

That December, he gradu-ated from Texas Tech with a bachelor's degree in music edu-cation. When he left for the Uni-versity of Wisconsin to earn his master's degree, COMA col-lapsed. But Aguero returned in December 1974 and restarted the organization in 1976. Aguero was also heavily in-

the organization in 1976. Aguero was also heavily in-volved in local politics. He helped organize protests for in-justices against Mexican Amer-icans. Aguero was one of a group of Lubbock residents who filed a lawsuit against the Lub-bock Independent School Dis-trict to change its method of trict to change its method of electing school trustees so repre-sentation would be more fair to non-whites.

He is survived by his wife, four children and four



Though the prejudices of Texas and Arkansas soon encroached upon Oklahoma, the open spaces and fighting spirit of the people whom Ellison grew up among whom Ellison grew up among did provide him with a relatively

unbiased atmosphere. The story of Ellison life con-tinues with the death of Lewis Ellison, his father in 1917 and left the based left Ida, his mother, Ralph and his younger brother Herbert quite poor. To support the fam-ily, Ida worked as a domestic and stewardess at Avery Chapel

African Methodist Episcopal Church. The family moved into the parsonage and Ellison was brought into close contact with the minister's library. His mother encourages Ralph to mother encourages Raiph to read by bringing books and magazines home for him from the houses she cleaned. In addi-tion, a black Episcopal priest in the city challenged the white custom of barring blacks from the public library and the custom was overturned. Ellison's horizons were broadened to a world outside his own sheltered life in Oklahoma City, by the many books now available to him in the library. Ellison left Okla-homa and headed to the Tuskegee Institute in Alabama to study music, with the help of a scholarship he had worn from the

the state of Oklahoma. At Tuskegee, Ellison was in-troduced to Alain Locke, a New Black thinker, who would lead Ellison to his writing career and his writing of Invisible Man. El his writing of invisible Man. El-lison succeeded because he was able to rise above the cesspool of racial bias and cultural igno-rance of white people of his day!







## A Year of Tragedy and Triumph for Jennifer Hudson

CHICAGO (AP) — In the year since three members of her family were brutally killed in Chicago, Grammy and Oscar winner Jennifer Hudson has found ways to heal and start a new life And it appears the 28-year-old

is happy again. The actress and singer has

The actress and singer has gushed over her role as a new mother. She has started going out again, including an appear-ance at a New York gala just days ago. And she's poured her-self into her work, from a gospel-tinged rendition of the national anthem at the Super Bowl months after the slayings to a "VHL Divas" concert in Bowi months after the stayings to a "VH1 Divas" concert in New York last month. Now she is set to return to Chicago in a few weeks to film

an ABC prime-time special in which she'll share memories of her childhood Christmases in her old neighborhood and the church where she started

singing. It will be a bittersweet ney as she films "Jennifer Hud-son: I'll Be Home for Christmas," which is scheduled to air in December.

to air in December. A year ago, just as her career was really taking off with roles in movies like "Sex and the City" and "The Secret Life of Bees," Hudson had to return home for the worst reason pos-

sible. On Oct. 24, 2008, the bodies of her mother, Darnell Hudson Donerson, 57, and brother, Jason Hudson, 29, were found in the family's home on the city's South Side. The body of her 7-year-old nephew, Julian King, was found days later in a sport utility vehicle on the city's West Side, just over 10 miles away.

All three had been shot. Hudson has repeatedly de-clined to talk about publicly about the killings. She and her publicist declined interview re-quests from The Associated Press.

Press. "She's heartbroken," said Bob Israel, 40, who was friends with Jason Hudson and lives near the Hudsons' Chicago,home. "They were a close-knit family." William Balfour, the estranged husband of Jennifer Hudson's sister, Julia, was charged with first-degree murder in the killings. Prosecutors alleged Balfour killed them in a jealous rage because he was upset Julia Balfour killed them in a jealous rage because he was upset Julia Hudson was dating another man. Balfour pleaded not guilty and remains jailed. Several calls to his public defender were not re-

turned. The following days were tu-multuous for Jennifer Hudson, including a trip to the Cook County medical examiner's of-fice to identify King's body.

A picture of the cherub-faced boy, nicknamed "Juice Box," was posted on Hudson's My-Space page after the killings and



eye. By February, she had launched back into work, filming a video for "If This Isn't Love," followed by the Super Bowl performance and a Grammy win for best R&B album for her self-titled

and a Grammy win for best R&B album for her self-titled debut CD. Hudson, who first gained fame as a finalist on "American Idol" in 2004, returned to Chicago last month to perform "Spotlight" for "The Oprah Win-frey Show." "It feels good to be home," Hudson told the crowd on Chicago's Magnificent Mile. The trip garnered the respect of many, including residents in Englewood, one of the city's most troubled neighborhoods where Hudson grew up. "People look up to her," said Aaron Wright, 38, who lives in Englewood. "Even in tragedy, you still come home and repre-sent where you come from. For her to come back home, that gave everybody else strength." These days, Jennifer Hudson is focusing on her son, David, named after her fiance Daniel David Otunga. Hudson recently talked with reporters about her son, saying

Hudson recently talked with reporters about her son, saying she's looking forward to seeing "who he becomes, who he takes after, if he'll sing."

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Like many others, I always assumed that Watch Night was a fairly standard Christian reli-gious service -- made a bit more Afro centric because that's what

Afro centric because that's what happens when elements of Christianity become linked with the Black Church. Still, it seemed that predomi-nately White Christian churches did not include Watch Night services on their calendars, but focused instead on Christmas Eve programs


focused instead on Christmas Eve programs. In fact, there were instances where clergy in mainline de-nominations wondered aloud about the propriety of linking re-ligious services with a secular holiday like New Year's Eve. However, there is a reason for the importance of New Year's Eve services in African Ameri-can concreations.

n congregations. The Watch Night Services in The Watch Night Services in Black communities that we cel-ebrate today can be traced back to gatherings on December 31, 1862, also known as "Freedom's

On that night, Blacks came to gether in churches and private homes all across the nation, anx-iously awaiting news that the Emancipation Proclamation actually had become law

tually had become law. Then, at the stroke of mid-night, it was January 1, 1863, and all slaves in the Confederate States were declared legally free When the news was received, there were prayers, shouts and songs of joy as people fell to their knees and thanked God. Black folks hava gutbered in their knees and thanked God. Black folks have gathered in churches annually on New Year's Eve ever since, praising God for bringing us safely through another year. It's been 145 years since that first Freedom's Eve and many of

us were never taught the African American history of Watch Night, but tradition still brings us together.



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
