## Rep. Combest Seeks Fifth Term

Congressman Larry Combest, a West Texan known as a pragmatic and knowledgeable legislator, who is in his fourth term, announced January 9, 1992, that he will seek a fifth term.

Now in his fourth term representing the people of the 19th Congressional District, the Re-

publican House leadership has tapped Combest to serve on four committees during the 102nd Congress.

Congressman Combest became the first Republican in the 50-year history of West Texas' 19th Congressional District when he won an election by more than 58% of the vote on November 4, 1988.

He was re-elected to Congress in 1986 by a 63% margin, retained in office in 1988 with 68% of the vote, and returned by the voters unopposed to his fourth term.

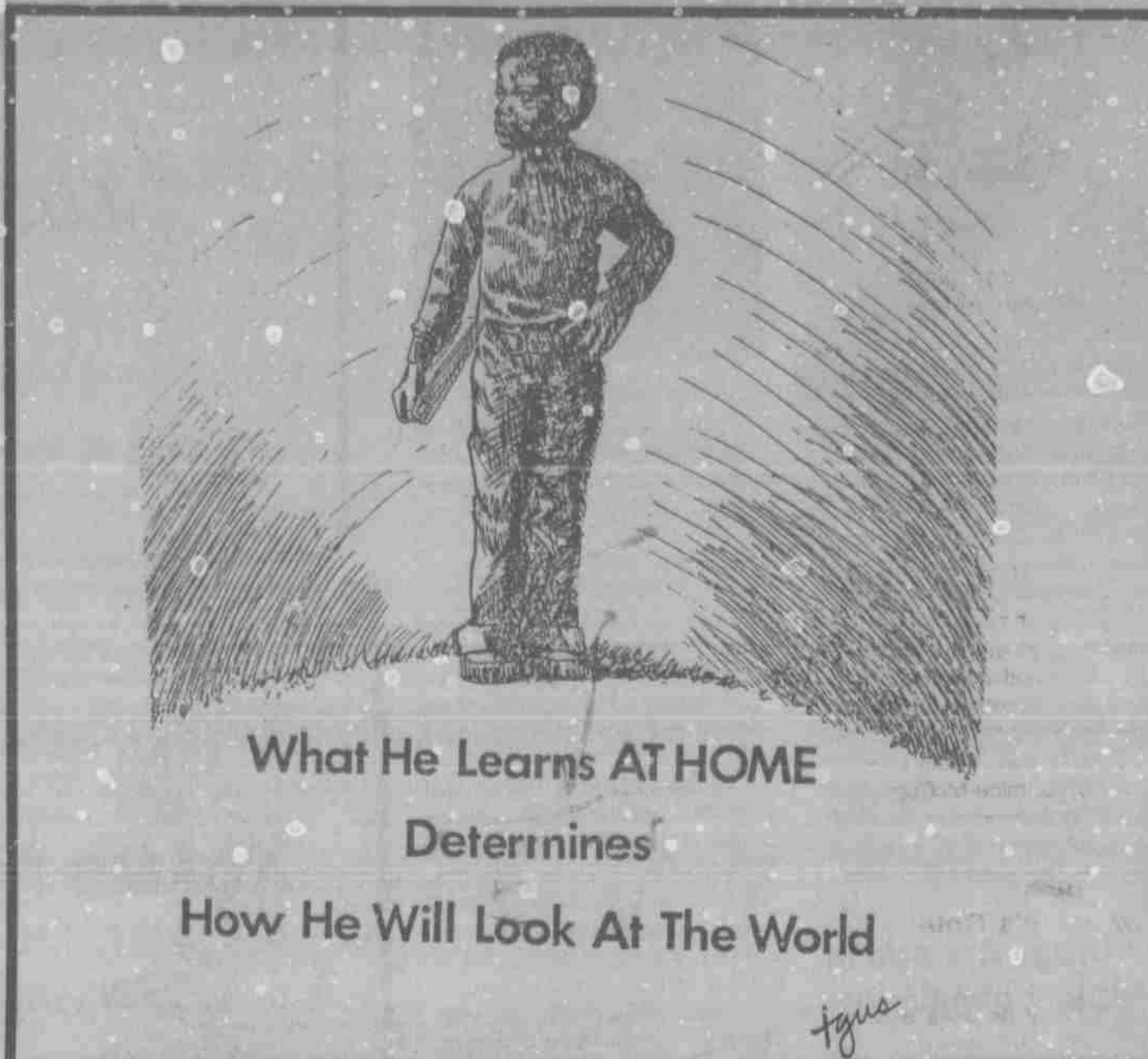

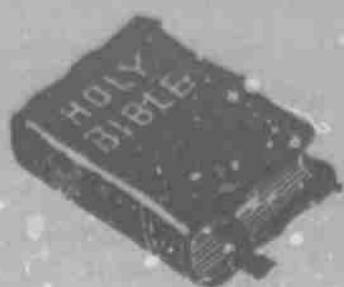

# Gale Sayers on SPORTS

## Playing the Television Game

With the number of black athletes in professional sports, it is surprising to many people that there aren't more black broadcasters in sports television. I have heard accusations of discrimination and racial bias on the part of the networks, charges that not enough blacks are getting a chance to succeed on television.

