## Study Funds OK'd for Lubbock Interstate 20 Link

A \$3.6 million feasibility study for a highway link between Lubbock and Interstate 20 was approved last week by the Texas Transportation Commission.

Routes through Andrews, Borden, Dawson, Ector, Garza, Hockley, Howard, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Midland, Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry, and Terry counties are po-

tential connections between Lubbock and I-20.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) was directed by the commission to study the feasibility of alternative routes, prepare environmental reports, complete the public involvement process and begin preliminary engineering for the selected alternate.

The federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 (ISTEA) contains provisions for such studies. ISTEA will provide \$2.9 million, which will be matched by \$725,000 in state funds.

## Habitat Holds Wall Breaking

Habitat for Humanity held a wall breaking ceremony for the start of its sixth house last Saturday morning at 2317 10th Street.

City Councilmen T. J. Patterson participated in the start of this major rehabilitation project by knocking down some of the wall. He was also assisted by Dr. W. Pennington Vann, acting president of Lubbock Habitat for Humanity.

This housing rehab project will mark the second house in the Overton district to be remodeled and sold at no profit and no interest by Lubbock Habitat for Humanity.

Last Saturday also officially kicked off a matching gift campaign to fund the housing project. An anonymous donor through the Lubbock Area Foundation has issued a challenge to raise \$5,000 by September 1. When the match amount of \$5,000 is raised, another \$5,000 will be contributed. The budget for this remodel project is about \$10,600.

Lubbock Habitat for Humanity is a non profit Christian Housing ministry dedicated to helping the working poor improve the conditions in which they are forced to live. People

are challenged to practice the "Economic of Jesus" by establishing a local fund for humanity at each project location. This fund, created from gifts and no interest loans, serves as capital for building homes. Construction prospective home owners. The capital used to build the house is then returned to the fund for humanity through the family's monthly payments over a 15 to 25 year period. Those payments are recycled into the building more homes.

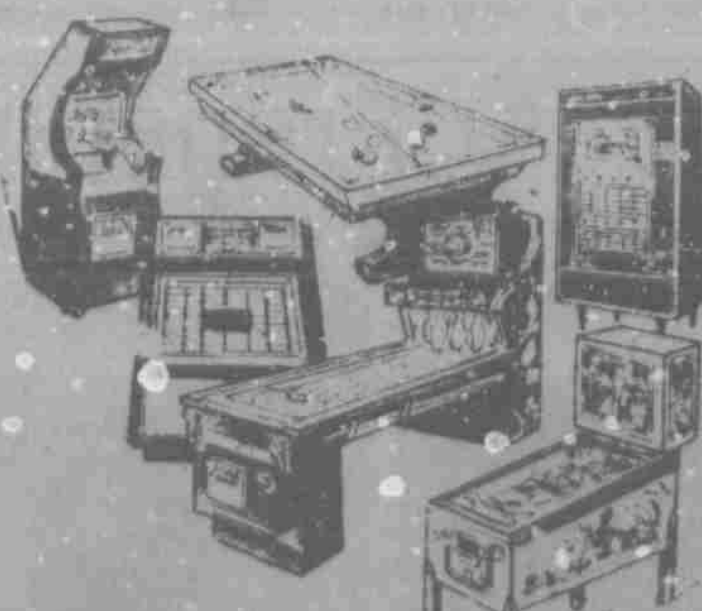

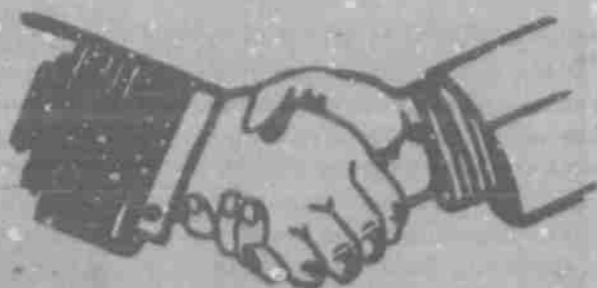

If you have any thoughts on this matter you will want to show up at the public hearing later this month at the Health Board and then later at the City Council. You should contact the task force and ask for their plan. You might ask the Eagle Forum folks why they are not willing to allow different points of view, including theirs, to be offered to parents and simply allow the parents to choose what is best.

