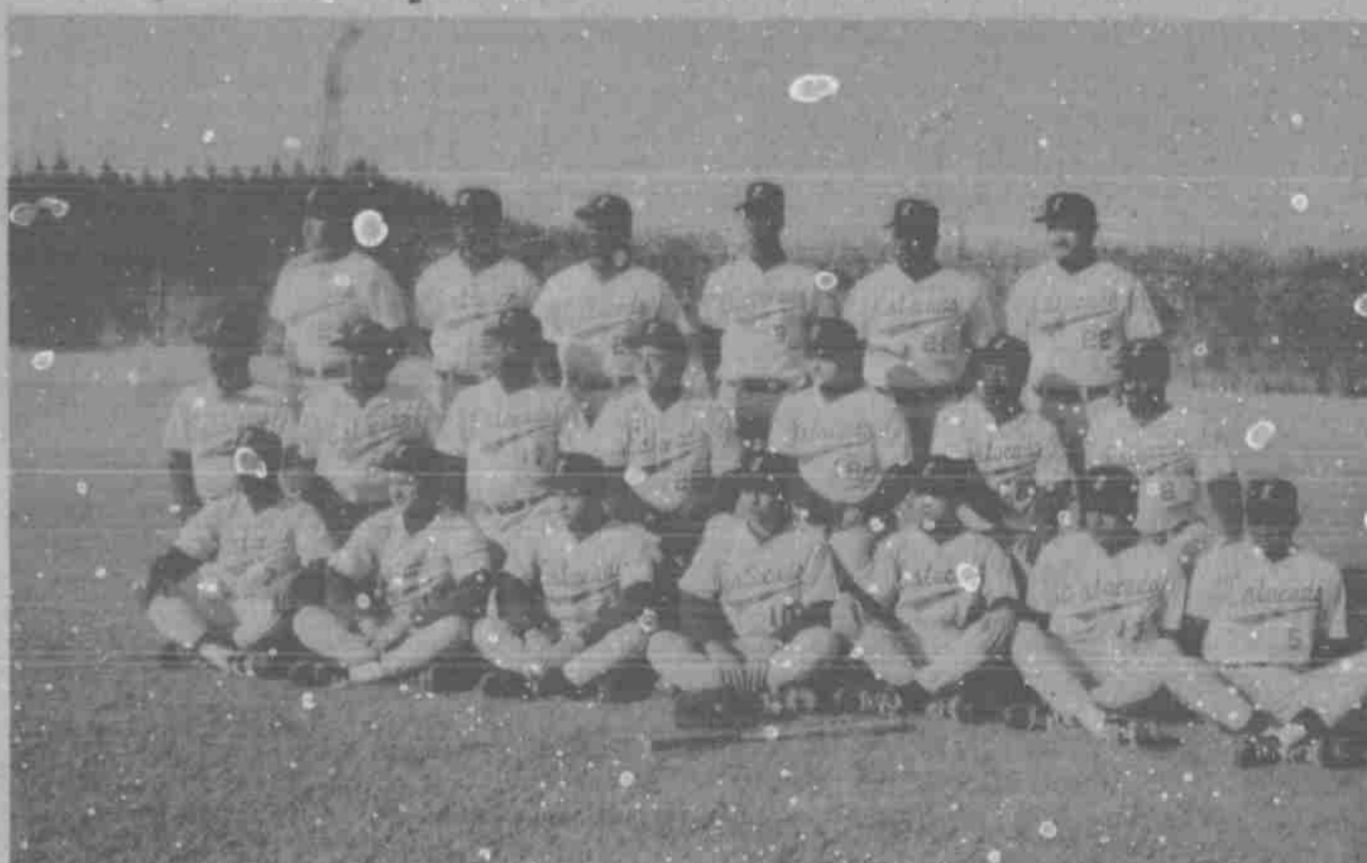

Early Learning Centers Receive Grants

The Early Learning Centers of Lubbock, Inc., a United Way agency, has recently received two grants to fund the addition of two classrooms to the Erskine Early Learning Center at 2714 Erskine. The expansion project, which will serve 45 additional children, will be built with funding from the Community Development Block Grant in the amount of \$110,000. Classroom equipment for the addition will be purchased through a grant for \$900 from Lubbock Area Foundation.

