

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

Strawberry Angels' Cake

1 baked and cooled, 10-inch 2 tablespoons unsweetened angel food cake (made from cocoa powder a packaged mix)

2 cups whipping cream

2 tablespoons powdered sugar

2 pint baskets California strawberries, stemmed and halved

Slice off entire top of cake about 1 inch down; set aside. To form tunnel, cut around inside of cake 1 inch from outer edge and 1 inch from inner edge, leaving a base of cake 1 inch thick on the bottom. Gently pull out cake within cuts (reserve for another use). Place hollowed cake on serving plate. In large bowl combine cream, sugar and cocoa; whip until soft peaks form. Spoon half the whipped cream into another bowl; fold in half the strawberries. Spoon mixture into cake tunnel, pressing down firmly. Replace top of cake; press gently. Frost cake with remaining cream mixture. Cover top of cake with remailing strawberries. Chill about 15 minutes before slicing

America is in a bubble when? Where? Do we find the answers? America needs at this point in time very strong leadership. Look to the top at our president he has to make a decision and stand by it.


Lani Guinner, a very sharp young lady, that was not given a chance to tell her side of the story. Mr. President, you have to pick a team and play on it.

GUN CONTROL IS NOT THE ANSWER

Washington, D.C. is where much of our nation's history is made. This is also the city with the highest crime rate in the nation and the strictest gun control laws. If history is being made here, could it be that history is trying to tell us something?

How do we solve the problem of violent crime plaguing our great nation? Gun control is not the answer. The criminals will always find a way to bypass that system. I believe we need stiffer and surer punishment imposed on those convicted of crimes where firearms are used. We have got to be tough and enforce the laws that are already in existence.

It's obvious the criminal justice system isn't enough of a deterrent. Just read the paper or watch the evening news. Take a look at the large number of criminals being released from jail, only to commit another violent crime, many times taking away someone's precious life.

Why isn't jail something that criminals fear? Claybe jail has become the only place where criminals can feel at home. If that's the case, we've got to find a way to improve the penal system so that those who engage in a crime where a firearm is used are appropriately penalized.

While each state makes its own raws concerning the punishment for crimes, I hope Texas and other states will ' ke a look at California's law concerning crimes committed with a firearm. In California, if a person uses a freeum in the commission of a felony, upon being convicted; that person would receive an enhanced jail sentence anywhare from three to five years. So if the normal punishment for that crime was a ten year jail term, the person could be sentenced to fifteen years in prison. The California slogan "Use a gun - go to jail" really has teeth in it.

The Brady Handgun Violence Prevention Act is one of several gun control bills that have been introduced in Congress again this year. I plan to oppose that bill along with all other gun control legislation. The Brady Bill would provide for a waiting period before a handgun is purchased, during which a criminal background check would be performed. Ultimately, this type of system would adversely affect only the sportsman, who owns a gun for recreational purposes. The criminals would purchase their firearms illegally, as most of them do already.

Several weeks ago I attended a hearing focusing on the increasing numbers of violent incidents involving children. One of the witnesses was an 18-year old teenager who had once fallen into the wrong crowd. The boy's only constant companion now is his wheelchair. Last summer, one of the teen's friends was killed and he was paralyzed following a drive-by shooting. He is now a member of a group called P.O.W.E.R., or People Opening the World's Eyes to Reality. The group hopes to warn children about the dangers of being involved with violent behavior.

I asked the teen if he had ever owned a gun; and his answer was no. I asked him if he could get one. "Easily", he responded. And then I asked this 18-year old boy, who will spend the rest of his life in a whoelchair, "If we had a gun control law in this country where it was illegal, could you still get a gun?" Without hesitation, this young man answered,

Gun control clearly has not worked in the District of Columbia. Every day on the news I hear about another innocent human being whose life has been taken away by an unfeeling criminal with a gun. And we all know guns are not the only veapons used by criminals. Just as many people are injured or killed with knives, hammers, and other objects. So would the killings stop if we outlawed knives an' hammers? Let's start channelling our efforts to get at the real root of the problem. We don't need to control the guns, we need to control people who use them for illegal acts. The laws are there, they just need to be enforced

Many times you hear about band-aid solar ains to problems. I believe gon control would be the wrong me. Line for the sickness. Instead we should focus our attention on finding a cure for the disease, and ! believe the right medicine is enforcing all of our current laws and making sure those convected receive swift and suce punishment.