Thanks to millions of fun-loving Texans, the new Texas Lottery is off to a fantastic start. In its first record-breaking month of fun and excitement, the Lottery sold an average of 6,620 tickets per minute, that's 110 per second.

After we broke all-time lottery sales records for the first day and the first week, we expected things to calm down some. But daily sales volumes have averaged better than \$9.5 million, and sales actually accelerated toward the end of the month.

And all of that happened seven weeks ahead of time. Remember, the Lottery wasn't even supposed to start until the middle of July.

The Lottery's \$286 million in sales from May 29 through June 28 amounts to nearly 25 percent of what we had originally projected for the entire two-year budget cycle. In its first month of operation, the Lottery paid about \$114 million in prizes on sales volumes that could earn as much as another \$114 million for the State Treasury.

If those sales volumes hold, our office will be able to certify that Lottery proceeds to the state will exceed the \$461 million projected for the current budget cycle. State law requires that we apply the first available extra funds to a pay raise for state employees. After that, any excess would go to the state's General Revenue Fund for distribution as the members of the Texas Legislature see fit.

We attribute much of this fast pace to the two-chances-to-win fun created by the Lottery's first two instant games. Sales of the historic "Lone Star Millions" tickets remain very strong, while "Texas Match-Up" tickets have sold at a rate of nearly six million a day since they reached our stores in mid-June.

The Lottery reported the following figures through the close of the first month's business:

Total Sales: \$203 million  
Instant Prizes Claimed: \$80 million  
Instant Prizes Remaining: \$45 million

**TEXAS MATCH-UP**  
Total Sales: \$83 million  
Instant Prizes Claimed: \$34 million  
Instant Prizes Remaining: \$52 million

Those figures do not include the millions paid out so far in our Grand Prize millionaire drawings.

## Caution Can Prevent Near Drownings

The very term "near drowning" may conjure an image of relief. Actually, however, children who do live to make it as far as the hospital and are classified as near-drowning victims often die or suffer severe, permanent brain damage.

The key to survival is to prevent the accidents altogether, according to Sharon Scott, R.N., a nurse in the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit at the Children's Hospital at UMC.

Scott, who sees about a dozen near-drowning cases a year in her job, said the typical victim is three years old.

"Most of the accidents happen just because the three-year-old gets away from mom. At that age, they have enough autonomy that they can scoot," she said.

Adult supervision, she said, is the most important step in prevention of drowning accidents. Parents can take other steps as well, she added.

"First, get the young ones in swimming lessons as early as six months old. They need to respect the water," she said.

Second, she encourages any parents to learn cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) through the American Red Cross or other programs.

The third step, she said, is to be sure the owner of the pool takes proper safety measures. It is important to check with the

city for ordinances regarding such matters as fences and gates, she said.

According to Scott, accidents can take place anywhere there is water. Play lakes are among the most dangerous.

"If anyone sees kids playing in a play lake, they need to get them out or even call the police," she warned.

Other places children can drown, Scott said, include apartment and hotel swimming pools, where they often are no lifeguards; backyard pools, especially when visiting someone else's home; baby pools and even buckets of water.

"A toddler barely walking can do a head dive into a bucket," said Scott.

For near drowning victims

who are found in time, there is hope. Scott advises anyone finding a victim to call 911 immediately in order that dispatchers can talk the rescuer through life-saving measures.

Once at the hospital, the child will receive specialized treatment, ranging from a lubricant to the air sacs in the lungs to a ventilator/respirator.

"We treat the heart and lungs to get through the critical stages," Scott said.

Scott warned that even children who appear all right

should go to a pediatrician because infections, especially from unclear water, can occur.

"Severe pneumonia can set in, or the child can have a seizure later in the day," she said. "If there's been any loss of consciousness, definitely go to the E.R.," she added.

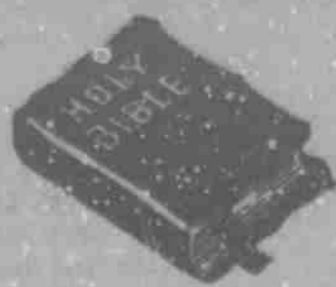

"Then Simon Peter answered him, Lord, to whom shall we go? thou hast the words of eternal life." John 6:68.