The Erskine Early Learning Center is one of five centers operated by the Early Learning Centers of Lubbock, Inc. Services include an educational program for all ages, Head Start, nutritious meals, and experienced and trained staff. Infant formula and baby food is also provided.

In addition to participating with the South Plains Child Care Management Service's funding for low income families, Early Learning Centers also provides a sliding scale

according to income for eligible families. The centers are open to the general public year round, Monday through Friday from 6:30 a. m. to 6:00 p. m. For information, call Virginia Davila at 765-9981.

Unproven Arthritis Remedies Can Do Harm

(NU) - One in 10 people with arthritis has tried an unproven remedy to relieve the chronic pain, only to suffer sometimes harmful side effects, according to a government survey.

The survey conducted by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services also found that 58 percent of the respondents first learned of an unproven arthritis remedy from well-meaning family or friends.

"Many unproven remedies are not harmful, such as copper bracelets or acupuncture," said Arthur Grayzel of the Arthritis Foundation.

According to the Arthritis Foundation, suspect an unproven remedy if it claims to work for all types of arthritis, uses only case histories or testimonials as proof.

Services Held For Marvin Pendleton

Services for Marvin Craig Pendleton, 68, of Lubbock, were held at 2:00 p. m. Thursday, April 15, 1993, at First United Methodist Church with Rev. J. Waid Griffin officiating. Roger Quannah Settler of Toppensish, Washington, nephew of Marvin, delivered the eulogy.

Interment was held under the direction of Sanders Funeral Home.

Pendleton died at 3:10 a. m. Sunday, April 11, 1993, in Methodist Hospital following an illness.

He was born in Abernathy, Texas on April 5, 1925, and his family moved to the Lubbock area shortly thereafter. His maternal grandparents, David and Lavenia Karr, were early Lubbock pioneers, who came to the South Plains by covered wagon in 1904. He attended Lubbock High School, and received a law degree from LaSalle University in Chicago, Illinois in 1963.

He served with distinction in World War II in the Pacific Theatre as a paratrooper, with combat service during the invasion of Corregidor. He received numerous battlefield ci-

tations, including: Asiatic Pacific Campaign Medal with 3 Bronze Stars; Philippine Liberation Ribbon with 2 Bronze Stars; and the Distinguished Unit Badge.

After returning to Lubbock, he was a longtime employee of the Lubbock Avlanche-Journal. Because of his years of experience as an advertiser representative, he was appointed to the faculty of Texas

Tech University in 1974. For the past few years, he has been engaged as a refrigeration technician for Southwest Coca-Cola Bottling Company.

A close associate of Governor Preston Smith, he was named an Honorary Colonel on the Governor's Staff in 1961 after a decade of extensive campaigning for Preston.

He was a founding member and then President of the Caprock Lions Club, Lubbock's first Mexican-American Lions Chapter, and maintained a lifelong interest in minority advancement.

He married Helen Barnes in Lubbock on May 31, 1963.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Ronald Craig Pendleton of Lubbock; a daughter, Maya Sharon Pendleton Cox of Lubbock; one twin brother, Melvin David Pendleton of Lubbock; two sisters, Martha Laena Collins and Jimmie Geneva Pendleton Settler, both of Lubbock; two grandsons,

Donnie Ray Cox and Brian Craig Cox of Rosebudd, Arkansas; one granddaughter, Sherrol Renee Cox of Haber Springs, Arkansas; and two great grandsons, Justin Craig Cox and Dillon Ray Cox of Hewber Springs, Arkansas.

