## High School, Junior High Set 'Open House' This Week

"Muleshoe ISD will observe Texas Public School Week, March 4-9, and emphasize the theme "Public Education is a Sound Investment in America," says H. John Fuller, superintendent. "Citizens need to understand more fully the benefits of investing in education, and

schools need to communicate better to taxpayers the importance of that investment," Fuller adds.

Muleshoe High School will host Open House on Thursday, March 7, from 7-9 p.m. Wayland Ethridge, principal, invites patrons to visit the schools and talk with teachers and administrators concerning tutorial services, graduation requirements, absences, TABS tests, the school calendar and other school related issues.

Fred Mardis, principal, invites parents and other interested patrons to attend Open House in the Watson Junior High School on Thursday, March 7 from 7-9 p.m.

Projects made by the junior high students will be on display at the History Fair and the Science Fair and all teachers will be in their rooms to talk with parents.

Milton Oyler and Bill Taylor, elementary principals, hosted Open House in the fall, but they encourage parents to visit their respective schools anytime during this special week.

"Muleshoe ISD has adopted plans, goals and objectives to constantly improve the quality of education, but it takes a team effort of the community and the school to make this investment in human resources pay off," Fuller concluded.

## California Balloons Find Way To Texas

West Camp farmer Clarence Kube was surprised four weeks ago when he went out to a summer garden plot and found several balloons. The cluster of eight unbroken balloons had apparently landed in the garden area during the previous night.

A couple of days ago, Kube received an answer to the letter he had written to John Wilkes, a Honda salesman in Temecula, Calif. After finding a business card attached to the balloons, he wrote the California business and told them of finding the balloons.

Below are two reproductions of newspaper stories following the balloon incident:

"TEMECULA-Honda of Temecula's reputation literally 'ballooned' this past week thanks to salesman John Wilkes' inflated gimmick to spread the dealership's name across the countryside.

"Wilkes' attached his business card, which read, 'Call Me,' to some ordinary carnival balloons that he launched into the night air at the Honda car dealership's grand opening Feb. 2. Some of the bunches of balloons he tied together didn't make it any further than a local dairy.

"But one group floated down in Clarence Kibe's okra patch in Muleshoe, Texas. As the crow flies, that's about 850 miles east of Temecula.

"When Wilkes returned to work Monday, Feb. 11, after having the weekend off, a letter from Kube was waiting on his desk. Wilkes' business card was enclosed with the message that

the eight balloons landed "not busted" in some okra stalks the morning of February 4.

"I'm really impressed with the distance," the Wildomar said. He also was impressed with the speed at which the balloons traveled.

February 18-21 was designated as Patriotic Week for the Muleshoe schools. Watson Junior High observed each day with varied activities.

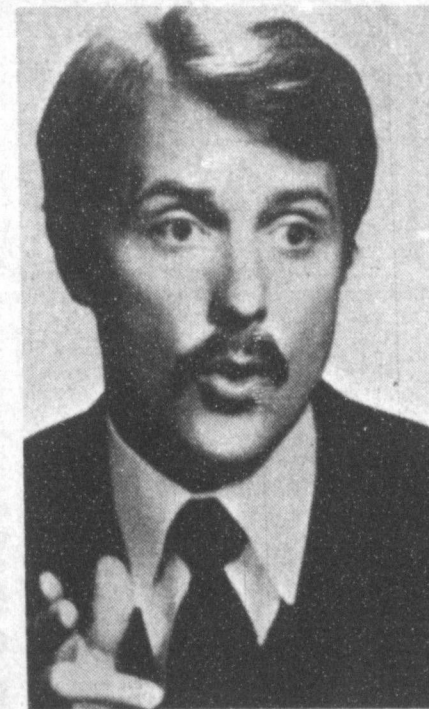
One activity that peaked the students' interests was the race to the Statue of Liberty. The three junior high classes, sixth through eighth, raced to see which class had the fastest "spenders."

## FmHA Eases Regulation For Loans To Farmers

Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) in Muleshoe is among the national FmHA offices currently making changes in its regulations to encourage commercial lenders to help their farm borrowers who are having economic problems, by taking advantage of the FmHA's debt adjustment program according to Henry W. Taylor III, county supervisor.

The debt adjustment program is part of the Farm Credit Initiative announced by President Reagan last September. It is designed to help banks and other lenders to reduce the amount of loan payments down to level farmers can afford.

Taylor said the program allows FmHA to guarantee a portion of farm loans owned to banks and other lenders under certain conditions. FmHA agrees to make up part of the loss to the lender if the borrower defaults. This government guarantee makes it possible for the lenders to stay with their farm borrowers longer than they could otherwise.

New regulations will help banks and other lenders cooperative with the program, also, according to Taylor, by allowing them to write down interest in exchange for the government

guarantee. Previously, they were required to write off a minimum of ten percent of the principal of the loan. When the change becomes effective, they can reduce the loan through interest or principal or a combination of both.