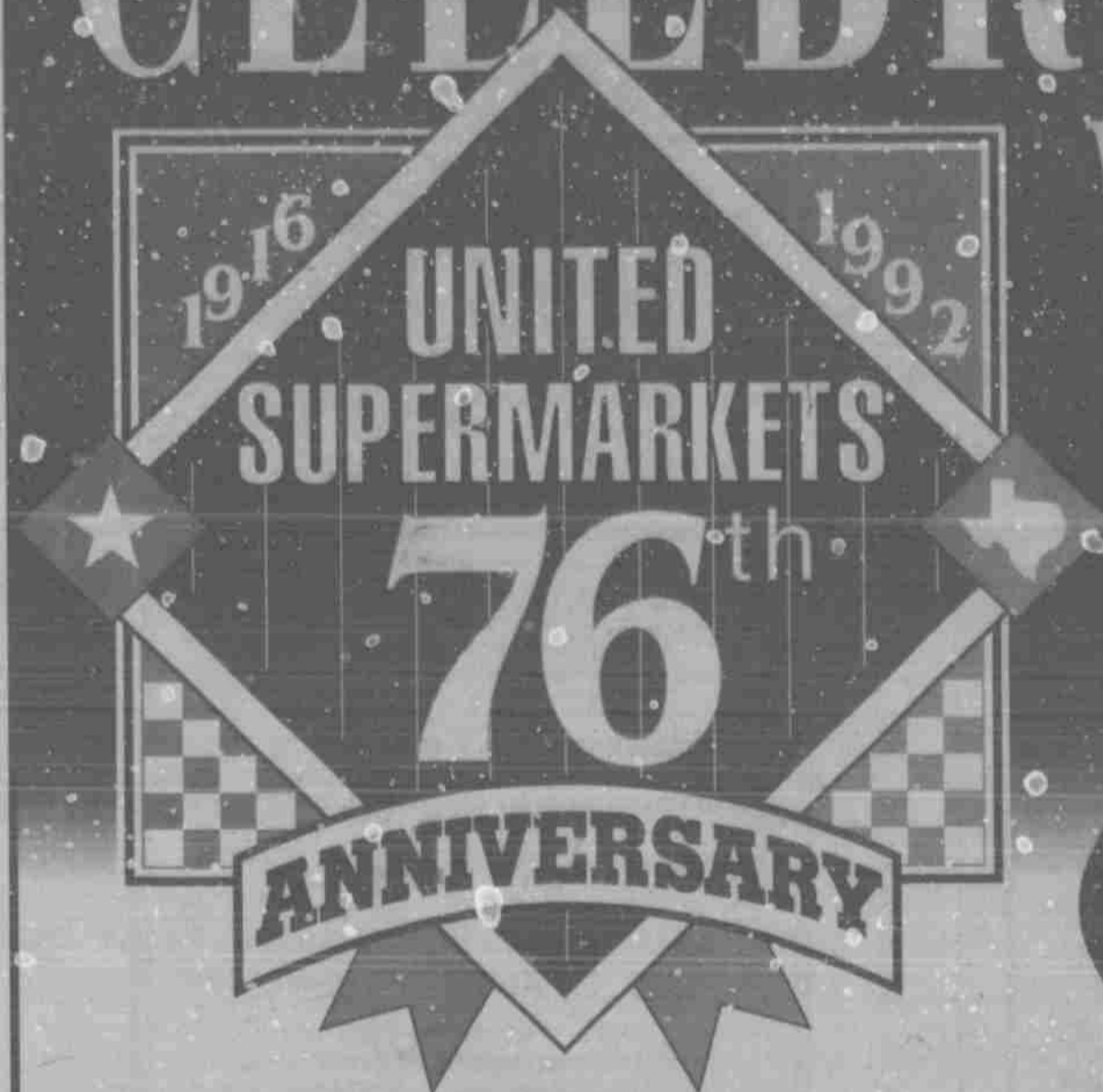