Pallbearers were: Donnie Cox and Brian Cox, grandsons; Joe Glenn Collins and Greg Settler, nephews; and Joe Collins, Douglas Settler and Jeffrey Settler, great-nephews.

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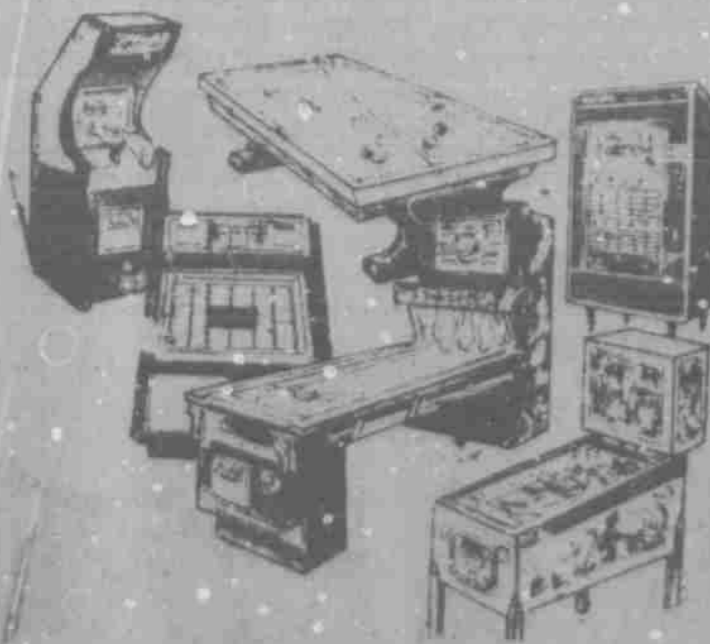
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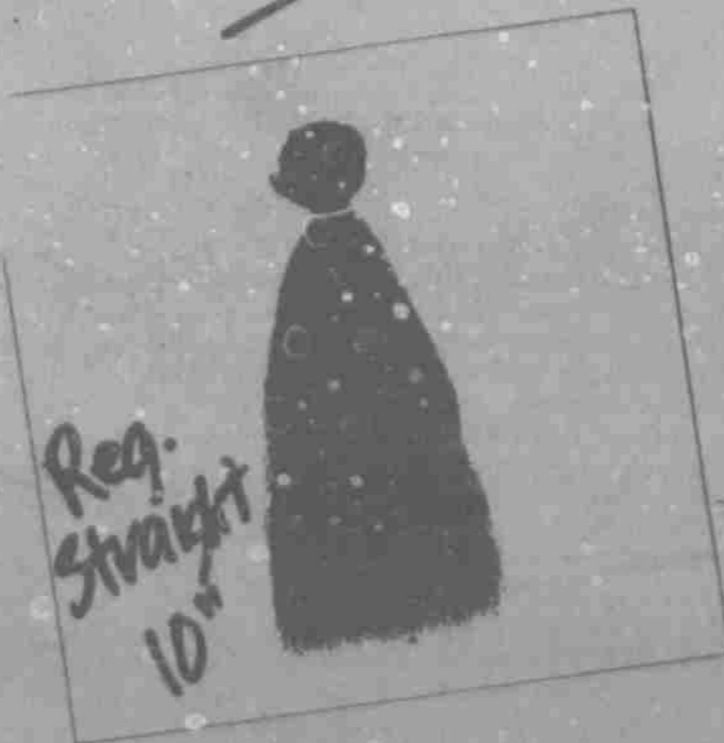

PANTEX AND PLUTONIUM STORAGE

A while back, I was talking to a young person about the Pantex Plant, which is located in my congressional district. This person was concerned -- and rightfully so -- about the prospects of Amarillo becoming a temporary storage site for the plutonium that remains after a nuclear bomb is dismantled.

While he was glad that the superpowers were reducing their nuclear arsenals, he didn't like the idea that Pantex was the site for America's nuclear weapons reduction effort. You see, I told him, Pantex is the only place in this nation where nuclear weapons are assembled and disassembled.