While I agree that there is a serious shortage of black broadcasters covering football and sports in general, I don't believe racial bias is the reason.

Let's face it, professional sports experience alone does not automatically qualify you for the broadcasting booth. To be in broadcasting, you have to have an extraordinary command of the English language, something too few professional athletes — black and white — have. This often is a result of educational backgrounds that emphasized athletics instead of communication and business skills.

I believe that the networks would like to hire more black athletes as sports commentators. Every year, auditions are held, and former sports stars are put through the routine by each network (all of which would love to find the next O.J. Simpson). Many athletes, however, have very serious, no-nonsense personalities, and in a field where a quick sense of humor means as much as sports knowledge, they often don't make the cut.

I know I wouldn't. Being in front of the TV camera is a tough assignment. I have a good command of the English language, but get me under the lights and put pressure on me, and I get tongue-tied.

I think Dan Jiggett on CBS and Tom Jackson on ESPN, two successful black National Football League (NFL) veterans on television, have shown that it takes that quick wit to make it these days. James Brown, who I think does a great job as a play-by-play man at CBS, never played in the NFL. He was a great basketball player and had several years experience in business before he came to television. The business experience, I'm sure, helped him learn the importance of being well-spoken.

Look at Greg Gumbel, the anchor for "The NFL Today." I don't think Gumbel ever played a sport in his life. But he and his brother Bryant, who started with sports on NBC and now hosts "Today" every weekday morning, obviously have placed emphasis on developing the art of speaking well. These two brothers have great on-air composure, confidence and eloquence.

Television is a money-making business that always is looking for the next big star. My best advice to any young athlete who envisions success in professional sports followed by a career in television is to prepare your mind along with your body. A mind that is in-shape will take you a lot more places than a well-conditioned body.

Gale Sayers is considered one of the greatest running backs of all time. The former Chicago Bear is a member of the National Football League's Hall of Fame.

## State Taxes Hit Record High

Despite the fact that tax increases are not popular with the American public, state legislatures handed out plenty of them recently, making fiscal year 1991 the biggest year in history for revenue raising by the states, according to a recent study by the Tax Foundation. "And with no robust recovery in sight," the study stated, "it is a trend which will cause an increasing amount of pain to state taxpayers."

Thirty states have enacted tax increases designed to raise a total of \$17 billion in new revenue during fiscal year 1992, reported the Washington, D.C.-based research organization. Gasoline and tobacco were the most popular targets, with 23 states raising the amount paid at gas pumps, and 14 states increasing cigarette excise taxes. The bulk of the new revenue, however, will be raised from higher sales taxes in six states and higher income taxes in eight states.

According to the Tax Foundation study, these tax increases are the latest in a trend of higher taxes and higher spending at the state level that began during the 1980s. State taxes grew an average of 8.6 percent throughout the last decade, outpacing inflation by three percentage points.