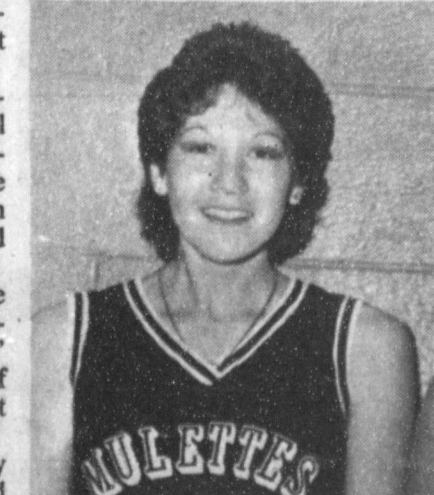
Under another part of the President's Farm Credit Initiatives, FmHA is reviewing loans of its own borrowers. FmHA County Supervisors will be getting additional staff help from other U.S. Department of Agriculture agencies to review FmHA loans.

FmHA also has selected expert credit teams that will assist farm borrowers if the bank they have loans with has failed. In addition, the agency is cooperating with state and other agriculture agencies and groups to establish a "hot line" telephone service in some areas.

The Agriculture Department is working closely with other federal and regulatory agencies such as the Treasury Department, the Farm Credit Administration, the Comptroller of the Currency and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) to provide whatever help they can for farm borrowers in economic trouble, Taylor said.

**FmHA Will Hire Temporary Employees**

The Farmers Home Administration will hire additional temporary employees to help process farm loan applications in Texas FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch said today. "We will begin hiring the extra staff immediately," Futch said. "The new employees will be temporary. They will serve for four months to help with the seasonal loan peak and to process loans for hundreds of farmers who have requested a review of their debt situation to see if they qualify for the new debt restructuring program." Under the new program, farmers who are having trouble meeting their FmHA payments, may have their loans re-

scheduled or have up to 25 percent of their loans, up to \$200,000, set aside for five years with no interest. Farm loans held by commercial banks and other lenders that are classified as "problem loans," can be reduced by ten percent in exchange for an FmHA guarantee. "We already know where qualified potential staff people are," Futch said, "and we hope to put them to work as soon as possible. Most of them are familiar with our loan processing requirements, and a minimum of new training should be required." The additional personnel will be assigned to FmHA offices where the work load is greatest, Futch said. "The new temporary employees will include both loan specialists and clerical staff."

"Where is Muleshoe? It's 22 miles east of Clovis, N.M., "right over the Texas border, 15 to 20 miles inside the state line," Wilkes said."

And according to a second news story from California:

"TEMECULA-They floated into the sky at Temecula, those little helium-filled balloons. They came down in Muleshoe, Texas.

"Before launching them from the Honda of Temecula parking lot, salesman John Wilkes had taped one of his business cards to the string that tied the eight balloons together.

### UPHOLSTERY FIRES DECLINE

--Upholstered furniture is safer than it used to be, but caution--especially with cigarettes is still necessary to prevent fires, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service housing specialist. The National Fire Prevention Association and the U.S. Fire Administration report a 37% decline since 1978 in upholstered furniture fires started by burning cigarettes, says Dr. Peggy Owens.

## Carbon Monoxide -- 'The Silent Killer'

Because you can't see it, taste it or smell it, carbon monoxide has earned the name, "the silent killer."

"Carbon monoxide is not a product of automobile exhaust alone. Whenever any fuel is burned, carbon monoxide is usually one of the by-products. If it escapes into the rooms of your home, the air you breathe can kill you," says Dr. Gary Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"As you breathe, oxygen in the air combines with your blood and is carried to all parts of your body. Because carbon monoxide combines with your blood 200 times more readily than oxygen, a relatively small amount can displace the life-giving oxygen you need," emphasizes Nelson.

As carbon monoxide crowds out the oxygen, weakness,

dizziness and confusion will result, notes the engineer. Further oxygen starvation will ultimately result in death.

Nelson offers these tips for protecting your family from deadly carbon monoxide:

--Have your heating systems (furnace, space heater, water heater and fireplace) checked annually to make sure they are operating efficiently and that vents, pipes, flues and chimneys are tight. Never alter or tamper with a heating device.

--Since heating devices, especially central furnaces, require a lot of air for proper operation, make certain they are not starved for air. Check with your heating contractor or fuel supplier to be sure.

--Don't close your fireplace damper until you are certain the fire is out.

--Make certain your attached garage is well sealed-off from the rest of the house. Never run your car engine in a closed garage.

--No heating device, designed for venting, should be used until it has been properly vented to the outside.

--Use only heating devices that bear the label of a nationally-recognized testing laboratory. Follow the manufacturer's recommendations concerning their installation and use.

--When changing from one type of fuel to another, have all appliances involved adjusted by a qualified serviceman.

--Use charcoal grills and hibachis only in well ventilated areas.