"But, isn't this work dangerous?" he asked.

Yes, it's dangerous, but Pantex has been operating safely since it opened its doors to this kind of work 42 years ago, and plutonium has been present at the facility for several decades. The fact of the matter is that it is far safer to store plutonium pits than it is to store "live" nuclear warheads.

The young person wasn't satisfied. DOE's nuclear efforts have been conducted in secret for so many years that it has fostered a feeling of distrust -- a feeling that there is something terrible and secret going on behind the fences of the Pantex complex.

Pantex, I told him, is under the watchful eyes of many local, state, and federal agencies. Operations at Pantex are monitored and overseen by the Texas Water Commission, Texas Air Control Board, Texas Bureau of Radiation Control, the University of Texas Bureau of Economic Geology, the EPA, and the Defense Nuclear Facilities Safety Board. In addition, the DOE awarded approximately \$12 million to the State of Texas to be allocated by Governor Richards' office for Pantex monitoring and research.

In response to his continued misgivings, I told the young man that the plutonium question is one that is on a lot of

people's minds, but it is also one of the most misunderstood parts of Pantex's operation.

First of all, Pantex doesn't store new plutonium. It stores the plutonium "pits" -- the reusable, component of a nuclear bomb -- which is a lot like concrete sealed in stainless steel, and not at all like green ooze as some would have you believe. Up until recently, these "pits" were stored for reuse at Pantex for short periods of time in specially designed bunkers -- it is much safer to store the plutonium "pit," than a "live" nuclear bomb. The only thing different today is that we are not building new nuclear weapons to replace the ones taken out of service, eliminating the demand for these recycled "pits."

As a result, I explained, Pantex and the Amarillo community are being asked to store these "pits" until a long-term storage site or alternative use for them is found. Even though plutonium "pits" are stored at Pantex today, the DOE conducted extensive research into the environmental impact of the increased storage. The decision was made only after scientists had demonstrated that storage of these "pits" at Pantex can be done without an increase in the risk to the environment.

At this point, my young friend interrupted me and asked me how could the storage of all of these plutonium pits be accomplished without risk to the environment.

The risk to the environment is no greater under the DOE's new plan than the interim storage activity of just a few years ago, I answered. Even though Pantex will be asked to store more plutonium "pits," the risks will be no greater than they were under Pantex's Cold War activities. In fact, they may even be less.

Since Pantex already stores plutonium "pits," the young man wanted to know if the storage facility itself was safe.

It is. Behind many layers of security protection, the plutonium "pits" are kept in heavily reinforced bunkers capable of withstanding multiple accidents such as tornadoes, earthquakes, fires and explosions. In addition, the bunkers are monitored constantly for radiation and the content of each facility is inspected regularly.

As the young man made motions to get on his way, I thanked him for asking these questions. Hopefully, the information I gave him dispelled some of his fears regarding plutonium storage.

It is an understandable fear, but it is still just a fear. Certainly, we should monitor Pantex with all of our vigilance, but we should not let a fear of improbable hypotheticals prevent a reasonable use of the Pantex facility.

I'm living so far beyond my income that we may almost be said to be living apart.

Science Grants For Estacado High

Three grants ranging from \$500 to \$135,000 have been approved for the science department of Estacado High School.

The school is recipient of a grant of \$8,500 from the South Plains Foundation. It will support a field biology program. Hands-on experiences, including water quality testing of lakes, will be planned. Transportation and field equipment will be funded through the grant.

A smaller but significant grant comes from the biology department at Texas Tech. The \$500 is made possible through the Howard Hughes Medical Institute Small Grants Program. With the grant will come participation of Tech staff in the Estacado biology program, according to Patti Blide, assistant principal for instruction.