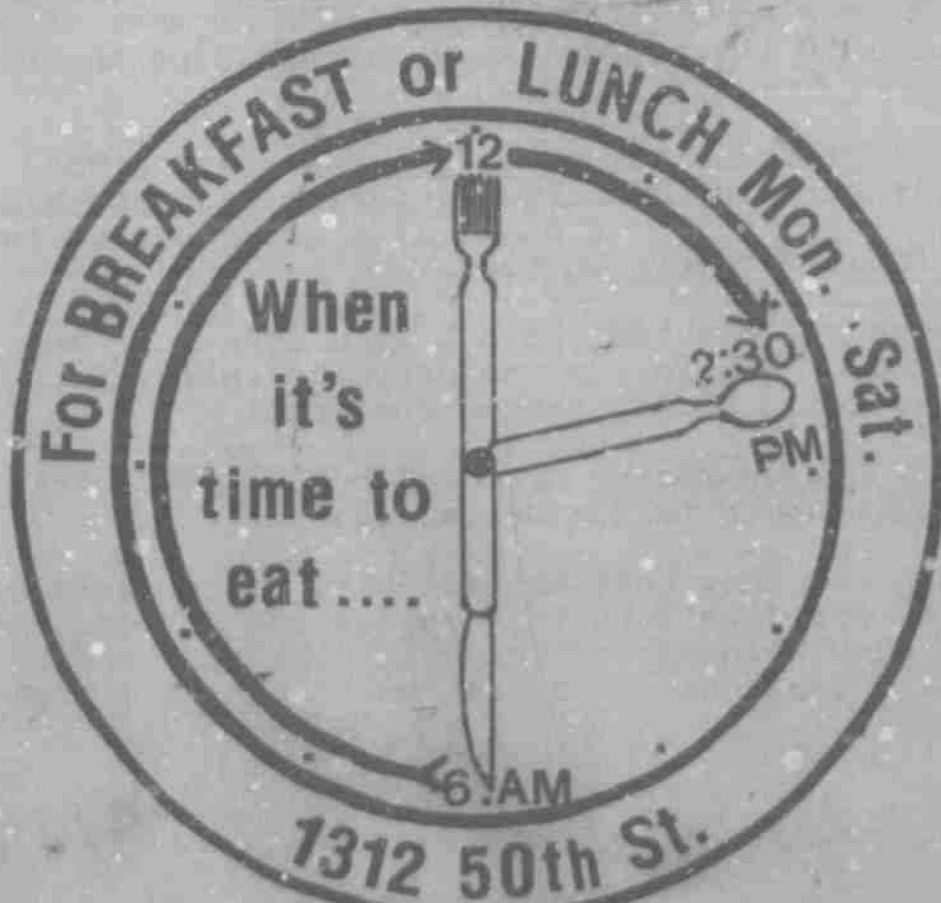

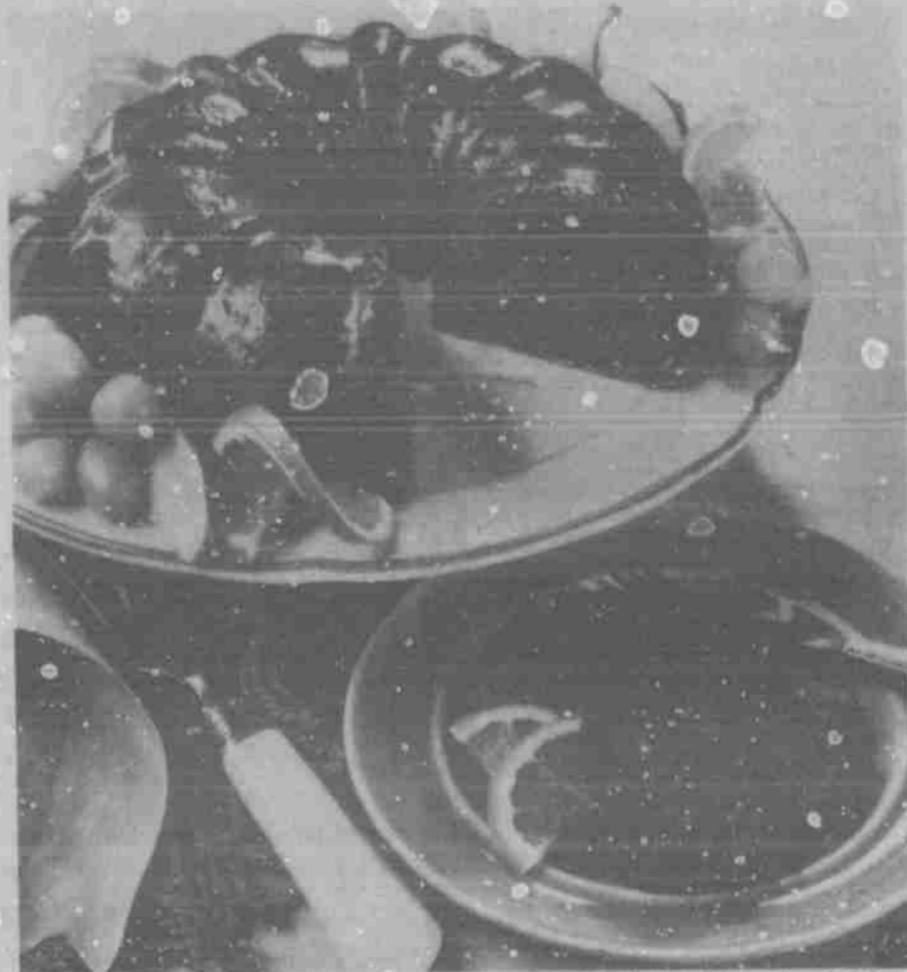