"Be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God."

Romans 12:2 It is said that the most powerful argument for justifying a questionable action is, "everybody else is, why shouldn't 1?" It is very hard to fight an argument like that: The precedent is established; the majority sanctioned it; anyone who balks

at "doing it" is behind the times and need to be peers of

the realm of "now." If the pressure of "everybody else is" affected only dress, hair style, amusements, and decorations, perhaps there would be no cause for alarm. But the pressures exerted upon us by groups to which we give allegiance extend to every areas of life. This includes ministers, business leaders, school administrators, etc. Committed group members are to be loyal and involved; they are to have a sense of belonging and a feeling that the group is an extension of themselves

and they are an extension of the group. Group members tend to share values and goal; and they interact frequently. However, there are some extreme forms of conformity among some groups. The requirement for admission to a street gang may be to commit a felony or some other act that is considered deviant behavior. We may regard these as abnormal submission to control of a group, but they suggest a very important fact involving the society in which we live; the need to belong to a group has become increasingly important and even more important than the

things in which the group believes. We live in a world where we constantly hear in refrain: "Everyone else is doing it, why should 1?" We live in a society where moral standards are being determined by non-Christian groups. These are groups who's members runs the risk of being ridiculed if they announce they are in opposition to the evils of their groups. And not wanting to be an outcast, the member in opposition usually capitulates and allows the group to dictate the standards for his action.

Christian homes are gravely threatened today by outside pressures. Television, movies, newspapers, magazines, radio, all subject us to the constant bombardment of ideas that are contrary to the mind of Christ. Our only protection against these and other insidious influences is to submit ourselves to the remolding of God's Spirit. We must be willing to be different, following not the ways of the world but the ways of God.

Richards Awards \$237,895 Grant To The City of Lubbock

Austin -- Governor Ann Richards awarded \$273,895 to the City of Lubbock a federal drug control grant to fund the South Plains Regional Narcoatics Task Force. This grant was part of \$27.4 million in federal drug control grants that were awarded to 83 law enforcement projects across the state.

The funds will provide the task force with personnel, equipment, and operating supplies to combat the use and transshipment of illegal drugs in the areaa. The grant will impact Bailey, Lamb, Hockley, Hale, Lubbock, Lynn, Floyd, Crosby, Galza, Motley, and Dickens Counties.

"The South Plains Regional Nacotics Task Force will go a long way in fighting the drug problem in this state," said Richards. "With these monies we can continue our efforts to stop the problem at the source, and that is on the streets."

The money will be used to continue and expand the Governor's Texas Narcotice Control Program, which funds antidrug task forces, drug offender prosecution programs, and drug-related impact courts in key areas across the state. All projects require a minimum 25 percent local cash match.

The projects funded across the state include 47 law enforcement task forces, nine court adjudication projects, four drug offender prosecution projects, and eight special projects.

The federal grant includes funds to 47 multi-agency, multi-jurisdictional task forces already in operation. The task forces in the past five years have arrested 61,234 individu-

als, contiscated more than \$1.7 billion in illegal drugs, and seized more than \$88 million in property, including more than 2,500 weapons.

The 1993 Texas Narcotics Control Program will provide ove. 500 law enforcement officers, 65 prosecuting attorneys, 10 judges, and 200 support personnel, such as court

reporters, chemists crime analysts, and clerks, to the war on drugs in the state of Texas.

The criteria for awarding the anti-drug grants was based on the analysis of the drug problem and the priorities established in the Statewicke Strategy for Drug and Violent Crime Control, which was developed by the Governor's Drug Policy Advisory Board.