A grant of \$135,000 has been approved by the Texas Education Agency. Dubbed "HYPOTHESIS", the acronym stands for Helping Young People Observe, Think, Hypothesize, Enjoy, and Stimulate in Science. Applications came from 32 schools, and 27 of them, including seven high schools, were approved. Only five of the schools were awarded more than \$100,000.

The HYPOTHESIS project will promote a partnership with

the scientific community through scientists acting as mentors to students. The students will visit and work in research facilities such as the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Texas Tech University, Health Sciences Center, and the Lubbock Forensic Laboratory. In addition, Estacado students will mentor elementary students and help with their science fairs. The school's science labs will open three Saturdays per month for student use.

The on-going project will be set up and evaluated over a two-year period beginning June 1, 1993 and extending through August 31, 1995.

All three grants will support work of the science department for all students. The Health Professions Magnet Program at Estacado will benefit because much of it is science-based.

Writers for the TEA grant application were Sam Thomas, biology teacher and science department head; Ms. Blide; and John Crane, computer writing lab director.

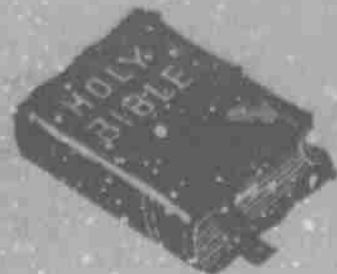

Now that spring is here, the home improvement gypsies will blow into town. These gypsies drive beautiful pickup

trucks, travel all over the United States and take thousands of dollars out of our community right into their own pockets. The gypsies prey on our senior citizen population - relying on their trusting nature. Your Better Business Bureau would like to offer this warning: If someone knocks on your door to sell you a siding, roofing, paving or fence job, you

should be cautious about anyone knocking on your door. If they tell you that you have a bad roof or your home needs

repairs, tell them you will check them out with the BBB. Always be cautious if they want up front monies. If you are not sure of who the peddler is, keep your door locked and call the police to report them in your neighborhood.

If you have filed bankruptcy, you may be the target of a new credit repair scam, often called "file segregation." In this scheme, you are promised a chance to hide unfavorable credit information by establishing a new credit identity. This sounds great, but file segregation is illegal. If you use it, the FTC says you could face fines or even prison. If you have

filed for bankruptcy, you may be told by a credit repair company that you won't be able to get any type of credit for ten years. This is not always true. Sometimes you will be told the file segregation program is affiliated with the federal government. This is not true. And, you may be told that file segregation is legal. It is a federal crime to make any false state-

ments on a loan or credit application, which the credit repair company may advise you to do.

Warning For Women: Beware of Endometriosis

(NAPS)—Knowing the facts about a disease that affects over five million American women—ages 11 to 50, of all income levels and ethnic groups—could help prevent serious health trouble, experts agree.

Endometriosis is a disease in which tissue that normally covers the inner surface of the uterus (endometrium) is also found in other areas such as the abdomen, on the ovaries and abdominal lining, bowel and bladder, resulting in internal bleeding, formation of scar tissue and other problems. Symptoms to watch out for include:

- Chronic pelvic pain.
- Painful periods, especially when disabling and/or increasing in severity.
- Repeated miscarriages.
- Deep pain with sexual intercourse.
- Chronic fatigue.
- Low resistance to infections.
- Extensive allergies and related problems.
- Heavy or irregular bleeding or spotting between periods.
- Diarrhea and/or painful bowel movements with the period.

Endometriosis can also cause infertility, reports the Endometriosis Association, sponsor of Endometriosis Awareness Week, March 21 to 27, 1993 and a leader in endometriosis education, support and research.



Women of all ages and races should be alert to the symptoms of endometriosis, medical experts agree.

Endometriosis cannot be confirmed in routine gynecologic exams, but it can be diagnosed with proper tests and treated—the sooner the better. Treatment options include surgery to remove the endometrial growths; hormone treatments which can cause the disease to regress; and the use of pain medications. When extremely disabling and/or when all else fails, hysterectomy with removal of the ovaries is commonly suggested.
